As the countdown for a US war against Iraq starts, Yemen slams US accusations

BY YEMEN TIMES STAFF AND REUTERS

Sanaa - Amid high anxiety in the region including Yemen concerning the possible US war against Iraq, new tensions have started to emerge between Sanaa and Washington concerning allegations of Yemenis on terrorism.

Yemen had slammed on Wednesday U.S. charges that two Yemenis held in Germany, including a prominent Islamic cleric, supported al Qaeda and Hamas, and demanded that they be returned home.


The two men were charged with providing millions of dollars, weapons and recruits to al- Qaeda and the militant Palestinian group Hamas at a U.S. court on Tuesday, about two months after their arrest in Germany.

"He is innocent. It is illogical that a Yemeni with \$20 million would hand it to Osama bin Laden," a Yemeni official told Reuters on the sidelines of a summit of the Organization of the Islamic Conference in the Qatari capital Doha. He was referring to

Sheikh Mohammed Ali Hasan al-Moayad who was arrested along with his aide, Mohammed Mohsen Yahya Zayed, in Frankfurt on a U.S. request on January 10. "We reaffirm our call to hand him to Yemeni authorities. If the United States has any concrete evidence, it should present it to the Yemeni authorities," the official said. On the other hand, Al-Sahwa.net reported last week that Anis Al-Duyais, who flew to Germany to meet Al-Moayad, reported horrifying stories about his jail conditions. **Continued** on P19



The Yemeni government failed to convince the Parliament in a 6-year tenure to endorse the law to regulate arms possession. The bill has been stuck in the parliament. The parliament ended up its term last Friday without endorsing the law which means that the amended law which was debated by a committee in the parliament, set up for this purpose, will be shifted to be a main issue waiting the next parliament to be formed after the upcoming parliamentary elections on April 27th. Political observers believe this is a landslide victory for Sheikh Abdullah bin Hussein al-Ahmar, Speaker of Parliament and leader of Hashid Tribe and Islah party as well, winning the battle with other tribal figures against the government.

Sa'ada governorate security authorities transferred last Tuesday prisoners called as the Faithful Youth from the Political and General Security prison to an area called Arozaimat and Manshour after they distributed leaflets in the governorate by some of their supporters accusing the governor Brigadier General, Yahya al-Omari of being a secret agent for the US.

Sources in Sa'ada told the Yemen Times that detention of those activists was carried out when they wrote anti-US slogans in the governorate's streets and distributed leaflets in the same context.

The sources said that the detainees were not al-Qaeda supporters and it is probable that they belong to the Shiite Islamic Movement.

Sa'ada is one of the significant governorates in the republic where the Islamic movement is founded.

In addition, it has one of the largest Salafi Islamic Movement centers in Yemen known as, Dar al-Hadeeth House Center in Dammaj.

Meanwhile, the governorate of Sa'ada celebrated last week the Day of Ghadeer, the day on which Imam Ali bin Abi Taleb assumed the Caliphate of the Muslim state.

On the other hand, informed sources added that Ali bin Abdulmajeed Azzandani, the son of the Sheikh Abdulmajeed visited Dammaj religious center last week and held meetings with the religious Salafi scholars at the center.

According to sources in the region, the visit's objective is basically to support the Brothers Muslims Movement (Al-Ikhwan Al-Muslimoon) during the upcoming parliamentary elections which are to be held on April 27, 2003.

In addition to this, the visit also aims at unifying visions where the Islamic movement has undergone crisis due the current international developments.

Sources said that the Salafia religious leaders will not participate in the elections, but it was not clear whether they will support religious candidates.

It is to be mentioned here that the Salafi Movement has about 100 religious centers and institutions. Thousands of students from different countries in the world enroll in those centers to enhance their knowledge in Islam and Quran.

Researchers demand their dues

Employees and researchers at the Yemeni Studies and Research Center staged a sit-in in, protesting what they described as , "unjust arbitrariness" against the finance ministry for recouping their salaries guaranteed by a law equaling them to their dues with those of the teaching staff at universities.

In a statement issued last Wednesday by researchers at the Yemeni Studies and Research Center said that a 10-year period has elapsed and their demands haven't been met yet.

The statement added that researchers at the center have showed a great interest on that the law and judiciary are their utmost support on their demands. In this regard, the center researchers have got four judicial orders for their legal rights in order to get their dues. The first legal right was on December 20, 2002, the justice minister's speeches, the prime minister, and recommendations of the parliament.

All those bodies confirmed not only on adhering to what have been mentioned at the judicial orders, but also increasing their accredited financial allocations for scientific researches.

"This stage-in symbolizes the researchers' insistence to continue on demanding their rights and their readiness to protest using all the civilized forms and ways in order to make their voices heard for the direct and indirect concerned bodies and to disclose illegal practices of the finance ministry,"

One of the protesters during the sitin said 1.000.000 has been approved by Yemeni government and such amount of money is insufficient even for the paper requirements.

"This is a clear testimony of not paying an attention or interest by the gov-

Take for instance, Israel, around 30 percent is approved for the benefit of the scientific research out of its annual budget. Around USD 25 billion is allotted for military research purposes," he concluded.

The total number of male voters is 4 million 682 thousand and 48 while the total number of female voters is 3 millions 415 thousand and 114.





<u>The Prophet's Hijra,</u> Lessons must be learnt

he possible war on Iraq, the American arrogance, the Arab and Islamic conferences permeated with squabbles and speeding up interna-

tional events have left their gloomy impact on Islamic peoples and thus the Islamic new year passed in a state of sadness. Many Muslims however, confuse the new Hijriya year with the day of Prophet Mohammed's (mpbh) Hijra (migration) to Al-Madina. Although the Hijri (using the moon

cycle calculation method for months) Calender has taken the name from the Hijra event as such, and in fact, the calender use started in the year the Hijra took place. Towards the end of Saffar or as other sayings claim, the beginning of Rabi'e Al-Awal a great event with meanings of greatness took place. It was a day that changed the course of history and reformulated life in a way the straightened deviation and illuminated the path and reestablished the balance after despotism of pre-Islam period.

The Hijra was not an escape but rather a quest for a more fertile society and environment and more appropriate for accepting the new religion. A quick reading of the Hijra, since its preparations till its fulfillment, discloses clearly its importance and greatness. It reveals to us rare images

of sacrifice for the sake of the religion. a deed by all the tribes and thus make Prophet and his companion as when The watertight political, strategic, tactical and security thought the Prophet and his companions had pursued depicts cleverness and shrewdness displayed by the Prophet, not only regarding the Hijra but also throughout his entire mode of life.

Biographers have overlooked the thinking, planning and organization of the Hijra. Detecting events and stands during the Hijra, we would find out the Prophet's wisdom and planning and dependence on God and then on the human factor. When the polytheists gathered at Dar al-Nadwa and discussed the way with which to get rid of the Prophet and the infantile call for the new religion, they decided to have forty men from representing all the tribes there to kill the Prophet the time he leaves his house and thus make it as

it impossible for the Prophet's tribe to have revenge. The revelation came upon the Prophet ordering him to migrate. Here the Prophet asked the Imam Ali to stay in the Prophet's bed. The prophet went to the house of his faithful companion Abubakr al-Siddiq and told him about his decision.

As the Prophet was aware that the tribe of Quraish would follow him and they would mostly chase him along the road heading for the city of Madeina to the north of Mecca, he preferred to take the opposite way to the south lading to Yemen and so he travelled five miles to reach the Mountain of Thor. Despite the human effort in camouflage and hiding Quraish managed to reach the cave where they stood at its entrance. Here the God's will interfered to save the

the chasers saw the spider's cobweb covering the cave entrance and was not damaged they ruled out the Prophet had entered that cave and left the place.

Quraish had used torture to wring out information on the Prophet's migration and they used that way with Imam Ali and Asma' bint Abubakr. They had also used temptation by promising big awards to those who would give information leading to capture the Prophet. It is clear that reading the events of Hijra gives us an idea on the aspects of caution and watchfulness and means of providing protection to the call.

Russian Ambassador Alexander Zasypkin to YT: Arabs and Russia united on Iraq

ussian Ambassador to Yemen, H.E. Mr. Alexander Zasypkin, 51, is known to be one of the most active, and dedicated ambassadors in Yemen. He started working in the diplomatic sector in the Russian Ministry of Foreign Affairs since 73, which means that this year he has marked three decades in service.

He started his diplomatic career in the USS embassy in Syria where he worked for 17 years. Then he became the Charge d' affaires of his country's embassy in Riyadh and then he started his mission in Yemen as the Minister Plenipotentiary of the Russian Embassy in Sanaa during 1994-95. Then he became the deputy manager of the Middle East and North African Office at the Russian Foreign Ministry. Finally he became the Ambassador of the Russian Federation to the Republic of Yemen in 2002, which is the post he is in today.

In an interview with Yemen Times, Mr. Zasypkin valued present Yemeni-Russian bilateral relations and said, "There is tangible improvement in bilateral relations between Sanaa and Moscow. Relations have enhanced especially after the latest visit of President Ali Abdullah Saleh to Moscow, which gave the bond between our two countries unprecedented strength."

"It is clear that the discussions that Vladimir Putin and Yemeni President Saleh have boosted bilateral relations between the two friendly countries after almost a decade of stagnancy."

companies have already applied to Yemen seeking approval to invest in the country in several industrial and exploration fields and in free trade between the two nations. I have come to know that major Russian companies in the oil industry have realized the potential in working on exploring oil in Yemen.

I can say that the number of initiatives and requests to find new projects in fields such as gas, electricity and oil, etc. in Yemen is in the rise. We hope that good circumstances based on international standards will be provided to Russian companies willing to invest in Yemen once they agree to work in oil and gas exploration or in the electricity and trade sectors. In the meantime, we are intensifying direct contacts with the chambers of commerce and industry in both Sanaa and Moscow to arrive to an agreement that would serve both parties best. Fourthly, after we have signed the cultural and educational cooperation agreement between the two governments in Moscow in an earlier time, we have now started preparing the executive program that would guarantee the cooperation in this field, which will include all the specific articles in the agreement so as to provide academic scholarships to Yemeni students and to also initiate academic and cultural exchange programs to benefit both countries' peoples.' In an answer to a question on military cooperation and Russian assistance to Yemen so as to modernize the Yemeni military forces, the Russian Ambassador said, "We have to find the appropriate method to cooperate militarily because we do understand the limited resources of Yemen, and we will try to provide Russian assistance - which would not be as much as what used to be during the USSR period - that would include various ways to facilitate payments for purchased weapons." On the Russian stance concerning the Iraqi issue, the ambassador expressed his satisfaction with the results produced by the last Arab summit held at Sharam Al-Sheikh in Egypt including the final declaration that openly confirmed Arab opposition of using force to disarm Iraq. This shows that Arabs and Russians are united in their stance concerning Iraq.

The ambassador praised President Saleh's leading role in making a success out of the Arab Summit and his role in 114-member Non-Aligned the Movement (NAM) Conference held in the Malaysian capital Kuala Lumpur.

As for the Russian stance towards the Iraqi issue he said, "We have done our best to limit the chances of a possible US-led war against Iraq. We are confident that a peaceful solution could be found, especially as current circumstances have become more suitable than before for effective inspections."

The 1441 Security Council resolution enabled the UN inspectors to work more efficiently and we think that they will be able to achieve their mission successfully because their ultimate goal is to find whether Iraq still possesses weapons of mass destruction or not."

The Russian Ambassador confirmed that the inspection committees have the capability to achieve the desired goals and that the international community should help them fulfill their responsibilities in a complete manner.

"On its part, Iraq has allowed the UN inspectors in to inspect all its installations and also allowed them to make interviews with Iraqi scientists. Furthermore, Iraq's destruction of its Sumoud II missiles demonstrates their cooperation.

"The anti-nuclear weapons agreements should include all countries of the world. We are in favor of disarming the Middle East region from weapons of mass destruction.

At the same time, achieving that is not an easy task because it encompasses other political and military purposes particularly concerning the Israeli-Arab conflict. This can not be solved overnight because it is an extremely sensitive issue."

Regarding crisis in the Caucasus Mountains, the Ambassador said that

the economic and security conditions have begun to be improved in that region. "This manifests itself when the terror acts are about to be purged in the republic. In addition to this, other vital infrastructures are operated again. Schools opened their doors for students and the social conditions have begun to improve in the entire region." he said. He added that on March 23, there will be the constitution referendum and the presidential and parliamentary elec-

will establish a very strong foundation to reach a satisfactory compromise. Preparations are in full swing to start a dialogue between the majority of the republic and other political forces, particularly those who still have strong isolated stances.

The Ambassador then briefly stated the main steps taken to achieve better relations between the two countries.

"Firstly, the political dialogue between the two leaders during the latest visit of President Saleh to Moscow tackled major regional and international issues along with bilateral relations which are shaping up in a serious and unique manner. The dialogue has indeed demonstrated that the two leaders have common views on major issues in the world.

Secondly, based on the bilateral cooperation traditions that have been continuous during the last forty years in the military field, the Russian Federation is willing to participate in modernizing the Yemeni military forces. We believe this coincides with the interest of the Yemeni nation and the interest of neighboring nations in terms of security.

Thirdly, unfortunately, throughout the last years relations between the two countries went through tough times especially concerning economic and trade-related cooperation, which was active for more than 75 years between the two friendly nations. However, following the visit of President Saleh to Moscow, interest and determination in investing in Yemen by several Russian companies and investors has increased.

A large number of businessmen and

When difficulties arise, they can be solved through dialogue and peaceful means between Iraq and the inspectors. Russia strongly rejected the use of force against Iraq without the authorization of the Security Council.

Russia in this respect is ready to look for alternative means to enhance the work of the UN inspectors so as they can establish a detailed and accurate program based on a timetable to schedule all the different phases of the inspections.


When need arises, the inspection committees should be able to increase the number of inspectors on the ground in Iraq.

All these things points have been mentioned in the French-German-Russian memorandum presented to the Security Council days ago.'

Bluntly speaking, Russia has the right to veto any resolution that would permit the use of force against Iraq, and we consider this the final resort if a resolution is to be passed for this purpose. When we feel that there could be danger threatening the international peace and security, we will rise to our responsibilities.

As for the Israeli possession of the nuclear weapons, Mr Zasypkin said that there have been double standards practices at the international level since a long time and Russia has been exerting great efforts to put an end to this phenomenon

colorful and glittering ceremony held at the Taj Sheba Hotel in Sanaa.



Fighting in Ivory Coast Rebels wreak havoc on government

GUESSABO, Ivory Coast, March 8 (Reuters) - Swarms of rebels attacked French troops and villages near a key river crossing in western Ivory Coast on Saturday, causing hundreds of terrified residents to flee.

Automatic gunfire could be heard coming from the west of Guessabo early on Saturday morning after the French army said the rebels tried to punch through onto the main highway between Duekoue and the cocoa centre of Daloa.

The latest clashes erupted the same day Ivorian rebels and politicians agreed in Ghana to set up a joint security council and form a new government by March 14, the latest attempt to end more than five months of civil war.

"Since dawn, there have been numerous clashes with armed elements trying to break through between Duekoue and Dibobly, which is by the Sassandra river," said French army spokesman Philippe Perret,

Two French soldiers received light injuries, he said.

Fighting in the lush, cocoa-rich west of the former French colony has becoming increasingly anarchic as rebel groups, Liberian mercenaries fighting on both sides and ethnic militias have formed groups to loot and kill.

Heavy fighting broke out in the western town of Bangolo on Friday, north of French positions at Duekoue. Rebels

said many civilians were killed in an attack which they repulsed. Ivory Coast's army said it was not behind the attack.

"(Saturday's attack) was an act of reprisal for what happened yesterday in Bangolo. My troops wanted to take revenge against the (Ivorian army) but the French army got in between," Ousmane Coulibaly, a western rebel commander told Reuters.


He said his troops had withdrawn after the dawn raids and said two of his fighters received light injuries.

Some 3,000 French troops are in Ivory Coast to protect their remaining citizens and to police a shaky cease-fire line. The French army in the west said it took seven hours to beat back the rebel attacks.

"It is urgent that the international community helps Ivory Coast put an end to the disorder in the west of the country," Ivory Coast's army spokesman Jules Yao Yao said.

"We must, above all, stop what is starting to look like the shifting of Liberia's own conflict onto Ivorian territory and the risk of tribal war," he said in a statement on Saturday.

Civil war broke out in the world's biggest cocoa grower after a failed coup in September. Several thousand people have died since then and more than a million people have fled abroad as refugees or to safer areas of Ivory Coast.



KUWAIT March 8 (Reuters) - Czech and Slovak troops trained to respond to chemical, biological and nuclear attacks began deploying on the streets of Kuwait on Saturday in preparation for any retaliatory strike in the case of war against Iraq.

A massive U.S.-led force has gathered in the Kuwaiti desert for a possible invasion of neighbouring Iraq with the stated aim of ridding the country of weapons of mass destruction. Iraq denies having such weapons.

The joint Czech-Slovak battalion, with expertise built up during the Cold War, will patrol the streets of Kuwait City, military bases and vital installations including the Kuwaiti oilfields, Czech Colonel Dusan Lupuljev said.

"Our main task is to save lives and to mitigate the consequences of the possible use of weapons of mass destruction and other disasters," Lupuljev told reporters.

"My unit is able to cover and deal with full scenarios of all known chemical warfare agents, radiological agents and biological agents."

U.S. sanctions are racist attack-Zimbabwe official

HARARE, March 8 (Reuters) - A senior Zimbabwean official condemned on Saturday a U.S. decision to impose sanctions on the leadership as part of a "white racist" attack on a government he said was fighting for the interests of its black majority.

U.S. President George W. Bush on Friday imposed economic sanctions on Zimbabwean President Robert Mugabe and 76 other high-ranking government officials, accusing them of undermining democracy in the impoverished southern African country.

Bush, following the lead of the European Union, issued an executive order freezing their assets and barring Americans from engaging in any transactions or dealings with them.

The Zimbabwean official said the new sanctions were part of a well-coordinated attack on Mugabe by British Prime Minister Tony Blair, who he said was angry over Mugabe's seizures of whiteowned farms in Zimbabwe, a former British colony.

"All these sanctions being imposed on

the U.S. sanctions, saying they represented a principled stand against tyranny.


Mugabe has been under fire from the West over the alleged rigging of an election last year and the persecution of political foes, as well as the seizure of white-

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As war countdown approaches Blix gives mixed picture of Iraqi cooperation

UNITED NATIONS, March 7 (Reuters) - Chief U.N. inspector Hans Blix said on Friday that Iraq's cooperation fell short of U.N. Security Council demands but applauded Baghdad's recent scrapping of al-Samoud missiles.

"The destruction undertaken constitutes a substantial measure of disarmament — indeed, the first since the middle of the 1990s," Blix said. "We are not watching the breaking of toothpicks. Lethal weapons are being destroyed."

His colleague, Mohamed ElBaradei, who fields nuclear arms teams, was even more positive.

"After three months of intrusive inspections, we have to date found no evidence or plausible indication of the revival of a nuclear weapons program in Iraq," ElBaradei said.

In delivering a fairly favorable report on Iraqi cooperation to the U.N. Security Council, Blix gave ammunition to those who want inspections to continue, although he made clear many disarmament issues were unresolved. "It is obvious that, while the numer-

ous initiatives, which are now taken by the Iraqi side with a view to resolving some long-standing open disarmament issues, can be seen as 'active,' or even 'proactive,' these initiatives three-four months into the new resolution cannot be said to constitute 'immediate' cooperation," said Blix, in charge of chemical and biological weapons and ballistic missiles.

"Nor do they necessarily cover all areas of relevance," he added.

'BETTER INFORMATION' U.S. Secretary of State Colin Powell, who is pressing the council to give Iraq a deadline to cooperate, said in an interview that the inspectors could only do so much.

"They are doing a reasonably effective job in light of what they are able to do, and they are only able to do what the Iraqis are really allowing them to do," he told ABC television.

"I think I have better information than the inspectors. I think I have more assets available to me than the inspectors do," he added, referring to U.S. intelligence gathering.

Asked why the United States does not give them that information, he said: "We are giving them as much as we can that is actionable, that really can cue them to something."

Blix praised Iraq's decision to destroy 34 of its al-Samoud 2 missiles, whose range exceeded U.N. limits, as well as four training missiles, two combat warheads, one launcher, five engines and two casting chambers since March 1.

But his presentation contrasted sharply with a 167-page document he gave to council members that lists 29 areas of unresolved weapons issues and a "to do" list of steps Iraq should take to comply.

This report, released by Reuters on Thursday, disputes Iraq's claim of how much anthrax it had destroyed, says it may be developing new banned missiles and calls on Baghdad to surrender any remaining biological, chemical or Scud missiles and to explain the fate of aerial bombs and missing chemical agents. Blix said that if inspections continued and Iraq cooperated, "it would not take years, nor weeks, but months."

"Neither governments nor inspectors would want disarmament inspections to go on forever," he said.

Violence and counterviolence continues Israel kills Hamas military head, Hamas vows revenge

GAZA, March 8 (Reuters) - Israel killed the top commander of Hamas's military wing and three other militants in a helicopter missile strike on a car in the Gaza Strip on Saturday, drawing vows of revenge from the militant Islamic group.

Ibrahim al-Maqadma, 51, was a founder of Hamas and was believed to be the top commander of its military wing, which has waged a suicide bombing campaign against Israel since the signing of interim peace accords with the Jewish state in 1993.

Four Israeli helicopter gunships swooped out of the sky and blasted a car in which Maqadma and three other militants were driving, turning it into a heap of charred, smoking wreckage and scat-



Palestinians protest against U.S., Israel

RASHIDIYEH, Lebanon, March 8 (Reuters) - Thousands of Palestinians marched through a teeming refugee camp in southern Lebanon on Saturday, denouncing U.S. President George W. Bush as a "butcher" and venting anger against Israel.

"Struggle, struggle against Bush the butcher and (Israeli President Ariel) Sharon the butcher," chanted protestors, referring to the Israeli Prime Minister.

Some 7,000 men, women and children filled the streets in a show of anger against Israel and its ally the United States, the day after Israeli tanks and troops stormed a Gaza Strip refugee camp, carrying out raids in which 11 Palestinians were killed.

Israel also killed four Hamas militants in a helicopter missile strike in Gaza on Saturday. The raids followed a Palestinian suicide attack that killed 15 people on an Israeli bus. Witnesses said protesters burned U.S. and Israeli flags and waved Iraqi and Palestinian flags in the Rashidiyeh camp near the port city of Tyre.

The demonstration on Saturday in the camp echoed protests in Lebanon's second city Tripoli on Friday where demonstrators demanded the expulsion of the U.S. ambassador and waved pictures of Iraqi President Saddam Hussein.

Washington is seeking a second U.N. resolution to authorise an invasion of Iraq and has dismissed Baghdad's moves to disarm as too little, too late. The United States and Britain have given Saddam a March 17 deadline to get rid of its alleged weapons of mass destruction.

Two Israeli reconnaissance planes and Israeli planes swooped over parts of southern Lebanon as the march went on, witnesses said. An Israeli reconnaissance plane was also spotted over south Lebanon last week.

Hamas's military wing ordered its cells to take revenge, including by killing Israeli political leaders. The Palestinian Authority strongly condemned Maqadma's "assassination" and said it would hold Israel responsible for its consequences.

Hours after the missile strike, Palestinian President Yasser Arafat nominated Mahmoud Abbas, a senior PLO official, as prime minister, a step on the way to major reforms of the Palestinian Authority demanded by international mediators.

Maqadma was the most senior Palestinian militant Israel has killed since the Palestinian uprising began in September 2000 after a deadlock in peace talks.

The missile strike was the latest move in a wave of violence that has rocked Israelis and Palestinians, frustrating U.S. efforts to calm 29 months of bloodshed as it tries to rally international support for a possible war on Iraq.

Thousands of Palestinians at Muqadma's funeral urged Hamas's Izzel-Deen al-Qassam military wing to carry out revenge attacks.

"The Qassam brigades will cut off a 100 heads in return for the death of our martyr. Our words will soon be translated into action," Hamas supporters chanted through loudspeakers.

Palestinian cabinet minister Saeb Erekat told Reuters: "We condemn in the strongest possible terms the new assassination in Gaza and we hold the Israeli government fully responsible for the

On the political front, Arafat nominated Abbas, who has kept a back channel open to Israel during the fighting, as the first Palestinian prime minister, a post he is creating under intense Western pressure.

Arafat did not set a date for the appointment or spell out Abbas's powers. Abbas, known by his nom de guerre Abu Mazen, has said he will accept the job only if he is given significant powers.

Violence has escalated in recent days. On Wednesday, a Palestinian suicide bomber killed 15 people on an Israeli bus which a top Hamas leader said was an attack by the group.

Hours later, 12 Palestinians were killed in an Israeli raid in Gaza and on Friday Hamas gunmen killed two Jewish settlers when they infiltrated the West Bank settlement of Kiryat Arba and opened fire on settlers gathering for prayers.

The gunmen shot dead a husband and

wife before holing up in a religious seminary where they were killed by soldiers.

Shortly afterwards, two Palestinian militants tried to infiltrate the neighbouring Negohot settlement and were killed in a gunbattle with soldiers, an army spokesman said. One of the gunmen detonated an explosive belt around his waist, he said.

A leaflet handed out in the Palestinianruled part of Hebron said Hamas claimed responsibility for the Negohot attempt in "revenge for the massacres of Palestinians, especially in Gaza".

Most Palestinians consider settlements on occupied land as legitimate targets for attack. The international community views the settlements as illegal, but Israel disputes this.

On Friday, the army seized part of the northern Gaza Strip in what the army called an open-ended campaign to thwart Hamas rocket attacks on Israel. Gaza has been a key flashpoint during the uprising, in which at least 1,918 Palestinians and 722 Israelis have been killed.

Iraq demands end to sanctions

After Blix report

BAGHDAD, March 8 (Reuters) -President Saddam Hussein called on the U.N. Security Council on Saturday to lift 12 years of sanctions against Iraq after what he said was its fulfilling of its disarmament commitments.

In a statement after a meeting chaired by Saddam, the Iraqi leadership made a set of demands it said the Security Council should implement after the reports by chief weapons inspectors Hans Blix and Mohamed ElBaradei on Friday.

"The embargo against Iraq should be lifted totally and comprehensively after America's motives were revealed to the world and after Iraq abided by Security Council resolutions," the statement said.

It also demanded that the Security Council denounce the United States and Britain as "liars", strip Israel of its alleged weapons of mass destruction and force it to pull out of "Palestine and occupied Arab land".

The United States and Britain reject Iraq's disarmament moves as insufficient and are threatening imminent war. They have put forward a new draft resolution at the Security Council which would give Baghdad until March 17 to disarm or face an inva-

sion.

Some 300,000 American and British troops are deployed within a striking distance of Iraq.

Chief U.N. inspector Hans Blix told the U.N. Security Council on Friday Iraq's cooperation fell short of Council demands but applauded Baghdad's scrapping of al-Samoud missiles.

The meeting was attended by members of the ruling Baath Party, Revolutionary Command Council and the parliament speaker.

The statement said Blix and ElBaradei had testified that Iraq was sincere and implementing accurately Security Council resolutions.

"After the stage that Iraq had reached in implementing the commitments defined by the Security Council...the world, its peoples and most of its governments have come to realise the real aims of the American administration," the statement said.

"It wants to cover what it wants to do with allegations that Iraq did not implement Security Council resolutions," it said. "But testimonies on the truthfulness of what we say and the accuracy in implementation come from the concerned specialists led by the committee of Blix and ElBaradei."

Several said killed in northern Afghan fighting

KABUL, March 8 (Reuters) -Several people have been killed or wounded in a fresh outbreak of fighting between supporters of two rival warlords in Afghanistan's northern province of Faryab, a top commander from the area said on Saturday.

Fighting erupted on Friday when Uzbek warlord General Abdul Rashid Dostum's men attacked positions held by supporters of Ustad Atta Mohammad's Jamiat-e-Islami faction in Pashtoon Kot district, south of Faryab's provincial capital, he said. "It is still going on," Sayed Mohammad, an aide to Atta and a top general in Faryab, told Reuters by telephone from the area.

"Several people from our side have been either killed or wounded and they have taken five of our people prisoners," he said.

General Majid Roozi, a deputy for Dostum said he was unaware of any clashes.

About six people, mostly family members of one of Atta's commanders, were killed by Dostum's soldiers in Pashtoon Kot two weeks ago. Tensions have since been on the rise between the factions in several parts of Faryab, Mohammad said.

He said both factions were building up their strength in the area of Friday's clash and other parts of northern Afghanistan, which could lead to a spread of the fighting.

He accused Dostum, an ex-communist general who is now a deputy defence minister in the U.S.-backed government, of trying to gain ground by force, and vowed this would be resisted.

The fighting came days after several people were killed in skirmishes between supporters of Atta and Dostum in Sari Pul province and despite U.N. efforts to encourage warlords to disarm.

Atta is also part of the government of President Hamid Karzai, serving as a corps commander and northern commander of Jamiat-e-Islami, dominant faction of the Northern Alliance, which forms the backbone of the administration.

The rival factions have fought bitterly in several northern areas since Karzai's government came to power in late 2001 after the collapse of the former Taliban regime, causing the deaths of dozens of non-combatants forcing hundreds to flee their homes. The United Nations says it has sus-

pended aid work in parts of northern Afghanistan because of fighting.

Tension raises in the region U.S., allies see North Korea missile test amid Iraq move

SEOUL/WASHINGTON, March 8 (Reuters) - South Korea and the United States said North Korea appeared set to test a missile within days, stepping up pressure for U.S. concessions in a nuclear standoff while Washington is preoccupied with Iraq.

Allies Seoul and Washington played down the communist state's declaration of a maritime exclusion zone - an apparent preparation for a missile launch while Japan urged Pyongyang to avoid further steps to escalate the nuclear crisis.

South Korean and U.S. officials said the North declared the exclusion zone in the Sea of Japan from March 8-11, in what was seen as a strong sign it was planning its second missile test in two weeks.

"We are aware that they are preparing to fire a missile, probably between this weekend and early next week," a South Korean Defence Ministry spokesman said on Saturday.

On February 24, North Korea fired a short-range anti-ship cruise missile into the Sea of Japan, a test that startled its neighbours and carried out a day before South Korea swore in its new president, Roh Moo-hyun.

Another missile test had been widely expected by the North's neighbours as Pyongyang seeks to pressure the United States to hold bilateral talks and sign a non-aggression pact to resolve the nuclear crisis.

"It was predictable the North would take a tougher line," said Kim Jung-ro, a Unification Ministry spokesman.

But any new test would follow a step-by-step escalation of provocations by North Korea that parallels the U.S. war timetable in Iraq. Critics say U.S. President George W. Bush is allowing Iraq to distract him from a crisis possibly more serious.

Earlier this week, Japanese media reported the North was close to restarting a nuclear fuel reprocessing plant that could produce weapons-grade plutonium.

U.S. officials said last week that North Korea, believed to be developing missiles capable of reaching parts of the United States, had restarted a research reactor at Yongbyon, north of Pyongyang. Plutonium could be extracted from the reactor's spent fuel rods.

Four North Korean MiG fighter jets buzzed a U.S. spy plane in international airspace on Sunday and a similar plane violated South Korean airspace last month.

Chinese police nab suspect in university blasts

BEIJING, March 8 (Reuters) - A farm worker has confessed to causing explosions at two prestigious Beijing universities, but his motives are not yet known, police said on Saturday.

Beijing police spokesman Liu Wei told reporters that Huang Minxiang, 27, was caught in his home province of Fujian early on Saturday morning and had admitted to causing both explosions within two hours of each other on February 25.

"That's what he admitted to," Liu said.

Liu said police had no details of why Huang might have set off home-made bombs in the cafeterias at Peking and Tsinghua Universities, which injured at least nine people and shattered glass doors and windows, or whether he had acted alone.

Access to explosives is fairly easy in China, which has seen bombings linked to Muslim separatists, disgruntled workers and spurned lovers.

The official Xinhua news agency said Huang worked on a farm on the island province of Hainan, off the country's southern coast. Police in Huang's native city of Fuzhou, on the southeast coast, were sending him to Beijing, Liu said.

The blasts stunned students used to relative safety on campus and prompted questions about social unrest as officials from around the country descended on Beijing for China's annual two-week session of parliament, which opened on Wednesday.

Police were under government orders to "crack the case as soon as possible", Liu said during the rare police news conference to announce Huang's arrest.

Peking University police said this week they had identified a male suspect between 20 and 40 years old, caught by security cameras, in their hunt for the people behind the explosions.

Beijing's new mayor Meng Xuenong said on Friday routine safety measures had been taken since the double bombings but tried to quell concerns over the incident.

"The security situation at Peking and Tsinghua Universities is good on the whole. This was a chance incident," he said on the sidelines of the parliament session. "It has no influence whatsoever on our building a world-class city."

Bangladeshi acid victims rally for rights

DHAKA, March 8 (Reuters) Nearly 200 women defaced in acid attacks by mostly jilted lovers rallied in the Bangladeshi capital, Dhaka, on Saturday, seeking protection for their families and other women, and the right to live an honourable life.

The Acid Survivors Foundation, which organised the event, said it was held to mark International Women's Day, an annual event that highlights women's struggle for equality and justice in the workplace, home and society.

"The number of acid victims is rising in the country," said Monira Rahman, executive director of the foundation, which was set up to fight injustices against women and help acid victims in particular.

"We are fighting for their protection and rights, and are hoping for a day when our girls will no longer be defaced."

The activists called for protection for

other women and their own families, who are often threatened by the offenders to prevent them taking legal action. Most acid victims usually become dependent on their poor families and rarely venture out of their homes out of shame.

Bangladeshi women are sometimes tortured by their husbands when they fail to come up with a dowry, by men who have been refused love and by influential people seeking to settle scores with the victims' families, foundation officials said.

Foundation records showed 485 women were attacked with acid across the country in 2002 - a nearly 50 percent rise over the previous year."Most of the victims are women who fell prey to jilted lovers or boyfriends," Rahman said.

Foundation officials linked the rise in attacks to what they called a general breakdown of law and order in the country.

The call came after the rise in value of insurance premiums on vessels against risks of war as the Aden port was negatively affected due to this increase and the company had lost its customers who turned to competing naval routes in Salala, Jedda and Djibouti.

Sources at the company mentioned that Aden's productive port dropped by over 75 per cent and the loss the company had sustained amounted to more than \$ 2,5 million a month.

Three thousand of employees working for the companies in the free zone in Aden had lost their jobs at the beginning of the year 2003 after the departure of maritime companies that used to use the port as a station for distribution for the region. Marine sources nevertheless confirm that insurance companies agreement to abolish charges from 16 per cent to 3 per cent would help the port restore its activity vigorously. The companies at Aden sea port had announced they had

lost around \$15 million per month, especially since the blast in the French super oil tanker Limburg offshore Hadramout last November.

A Yemeni ministerial delegation had travelled to London and held negotiations with insurance companies ended in agreement to depositing Yemeni guarantee in return for reducing insurance charges. Marine sources have made it clear that Yemen has actually offered guarantees and that has urged insurance companies to agree on reducing insurance charges.

Marine sources confirm that prices would see an improvement in the coming short period as the insurance companies would embark on implementing what had been agreed upon in London concerning reducing of charges. According to the sources the imported merchandise that witnessed noticeable rise in prices during the past period, including steel, would see some drop. The possibility of war against Iraq would help add to suffering of Yemen and send mercantile ships away from Yemeni coasts.

It remains to point out that the companies that encountered problems after raising insurance charges and departure of vessels to other sea ports their circumstances would improve following a retreat in charges prices.

Enhancing **Productivity**

mproving organizational performance has always been a burden in business management. Nevertheless, a technique called Accomplishment through goal setting or Management By Objectives (MBO), can help in the process. MBO means setting goals and standards for employees to reach or achieve identified objectives. The basic idea behind this concept is that a person's conscious intentions regulate his or her actions. For example if a salesman sets a goal of making three sales calls on new clients in a particular day, he will tend to achieve that goal. Simply put, you have an objective and you intend to achieve it.

And so, you can use this technique in stimulating more productivity in your organization and hence enhance the overall performance. This includes giving your employees clear and easy to understand goals and methods to help them achieve these goals. The more challenging these goals are; the more people will stretch themselves in order to meet them and perform better. In other words, as efforts increases, better productivity and its associated rewards will also increase.

However, goals like do your best or give it your best shot may not be as effective as specific goals, because such generalized goals when assigned by a manager pressures employees behaviors to the extent that they consciously accept these goals. This brings out the need for more specific goals that include more elaboration about what is exactly needed.

Setting specific goals also helps in better performance evaluation. Although many people dislike being measured, setting specific goals helps the management in productivity assessment by providing more concise information with the help of two dimensional performance measurements; i.e. the rate of goal achieving and the quality through which these goals have been achieved.

There should not be a balance of power but community of power, not organized rivalries, but organized peace.



<u>Revolt against Blair explodes across U.K.</u>

War rejected

s British Prime Minister Tony Blair constantly repeats his intention for war against Iraq, side by side with the Bush Administration, the revolt against his war policy grows, by leaps and bounds, throughout the population and institutions of Great Britain. Whether this national rebellion will be strong enough to topple Blair in the immediate days ahead is not clear, but it may well be intense enough to force him to opt out from the war drive, at the risk of being heaved out of office for having dragged Britain into an insane and unpopular war.

What went in the debate

The most dramatic expression of the mood of revolt occurred in the House of Commons, during the seven-hour debate on Iraq policy on Feb. 26. When the government put forward a resolution to support Blair's policies, but couched in such anodyne terms as to make it seem like he was just implementing the intent of the United Nations, more than 120 Members of Parliament of Blair's own Labour Party voted against the resolution. Even more telling, was that when an amendment was put forward stating that "the case for war is not yet made," 199 MPs, well more than one-third of the House, voted for it. This included 121 Labour dissidents, but also 13 MPs from the opposition Conservative Party (whose leadership fully backs the Bush Administration, on Iraq) and 52 Liberal Democrats, as well as MPs from small parties.

The headlines of the next day's British papers said it all. The pro-war, Rupert Murdoch-owned Times headlined, "Labour Mutiny Leaves Blair Out on a Limb: Case for War Rejected Biggest-Ever Government in Rebellion," and commented that this was "the biggest revolt against any governing party in Parliamentary history." Accompanying this was a cartoon showing Blair and Foreign Secretary Jack Straw lying bloodied on the floor of the House of Commons, with antiwar signs strewn all around. The Labour-linked Guardian headlined, "Rebels' Vote Stuns Blair: Biggest Ever Revolt Against a Government," and commented, "Tony Blair's Iraqi war strategy was shaken to the core." An accompanying front-page article was headlined "Parliament Has Seen Nothing Like It" quoting Oxford academic and constitution expert David Butler, "There has been nothing remotely comparable in the past 100 years.

Indeed, the British House of Commons has rarely seen such emotive and substantive interventions, on a matter of world-historical importance. The opposition went far beyond the 30-40 them, Chris Smith, was the co-sponsor, with former Conservative Party Minister Douglas Hogg, of the amendment. He warned the Commons, that "the timetable for war appears to be determined by the decisions of the President of the United States, and not by the logic of events." Former Health Minister Frank Dobson, a Labour moderate, told the gathering, "I am simply not convinced, that all-out military action in Iraq can be justified at this time, and on the scale envisaged." He then accused the United States of "beginning to behave like a maverick state," and warned that an Iraq war would be a boost to the "right-wing United States unilateralists, who think that the new world order should consist of them issuing the orders.

Other prominent Conservatives joined in, including former Agriculture Minister John Gummer and former Chancellor of the Exchequer Kenneth Clarke. The latter is particularly crucial, as he is, behind the scenes, making a bid to replace the hapless, pro-war Iain Duncan-Smith, as Conservative Party leader.

In "endless trouble"

The day after the debate, EIR spoke to Labour MP Tam Dalyell, longestserving MP (Father of the House of Commons), and the most persistent opponent, in the House, of a new Iraq war. He stated that Blair will be in "endless trouble," if he persists in pushing for war, and that the new element in the situation, will be increasing questioning from the British military services, about "why we should risk our lives, for such an unpopular war." According to Dalyell, "The significance of what happened yesterday is that this was the dissent, in British biggest Parliamentary history, from a governing party. A lot of it has to do with the growing feeling that America and Britain are looking for excuses for war, while Iraq seems to be trying to avoid a war.'

Dalyell emphatically agreed with Lyndon LaRouche, that this war "is not inevitable, and can be stopped." In his view, what is now extremely important, is that there be maximal publicity, throughout the United States, of the resistance to the war in Britain. He said it would be extremely important, if matters come to that point, that Russia, France, and China combine, to veto any new United Nations resolution authorizing war, and stand firm against any U.S. threats of reprisals, in response to a of the veto.

Echoing Dalyell's sense of what impact the Feb. 26 Parliament events might have transatlantically, Liberal Democrat leader Charles Kennedy affirmed that the fact that the Blair government "has failed to persuade a third of the House of Commons ... sends a potent signal to the government of both Britain and the United States."

Disconnection and de-selection

appear to produce dossiers of mass deceptions" and insisting that Cabinet ministers listen to "our other allies," like France and Germany, who assert that "we need inspections, not invasions," Simpson stressed that the war rhetoric of the Blair government and its supporters had created a "real low point" in British politics. Indeed, "it marks a sense of the disconnect of this House from the society we claim to represent."

That so many MPs did come around to oppose Blair's war policy reflects a massive anti-Iraq war mood in the British population, exemplified by the Feb. 15 outpouring of some 2 million in the streets of London, against the war, as well as tens of thousands demonstrating in Glasgow and Belfast. Since then, as confirmed to EIR by Dalyell and others in Britain, a growing number of Blair loyalists within the Labour Party have been facing procedures of "de-selection" from their home constituents, which means that they are being replaced, or threatened with replacement, because of their pro-war position. In one case, a Labour official faced his constituency at a local gathering of 150 people, and found himself the only person in the room, who supported the rush to war against Iraq!

Papal meeting backfires

But given the power of elite structures in the United Kingdom, what is even more threatening for Blair, is the intensity of opposition to war being expressed by senior elements of this establishment, in the spheres of religion, military, diplomacy, and intelligence, and extending into the monarchy itself, as indicated by recent reports that royal heir Prince Charles is opposing the Bush-Blair policy.

From the domain of religion, a joint statement of opposition to a new war was issued on Feb. 21, by Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams, the head of the Church of England (whose Supreme Governor is Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II) and Cardinal Cormac Murphy-O'Connor, the head of the British Catholic Church. This immediately preceded the rebuff Blair received, in Rome on Feb. 22, from Pope John Paul II, during their 15minute meeting. This has knocked the props out from Blair's pompous efforts to portray himself as the arbiter of morality on the planet, and to portray aggression against Iraq as a "just war," in traditional Christian terms. After his rebuff at the Vatican, the Times ran a biting cartoon, showing him approaching God, who is angrily pointing his finger at the British Prime Minister, and exclaiming, "This is not the time for a leadership challenge!"

At the Vatican, the Holy Father was reportedly distressed, not only by Blair's pro-war arguments as such, but by the British Prime Minister's attempt to usurp the prerogative of the Pope, as a leading moral-spiritual spokesman in the world. Additionally, according to



nature of the meeting, and at the arrogant lectures by Blair aides to Vatican representatives about how to handle the British press. An irate Vatican spokesman told the paper: "We have our own way of doing things. We were not going to let them tell us what to do."

Pope says avoid war

Notably, Vatican spokesman Joaquín Navarro-Valls put out a terse statement on the meeting between the two men, emphasizing the Pope's insistence that an Iraq war be avoided. On Feb. 23, the Pope further distanced himself from Blair, in his Sunday Angelus, when he called on the major religions to work together to avoid war, and called on people of all faiths to fast for peace, on March 5, Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent.

The Mail on Sunday summed up, that the Blair initiative to meet and convince the Pope, had "backfired."

Thatcher aides break ranks

As for military and diplomatic elites, what is perhaps most breathtaking is the intensity of opposition to the war among former aides to Conservative Prime Ministers Margaret Thatcher (1979-90) and John Major (1992-97). This is especially so, as Her Barrenness continues to rave and rant for war.

Of the former Tory government officials who have spoken out against the present war plans, almost all were actively involved in the 1991 Gulf War:

• Lord Wright, who, from 1986-91, was Permanent Undersecretary of State and Head of the Diplomatic Service, in which positions he effectively ran the Foreign and Commonwealth Service, on a day-by-day basis.

Sir Michael Quinlan, from 1988-92, Permanent Undersecretary of State at the Ministry of Defense, who ran the MOD on a day-to-day basis.
Lord Hurd, from 1989-95, Foreign

Lord Hard, Holf 1969-95, Poleign Secretary.
Lord Bramall, from 1982-85, i.e.,

the period beginning with the conflict known in Britain as the "Falklands War," Chief of the Defense Staff, thereby head of all the British Armed Forces. • Maj. Gen. Patrick Cordingley, Commander of British Forces during

During the last week of February, Cordingley, Hurd, and Walker all issued strong critiques of Bush-Blair Iraq war plans.

Will scandals topple Blair?

As for the British intelligence services, MI5 and MI6, informed sources tell EIR that leading figures in those agencies are "furious with Blair," especially after the recent caper, in which the British government, during the week of Feb. 3, released a "Dossier on Iraqi Deception," claimed to be based on intelligence agencies' efforts, but actually mainly derived from a plagiarized academic's 2002 study on Iraq, published in a disreputable Israeli journal, in which the academic had used information that was 12 years old.

One continental Europe-based British source told EIR on Feb. 25: "For the first time since 1945, the intelligence services are against a war that Britain is supposed to fight. They are looking for a way to punish Blair, after what Blair did to them. MI6 and MI5 are furious at Blair. You must understand, these people are extremely egoistic. But now, they face the ultimate humiliation—of looking like fools, before the French secret services. What could be worse, in their eves?"

He and other sources stress that such furious intelligence professionals may contrive now, to come up with one or more scandals, to topple Blair, if he persists on the war course. There are a wide range of scandals that have already received public attention, or are capable of soon erupting.

The most high-profile of these is the "Cheriegate" scandal, which was the subject of a one-hour broadcast on BBC-TV. This involves, primarily, Tony Blair's wife Cherie's involvement with Peter Foster, a convicted con-man, used for buying private Blair real estate, but also involves Cherie's implication in a strange "New Age" network, centering around her personal guru Carole Caplin, Foster's girlfriend.

Otherwise, investigators are looking into allegations that present or former Blair Cabinet ministers have been involved in pedophilia; indications that Blair intimates have been engaged in illicit money-laundering activities with fellow war supporter Italian Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi; allegations that Blair has received substantial personal bribes, to join with the United States in war with Iraq; and assertions of repeated Blair/"New Labour" political favors to leading Labour contributors.

As one London source stated on Feb. 25: "Scandals are the way that the powers-that-be usually ease a Prime Minister out of power in this country. Such a move against Blair, is a possibility."

Emergency moves

Under such conditions, Blair and his entourage may take drastic action, in the direction of declaring a national emergency, militarizing the country, and crushing all dissent, under wartime conditions. Some weeks ago, they had unleashed such a process, perhaps as a test run for something sinister later, with a non-stop barrage of reports of imminent terrorist threats, and highprofile arrests of alleged terrorists none of which amounted to anything.

Now, the British Treasury, the day before the Feb. 26 Parliament debate, released a "Green Paper," affirming that the Treasury, together with military units, may move in to take over all City of London financial operations under conditions of "emergency," "extreme situations," and "economic meltdown."

One City of London source said that two factors have prodded the Blair entourage to make such an extraordinary move. One is their typical "management of psychology," in this case, to engineer "a mood for war," and to "create an emergency atmosphere," in a population that is reluctant, skeptical about, and/or opposed to this war. The other, is that British financial elites may be aware of an imminent risk of "systemic financial meltdown," caused by the collapse of the deeply troubled insurance sector, or by sensational news that may soon break about the damage caused by recent waves of corporate bond defaults, the extent of which damage has been covered up, until now, by clever accounting tricks.

The plunge toward an insane war, and the danger of systemic financial collapse, are integrally related. The only sane way to deal with these, is by preventing the insane war, and carrying out the "New Bretton Woods" global reorganization proposed by Lyndon LaRouche. Blair himself is committed to the course of lunacy. But it is to be hoped, that the extraordinary developments now occurring in Britain, will stop him in his tracks. This, in turn, may deter Bush from war.

<u>Better look before you leap</u> Bush risks a Mideast inferno

t seems to be no coincidence that Iraqi songs are invariably melancholic and sad. The justification, Iraqis say, is that "our history is rife with injustices." Their future does not seem to be more promising.

On the eve of the UN arms inspectors' second report to the United Nations, and with America apparently determined to attack Iraq no matter what, the Iraqis seem to face further injustices that may be more horrifying than anything that has so far befallen them.

From the beginning of time Iraq has offered humanity some of its richest civilizations. It is the land of Mesopotamia and of the Code of Hammurabi, the oldest human law. To the people of the region, it is baffling that Iraq - whose people had been renowned as the best readers in the Arab world and which produces the best intellects - should become a testing ground for the latest missiles and weaponry.

To speak only of Saddam Hussein and the Iraqi regime is to ignore more than 20 million Iraqi people whose lives have been reduced to a subhuman level by the cruel and unfair sanctions that have been imposed on the country. Iraq has not only oil but also civilization, a rich history and a people who will be irreparably harmed if a war is launched against their country.

The international community, including the American people, has expressed poignantly its opposition to a war. I would like to pay tribute in particular to the relatives of the victims of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks who came

all the way to Baghdad to express their rejection of the war option. One of them said, "I lost my brother in the attacks of Sept. 11, and I do not want any human being to suffer such a loss."

This is what our humanity represents at its best. If only the American government could rise up to the example of the citizens it is supposed to represent and save Iraq, the region and the entire humanity the devastating consequences of unnecessary aggression.

Most people of the region feel that the Bush administration behaves as if the Middle East is a region without people, or as if its people are without human rights and as if their lives, security and sovereign rights are worth nothing but to satisfy certain ideological designs that are in the minds of some leaders in Washington.

The statements of President George W. Bush and some of his senior officials in this regard have invited both amazement and anger. It was baffling to watch Bush threaten the United Nations that it will become insignificant if it doesn't support his war against Iraq - as if he had forgotten that the United Nations is an expression of international will.

UN inspectors are still doing positive work and their statements indicate that Iraq is cooperating. The Bush administration has called for a diplomatic solution to the crisis over North Korea's withdrawal from the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty, so what is the rationale behind its rush to disarm Iraq by carrying out a military attack?

People in the Arab world see the discrepancy in the U.S. attitudes to Iraq and to North Korea as yet more proof that the Bush administration is moved by religious hatred toward Arabs. It is also strongly believed here that Israel is

the driving force behind the unjustified plan to attack Iraq, especially as the lack of respect that Israel has always shown to the role of the United Nations is slowly but steadily leaking into statements by senior American officials.

No one here believes that the Bush administration is coming to modernize or democratize or bring in better political systems. After all, the policy of successive U.S. administrations played a vital role in supporting the same regimes that it describes as undemocratic or dictatorial.

If the Bush administration wants to be viewed as fair in the region, it should support UN resolutions concerning the Palestinian-Israeli conflict and take a stand against the Israeli occupation and settlements - and Israel's killing of Palestinian women and children, and destruction of houses - rather than give Prime Minister Ariel Sharon a free hand to spill so much Palestinian blood.

Sharon's strategy, which has plunged Palestinians and Israelis into a cycle of violence unprecedented in the history of the Arab-Israeli conflict, has brought nothing but pain to both sides. Now the Bush administration, on the basis of a strategy similar to Sharon's, is on the verge of infecting the entire region with the same kind of violence and counterviolence.

If it goes to war, in other words, the United States may inadvertently unleash an Arab-American or even a Muslim-American conflict - with unpredictable and, in all likelihood, uncontainable consequences.

"We did our best to treat Marwan's mother, but to no avail," Marwan's father, Abduhrahman Shugaaddeen said.

Promising talent

with such a severe impairment, he can still provide the world with marvelous contributions. His contributions are resembled in fine pieces of art, which truly indicate the budding talent that he has. His skills in drawing and painting are spectacular. Plastic art is what he loves most. With more than 2,000 paintings, he was able to shock his family, friends and relatives.

"Marwan began drawing when he

was four years old." his father tells us. His old and new paintings are all being kept with him in an archive. Many of them are of prominent Arab leaders, Yemeni social figures, landscapes, cars, and traditional Yemeni architecture. Not only that, but his paintings and sketches include details that could be truly astonishing even for expert painters.

Since his infancy, Marwan has showed interest in cars, and gradually he began painting every new or old car model he would see.

Despite his disability, he has good inclination towards everything new and beautiful, and he would convey messages to others of the things he loves or hates using his pencil and brushes to bring to a life a lively and wonderful portrait.

Can his dream be fulfilled?

However, it is unfortunate that not many organizations or establishments foreign or local- have expressed their desire to encourage or help Marwan achieve his dreams of becoming a professional artist. His father left no stone unturned to find means of providing Marwan with proper education in a specialized school for teaching the disabled so as when he graduates, he could be accepted in a college that teaches professional paintings. "There are no decent specialized schools for the handicapped in Yemen. Thus I do fear for his academic future" Marwans's father said.

"If there are such schools, then you would find no supervision or interest in enhancing them to rise to international standards or at least to meet the lowest acceptable standards." he added.

Indeed, many have complained that no qualified cadres exist in those schools and even the curriculum taught is not good enough

In order to assist handicapped talented children in enhancing their talents, skills, and abilities, the society and government should take greater measures to train cadres to be able to handle their jobs more adequately.

"Not only that." the father commented. "The government needs to provide those teachers more financial incentives and better salaries, because only then will they be loyal to their professions and abide by high standards.' Moments of inspiration

Marwan's talents are exposed to the maximum when the atmosphere is calm and peaceful. Only then will he demonstrate his abilities in painting various pieces that turn out to be marvels. "I realized that Marwan has no specific time to paint. I am sometimes taken by surprise when I find that Marwan produced yet another interesting sketch of anything. Yes indeed, in his paintings, anything is expected." Abdulrahman said.

"He likes to be alone when painting. Sometimes, he gets inspired in the middle of the night and starts painting immediately ... How wonderful a feeling it is when you see your son lying on his bed early in the morning next to a completely spectacular painting, which he painted the earlier night."

Equal treatment

Something unique about Marwan's family among many families with disabled children is that it treats all its members equally, including Marwan. "He is placed on equal footing as his brother Rasheed, and never has his disability made us treat him otherwise. As a matter of fact, painting so elegantly demonstrates that he does have peace of mind and I am happy for him.'

Dances:

Al-Rakla dance is performed by at least two people and maximum of 20. It is a dance in which men stand in line holding each others hands and advance forward raising one foot then another in an alternating manner left and right. It is interestingly similar to the "dabka", which is popular in countries in the north of the Arabian Peninsula, especially in Syria and Lebanon. The dance is driven by music played with drums and flutes.

Al-Haqfa dance may be Al-Haqfa Al-Baladi (local haqfa) or Al-Haqfa Al-Shami (Al-Sham Haqfa). If the dancers are four, then it is the local haqfa. If they are more, then they perform the Shami haqfa forming a square while dancing. This dance is common in Al-Hugm, Mawza'a, Al-Wazieya, Al-Awashiqa, Al-Hamool and the whole of Tihama.

Al-Bara'a dance is a dance that includes the use of daggers. It is performed by moving fast to the front then retreating and bending while waving the daggers. It is widely popular in northern regions of the country, especially in Sanaa and other tribal areas.




Exhibition sponsors needed

Finally, Al-Sharah dance is usually performed during weddings in the Al-Mahawala, Al-Ahyawa and Al-Kadha regions.

3 Unsolvable ethical conflicts. The pharma-ceutical industry faces an intrinsic conflict between maintaining profits from patent fees and meeting the health needs of people. In the developing countries, the profitability of drugs has been a major factor contributing to the spread of AIDS and other epidemics.

Unsolvable scientific conflicts. Advances in 4 vitamin research, cellular medicine and natural health allow the control of today's most common diseases. These safe, effective and affordable natural therapies focus on the prevention and eradication of diseases - not only the alleviation of symptoms. This fact and the low profitability of these non-patentable natural approaches, threaten the economic base of the pharmaceutical investment business.

B ut then everything stopped on September 11, 2001. On this day global attention shifted away from the crisis facing this industry.

Since then, the main goal of the Bush administrations has become to secure the survival of the pharmaceutical industry through:

- · Attempts to overcome the unsolvable scientific conflicts. The Bush administration is spearheading an international effort by the pharmaceutical industry to outlaw natural health therapies world-wide by abusing the United Nations 'Codex Alimentarius' (food standards) commission.
- Attempts to overcome the unsolvable ethical conflicts. The recent 'relief' program for fighting AIDS in developing countries is a 15 billion Dollar subsidy program for drug makers. While neglecting effective natural therapies to fight immune deficiencies this plan maintains the economic dependency on drug companies.
- Attempts to overcome the unsolvable legal conflicts. Further plans for 'medical litigation reform' include limiting product liability lawsuits against drug companies.
- Attempts to overcome the unsolvable business conflict. This conflict cannot be solved because it would destroy the very nature of the pharmaceutical "business with disease". The only option for this industry's survival is protectionist laws that artificially maintain control of the pharmaceutical investment business and its global health monopoly.

70 years ago, this week, an event shocked the world and set the stage for the last World War. On February 27, 1933 the German parliament building, the Reichstag, was set on fire

The official version that 'terrorists' had led the attack was soon questioned abroad. Today it is a fact that the Reichstagsbrand was deliberately used as a pretense and that the 'empowerment laws' following this event had been prepared in advance.

Following the burning of the Reichstag: civil rights were abolished,

The Reichstag-Assault in 1933 provided the legal plat-form for 12 years of dictatorship and WWII. Its main benefactor was IG-Farben, the largest European petrochemical Cartel seeking control of the oil and chemical industry worldwide.

In the Nuremberg War Tribunal in 1946/47 this Cartel was tried for 'conquest', 'robbery' and 'slavery' and - as a result - it was dismantled into Bayer, BASF and Hoechst



hile many events led up to the current crisis, none was as threatening to the survival of the entire pharmaceutical industry as the scandal around Bayer's cholesterol lowering drug Baycol.

In August 2001 Bayer had to withdraw its leading new drug Baycol because more than 50 people had already died from taking it and more than 6 million patients were at risk from the deadly side effects of rhabdomyolysis (dissolving of muscle tissue). British pharmaceutical multinational Smith Kline Beecham (SKB) was Bayer's global marketing partner.

Bayer - a century old flagship of the pharmaceutical industry - and British SKB - the world's continuing to press for higher dosages.

- Investors lost billions of dollars in share value, threatening the very survival of these companies
- T he Baycol scandal was only the eles many of a 'domino effect'. Within weeks many he Baycol scandal was only the beginning multinational drug companies were faced with lawsuits from patients suffering severe side effects from taking other pharmaceutical drugs (beta blockers, calcium antagonists, estrogen replacement, etc).

In summary, the pharmaceutical industry was facing the same grim fate as the tobacco industry, with entire States and Nations suing these companies for billions in damages. In August 2001, the end of the pharmaceutical industry seemed closer than ever.

fighting 'terrorism' or conquering oil fields. It is part of a long-term strategy of the pharmaceutical/petrochemical investment groups to create the psychological state of fear to maintain global control.

Long term international conflicts, wars - even the use of weapons of mass destruction - can be used to achieve this goal and suppress any opposition.







2006 World Cup finals More teams wanted

ZURICH, Switzerland, March 7 (Reuters) - A South American proposal to increase the size of the 2006 World Cup finals from 32 teams to 36 has been forwarded by FIFA to the organisers in Germany, world soccer's governing body said on Friday.

South American federation CON-MEBOL, which lost a playoff place last December after a shake-up in the allocation system, sent a proposal to FIFA suggesting an extra four teams should compete in the finals in Germany.

FIFA's executive committee looked at the proposal during its meeting this week and president Sepp Blatter has now asked event organisers for their opinions.

"The South Americans do not agree with the distribution of slots decided in Madrid in December and they have come to Europe with a proposal," Blatter told reporters.

"They suggested the World Cup in Germany can be played with 36 teams and we have taken note. Being openminded we have sent it (the proposal) into Germany's court.

"Therefore the German organisers will have to deal with the problems (of it) and send it back to Zurich."

FIFA's vice-president Julio Grondona, of Argentina, made the pro-

posal after South America lost half a blace to Oceania. That decision by FIFA's executive committee was met with discontent by

the 10 members of CONMEBOL at the time before a proposal was put together aimed at gaining back the place.

CONMEBOL previously had four automatic qualification places and a

playoff with Oceania.

Under the new format Brazil will also have to qualify after FIFA took away the automatic place for the World Cup holders.

Blatter said organisers would have to weigh up all the options, including television, stadiums and funding, before a decision is made on the CON-MEBOL suggestion.

, "We are not there yet, we need to look at all the parameters," Blatter added. "The organisers need to look at marketing matters, television, stadiums and guarantees.

"We need to discuss the impact. They (the South Americans) had to write with proposals but no other decision has been made since the executive committee in December."

The executive committee will discuss the 2006 finals further in a general meeting on May 3, Blatter said.

T-Shirt, web site spark challenges to rights

WASHINGTON (Reuters) - Free speech, a key tenet of the U.S. Constitution, is facing unusual challenges in pre-war, post 9/11 America - where wearing an anti-war T-shirt prompted an arrest and lampooning the vice president's wife drew a letter from a White House lawyer.

The creator of a satirical Web site that took aim at Lynne Cheney, wife of Vice President Dick Cheney, said he felt a chill when the letter on White House stationery arrived.

"I read it very carefully and while I could see that technically it was a request ... the overall tone of it and the citing of various and sundry cases was obviously threatening in nature," John Wooden said by telephone from Brooklyn, New York. "You don't get just a request from the vice president's office.'

WASHINGTON (Reuters) -Organically grown crops contain more healthy compounds than conventional crops, perhaps because they are not exposed to pesticides, U.S. researchers reported on Friday.

Tests on organically and sustainably grown berries and corn showed they contain up to 58 percent more polyphenolics, compounds that act as antioxidants and may protect cells against damage that can lead to heart disease and cancer.

Organic food is grown without chemical pesticides or fertilizers. Sustainably grown food is grown without artificial pesticides.

"This really opens the door to more research in this area," said Alyson Mitchell, an assistant professor of food science at the University of California, Davis, who led the study,

Her team compared levels of total

polyphenolics and ascorbic acid content in blackberries, strawberries and corn grown organically, sustainably or conventionally.

The team found that blackberries grown sustainably or organically and then frozen contained 50 percent to 58 percent more polyphenolics than conventionally grown crops from neighboring plots.

Sustainably grown frozen strawberries contained 19 percent more polyphenolics than conventional fruit.

Sustainably grown and organic produce also had more ascorbic acid, which the body converts to vitamin C, Mitchell's team reported in the Journal of Agricultural and Food Chemistry.

The polyphenolics in the organic crops were at levels seen in wild plants, Mitchell said, suggesting that plants treated with pesticides need to make less of the chemicals.

'Reservoir Dogs' to become SCi computer game

LONDON (Reuters) - Violent cult film "Reservoir Dogs" is to be made into a computer game, software firm SCi Games Ltd. said on Friday.

The film about a botched diamond heist launched the career of director Ouentin Tarantino and restored the for-

tunes of actor Harvey Keitel. Notorious for its bloody gunbattles and constant swearing, it has been a favorite with critics and movie fans since its release in 1992.

SCi Games said it had acquired inter-



active rights to the movie from Californian film and television production company Artisan Entertainment Inc. The game will initially be released for Sony PlayStation 2 and Microsoft Xbox consoles.

SCi promises that gamers will be able to play all the film's key characters, including Mr. Blonde, infamous for torturing a policeman in one of the movie's most visceral scenes.

SCi shares were up 3 percent at 46.5 pence in late morning trade.



Ivorian war spurs west Africa's AIDS nightmare

BOUAKE, Ivory Coast (Reuters) -"The girls all love us because of what we are fighting for," laughs Ivory Coast rebel fighter Mantou Cisse, surrounded by young female admirers.

"Worry about AIDS? There is no AIDS in Bouake," he says confidently in a rebel stronghold where young men with guns now lay down the law. But there is AIDS in Bouake.

In fact it was one of the more heavily

affected parts of the West African country before a war blew up in September and changed what was once a haven of stability into bloodshed and chaos.

Now the conflict threatens to encourage the spread of the HIV virus that causes AIDS and put yet another seal on Ivory Coast's hopes of ever regaining its place as a prosperous exception in a region of turmoil and despair.

Just as dangerous, the war could help fan the crisis in a part of the worstaffected continent that has so far got off fairly lightly compared to southern or east Africa.

"Ivory Coast was already the country with the highest rate of infection in this region," said Pierre Mpele, the head of UNAIDS for West and Central Africa.

"Crisis situations help to spread HIV/AIDS and if it continues any longer then we fear that we will start to see an impact in the region because of the movements of people."

Ivory Coast, which drew millions of immigrants in search of its relative riches, has infection rates estimated at 10 to 12 percent of the sexually active population.

As Ivory Coast's second city, a crossroads, market center, garrison and student town, Bouake had more sufferers than most.

In a sign of what is happening elsewhere, efforts both to look after sufferers and prevent the transmission of the virus have broken down.

NO CONDOMS

"There are no condoms in town even if people want to use them and people cannot hold on forever. There is no money for campaigns to persuade people of the dangers," complained Penda Toure, who runs an AIDS project in the city

Before the war, Toure's Center for Solidarity and Social Action was help-

ing over 900 families, one or more of whose members was infected. Since the fighting erupted it has only been possible to establish contact with 268.

Most sufferers either fled to the main city of Abidjan or scattered back to their villages and might now be off spreading the virus again. There is concern that infected prostitutes might have little choice but to sell their bodies again.

"The war is a catastrophe for those of us with HIV," said Sidibe Brahima, a former trader who has known he was infected since 1995, emphasizing his point with trembling arms weakened by suffering. "The people who were caring for us

have run away themselves. We have no food, no help."

"The crisis makes the young and women particularly vulnerable," said Mpele.

"The health infrastructure is gone in some areas. There is violence. There is an increased likelihood of rape and the behavior of young people has changed because of the war and has put them at greater risk."

Infection not a concern for many

Infection with a virus that could lie dormant for years is not a major concern for people worried about where their next meal is coming from or for fighters fearing that battle might resume at any time.

U.S. officials said on Tuesday they had asked Germany to extradite the two men. Yemen had asked Germany to repatriate the men, saying it would prosecute them if there was evidence against them.

If found guilty in the United States of helping a foreign "terrorist" organization, Moayad faces a possible jail sentence of up to 60 years, and Zayed faces up to 30 years.

The Yemeni official described Hamas, labeled by Washington as a "terrorist" organization, as a legitimate group resisting Israeli occupation of Palestinian territory.

"Our position towards Hamas is clear. We do not consider Hamas a terrorist group but a group that is struggling to gain legitimate rights," the official said.

U.S. officials have sought to cut off money supplies to suspected Islamic "terrorist groups with arrests and indictments since the September 11, 2001, hijacked plane attacks, blamed

on al Qaeda and its leader, bin Laden. Both men belong to Yemen's Islamic opposition Islah party, whose members have denounced the arrests and said the pair had no connection to al Qaeda.

On the other hand, sources at the Islah Party denied that the US had given any new evidence with regard to al-Moayad and his associate's involvement on charge of assisting al-Qaeda organization and Hamas.

Al-Moayad lawyer in Frankfurt has demanded the Supreme Federation Court for the case to be referred. Al-Moayad is a preacher at Al Ihsan Mosque, one of the main mosques in Sana'a.

He left Frankfurt with his companion Mohammed Yahya Zaed for medical treatment. At the same time, intensified efforts are currently being exerted on the government by Islah and religious affiliates to pressure the government to bring him back to Yemen.

Weapons' mess continues

MP Sultan al-Barakani, head of GPC caucus in the parliament said that MPs were short of time to debate the law and endorse it and that there are some figures who do not want the law to see the light. He pointed out that the law will be the business of the next parliament.

The question of arms possession in Yemen has become a major headache for the government which believes that there must be a law to regulate and control this issue, as arms have been a main source of violence and terrorism. The government believes that enforcing control on arms possession is part of its campaign against terrorist elements. It also feels that this issue is one of the main reasons that curb its efforts to achieve security and stability as well as development.

Arms possession and carrying is no longer a sign of manhood and part of the Yemeni culture as tribesmen used to think but it has rather become a means for kidnapping, theft, and all sorts of crimes. The possession of firearms in some remote tribal areas has made it difficult for the government to control these areas like Marib, Al-Jawf, Sa'dah and Shabwa. It made possible for terrorists to carry out their terrorist operations even near the airport of Sana'a as some terrorists fired

and did not interfere at all.

The government has been since 1997 demanding the parliament to endorse a draft law to regulate this issue. But the parliament was not convinced with a new law to replace the law of 1992. Al-Ahmar has repeatedly said that "we do not need a new law

but enactment of the first one." The law of 1992 which has not been implemented yet, does not impose strict rules on arms possession; it allows the possession and carrying of arms with a license issued by several authorities. It entails that if someone is caught possessing a gun, he should be fined with YR 10000 but it does not dictate that the gun should be confiscated. All these lapses in the law turned the issue into chaos.

As the new law was totally rejected by the parliament, the government incorporated some amendments into the first law by the end of last January and presented it to the parliament for discussion and approval. Some tribal figures who are suspected of having links with the issue of arms smuggling and trading have also strongly rejected the new law which imposes some strict and tough measures against those who possess and trade in this business.


According to reports, there are over 60 million pieces of arms in Yemen most of them have been brought into the country through smuggling. Some estimates put the ratio of arms to people at 3-to-1. However, many people do not possess arms. There are various' types of weapons like Kalashnikovs, artilleries, cannons, mortars, anti-aircraft guns..etc from different countries like Russia, US, Ukraine, Bulgaria, France, Brazil, Korea, China...etc. People in Yemen prefer the Russian Kalashnikov as it is cheap in compari-

son with the US and because they have experienced it for a long time. There are different arms markets spread in Sadaa, Thamar, Marib and Sana'a. The most famous ones are those of Jihanah 30 km outside Sana'a and that of Al-Talh in Sadaa.

Of course, the unstable political situation in the country as well as the infightings between the south and north has been a major reason behind the spread of the weapons in the society. During this time of political unrest people felt insecure and therefore they felt the need for a sort of self-defense and self-protection.

Advocate Abdulaziz al-Baghdadi believes that the sense of chaos, injustice forces people to find a way to protect themselves and their properties. Also, throughout history, people in Yemen got accustomed to this issue of arms possession and it developed with them as part of their culture and tradition and possessing them is a symbol of status and manhood. Firing into the air to celebrate weddings, the birth of a baby boy or the arrival of a male guest is part of the culture.

Despite this, many people feel now that it is no more like this and that the society should be civilized, provided that the government takes the responsibility for doing justice and protecting everyone in the community without any sort of tribal or regional discrimination. Of course, the process of disarmament or controlling this prob lem will take time. Observers believe that this is a step towards establishing a civil society and enhancing security and the rule of law. But the question remains to be asked whether the new parliament would pass the law. More importantly, will the law even be enacted?





dome is about 14.5 meters and is built

in a rectangular shape with black

stones. Its interior is composed of four

semi domes in each of the four cor-

ners. The prime dome is estimated to

Ba Saad Tomb:

This tomb is actually composed of two adjacent graves surrounded by a wooden structure made of Al-Saag wood. The tomb, which has four windows, is covered with woolen textile of red and green colors. There are engravings on the wood explaining the history of the person buried. To the south there lies another tomb of one of Bin Saad's followers.

Al-Mihwaly Dome:

This dome dates back to more than 400 years and was constructed of A'ajer stones. Near the dome, there is a water well, which is currently in ruins after it was a major source of water at the time. Traces of ancient structures surround the dome in almost every direction. Overall, the dome is quite similar to that of Bin Saad, but it is smaller in size and is suffering from cracks on its side walls.


