



Amid major changes taking place in the PSO

Stiff security measures in Sana'a

The Yemeni government tightened security measures last week at the border outlets as well as in Sana'a and other main cities in anticipation of a possible terrorist operation. The Interior Ministry found out that a terrorist act was likely to take place in Sana'a as heavy explosives were found in an area to the south of the capital. Reliable sources told the Yemen Times that heavy explosives were found in the area close to Shahran Hotel and it is expected that when some terrorist groups failed to carry out their plan, they left the explosives. The same sources also said that the security officers in al-Mahra governorate seized a car with over 150 sacks of TNT. The driver of the car said he got that amount of explosives from another vehicle outside al-Mukalla

The security tightening coincided with the extradition of four Yemeni al-Qaeda suspects who were captured in Saudi Arabia. Yemeni official sources said that the extradition of the suspects has been carried out according to the security treaty signed between Yemen and Saudi Arabia three years ago. The sources said that eight other suspects, including two suspected Limburg bombers, are to be handed over by the Saudi authorities to Yemen soon.

Meanwhile, high level intelligence

officers have been removed from their posts last week. The change has targeted prominent officials in the Political Security Office (PSO) as Mohammed al-Surmai, first deputy director was replaced by Ahmad al-Astta. Similarly, Abdullah Moharam, second deputy

director was replaced by Rajeh Hunaish. Other changes in the PSO are expected to take place soon. Among those who were changed also is the officer of Aden Hussein al-Anisi as he was replaced by Yahya al-Ahrami. PSO directors of Hajah and Hadhramaut were also changed. Well-informed sources told the Yemen Times that these changes aim at activating the job of this important organization in the light of the new plan to fight terrorism which still represents a major threat to the Yemeni government.

It was an embarrassment to the government that ten al-Qaeda suspects involved in the operation against the USS Cole escaped from Aden prison last April. Among those are two people wanted by the US, Jamal al-Badwi and Fahd al-Qas'e. The Ministry of Interior already assigned a reward of YR 10 million to the person who would disclose their whereabouts. Some of these fugitives are believed to still hide in Aden. Security officers are seriously hunting down for them. They have arrested over ten people who are believed to have an idea about their hideouts.

DIA organizes workshop for journalists

In Taiz, and within the objectives of the program for integrating poor people into the society, DIA, an international NGO working in Yemen, organized a workshop during 26-28 May in Taiz.

Twenty journalists from various media establishments participated in the workshop.

The workshop concentrated on the problem of finding an active role for journalists in promoting social integra-

Journalists were informed of how to make Yemeni people aware of the importance of the integration of the marginalized classes of the community into the Yemeni society for better development and to improve relations between the different sectors in Yemen.

For DIA, the question of integration was a priority, as it complements its previous work in the field of helping the youth understand the value of tolerance.

Abyoub al-Qasemi, the workshop coordinator, told YT that "the workshop aimed to activate journalists' role in supporting the social incorporating programs targeting the poor and the marginalized classes of the society and getting them acquainted with their problems and the obstacles facing social



integration.

Swasan al-Adeemi, the head of social integration project said, "The project works in two aspects. The first with the marginalized sectors so as to improve their educational and health levels and let them acquire new skills, and the second is related to the society that includes organizing workshops and training journalists, teachers and students on how to deal with the marginalized classes."

"For DIA, it is important to work with the local authorities. As far as DIA is concerned about social programs and try to assist the poorest people in order to help them recover their dignity and hope, Cecili Conilleau, DIA's Program Coordinator said

"DIA would like to develop programs which deal with "food security and gender" and agricultural programs in the governorate of Taiz,". she said.

DIA is currently working on a project to produce cheese locally in Taiz and on projects to develop emergency water supply for 25 villages in one district of

Al-Qaeda suspect flees unharmed

Tribal sources told the Yemen Times that confrontations took place between an al-Qaeda suspect and the police forces last Wednesday in one of the traditional markets of the Marib City located about 16 km east of Sana'a.

The clashes started when a group of

police forces tried to arrest a man

named Ali Mubarak Firas, one of the Arab Afghans who returned from Afghanistan and who belongs to one of the prominent tribes of Ma'rib. The sources mentioned that the con-

frontations took place using fire arms and white weapons and lead to the injury of three of the police forces, one critically injured and might not make

Ali Mubarak fled the scene leaving

his car in the hands of the forces.

Another tribal source said that this confrontation started suddenly especially that the security forces arrested him earlier in 2002 in Marib and sent him to Sana'a where he remained for approximately three months and was released due to lack of evidence and then came back home to Mareb.

A source close to the security forces told the Yemen Times that this operation has come according to information stating that Ali Mubarak Firas might lead the security men to hunt down of Abu Asem, the first wanted man in Yemen, and know his whereabouts.

In addition, the source pointed out that Ali Mubarak Firas might be one of persons who transmitted information to Abu Asem to convince him to surrender himself to the authorities on condition that he would not be handed to the

This has been done according to negations made one month ago between people who know Abu Asem, a key al-Qaeda mastermind and officials at the government to convince Abu Asem to hand himself over.

On another front, sources relating to those people connected with Abu Asem stated that they do have links with Al-Qaida but they did not promise any of the security authorities to convince Abu Asem to surrender and that they would tell him about this proposition and it would be up to him to decide.

The sources say that Abu Asem refused the proposal saying that he does not trust the state and does not believe it would not hand him to the USA. It is believed that Abu Asem lost touch with his former colleague as they have no connections with him any longer because he disappeared two months ago from in Ma'rib.

Another source confirmed the negotiations taking place between similar elements and high rank officials in the state in the hunt down of Abu Asem and in effort to convince him to surrender to the police.

In a statement last week, the USA warned its citizens from traveling to Yemen and called upon Americans living in Yemen to return home if possi-

The USA had started more than a week ago minimizing its diplomatic staff in the embassy referring this act to the increasing level of danger especially with the news that new terrorist acts are yet to take place in Yemen soon.

using recycled computer parts and simple electronic devices. The robot was fitted with an electronic brain and was able to perform simple tasks.

The chemistry and biology projects included a chemical bomb using everyday chemicals, live eruption of a volcano, manufacturing of soap, recycling of waste materials such as paper and used metals, the adverse affects of acid rain on plants and aquatic life, colour blindness test and demonstration of basic first aid.

Burns meets Palestinian PM ahead of Bush summit

RAMALLAH, West Bank, May 31 (Reuters) - An envoy of U.S. President George W. Bush on Saturday met with Palestinian leaders to prepare the ground for a Middle East peace summit, as violence claimed three more Palestinian lives.

U.S. Assistant Secretary of State William Burns met with Palestinian Prime Minister Mahmoud Abbas ahead of Bush's June 4 summit with Abbas and Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon to push forward a U.S.-backed "road map" to peace.


Palestinian Foreign Minister Nabil Shaath, who attended Saturday's meeting, said Burns was helping the two sides hammer out a statement that would conclude the summit in Aqaba, Jordan.

"Our responsibility (under the road map) is to reach as soon as possible, hopefully before the Aqaba summit, a full compliance with the hudna," he said, using the Arabic term for truce. Shaath said Israel was expected in return to stop violence against Palestinians and release prisoners.

Abbas on Friday told Israeli television he expected militants spearheading the 32-month-old Palestinian uprising to agree to halt attacks on Israelis within three weeks.

Shaath said the goal was to achieve a deal even sooner.

Bush, on a visit to Poland, called Abbas's commitment to ending violence a "hopeful sign for peace in the Middle East".



A Palestinian climbs over a concrete wall which separates east Jerusalem from the West Bank May 30. Israelis and Palestinians saw only a glimmer of hope for peace on Friday after talks between their prime ministers, despite a looming summit with U.S. President George W. Bush.

However, it was not immediately clear if the truce deal would satisfy Israel, which wants Abbas to crush militants. Palestinians fear a harsh crackdown could spark a civil war. They also argue that their security forces have been weakened by Israeli army sweeps, making the task more difficult.

Abdel-Aziz Rantisi, a top leader of the Islamic militant Hamas group behind many bombings that has killed scores of Israelis since the start of the

uprising, said Hamas was still dis-

cussing the ceasefire proposal. Hamas wants Israel to agree to stop attacks on Palestinians in return.

Abbas also told Israel television on Friday that Palestinian security forces would be ready within three weeks to take Israel up on its offer to hand over parts of the West Bank and Gaza to Palestinian control.

Israel has offered to withdraw from some of the Palestinian areas it reoccupied in the summer of 2002 after a spate of suicide attacks, turning them into a proving ground for a Palestinian crackdown on militants.

No concrete moves towards peace are expected before the June 4 summit, although Israel radio said strict restrictions on Palestinian entry into Israel could be lifted to allow some 20,000 Palestinian labourers into Israel by Sunday.

In new violence, Israeli troops shot dead a Palestinian near the West Bank town of Jenin. The army said he was killed as he laid an explosive charge. Palestinian witnesses said soldiers fired on two students on their way to college, killing one.

Two other Palestinians died on Saturday of wounds sustained in clashes over the past week, Palestinian medics said.

Saddam Hussein found at Bani Matar

He used to bring him food or the girl of the kidnapper who used to live with her father only in the house.

The people of the village did not dare to inform the police as they are frightened by al-Suwari who is accused of several crimes. Saddam used to hear the conversation of the kidnapper with his fellow friends who used to visit him at nights. Security officers said he is smart and has important information to them about the criminal.

The family of the hostage did not know about him for all this time as the child is orphan and he was brought to the Orphans Care House in Sana'a by his grandfather who lives in lbb. He once went to see his brother who works in Bani Mattar in the field of coffee farming. His brother came to know the kidnapper and used to work at day and goes to sleep at his house. Once he told him to take the gun and go to bring him qat but he took the gun and ran away. Therefore, he kidnapped the child and put in the stable. Nobody asked about him; his brother knew about the kidnapping but he did not inform police. His whereabouts is still unknown so far. It is not clear also whether he was indulged in the criminal gang of the kidnapper. Saddam's family thought he was in the orphan house.

As the kidnapper is charged with robbing the factory of the well-known Hussein al-Suwari, he was wanted by the security. Officer Najeeb Bagash who followed up the case told Yernen Times that

a group of security people went to moni-tor the house of al-Suwari so as o arrest him for robbing the factory. When they approached the house, they heard the voice of the child singing. He used to sing to let people hear him as he was beaten up whenever he cried or shouted. The officer took a warrant from the prosecution to storm the house. They found the child chained and in a very miserable situation. He could not believe that he was free, thinking that the kidnapper will bring him back to the stable. When I asked what he wants, he said he wanted to go back to his village. He does not want to go to school which did not even inform his family about his disappearance. He was shown to the doctor and it was found that his stomach is no more used to any sort of food except bread and water. He was given some rice and meat but he

One of his relatives, Officer Nasr al-Nusari, described the act as a heinous crime that Yemen has never seen before. He warned that if no stiff action is taken against the criminal and his gang, it will lead to further similar crimes. "We do not know how to deal with this issue which might bring tribal problems."

Security people are still hunting down to arrest the kidnapper.

The state of lawlessness has encouraged similar people in different areas in Yemen to show their muscles and bring fear into the life of their people.

US, British troops to launch arms amnesty in Iraq

BAGHDAD, May 31 (Reuters) - U.S. and British troops in Iraq launch a weapons amnesty on Sunday to clamp down on firearms which have flooded the country since the fall of Saddam Hussein. spokesman for the U.S. military told a news conference Iraqis would be encouraged to put their guns in plastic bags and drop them off at police stations during the two-week amnesty. He said the bags would help prevent misunderstandings as people with guns approached police stations. Iraqis will be allowed to keep weapons such as AK-47 assault rifles at home, but they will not be allowed to carry them on the streets. They will be able to carry licensed handguns on the street, however. The arms crackdown will be broadcast on radio stations and on loudspeakers. Leaflets will also be distributed. spokesman said that after two weeks, anyone with unlicensed or heavy weapons on the streets would be prosecuted. It could be a daunting task. The AK-47 assault rifle business has been booming. Arms traders nd in vegetable markets offering guns to Iraqis, who inspect the weapons often by firing them, before

Iraqi dinars change hands. So many AK-47s have been sold that the price has plummeted from pre-war levels, according to arms traders. A rifle now sells for about 50,000 dinars (\$40) compared to 400,000 dinars before the conflict. Everybody is interested in buying, from men who want to protect their families to Iraqi teenagers roaming the streets of slums with AK-47s slung over their shoulders. Iraqis had AK-47 rifles in their houses before the war. But the weapons are now found on many streets as Iraqis fearful of looters and other armed Iraqis purchase guns. Rocket-propelled-grenades and hand

grenades are not as widely sold as AK-47s, but they still pose a security problem for both Iraqis and U.S. and British troops. Iraqis complain that the failure of U.S. and British troops to restore order following the war has endangered ordinary people who crave a normal life

free of the crackle of gunfire.

Sweden rebuffs Indonesian demands on Aceh rebels

STOCKHOLM, May 31 (Reuters) -Sweden said on Saturday it had rejected a request by Indonesia to take action against thec Stockholm-based leadership of a separatist rebellion in the province of Aceh.

Indonesia, which has stepped up a military offensive to crush the rebels who have fought for independence since 1976, sent a letter to the Swedish government in mid-May demanding steps be taken against the rebel leaders.

"The Indonesian letter asked Sweden to take measures to stop the activities of the GAM (Free Aceh Movement) people," Foreign Ministry spokesman Lars-Olof Lundberg told Reuters, without elaborating on the nature of the measures being sought by

"The latest position is that we will follow Swedish law which does not allow us to expel Swedish citizens," he

Sweden's reply, written by Foreign Minister Anna Lindh, was received by her Indonesian counterpart on Saturday, he added.

Sweden is home to 50 Acehnese, including the movement's top commanders and Sultan Hasan Tiro, considered by GAM to be Aceh's head of

Jakarta has exerted increasing pressure on Stockholm to take firm action against the GAM leadership, which a Swedish Foreign Ministry source linked to the military offensive in Aceh that has killed dozens and made up to



Indonesian marines fire shots at Aceh separatist rebels (GAM) who were defending a base in Jambo Aye district on the border between East Aceh and North Aceh, May 30. The marines overran the rebel base after three hours of

23,000 people homeless.

"If Sweden does not pay full attention (to the request), the conflict in Aceh will continue," Indonesian Vice President Hamzah Haz was quoted as saying by Indonesia's Antara news agency on Friday.

Haz called on Sweden to surrender Tiro to the Indonesian authorities, Antara said.

Lindh said on Friday that while her government accepted Indonesia's "full territorial rights" over Aceh, which lies on the northern tip of the island of Sumatra, no action would be taken

against the GAM leaders.

"Of course it is very sensitive for us and a difficult situation," she said. "At the same time, we have Swedish laws which say as long as you don't commit any crime against Swedish law the government can't interfere."

Resources-rich Aceh has been the scene of a simmering decades-long rebellion which has killed at least 10,000 people.

Talks to resolve the conflict, scheduled for late last month in Geneva, broke off with each side blaming the

Geldof says West is neglecting Ethiopia's hungry

ADDIS ABABA, May 31 (Reuters) - Live Aid founder Bob Geldof accused western donors on Saturday of "criminal negligence" in drought-afflicted Ethiopia, saying a lack of aid had already killed tens of thousands of people.

Aid agencies estimate 14 million Ethiopians are at risk of starvation after the worst drought in almost two decades. There is no official figure of how many people have already died from drought-related causes.

On the last day of a visit to the Horn of Africa country, Geldof said the situation in some areas was worse than he had witnessed in 1985, when famine in the region prompted him to organise the

world's biggest rock concert to help the starving.

"It is criminal negligence that tens of thousands of Ethiopians have died due to lack of food during the current drought affecting the country," he told a news conference in the capital Addis Ababa.

"When millions died as a result of famine in 1985, the western world had said not again. But I came back 18 years later and I found the situation no different, it is in fact worse in

"It is clear that the current drought situation in Ethiopia will develop into a famine unless enough assistance is provided," he said.

The Irish musician and activist

praised the United States, which he said has provided around 60 percent of the 1.5 million tonnes required to feed more than 14 million droughtaffected people.

He criticised the European Union (EU), saying its donation of about 28 percent of the aid needed was insufficient.

"Europe has got the food, if they are not capable of providing it to the needy in Ethiopia, give it to those who are capable so that the food can save lives," he said.

"Ethiopia is faced with a food crisis. If the EU and other donors fail to deliver the required food on time and death occurs as a result, do not say you are not warned."

French police teargas anarchists in G8 eve clash

ANNEMASSE, France, May 31 (Reuters) - French police fired teargas on Saturday to disperse several hundred anarchists in the first major disturbance ahead of a summit of the "Group of Eight" leading industrialised countries.

Eyewitnesses said the incident came after the protesters marched from an anti-G8 campsite near the French town of Annemasse on the Swiss border to blockade a building where French Socialist Party activists were meeting.

It was the first clash in what both protest leaders and police had said would be a series of peaceful marches and sitins during the three-day summit in the nearby French spa town of Evian, which opens on Sunday.

Authorities on both sides of the border, fearful of a repetition of violence that rocked a G8 summit in Genoa, Italy, two years ago, have mounted a massive security operation involving some 25,000 police and security officials.

It was not immediately clear why the anarchists, carrying their traditional black-and-red flags, decided to march against the socialists - although hardleft movements generally regard social democratic parties as "hirelings of capitalism".

Marchers said they threw stones at the building where the socialists were meeting to discuss the G8 summit after guards inside fired a spray at them. There was no immediate comment from the socialists.

The anarchists began setting up barricades but French riot police moved in, firing volleys of teargas to push them back to the campsite at Annemasse airfield, where earlier in the day protesters trying to move off permitted routes. were instructed in passive resistance

Police barricades were going up on both sides of the French- Swiss border around Lake Geneva to halt protesters

Army helicopters circled overhead.

In Lausanne, across Lake Geneva from Evian, various groups denouncing the G8 leaders, who include U.S. President George W. Bush and Russian President

Vladimir Putin, were considering ways to try to block water traffic.

While most G8 leaders are staying around Evian, about a dozen prime ministers and presidents who are summit guests, including China's Hu Jintao, will Geneva from the Swiss to the French

Protesters accuse the G8 chiefs of acting like "Masters of the Universe" and say the poorer nation leaders — who

stay in Lausanne and travel across Lake include Brazil's new left-wing President Luis Inacio Lula da Silva — will get nothing more than crumbs from them.

The G8 include Britain, Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Russia and the United States.

No deterrents in US war on terror-Cheney

WEST POINT, N.Y., May 31 (Reuters) - The United States will not pursue deterrence or containment policies in its so-called war on terrorism but would instead seek to utterly destroy its enemies, Vice President Dick Cheney said on Saturday.

In a speech to the 2003 graduating class of the U.S. Military Academy, Cheney also warned that the United States remained willing to use its military might against any nation supporting terror-

"The battle of Iraq was a major victory in the war on terror but the war itself is far from over," Cheney told the more than 840 graduating cadets, most of whom will pursue careers as officers in the U.S. Army

"We cannot allow ourselves to grow complacent, we cannot forget that the terrorists remain determined to kill as many Americans as possible both abroad and here at home, and they are still

"With such an enemy, no peace treaty is possible, no policy of containment or deterrent will prove effective - the only way to deal with this threat is to destroy it completely and utterly, and President Bush is absolutely determined to do just

Cheney noted that the attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, when hijacked planes destroyed the twin towers of New York's World Trade Center and damaged the Pentagon, marked the birth of the "Bush doctrine" that any nation supporting or harboring terrorists was as guilty as the terrorists themselves. Without naming nations, Cheney warned that policy remains in effect.

"If there is anyone in the world today who doubts the seriousness of the Bush doctrine. I would urge that person to consider the fate of the Taliban in Afghanistan and Saddam Hussein's

regime," he said. Chenev hailed the U.S. victory in Iraq, which

quickly toppled Saddam's government in Baghdad, as proof that the American military is the best in the world.

"With our victory in Iraq we have removed a threat to our country and to our friends in the region," Cheney said

While making no direct mention of Iran, a nation along with Iraq and North Korea that President Bush has called part of an "axis of evil". Cheney's latest comments came as the White House is turning its attention to Tehran.

With military victories in Afghanistan and Iraq already in hand, administration hawks have begun portraying Iran as an imminent threat.

The Bush administration has complained repeatedly about Iran's nuclear programs, and Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld has accused Tehran of not doing enough against al Qaeda members allegedly in Iran. The network led by Saudi-born Osama bin Laden has been blamed for

Creating a ministry of water & environment to...

Solve water crisis

he new Yemeni government has placed itself at a decisive confrontation with water crisis and regulation of water resources in addition to its re-distribution according to plans supposed to be implemented by the first ministry of water created for

The establishment of a new ministry for water and environment came to face an aggravating crisis of water in Yemen. Before the creation of water ministry, water wealth management was the responsibility of many authorities, i.e. the ministry of irrigation and agriculture, the ministry of electricity and the state establishment for water.

Pursuant to world bank and donor countries remarks on significance of preparing a water strategy to put an end to depletion of subterranean water basins, the ministry would be responsible for solving the problem of excessive pumping of water in mountains, mountainsides and littoral plains where more than 90% of the population lives. The World Bank report excludes the governorate of Hadramout from excessive use of water. For the modern evaluative studies on water resources revealed the existence a water resource in that governorate that can amount to 280 cubic meters of annual feeding, in addition to a reserve that can be enough for several thousands of years under the present rate of consumption in the region. Thus the establishment of the new ministry is meant to encounter the hyper-usage of subterranean water at rates that could lead to exhaustion of a great amount of countryside water reserve within one generation. Yemen is expecting from the new ministry of waters to explore resources of pure water many of the poor citizens are lacking in. Moreover the ministry is expected to work for utilizing rainwater by building new water

The government's association of environment with the ministry of waters is aimed at preventing the environmental deterioration that caused aggravation of water problems, especially with removing trees, discarding terraces and scraping of soil by the act of water torrents and diminished feeding to subterranean

reservoirs.

The ministry would set up a legal and planning work frame allowing flow of water from the countryside to towns at sustainable amounts meeting the needs of urban areas inhabitants. The purpose is to raise averages of covering pure water and sewage serves.

The Yemeni government's policy on providing the citizens with waters is categorized under the strategy on reducing poverty and decreasing its rates in a way the ministry of waters would bear a percentage pf the cost of transfer and distribution of water resources. Experts confirm that success of the new ministry is

dependent on allocation of ample funds for running the water sector and allotment of big investments for providing pure drinking water in towns and the countryside. It is also depending on coordination of the state policies in preserving water wealth and its distribution

n Indian delegation led by foreign undersecretary for Asia and Africa affairs made recently a visit to Yemen to explore possibility of enhancing cooperation within the Indian Ocean league and to exchange trade benefits especially in investment field.

The Indian official concluded an agreement with Yemeni president of the state authority for investment Abdul Kareem Mutair stipulating that the competent sides in the two countries would conduct a follow-up for finalizing legal procedures on final endorsement of the agreement on encouragement and protection of investment signed by the two parties in December 2002.

The Indian delegation and deputy premier, the minister of planning and international cooperation Ahmed Soufan means and ways of enhancing and developing cooperation of Yemen and India and finishing and continuing what had been agreed upon during the talks at the fourth session of the Yemeni-Indian

In a meeting grouping the Indian delegation and oil minister Saleh Barabba' discussion tackled facets of cooperation. In this regard the Yemeni side welcomed the Indian companies willing to invest in oil and gas industry in both aspects of exploration and services. The Indian delegation displayed its country's interest in consolidation of cooperation with Yemen in both oil and liquefied gas fields which are considered a true beginning for establishment of effective trade partnership between the two countries that are both members of the Indian Ocean

The Indian delegation had also held a meeting with Prime Minister Abdulqader Bajammal reviewed with the Indian delegation the possibility of consolidating the two countries cooperation in oil and diversified industries in addition to expertise in the fields of education and common history. Emphasis centered on significance of Indian-Yemeni cooperation for enhancing opportunities of stability, security and peace in Asia and the Indian Ocean.

Intellectual capital

hey say, money is the lifeblood of any business, and by money, they mean capital, liquid cash, and anything that can be transformed into money. However, as times change, money is no longer the biggest problem businesses face, in fact, people are.

It is generally acknowledged that good people are the prime source of any sustainable advantage in any company, especially in this increasingly knowledge intensive and fastchanging business world, yet organizations continue to struggle with how to retain key people and best utilize their expertise, innovativeness and strategic agility, because they know how much they really need this kind of people.

In turn, as an effort to enhance the intellectual capital in today's business organization, a new concept has emerged in order to increase collective knowledge, the organization is called Communities of practice (CoP). This concept is considered one of the most recent knowledge management initiatives; (Brown and Duguid, 1991 and Wenger and Snyder; 2000), Cops are often a less structured means of creating and sharing knowledge, because CoPs crosses levels, functional distinctions and even the whole organizational structure. In short, CoPs are groups formed around a shared interest, in which discussions builds on the motivations of the group members, and hence information may flow freely in many directions. It is a dynamic process of collecting and sharing information that can be leveraged into an economic or social

Such free flow of information in an organization would facilitate employee empowerment and hence the creation of intellectual capital through CoPs can be the competitive advantage that other companies cannot easily imitate, because with an organization that looks like spaghetti to outsiders, every employees would know a great deal about how other employees work and how the whole organization functions, and hence the organization can utilize his experience, abilities and even suggestions in a better manner.

However, this spaghetti-like sidestepping of traditional hierarchical control and lack of specified outcomes from the group makes managers uncomfortable in a business environment based on performance matrices, deliverables and more familiar evidenced of doing real work, because even though we all would like to keep on chatting and chatting about a shared interest in a new idea, this wouldn't be the best way to contribute to the organization's prosperity, and hence value should be kept in mind.

Value is non substitutable, in fact, value should be created as a result of sharing information and creating intellectual capital. This value might come from new information exchanged between different layers of knowledge in all departments and between all departments, and also with customers, suppliers and stockholders, because not any information is of big value.

Endnote: Intellectual capital can be your competitive advantage, but to make use of it you have to adopt a good information flow systems with least restrictions, like CoPs for

The tragedy of Iraqi people

itting comfortably in my home in Yemen, I watch all major news networks compete for the "Hot" stories in Iraq. Stories of a war that brought so much suffering to the Iraqi people, forever scarred with memories of loved ones, an ancient civilization, and loss of a wealthy history.

I keep thinking about why this war took place, why was Iraq inflicted with so many pains? George Bush and Tony Blair insist this war was for the freedom of the Iraqi people, thus the ridiculously hypocritical name, "operation: Iraqi freedom". They also claimed Saddam Hussein to be a threat to the world, in general, and the U.S. and Israel in particular, with his weapons of mass destruction. "Saddam must be disarmed!" Bush said on many occa-

Saddam Hussein had been in power for more than two decades, during which time he committed many atrocities against his own people. Why did not anyone rush to rescue the Iraqi people then? They were too busy with the cold war! Saddam's weapons were supplied to him by his very close friends in the U.S. to win the war against Iran. Those same weapons have presently become a threat to the "sup-

Now, the war is officially over, however, the question remains, where are the weapons of mass destruction? Ironically, expert U.N inspectors did not find anything in so many years (whatever they found was destroyed), and yet, Bush and Blair insist that the weapons exist, probably hidden". Why were they not used to win the war? Why did Baghdad fall virtually without a fight? Why were there so many civilian casualties? British and American forces defended themselves claiming Iraqi military assets were placed delib-

erately in Urban Arabs close to civilian population.

How does that justify targeting hotels and Hospitals, for example the Red Cross? A building that is clearly marked as a non-military site, and is used by International Journalists was targeted by American forces. The result was the death of an Al-Jazeera cameraman. By April 19th, 13 Journalists had been killed in Iraq by American airstrips alone. If Liberation had truly been the noble aim of this war, meticulous measures would have been employed to minimize civilian casualties. Cluster Bombs would not have been used because of their higher risk to civilians, the same civilians in whose honor this war took place.

Time magazine has reported the use of cluster Bombs in Karbala may have been downplayed by coalition forces. Many not blown off. They are still lying around in the cities. Most victims of cluster Bombs have been children. American marines, and later the American army were informed about such cluster Bombs by Baghdad residents, but it is "Not our job", the soldiers said.

More importantly, the use of cluster Bombs is illegal according to the treaty of Ottawa. Ironically, the justification for the war in Iraq was the "Threat of weapons of mass destruction", at the same time American and British forces employ the wingspread use of internationally recognized illegal Bombs, some of which had never been used before. Iraq became a testing ground for such Bombs. Looting occurred throughout the city.

According to Andrew Gilligan of BBC, looting of public and commercial buildings, hospitals, and museums was witnessed all over Baghdad. Andrew was criticized by Blair's office for reporting on the chaos in Baghdad, and not mentioning the Euphoria of the Iraqi people on the joyous occasion of

Bush and Blair that the Iraqis are ecstatic about their newfound freedoms of speech, religion, etc. despite the Red Cross calling the humanitarian crisis in Baghdad a "Catastrophe".

MBC'S Channel two reported Forty percent of Iraq's children no longer see any point in living. Remember twelve years old Ali who lost both his Arms and most of his family in an American airstrip attack? He is now in the U.S. being treated for his wounds. Ali's sad story made it to the news. There are so many others we have not heard about, including the 500,000 children who died every year for the past eleven years as a result of the economic sanctions imposed on Iraq

Is this really what America

is all about? nyone, who has lived in the United States for many years, studied there and freely intermingled with the different elements that make up the vast melting pot of every ethnic background, is bound to come to the conclusion that in many respects, the US is one of the most successful social experiments of all time. If one goes further and delves into the history of this dynamic country, then one can not help but recognize that the founders of this nation surely had great foresight in laying down the foundations on which America stands and projects itself to the world. The history of that great nation is so full of great men, who every now and then came to insist that these foundations were to be upheld and promoted to produce the optimum of social cohesion, with all due respects to individual and community rights. Yet any perceptive observer of the current scene in the United States is bound to conclude that for some un American reasons, America is being led to behave out of context of what America stands for and what Americans really believes in. On the other hand, one is really surprised to find that American public opinion has in fact become so sedated with a deliberate streak of erratic vengeance pumped into the vast majority of media channels. One might come to even believe that the American people are not really aware of the dubious intricacies that have come to shape American foreign policies and the important role that interest groups have played in the shaping of such a policy. For sure, these interest groups were not recently born or popped out of nowhere. Yet American leadership in the past in many cases had the cunning to determine where lines should be drawn in submitting to these interest groups. This American White House Administration has, as far as any familiar observer can see, for all intents and purposes, not shown that important caliber of leadership one has seen in many previous administrations - Clinton, Johnson, Kennedy, Eisenhower, Roosevelt, Wilson, Lincoln etc, just to name a few. These were men who, when one reads about them or reads or hears their speeches, one is bound to sense the awesome caliber of intellect and vision that project the output which America can produce at its optimum. What went wrong? For sure the present Administration of George W. Yes, it is becoming ever so clearer that reason in the United States, which was and continues to be said and written was not allowed the deserved attention it should have gotten by the American people. Oh yes, there was a lot of reason being said and written in the United States before and after the First Undoubtedly Unjustifiable War in US History. Even now such sensible views are sneered at by the well paid doublethink wizards behind these vested interests [even here in Yemen, we have received emails that emanate from such wizardry, which never argue any specific points, but turn to dubious remarks of "being sick", or "anti Semitic" (does it not occur to these attackers that it would be downright stupid for a Semite to be Anti-Semitic?). The observer has also seen how "hawks" have childishly turned against those Americans, who saw and still see no justification for the invasion of Iraq, and very little wisdom in a lot of the nonsense that the Bush Administration is proving to be in all its manifestations. A commentary: The peace process between Eritrea and Ethiopia

Where from and where to? (part 1 of 2)

t is important to note, at the outset, that the problem between Eritrea and Ethiopia that has been brewing since the end of 1990s after an initial phase of cordial and friendly relations should be viewed basically as a political problem and not an ethnic problem. Indeed, ethnicity has been a destabilizing factor especially in the relations between these two countries. There were numerous ethnic group conflicts such as between Tigray groups and Tigrinya speaking groups and within Ethiopia the Amhara ethnic group and Tigray vying against each other for power. Although these conflicts existed thereby complicating the politics between the two countries, it is to be viewed from the political angle that this article is aimed to look at. Eritrea's assertion of independence in 1991 from its "recent colonizer" Ethiopia coincided with political changes in Ethiopia as well. In fact, it was the joint combination and close cooperation with the opposition forces in Ethiopia under the Tigray People's Liberation Front (TPLF) and the nationalist forces of Eritrea under the then Eritrean People's Liberation Front (EPLF) (now People's Front for Democracy and Justice - PFDJ) which made such simultaneous political changes in both the countries possible. The TPLF was able to wrest power from the Marxist regime of President Mengistu Haile Mariam in 1991 and the EPLF was able to proclaim independence from Ethiopia in 1993. Eritrea attained defacto independence in 1991 but it was not proclaimed as such. The actual dejure independence was done in 1993

only (after a referendum was conducted) and it was postponed in order to give the TPLF the chance to stabilize its regime in Addis Ababa. This showed the extent to which both TPLF and EPLF were aligned with each other at that point of time.

When Eritrea came under the British Military Administration (BMA) after Fascist Italy was defeated in the Second World War, this Trust territory of Britain was put for voting in the new United Nations which voted to incorporate Eritrea into Ethiopia as a federal state. It will not be surprising to point out here that in the British supervised elections of 1952, it was the Unionist Party - a party that campaigned not for autonomy, not for federation or independence but for unconditional union with Ethiopia that won a majority of seats in the National Assembly as against other parties which were demanding independence. And that is because; the Unionist Party was predominantly composed of Tigrinya speaking Christian supporters mainly from the highlands in Eritrea who had lots of cultural links with them. In other words, it was the lowland people in Eritrea who started the liberation struggle initially. They were joined by the Christian highlanders mainly from the 1970s and especially during the Marxist regime of Mengistu Haile Mariam. An additional factor that contributed to the change of attitude was that in subsequent years, the faith and confidence of the Eritrean people in Ethiopia was shattered when King Haile Sellassie's government took a drastic move to abrogate Eritrea's U.N. sponsored federal stasuppressed political parties, banned the trade union movement and made it a province of Ethiopia. This move of Haile Sellassie was very much expected. In fact, it was clear

federal status with Ethiopia that he would do so. The ground reality of the situation in Ethiopia was such that although Ethiopia under Haile Selassie called itself a democracy, in practice it was not and the political system was basically an autocratic monarchy with "God" given powers. Hence a democratic Eritrea would be a challenge to Ethiopia's already existing political system which obviously King Haile Selassie did not want to be touched. What even more complicated the politics of Ethiopia but was in a way advantageous to Eritrea was the overthrow of Haile Sellassie government in 1974 and take over of power by the socalled Dergue regime. President Mengistu Haile Mariam a prominent leader seized power from the Dergue in 1977. The internal political squabble between Mengistu and his opposition complicated the entire scenario. By then, there were numerous regional based opposition movements such as Ethiopian People's Revolutionary Party, Ethiopian Democratic Union and Oromo Liberation Movement etc., which were trying to take over power from President Mengistu. The TPLF was more a liberation movement seeking secession from Ethiopia. It became much more organized in the late 1970s and basically sought secession and this made the EPLF to join hands with TPLF to fight against the Ethiopian government for the common cause of both of them. In that sense, it was the common understanding between both the forces, which helped serve their common interests ultimately, although it should be pointed out here that they indeed had differences of opinion in the 1980s and even went to the extent of breaking their relations.

from the very beginning of Eritrea's

Post independent Eritrea and post Mengistu Ethiopia provided a notable



example of the cordiality and friendship of neighboring countries in the whole of Africa. Ethiopian recognition of the sovereignty and independence was almost instant and so was from the other countries of the Horn of Africa. For a time then, even if it was a short one though, post-Cold War Horn of Africa seemed to be all the more serene and peaceful with each of them pledging peace and cooperation, emphasizing diplomacy and joint resolution of disputes. In fact, the Eritrea government went to the extent of proposing a confederal relationship with Ethiopia during this time. For various reasons, this was a non-starter. In the immediate aftermath of Eritrea's independence, the internal uprising in neighboring Somalia was dealt with lots of diplomacy that reflected statesmanship and commitment to maintain peace in the Horn. These moves in fact did not succeed. The role of OAU and the newly formed organization - the Inter-governmental Authority on Development shortly called IGAD also was very much evident in this but as pointed out earlier even these attempts failed.

Apart from the much publicized and the renewed vigor with which Eritrea

especially portrayed an important regional leadership role in the affairs of Horn of Africa, what is of importance to us is the type of relationship that existed between Eritrea and Ethiopia. As was mentioned earlier, the relationship exemplified cordiality and friendliness between them to the extent that it was the Ethiopian currency "Birr" that was the medium of currency here in Eritrea as well until 1997 when Eritrea decided to have its own currency called the Eritrean Nakfa. Moreover, as Eritrea had the advantage of two ports - Massawa and Assab - a written agreement between the two countries made it possible for Ethiopia to use the port facilities of Assab. Trade and economic ties were smooth and there was an overall economic growth seen particularly in Eritrea. Although the boundary separating both the countries were clearly defined in the colonial treaties of 1896, 1902 and 1908 during the period of King Menelik with Italy which colonized Eritrea, it was never raised or never was actually demarcated after Eritrea's independence. This seemed to be the origin of the frictions that developed between these two nations although there were numerous other immediate

reasons as well.

The cordiality soon deteriorated to the point of no return. It is saddening to note the unfortunate developments of 1998 since it has and to the surprise of many, brought about enmity between them. In other words, the initial euphoria that prevailed did not last long. Sudden turn of events led to serious problems between them. One among the many other background reasons was the border issue, which became the main bone of contention. The symbolic village of "Badme" which borders both the countries was the flash point which ignited the conflict on 6 May 1998 that did not stop with one round but with three rof conflict and which seems to be, as of now, a never ending one.

Exhausted with three rounds of costly border war and loss of tens of thousands of soldiers and bearing the burden of the after effects of war on their economy and social life, these two countries went in for a peace process that were to bring about a comprehensive solution to the problem by de-limiting the territorial borders once and for all which was, as mentioned above, not done until then.



The newspaper's editorial says day by day we find our political reality ushers us into a dark future and that we are heading for tunnels of political crises.

Under these difficult circumstances the entire Arab region is passing, the most dangerous threat to the security and stability are those new media tones spelled by some political parties immediately in the wake of the president's decision of amnesty for the group 16 members. 



An Introduction to the Internet

Internet Protocols



cate in the Internet they need to follow and use some of the Internet protocols. These protocols are one of the most important factors for the success of the Internet. They define the rules that allow the Internet entities made by different vendors to function. Most of these protocols are created by national and international standards organizations, and are documented in standards documents. So any company that needs to manufacture a piece of hardware or software that could be used in a networked system must follow these protocols. Some of the most common Internet protocols are:

- Internet Protocol (IP).
- Transmission Controlling Protocol (TCP).
- User Data gram Protocol (UDP).
- Domain Name System (DNS).

Each of these protocols covers different aspects of the Internet communication and some of them can be used instead of or with the others such as TCP/IP which are actually the two protocols TCP and IP. Because of their importance, we need to learn more about these protocols.

Internet Protocol (IP)

This protocol defines the rules of transferring packets from one host to another. All of this process depends on the use of the numerical IP addresses discussed in the previous lesson, and which every Internet connected host must have. But what is not good about this protocol is that it doesn't guarantee the delivery of packets in a specific time or in a specific sequence or what is worse, it does not deliver the packets at all. So you may ask how the whole Internet could depend on such a weak protocol. In practice this is not the case. Further protocols can be added to work with IP to reliably transfer the packets.

Transmission Control Protocol

Well, the problems we face with the IP can be solved by using this powerful protocol. It operates on top of IP to produce a reliable delivery of data from one host to another. It takes care of the process of dividing the messages into small packet-sized chunks at the sender computer. It also takes care of reassembling of these packets at the receiver computer. Moreover, TCP checks the validity of the packets. In case a packet got corrupted in transmission, TCP can recognize this and request the sending computer to resend the corrupted packets. Even if the packets get safely to the destination, the TCP sends acknowledgement message to the sender computer that the transmission has been completed perfectly. If we concentrate on these processes we notice that the TCP protocol is using the transmission medium aggressively by resending packets and confirmation messages. So the cost of the reliability of this protocol is consuming a lot of the transmission bandwidth.

User Datagram Protocol (UDP)

This protocol is slightly different


from the TCP protocol. Similar to TCP, the UDP operates on top of IP but it avoids a lot of the complications of TCP which results in better performance. Performance here means faster communication between the hosts. The price of this better performance is that UDP does not have the same capability to ensure reliable communication. In case a packet is lost in the transmission, UDP does not ask the sender to send it again. So if we try to link all of what we got until now about these protocols to find out which one is suitable for the



Internet, we discover that all are suitable but in different situations. UDP can be used in the communication of data that needs higher bandwidth and does not get affected by losing part of the data. For example UDP can be used in the transmission of video files where losing some frames of the clip does not destroy the whole idea of it. On the other hand, TCP can be used in the transmission of data that needs accuracy like text messages where losing lines or a paragraph will badly demolish the content of the message.

Domain Name System (DNS)

Since each host requires a unique dotted quad address, it would quickly become difficult and inconvenient to remember all these numerical addresses. For example what is easier for us to "63.249.207.71" remember www.yementimes.com? I am sure all of us prefer to remember the textual address of a host rather than the numerical address. Ok, but hosts communicate with each other by using this numerical address. And when I want to go to YT web site I just type www.yementimes.com in my browser and that's it. So what is hiding the numerical address from the users? Well, it's the Domain Name System that hides it. Each host can be given a textual name that may be used in place of the numerical IP address. The name is built up from a number of domains (words) separated by dots. There can be several domains within a name, typically three to five. The Domain Name System translates these names to the corresponding numerical address. Most of the domain names are three parts. The system accesses the DNS through a resolver. The resolver gets the hostname and returns the IP address or gets an IP address (fig.1) and looks up a hostname.



Each host in the Internet must have a unique domain name. The domain name should reflect the category of the domain and the country of the host. The domain names are divided into three parts:

- 1. "Arpa" is a special domain used for address-to-name mapping.
- 2. The seven 3-character domain (generic (organizational)
- 3. The 2-character domains are based on the country codes like ".ye" for Yemen.

The seven generic domains and their meanings are:

























Intracs celebrates Labor Day and honors employees


