

Officials are investigating a bizarre case of kidnapping and beating of a 29-year-old Sana'a man.

Rami Zakaria Bazara'a was kidnapped from his house in the Faj Attan neighborhood in the afternoon of Friday May 24.

### Al-Qirbi in the USA to discuss war against terror Yemen seeking US aid

Yemeni Foreign Minister, Dr. Abu Bakr Al-Qirbi flew to Washington DC on Saturday in an official visit to the USA

US Vice President Dick Chenney and State Secretary, Colen Powell were among the dignitaries he was to meet.

The visit was expected to focus on Yemen's role in the US-led war against terror along with other security-related issues in Yemen.

Al-Qirbi said he would discuss with the US officials bilateral relations and

economic aspects with the aim of creating joint projects to be carried out by Yemeni and US businessmen in Yemen

He added that he would also discuss the US economic aid to Yemen as well as the on-going security cooperation between the two countries in the war against terrorism.

Al-Qirbi was also to raise the issue of the Mideast crisis including the Arab peace initiative in the region and Yemen's vision of this initiative.



## YEMEN **Mystery of Queen** Sheba revived

From 9 June to the 13 October this year, the British Museum has reserved the recently opened Grand Court for the "Queen of Sheba: Treasures from Ancient Yemen' exhibition which will be similar in content to the exhibition held at the Institut du Monde Arabe in Paris in 1997-1998 and which has since toured other European cities.

Items from the British Museum's own collection will be included. A number of side events and activities are being organized to coincide with the exhibition. The Arabian Studies Seminar will be held at the British Museum this year from 18-20 July.

An extensive education program will accompany the exhibition. This will include an academic conference in July, a series of study days in June and September, a film program and a week of events related to the Ancient Near East in Early October.

The exhibition will begin with an examination of the Oueen of Sheba in art, looking modern, 19th century and Renaissance representations. She is variously viewed as a figure of beauty and seduction, the propounder of riddles to King Solomon, (the Old Testament) a convert to Islam (the


## Yemen-**UAE proto**cols signed



The misery of this young man started, according to the director general of Aden's Care House, when the police found the boy wandering in Aden streets. Being blind and dumb, the police couldn't identify who or where from he is. So, the police took him later to the delinquents Care House. The house, on its part, tried to contact his family through running his photo at the local newspapers, but no body was responding.

The house made it its own responsibility to embrace the boy and provide him with all material and emotional support.

Then the State Minster of Human Rights, Dr. Waheeba Fari' visited him May 11, along with some prisons and delinquency homes in Aden, Lahaj and Aden with a view to inspect the situation of these facilities.

On her visit to Aden's

Delinquencies Home, she was attracted to an innocent young boy. And she promised to follow his case. Upon her return to Sana'a, the state minister took the boy from Aden's Procedural Court to search for his family. She also ran his photo in several newspapers again.

On May 19, the Human Rights Ministry got a call from a person named Nabeel who informed the ministry that he knew Abdu.

Nabeel came accompanied by Haza'a, a cousin of Abdu, to the ministry to take the boy. There was an emotional meeting for all present. The state minster checked the truth of the relation between the boy and the person who came to take him, as well as the reasons for his fleeing home.

Abdu was given back to his family with the presence of an officer of the criminal police, the office director of deputy minister of interior, and Abdulbasit As-Samawi, an MP for constituency No.231 to which the boy belongs.

Still one has to question why it the minister, not the Aden police who found the boy and connected him with his family. Isn't it a police responsibility?

A suspected terrorist remains free after Yemeni military couldn't take him in during a an attempted siege of his home.

The heavy clashes took place in Sarwah area, 150 km east of Sana'a on May 20 between soldiers from Yemen's Army Brigade 25 and Mohammed Ali al-Zaidi who is suspected to be a member of al-Qaeda network and who is believed to have masterminded the kidnapping of a German diplomat in September 2001.

The armed confrontation began at 10 a.m. when the brigade's men tried to storm al-Zaidi's house using tanks and armored vehicles. Al-Zaidi was supported by his family members and some tribesmen armed with anti-tank bazooka rockets during the two-hour clash.

While the army failed to capture al-Zaidi, he and his men captured the commander of the army brigade.

Tribal sources said that the military forces did, however, seize two relatives of al-Zaidi before they were released.

"The incentives behind such detention is that my house and a petrol station is under threat of an attack," the commander of the army brigade stated.



# Questions about Islamic prisoners

A group of 12 parliamentarians have asked interior minister Dr. Rashad al-Alimi about the Islamists detained due to suspicion of having links to al-Qaeda.

Sources in the parliament said 12 members of the parliament called the parliament president to summon al-Alimi to answer their question on legal situation of these prisoners.

They have spent several months in the intelligence prisons without having been charged.

The minister will also be ques-

tioned about 40 prisoners detained for two years in connection with the suicide bombing attack on the USS Cole on October 12, 2000. Seventeen US sailors were killed and other 39 injured in the blast.

The government of security detained a good number of suspected people; some were released. After the September 11 attacks in the U.S.A, over 500 people were arrested and interrogated. Some are still in detention without any charges. Some of them are relatives of suspected fugi-

tives.

Advocates believed it is against law to detain people without warrants or trials.

An anonymous group calling itself "al-Qaeda sympathizers" has claimed responsibility for bombings in Sana'a during the last two months and have demanded the release of 173 detainees on charges of having links to al-Qaeda. The group pledged more suicide attacks against some government officials if the detainees are not released.





## **U.S. military bids to** postpone war on Iraq

WASHINGTON, May 24 (Xinhua) - The U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff have waged a determined behind-the-scenes campaign to persuade the Bush administration to reconsider its aggressive posture designed to pave the way for military actions against Iraq, The Washington Post reported Friday.

The uniformed leaders of the U.S. military believe that they have at least persuaded the Pentagon's civilian leadership to put off an invasion of Iraq until next year at the earliest and perhaps not to do it at all, the newspaper quoted senior Pentagon officials as saying.

The campaign included a secret briefing at the White House earlier this month for President George W. Bush by Tommy Franks, commander of the Central Command which oversees U.S. military operations in the Gulf region.

During the briefing, Franks told Bush that invading Iraqi to oust Saddam Hussein would require at least 200,000 troops, far more than some other military experts have calculated.

This was in line with views of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, who have repeatedly emphasized the lengthy buildup that would be required, concerns about Iraq's possible use of biological and chemical weapons and the possible casualties, Pentagon officials said.

The Bush administration still appears dedicated to the goal of removing Saddam from power. But partly in response to the military's advice, it is focusing more on undermining him through covert intelligence operations, the officials added.

"There are many ways in which that (regime change) could come about, only one of which is a military campaign in Iraq," one well-informed official was quoted as saying on Thursday. However, any final decision would be up to President Bush, who is cur-

rently on a week-long visit to Europe.

# **Turkey PM says** reforms above politics

ISTANBUL, May 25 (Reuters) Turkey's ageing prime minister, Bulent Ecevit, recuperating from illness, was quoted as saying on Saturday his health was improving quickly and called on his rightist coalition partners to back stalled EU reforms.

Financial markets were shocked when the 76-year-old leader was admitted to hospital eight-days-ago and there was talk of an early election in the crisis-hit EU candidate country, which is grappling with an IMF review and sensitive reforms it must pass to begin EU membership talks.

But Ecevit said intense physiotherapy at the Ankara hospital meant he would most likely attend a military-civilian National Security Council meeting on Friday expected to discuss lifting the death penalty and increasing democrat-

ic rights for Turkey's Kurdish minority. "I am much better and feel well. I think I'll attend the meeting. My current state of health presents no obstruction,"

Ecevit was quoted as saying in the Turkish daily Milliyet. It was the first statement from the prime minister since he entered hospital. He has been suffering from a blood clotting condition in his left leg.

Turkish President Ahmet Necdet Sezer said on Friday EU reforms were above politics and called a summit of the leaders of all Turkey's political parties to discuss the measures, which the government coalition Nationalist Action Party (MHP) opposes.

Ecevit, often at odds with the reformist president who has vetoed a swathe of government reforms on democratic grounds, said the impasse over the EU must come to an end and approved the summit, due to be con-

vened shortly

Bahceli's MHP party committed itself to the EU criteria after Brussels declared Muslim Turkey a candidate in 1999 but the fractious three-party government has dragged its feet on several measures amid worries they will threaten Turkey's unity.

Deputy Prime Minister Mesut Yilmaz, head of Turkey's third coalition Motherland Party (ANAP), said on Saturday his party backed the measures in statements carried by local news channels.

The decades-long division on the divided island of Cyprus has also sparked tensions as Brussels pushes for a solution between Greek and Turkish Cypriots ahead of the island's accession to the union in the next wave of admissions.

# Israeli troops maintain grip on West Bank city

TULKARM, West Bank, May 25 (Reuters) - Israeli forces kept a tight grip on the West Bank city of Tulkarm on Saturday, combing houses for Palestinian militants after losing one soldier dead and two wounded in fighting the day before, witnesses said.

Eight Palestinians were wounded at the start of the Israeli incursion on Friday, but there were no reports of fresh clashes.

The Israeli army said troops had detained four Palestinians in Tulkarm and defused a bomb found in one house.

Israel has been sending troops in and out of what are officially Palestinianruled areas at will since declaring this month that its West Bank military

### offensive was over.

It said the sweep unleashed on March 29 was aimed at routing militants behind Palestinian suicide attacks that killed scores of Israelis. The offensive resulted in scores of civilian deaths and widespread damage to Palestinian cities and institutions.

Palestinians have vowed to pursue their 20-month-old uprising against occupation, though President Yasser Arafat has demanded an end to what he now calls terrorist attacks inside Israel, saying they harm prospects for independence.

An Israeli army spokesman said the Tulkarm raid was needed to "strike at a broad terrorist infrastructure based on warnings that terrorists are still active there".



## **Gulf / Africa** 27 May 2002 Lesotho Kingdom votes, hopes for fresh start

MASERU (Reuters) - Huge number of Lesotho citizens voted Saturday under a new electoral system they hope will usher in a new era of stability and prosperity after years of political turbulence.

Crowds in the impoverished mountain kingdom queued long before dawn to take part in the election, held for the first time under a combined first-pastthe-post and proportional representation system designed to give smaller parties a voice in parliament.

Lesotho, which is encircled by South Africa, has been in political limbo for the past four years after violent opposition protests and an army mutiny nearly overthrew the government.

Free and fair elections in the tiny state will boost southern Africa's democratic credentials, after elections condemned by international observers as highly flawed in Zimbabwe and Zambia in the last six months, analysts said.

Voting began at 0500 GMT, but in some areas in polling was delayed for hours by administrative glitches. Electoral officials said turnout was heavy, with up to 90 percent of eligible voters in some areas.

In the small town of Berea, just 40 km north of Maseru, voters enthusiastically waited for their turn to vote.

"I feel this new system will do away with some of the problems of the past. The proportional system will create a balanced parliament which will ensure that everyone gets heard," said Neo Mapeshoane, a 65-year-old pensioner.

Electoral officials said they were pleased with the overall voting process, but said late delivery of equipment and materials had been reported at a couple of polling centers. "It is a concern," very isolated said

"Our main problem is that the queues are long and we are having to wait for long periods. The process is extremely slow," said 40-year-old accountant Motlong Masia.

Electoral officials said they had found no time to educate voters on the system before the poll, and were having to explain how the system worked before voters could cast their ballots.

International and regional observers say that if successful, the poll model would be recommended as a solution for the conflict-ridden young democra-

cies of impoverished Africa.

"This will be one of the most transparent elections. We have a homebrewed solution. The electoral model itself is reconciliatory," said Mafole Sematlane, a commissioner of the Independent Electoral Commission (IEC).

An estimated 840,000 voters from a population of nearly two million are expected to vote in 80 constituencies. They will also be casting a second vote for the party of their choice.

### FIGUREHEAD MONARCH

Since independence from Britain in 1966, mountainous Lesotho with a figurehead monarch, has known little political stability.

Its history is checkered by coups and military rule. Moreover, its enclosure

by South Africa made it vulnerable to bullying by the former white apartheid regime, which often sponsored nuisance raids into its tiny neighbor.

The last election in 1998 was won by the ruling Lesotho Congress for Democracy (LCD), but disputed as fraudulent by opposition parties. The LCD won a landslide, scooping 79 out of the 80 parliamentary seats. Archrival Basotho National Party won the remaining seat.

An army mutiny several months later nearly overthrew incumbent Prime Minister Pakalitha Mosisili's government but was crushed by South African and Botswana troops who intervened under the auspices of the Southern African Development Community in September 1998.

Under the new system, the national assembly has been expanded to 120 seats, with the additional 40 seats to be allocated proportionally. Electoral officers said the model has borrowed elements from New Zealand and Germany.

"We have to leave 1998 behind us and go into elections peacefully," said Tom Thabane, Lesotho foreign minister and LCD spokesman.

Mosisili's LCD is widely expected to return to power, albeit with a reduced majority. The opposition BNP, headed by former military ruler Justin Lekhanya, 64, is his biggest rival.

Competition is also expected from the Lesotho People's Congress (LPC), whose leader Kelebone Maope, 55, was deputy prime minister until November 2001 when he broke away, accusing the ruling party of corruption and nepotism.

Constituency results are expected to begin trickling in from midnight Saturday, but IEC officials said they did not expect a final result before Wednesday.

## Train crash kills at least 117 in Mozambique

MAPUTO, May 25 (Reuters) - At least 117 people were killed and 400 hurt in a train crash in the southern African nation of Mozambique on Saturday, the transport minister said.

The accident happened on Saturday morning near the town of Tenga in Maputo province, 40 km (24 miles) from the capital Maputo, Transport and Communications Minister Tomas Salomao told reporters.

"There are at least 117 dead," Salomao said. "There are many in a serious condition and the death toll could climb."

Radio Mozambique quoted police and fire department sources as saying the train had "technical problems" with its brakes.

But Salomao said the cause of the accident was still unknown and investigators had done to the scene to investigate.

The train was described as being made up of freight cars and passenger carriages and was travelling on the Maputo-Ressano Gracia railway that

links Mozambique with South Africa. President Joaquim Chissano cancelled meetings in his home village of Malaice in southern Mozambique on hearing the news and was returning to the capital, a senior minister said.

"At this time of tragedy, I express my heartfelt condolences to the families of those who have lost their lives," Chissano said in a brief statement issued to the media in Maputo.

"The government will mobilise all means at its disposal to assist the affected families, whose who have lost loved ones and those who are injured,' Chissano added.

The injured were being transferred to Maputo's main hospital as well as other health facilities. Health officials issued an urgent appeal for blood, saying it was required to save lives.

"We are appealing for blood to save lives," the ministry said in a statement. Officials at the main Maputo Central Hospital said volunteers had already began to gather.

## **Plane carrying illegal** aliens lands in Kenya

NAIROBI, May 25 (Xinhua) - A plane carrying illegal aliens breached Kenya's airspace undetected on Thursday afternoon and landed at a rural air strip near Machakos, about 100 kilometers southeast of the Kenyan capital Nairobi, local media reported on Saturday.

The plane then flew out of the country without notice after off-loading 21 illegal aliens believed to be Somali immigrants.

The reports said the operation appeared to have been well coordinated because the plane was met by a convey of four mini-buses and saloon

car, which ferried the passengers towards Nairobi.

Suspicious onlookers of the mysterious plane immediately alerted the Kenyan police who threw a series of road blocks around the area and stopped one of the buses, seizing 17 passengers who were taken to a police station for interrogation.

A further four Somali passengers were arrested later, along with 40 other Somalis and seven Kenyans who were held on suspicion of having helped the plane and illegal immigrants to gain entry to Kenya.

# Pakistan tests missile in midst of tension

ISLAMABAD/NEW DELHI (Reuters) - Pakistan test fired a medium-range Ghauri missile on Saturday despite calls for restraint from the United States which said tension between nuclear-armed Pakistan and India was very dangerous.

India's Prime Minister Atal Behari Vajpayee was spending the weekend resting in the foothills of the Himalayas as thecrisis between his country and rival Pakistan, sparked by bloody Muslim rebel raids in disputed Kashmir, showed no signs of easing.

Islamic Pakistan's military government chose a public holiday marking Prophet Mohammad's birthday to launch what it said earlier would be a series of routine missile tests lasting until Tuesday.

"Pakistan today carried out a successful test fire of its indigenously developed medium-range surface-to-surface ballistic missile Hatf-V (Ghauri)," the Pakistani military said in a statement.

"According to the data collected from the test all design parameters have been successfully validated."

In New Delhi, a Foreign Ministry spokeswoman declined to comment.

"We have given our point of view yesterday. We have nothing more to add," the spokeswoman told Reuters.

India on Friday played down the significance of the tests and said Pakistan had informed it the exercise would involve short- and medium-range missiles.

"The government of India is not particularly impressed by these missile antics, clearly targeted at the domestic audience in Pakistan," an Indian statement said.

India and Pakistan have fought two of their three wars since independence in 1947 over the Himalayan region of Kashmir and the potential for another war has set off alarm bells around the world.

Both sides have massed a million



men along their border, backed by missile batteries, tanks and fighter planes, since a deadly raid on India's parliament in December that New Delhi blamed on Pakistan-based militants fighting its rule in Kashmir.

Tension rose sharply after a bloody May 14 raid on an Indian army camp in Muslim-majority Kashmir that India blamed on the same Islamic groups it holds responsible for the parliament attack.

#### "CRITICAL POINT"

The missile test plan was disclosed after Vajpayee left the capital for a break of several days in a move that helped cheer financial markets in the two countries after a battering by war fears.

The two sides have been trading regular heavy fire across their frontier in Kashmir for more than a week and dozens of civilians and soldiers on both sides have been killed and wounded. Thousands of civilians have fled the

U.S. Secretary of State Colin Powell, in Moscow with President George W. Bush for a summit with Russian leader Vladimir Putin, also urged both sides to step back

"It's very dangerous but I hope both sides realise they're at a very critical point. And we'll get them to step back," he told reporters before news of the missile tests.

The State Department urged Americans to put off travel to the region and said U.S. citizens there should consider leaving.

"Tensions between India and Pakistan have risen to serious levels, and the risk of intensified military hostilities cannot be ruled out," the State Department said in a statement.

Europe said India was running out of patience because of Pakistan's alleged support for a separatist insurgency in India's part of Muslim-majority Kashmir.

#### WASHINGTON URGES RESTRAINT

U.S. State Department spokesman Philip Reeker said Washington was disappointed that Pakistan planned missile tests and called for restraint on both sides.

"We continue to urge both sides to take steps to restrain their missile programmes and their nuclear weapons programmes, including that there be no operational deployment of nucleararmed ballistic missiles," Reeker told a Washington news briefing.

European Union External Affairs Commissioner Chris Patten, the first of

a string of top level envoys visiting the subcontinent in the latest international peace push, said in New Delhi on Friday the situation was on a "knife edge".

Musharraf said in an interview broadcast on Friday night that he did not want war.

## **US general defends** officers in Afghan battle

TAMPA, Fla., May 24 (Reuters) - The U.S. military said on Friday that senior American officers "did a good job" and were not responsible for the deaths of seven elite U.S. special forces troops killed by al Qaeda fighters in Afghanistan in March.

Army Gen. Tommy Franks, head of the U.S. Central Command, told reporters that imperfect intelligence, winter weather, mountain terrain, spotty radio communications and the confusion of warfare contributed to the deaths southeast of Gardez near the border with Pakistan.

He was responding to questions raised by a lengthy report on the battle in The Washington Post on Friday which faulted commanders on the ground.

"My belief is that those commanders, knowing what they knew at the time they made their decisions, followed good logic and did a good job in this operation," Franks said at a briefing on the March 4 firefight that kicked off a major two-week operation against al Qaeda and Taliban fighters in the area.

The battle, in which al Qaeda raked U.S. special forces helicopters with fire and

killed the seven troops, was the deadliest for American forces in the seven-monthold Afghan War.

"This battle is like so many battles in our history where we have seen a group of wonderful people doing their job in the toughest possible terrain. It is the stuff of which heroes are made," Franks said.

The general told reporters that U.S. commanders sent reconnaissance teams into the area because they were essential to clearing al Qaeda and Taliban.

### KILLED IN RESCUE ATTEMPT

An initial helicopter came under heavy fire and a Navy SEAL (sea, air, land) trooper fell from the chopper as it was retreating. Another helicopter returned later to rescue him, but he was killed along with six comrades in withering fire from machine guns and small arms.

"The terrain was a major factor," Franks said, noting that al Qaeda fighters were dug in high on a mountain looking down on a landing zone were the helicopters landed.

"What I would say is that those we find responsible for this particular activity are al Qaeda," Franks said of the guerrilla followers of fugitive Osama bin Laden, blamed by Washington for devastating September attacks on America.

"They (al Qaeda) were on that mountaintop - and most of them are dead," he added. "I think that any tactical situation that we find ourselves in ... we will never have that perfect intelligence. We just really won't."

Franks said that some of the radios on the helicopters might have been damaged by gunfire so that it was difficult to report the situation to headquarters. But another military official, who asked not to be identified, said that some radios used by the special forces were simple "line of sight" devices which could not be heard over mountains.

U.S. commanders said after the operation southeast of Gardez that hundreds of al Qaeda and Taliban were killed. But that was never confirmed.

Franks and Pentagon officials disputed reports from Afghan fighters that perhaps several thousand regrouping al Qaeda and Taliban were able to flee the chilly mountain region into neighboring Pakistan during the two-week operation.

## Questions remain about Russian aid to Iran while. . . **Bush and Putin celebrate** new Treaty of Moscow

Russia, (Reuters) - U.S. President George W. Bush flew to St Petersburg, Russian leader Vladimir Putin's home town, to round off a summit with sightseeing and a boat tour in a city where the sun barely sets.

As he arrived in brilliant sunshine after a day of serious summitry in Moscow that focused on disarmament and nuclear proliferation, officials were busy sprucing up the old imperial capital's avenues and elegant canals to mark it 299th birthday.

Bush and Putin on Friday celebrated the Kremlin signing of the Treaty of Moscow, a landmark accord that over 10 years will reduce U.S.-Russian arsenals of deployed nuclear warheads on long-range missiles by two-thirds.

But nagging at what was otherwise an upbeat meeting in the Kremlin was a dispute over whether Russia was assisting Iran's development of nuclear weapons by helping it build a civilian nuclear power plant.

### Wreath laying

Bush was due first to lay a wreath at the Piskarvovskove memorial cemetery, burial site in common graves for more than a half million victims of the World War Two siege of the city then known as Leningrad.

Then, in Putin's company, he tours the vast Hermitage museum, once the Winter Palace of the tsars and whose storming by Bolsheviks in 1917 began the 70-year reign of communism.

He will only have time to see a fraction of its three million works of art. These will include works by Leonardo da Vinci, Rembrandt, Titian and the Malachite Hall dominated by columns of the deep green stone.

The two leaders visit St Peterburg State University in the afternoon to field questions from 300 students - much in the same manner as when they met schoolchildren in Bush's home town of Crawford, Texas last November.

Flags and banners appeared overnight on the bustling main thoroughfare Nevsky Prospekt - lined by hundreds

"For almost 300 years our ancestors built, beautified, maintained and defended our city on the Neva," St Petersburg governor Vladimir Yakovlev said in a television address as Bush arrived. "It has become one of the most beautiful in the world." Large balloons were placed in front of the vast colonnaded Kazan Cathedral — the Museum of Atheism in Soviet times - which Bush and Putin will visit on Sunday.

Traffic police cordoned off large sections of the northern city, famous for its summer "White Nights" when the sun never sets.

### **Cautious welcome**

The Russian press cautiously welcomed the outcome of the summit, stressing its role in bringing the two

ners. "The presidents are cutting their

nuclear potential in favour of the economic one," said the daily Izvestia.

Novy Izvestia called the meeting a "fast-food summit", noting that the ceremonial glitz could not hide lingering disagreements between the two leaders.

"The protocol part was a smashing hit but the quick-cooked triumph was marred by some barbs on issues supposed to be lying at the core of the new partnership."

Skulking in the background, and taking some of the shine off declarations of a new era in U.S.-Russian relations, were differences over Iran.

The United States believes Russia is contributing to the single most important proliferation threat in the world by helping Tehran build a civilian nuclear power plant.

Bush said during the Friday news conference with Putin that Iran is "run by radical clerics", adding that if they were to get hold of weapons of mass destruction "it could be harmful to us and harmful to Russia".

Bush said he had received some assurances from Putin during their private talks about helping Iran. The Russian president did not elaborate, but instead pointed out that the United States is helping North Korea build a similar reactor.

North Korea, Iran and Iraq make up Bush's "axis of evil".

A senior U.S. official said the two presidents had had an extensive and open discussion in private about Iran, and Putin had told Bush he understood the U.S. leader's concerns.

"He wanted to reassure President Bush that not now, nor in the future, will Russia do anything to contribute to Iranian military nuclear capabilities or its ballistic missile programme, because they do not want to undermine proliferation, and they have no interest in seeing Iran acquire nuclearweapons," the official said.

## John Paul II still active Pope sees fount of **Bulgarian** freedom

SOFIA, (Reuters) - Pope John Paul travels on Saturday to the fount of Bulgarian independence, a monastery in the high Balkan mountains that inspired resistance to centuries of Ottoman rule.

The aged Pope, frail and short of breath, will be flown up to the Rila monastery on the third day of his visit to Orthodox Bulgaria to tour the frescoed halls and venerated icons that symbolise the blend of eastern and western traditions here.

It will be a day rich in history in which the Pope will reach out to Orthodoxy, the eastern rite of Christianity which split from Rome in 1054, and appeal once again for unity.

Within the fortress-like walls of the monastery 130 km (80 miles) south of Sofia, the former King and current Prime Minister Simeon Saxe-Coburg will greet the Pope and take him to see the grave of his father, King Boris III.

Simeon entered national politics last year, winning an election as the head of a newly-founded movement. He carries on his shoulders a heavy burden of expectations from a people disappointed the post-communist years have yet to bring wealth.

The former king, who came to the throne at the age of six and who fled in 1946 after communists rigged an election abolishing the monarchy, says he simply wants to serve his people and does not want his crown back.

Boris died of a mystery illness in 1943 after a trip to Berlin, with many suspecting he was poisoned by Nazis that angered he refused to send his troops to fight along with German forces. He was buried at Rila, but the communist authorities disinterred the body to prevent it becoming a focus of resistance and scattered it in parts. Only the heart was recovered to be reburied amid great ceremony in 1993

### HISTORICAL DIVIDE

The monastery situated around 1,100 metres (yards) above sea level was founded in the 14th century in memory of St John of Rila, a 10th century hermit who rejected feudal savagery and retreated into the mountains to pray.

Long a focal point for national pride in the five centuries of repressive Ottoman rule that ended in 1878, the rich interior pays testimony to the ardour with which Bulgarians rallied round to rebuild the monastery after an 1833 fire.

The trip to Rila is another act of homage to Bulgaria's 1,100-year-old Orthodox culture a day after the Pope helped celebrate the feast of patron saints St Cyril and St Methodius, fathers of the Cyrillic alphabet still used by many Slavs.

Throughout his 23-year papacy the Pope has campaigned to reunite eastern and western Christian rites. His efforts have been confounded in part by Orthodox suspicion that Roman Catholics want to steal their flock.

The Vatican has said the Pope is coping well with the strain of his fiveday trip, which started in Azerbaijan on Wednesday and ends on Sunday in Plovdiv, Bulgaria's second city and home to most of its 80,000-strong Roman Catholic minority.

## Finland to build controversial new nuclear power plant

HELSINKI, (Reuters) - Finland decided on Friday to build the first new nuclear reactor in Western Europe in ore than a decade to meet rising energy demands despite bitter opposition from environmentalists.

Parliament backed by 107 votes to 92 the coalition government's controversial proposal to construct a fifth atomic reactor to guarantee long-term energy supplies, cut its dependence on Russia and meet greenhouse gas targets.

The anti-nuclear lobby said construction of the plant ignored health and security risks, which were even more relevant following the September 11 attacks on New York and Washington.

"This is a decision not only against the environment but a decision against Finland," said Tobias Muenchmeyer, nuclear expert at Greenpeace International. "It is unsafe." The European Union repeated the decision on nuclear energy was up to each member country.

Environment European Commissioner Margot Wallstrom also said it was not necessary for EU member states to increase use of nuclear power to meet their goals under the Kyoto treaty against global warming.

"I have a personal view on nuclear (power) but this is their choice," Wallstrom, who has in the past made clear her dislike for nuclear power, told Reuters during an EU environment ministers' meeting in Spain.

#### Cut reliance on Russia

The Finnish government says it needs the reactor to ensure economic growth continues, meet Kyoto targets and cut its dependence on Russia, which provides most of its imported energy.

Nuclear energy produces no green house gas emissions but the issue of nuclear waste disposal often worries opponents.

Parliament's decision passed largely unnoticed in Helsinki, with only around 100 demonstrators outside parliament compared to more than 5,000 during an anti-nuclear protest last month.

Environment Minister Satu Hassi, a Green, has hit out against the government for raising the Cold War spectre of the nation's need to lessen dependence on Russia.

power producer Nuclear Teollisuuden Voima Oy, controlled by Finnish industry, is expected to spend up to 2.5 billion euros to build the reactor. The plant is expected to be operational before the end of the decade.

The United States is the biggest nuclear energy producer in absolute terms with France second and Japan third, said Ritch.

No commercial nuclear power plant has been ordered in the United States since the 1979 Three Mile Island accident in Pennsylvania, where there was a partial reactor core meltdown.

'You can confidently expect a new nuclear construction in the United States within the next five years," Ritch said.

Media pays more attention to economic issues

## Wanted: Good business reporters

usiness reporting plays a pivotal role in delivering business related information with a view of highlighting any positive or negative economic change. Until recently, Yemen's business media was totally nonexistent, though that's changing. More media are paying more and more attention to economic issues.

To this end, a meeting between economic editors and industrialists was held in Sana'a May 5 to discuss the role of media in boosting the national economy. The meeting was held under the title, "Economic Correspondent Diary."

Ibrahim al-Ashmawi, former correspondent of the London-based al-Hayat al-Iqtisadiyah newspaper, talked about the knowledge that is needed for any economic editor, saving that economic editors should know every component of the econo-

"Good economic editing skills as well as neutrality and being new and to the point information are the foundations for good economic stories," he said. Mr. Ibrahim pointed to the importance of maintaining an easy-reference archive, since it constitutes the source of information and the authoritative reference for any economic editor.

Hamoud Munasar, correspondent of the France-Press Agence (FPA), highlighted the significance of the press and its different forms as well as its role in building up public's awareness.

Muhammed Abdu Saeed, chairman of Yemeni Industrialists Association, spoke on behalf of the business community, and pointed out to the importance of media in communicating the concerns of the business community

to the decision-makers. "Media will continue to be a forum

for change, if it's employed well. Yet, economic reporting occupies a good space at the Yemeni press for its vital importance in their respect," said Iskandar al-Asbahi, foreign information officer at the Ministry of Information.

Al-Asbahi commented that we can't claim that we have economic media in Yemen so far, adding that its influence is still not that strong.

On the same topic, the director-general of the Yemeni Industrialists Association talked on the role of business reporting in the development of nations. He added that the difficult

economic conditions encountering our economy should be tackled through the media.

"Highlighting this issue through the press would help form an overall strategic national vision for a developing economy. This role can not be carried out but with the help of the different forms of the mass media," he said

The overall conclusion of the meeting was strong and straight forward: Without accurate and professinoal business reporting in our media, it would be almost impossible to achieve an economically developed Yemen.

## <u>Yemen's handicapped have . . .</u> People power

ith more than 2 million handicapped in Yemen, mostly in the rural areas, Yemen is desperately in need for special training for this segment of the society. This group is an inactive part of the workforce that could be contributing to the country.

The majority of this group have disabilities originating during the different civil wars Yemen has had since the the 26 September revolution in former northern Yemen, and the War of Independence in southern Yemen.

Yemen's economy is likely passing through the most difficult time ever. With a budget deficit of YR 49 million the government seems unable to tackle this issue.

So taking care of this group is a real test for the current and subsequent governments

At the outset of the current year, a presidential decree was issued concerning the handicapped care. But, the everincreasing population and the high rate of unemployment make the problem complicated.

Official statistics show that the rate of peneficiaries from the social care programs don't exceed 15 percent of the total handicapped.

port, through allocating more funds to the Social Care Fund, large funds are required for rendering care to the handicapped. Care for the handicapped in rural Yemen is totally absent.

The handicapped need a lot of rehabilitation centers as well as proper heath care programs. One handicapped trolley, for example, can costs as much as US \$3,000. That is the size of the problem.

If the Social Care Fund allocates 2000 trolleys for \$3,000, it will need \$60 million while its current general budget is only \$42 million.

Consequently, the government resorts to donor agencies which sympathizes with it upon knowing that there're two million handicapped in Yemen.

The needs of the handicapped are so varied: special training, rehabilitation centers, special healthcare programs, provision of required equipment as well as helping trained ones to find jobs. All these require considerable funds. Thus, it necessitates finding new funding

Sources at the handicapped care associations say that there's a high shortage of rehabilitation centers as well as qualified staff and the equipment required for boosting their productivity.

We are hopeful that donor agencies will pay considerable attention to allocating more funds to the Social Care Fund so as to help it in carrying out its formidable mission.

# Yemen & Romania to increase trade

4th Yemen he International Trade Exhibition was held May 20 to 26 as a way to establish new trade between Romanian companies and Yemeni businessmen and increase the flow of products and services already marketed.

> hy is the foreign media is focusing on the Palestinian arena and not the Israeli arena?

The answer is simple; it is Israeli president Ariel Sharon's underestimating the situation. 

Mahatma Gandhi fought against British's occupation by using the mechanism of non-violation struggle. He instruct the Indian people, not to buy the British made items, to ignore


British policy as if unheard, not to respond to what every they do.

ecently my wife and I have had wishes over the email for peace and quiet' and 'safety and peace.' Indeed, with the Internet, one can't keep anything secret anymore. Online newspapers around the globe have reported recent activities in Yemen, specifically bombs sent by Sympathizers of al-Qaeda to warn some government officials.

When these things are reported in places like Canada, folks back home worry. But from this side of the ocean, one does learn to take these things in stride. Consider after the tragic attacks on America on Sept. 11, an embassy official in the region sent a no-nonsense email to Canadians to get out of Yemen without delay. Within 24 hours that changed to please disregard the previous warning.'

### Alerts

Alerts from other embassies also tend to be equally clear as mud. What's more important is to keep in mind is this: most Yemeni realize Westerners among them are here to help. And it's good to also remember that life is uncertain regardless of

You or I might get hit by a truck while crossing the street for that matter, whether that be in Yemen, Canada, or at a penguin crossing in Antartica. Indeed, in Yemen, with 1,300 traffic deaths a year, an accident is a far more likely way to go than a bomb.

Accidents up in Third World In the last 15 years, largely because of safer cars and the use of seat-belts, traffic deaths in many countries are down. Sadly, that's not the case in the developing world where in the same time period, accidents are up: 40 per cent in Asia, 36 per cent in the Middle East, 26 per cent in Africa and 16 per cent in Latin America, according to the Transportation Research Laboratory, a body which monitors global traffic trends.


I got a kick out of reading one particular consular warning about driving here. It reads, in part, "within cities, mini-vans and small buses pick up and drop off passengers with little regard for other vehicles. Despite traffic lights and traffic police, each intersection requires an act of negotiation. Yemen has no laws governing turns on red lights, maintaining lanes, merging or right-of-way. Drivers

the road." The warning continues, "Many underage drivers are on the roads. Many vehicles are in poor repair and lack functional turn signals, headlights, taillights, and brake lights. Pedestrians, especially chil-Thomas Froese dren, and animals,

maintained in fair condition, but rural roads generally require four-wheel drives or vehicles with high clearance." They forgot to mention

passengers hanging precariously from backs and sides of trucks, a practice that's particularly treacherous on narrow mountain roads. Overloaded

(Thomas Froese photo) motorcycles with drivers and passengers wearing flip-flops are a precious sight. I always enjoy the windshields on cabs that are cracked like topographical maps. And let's not forget the fumes.

### No drunk drivers

The good news is that since alcohol is banned in Yemen. Unlike in North America or Europe, you'll never get hit by a drunk driver here. Also, I'm encouraged to know that kidnappings on rural roads are down. Besides, even if one gets picked up, these fellows do have a reputation for treating their so-called guests very well. Don't they?

I'm not trying to trivialize the importance of being safe. Nor am I suggesting Yemen is the most dangerous place in the world to drive. What I am saying is that short of getting around the planet on a flying carpet, life does have inherent risks. And most have nothing to do bombs going off.

Furthermore, when people try to get through life playing it safe, they actually only create more insecurity. And that is too bad, especially for people who have never visited the developing world. There is such a large need for more skilled people

from around the world to offer their help here.

Some, of course, come regardless of what they hear. For example, as I write this, I have a friend visiting from Canada. He's looking at donating some much-needed health care equipment and training. He had read about some of Yemen's security concerns before his arrival. But he came anyway. That's because, having traveled in other parts of the developing world, he could keep things in perspective.

### You want security?

In the end, if it's security in life that people want, as former American president Dwight Eisenhower said, there are ways to get it. Staying in prison is one. There you're fed, clothed, given medical care and so on. The only thing you don't get is freedom.

Personally, I prefer life on the outside. It seems to me that it's the best way to live. After a while, in fact, it becomes quite hard to get a good night's rest anywhere else.

Mr Jihad Jameel Muhsin says in an article that official statistics issued in 1994 indicated that volume of child labor in Yemen was exceeding 400 thousand children at ages ranging between 10 to 14 years. But unofficial sources confirmed that children's number working in difficult and hard jobs was much more than mentioned in government statistics.

An international humanitarian organization lashed against the state and family in Yemen and drew the attention to causes of child labor percentage increase and spread of the phenomenon in towns and countryside. The organization ascribed the phenomenon to low rates of development and deterioration of economic situation in the country during the last decade. Those situations led to the increase in proportion of poverty ad deprivation and rise in prices accompanying the government's implementation of economic reforms program, ongoing since 1995. The organization requested the Yemeni government to shoulder its humanitarian responsibility towards speeding up tackling the problem of child labor. It says such an end would not be attained but through realizing an actual development at all

economic levels. The government has

to curb spread of the phenomenon by accurately determining its volume, studying situations of families and their social conditions and choosing a number of children able to be professionally qualified to upgrade their standard and return them to labor market.

22 27 May 2002 **Browsing the World Wide Web:** A battle or a picnic?

> he past decade has witnessed an amazing proliferation of 'Internet cafes' all over the world and

these have attracted, as no other media had ever done before, stunningly huge crowds, hungering after the Web (more properly, the World Wide Web) for information of various kinds. Even in Sana'a, in these poorly ventilated, smoky places, there is a constant stream of clients, and at times, one has to wait for hours to get one's turn, despite the fact that, in certain busy localities every second joint is an internet café. A large number of youngsters in this country, who have had little exposure to even printed materials, seem to have woken up to a whole new world of web-browsing directly, and all of a sudden.

It is true that initially most of the users were attracted to the Web for distraction, and they spent most of their time, and, of course, money, hopping, often uncontrollably, from one 'interesting' video clipping to another, listening to music, or sending mails. But gradually and unfalteringly, large numbers of these users have come to recognize the potential of the Web as an important source of information contained in 'texts'. Though most of these users, at least in a place like Sana'a, are untrained browsers, they seem to be learning the art of browsing by browsing, and quite successfully, too. Well, I do not claim to have done any systematic study of the way

they browse, but they certainly seem to be getting the value for their money, otherwise how would one explain the brisk business that these internet joints do?

Now, a phenomenon like this, affecting a large number of youngsters, needs to be properly monitored, like any other medium of information transmission is. Considering that the vast majority of the users are students, the educational institutions also have a responsibility to examine this phenomenon very closely to see, to what extent and with what results, do the students browse the Web for educational / or academic purposes, and suggest ways of educating them on the use of the Internet. More particularly, in a scenario where promoting 'reading' in English, through the conventional methods in schools and colleges has proved to be a dull and painful affair, the educational value of 'browsing' as an interesting alternative to 'conventional reading' should be carefully considered. In other words, one may profitably look at the way the use of the Internet ties up with the 'reading habits' of the users, and explore ways of promoting systematic 'reading habits' through carefully monitored 'browsing'.

Having suggested 'browsing' as an alternative to 'conventional reading', I would like to briefly talk about the advantages and disadvantages of this electronic media below.

One thing that is in favour of 'browsing' is the high degree of motivation to browse, which the users already have. Teachers of English know that it is often a 'battle' to get the students to read in English.



Compared with this 'battle', browsing is 'picnic'.

Secondly, the motivation itself is the result of the 'novelty' of the medium, and the sense of 'achievement' that the user feels when he is aware of his ability to handle the Web, though a lot more needs happen before he /she can handle the Web more profitably.

Far more outweighing than any other consideration is the 'variety' that characterizes the web path. Textual information is often supported by audio and video materials, and the user very often has the option to so manipulate these materials as to suit his / her browsing style.

Interactive browsing, where available, is a definite advantage, too. The use of the HTML (Hyper Text Mark-

creation, with its 'anchors' is a revolution in information proliferation, whose value can never be over-estimated. The speed with which one can hop from one web site to another in a heated search for information (so long as the search is monitored by a purpose) is unimaginable in the context of conventional reading practices.

But, this enthusiasm will prove to be empty unless it is moderated by an awareness of some of the dangers inherent in 'browsing', especially if this were to be projected as an alternative to 'conventional reading courses'.

To begin with, the high degree of motivation to browse, mentioned above, will be considerably eroded, the moment 'browsing' is made a compulsory course in an academic programme, and will suffer the same fate as a host of other interesting disciplines, which have lost their luster simply because they have been made compulsory courses, and students were expected to sit for examinations in them.

The second disadvantage relates to what has come to be known as 'vision fatigue'. Sitting for long hours in front of the computer is known to cause a health condition, which manifests itself as an impatience, for example, to know the conclusion of an argument before the reasoning that

up Language) for text helps reach the conclusion. Experts have made specific recommendations for text creation using particular formats that can reduce 'vision fatigue', but, in an article of this nature, I wouldn't like to go into the details of this technical subject.

> The third serious disadvantage of 'browsing', which most users are blissfully unaware of, but which can seriously hamper an academically oriented browsing is what is called 'user disorientation'. People who have a lot of time to kill and a lot more of money to waste find the Web the most ideal means of doing so. They enjoy hopping from one site to another in quick succession with out bothering to check whether they had an original purpose to visit all but the initial site. When you log on to the Internet, and access a web site, there is always the danger of this site taking you to other sites that you never intended to visit. Soon you are lost in a jungle of irrelevant information, interrupted only by commercials. This can be a serious drawback when you browse the Web for academic purposes. An academic search becomes satisfying when you are able to hit the site that you are looking for in the quickest possible time, without being distracted by other 'apparently' similar sites. A lot of research involving experts from various disciplines needs to be carried out before an academically 'safe' and use-

### The rich are eyeing space tourism

LOS ANGELES (Reuters) - Rich Americans are willing to take conspicuous consumption to new heights by spending big bucks to fly into space, including paying \$100,000 for a 15-minute trip into the heavens, according to a poll released on Monday.

Possibly bored by the banal baubles of mundane Mother Earth or inspired by the dashing derring-do of such pioneers as first American in space Alan Shepard and first millionaire in space Dennis Tito, the poll says 7 percent of rich Americans would pay \$20 million for a twoweek orbital flight and 19 percent would pay \$100,000 for 15-minute sub-orbital flight.

The poll by Zogby International was commissioned by Futron Corp., a Maryland aerospace consulting group which has a \$1.8 million contract with NASA to explore the commercial applications of space travel, including what space tourism could look like in the next 20 years.

Zogby International conducted telephone interviews with 450 Americans whose yearly incomes exceed \$250,000 or whose net worth exceeds \$1 million. The polls, conducted in January but only released Monday, has a margin of error of plus or minus 4.7 percent.

Futron's NASA project program manager Derek Webber said, "We commissioned this survey in order to get an idea of what rich people think and not the man in the street who loves the idea of going into space but can't afford it."

Space tourists would have to meet medical standards and only be able to go to the International Space Station.

'N Sync singer Lance Bass is currently undergoing tests to see if he could become the third space tourist. He wants to become the first entertainer in space.



## **Indian bulldozers!**


GUWAHATI, India, (Reuters) Authorities in northeastern India are using elephants as bulldozers to demolish illegally built houses. Five elephants have been drafted into service to break up about 1,000, two-room, thatched houses in a protected forest area around Guwahati, the main city in the remote tea-and-oil rich state of Assam.

"Elephants can easily destroy thatched houses," D. Haraprasad, a forest official, told Reuters on Tuesday.

First the elephants, guided by their "mahout" or trainer, remove the roofs with their trunks. Then they push over the bamboo walls and crush them with their feet

The pachyderms, which can weigh several tons, are being employed to clear 220 hectares (540 acres) occupied by 4,000 people following a court order to restore the hilly, lush land to its protected status

Officials decided to use the elephants after attempts to chase away the squatters resulted in clashes that killed one

## **Citizens lend cars to** impoverished police

**BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (Reuters)** - Inhabitants of a small city in Argentina have started to lend their cars to the police, who cannot afford to run their own vehicles as the country's worst-ever recession forces budget cutbacks.

Resident Oscar Pinto told local radio a community fund had been started that was also paying for the makeshift patrol cars' fuel in Junin, a city of 93,000 people in the Pampa grasslands about 155 miles (250 km) northwest of Buenos Aires.

"We had this crime wave, and when

we talked with police they said they didn't have enough cars or money for gasoline," Pinto said, adding that the existing police vehicle fleet was mostly old and broken down. "So I said I'd loan them my car."

Argentina's chaotic recession, well into its fourth year, has sapped government revenues in a country where more than half the population do not pay their taxes.

But Pinto said Junin's strategy had been effective, declaring: "Crime is nonexistent now."




