Aden, August 3 (YT)-Sera Court of First Instances in Aden Saturday morning held its public session chaired by Justice Mohammed Mahmoud al-Gundi and pronounced the verdict in Aden explosions that had taken place in 2001 New Year and targeted al-Tawahi church, Saba News Agency office and Continental Hotel in Khor Maksar, Aden.

Four people were condemned in the explosions, namely, Nassir Ali Awad Al-Shaibah, Anees Mohammed Abdu, Fares Saleh Taher and Saleh Hussin Ali.

The court sentenced the first defendant to 6 years in prison, the second was sentenced to two years and half imprisonment and two years imprisonment for the third defendant. The court had acquitted the fourth defendant for the incomplete evidence and handed him over to the general prosecutor for investigations into trading in

## **Opposition loses SEC** struggle

Aden, August 1 (YT)-The Joint Meeting of the Opposition Parties has called upon the Supreme Election Committee (SEC) to retract its decision concerning the distribution of registration allocations among parties at the registration committees n accordance with the local election results and the referendum of the constitutions in 2001.

In a statement issued last Wednesday, opposition parties have strongly rejected SEC's decision. The statement added that the new decision might be enacted on purpose to deprive the opposition parties from participating in the coming elections. According to the statement, the opposition parties have shown great adherence to criteria and agreements, which have been agreed upon with the

"The SEC will be held accountable for excluding the opposition parties from participating in the elections," the statement implicitly referred to the General People's Conference (GPC) as the responsible party behind this action. Continued on P 5

## Opposition parties meet U.S., international organizations

Sana'a, August 3 (YT)—Representatives of opposition Joint Meeting Parties and Islah party have Saturday met with American ISES and NDI organizations representatives plus a number of international organizations, concerned with civil society organizations affairs and elections, and a number of European diplomats.

Opposition parties have presented, during the meeting, their stance towards the question of forming electoral committees, confirming that the criteria they proposed for taking part in the committees of registration are the basis for their participation.


The parties have further mentioned that the Elections Supreme Committee is controlled by the ruling party and that the successive amendments effected by the government do undermine the entire process of democracy, and threaten future of democracy in Yemen. They claimed that following the 11 September events, the regime in

Yemen feels that the donor countries have been giving the question of security much more attention than others. On their part, representatives of the international organizations affirmed that they would play media? tors role between opposition parties and the government, stressing it was necessary that dialogues continue till a stance satisfying all parties was reached, as dialogue serves the democratic process in Yemen.

Joint Meeting Parties had earlier asked the government to adopt on regular basis certain proportional representation in electoral processes to be given to the 21 political parties registered at the parties affairs committee, including the Yemen Socialist Party, according to the volume of its representation in the 1993 parliamentary elections.

As for the remainder proportions they asked to be distributed among the parties represented in the parliament according to number of votes each party wins.



## **Proposal Writing Course wraps up**

Organized by Friederich Ebert Stiftung in collaboration with the Yemen Times Newspaper, the "Proposal Writing Course" was concluded yesterday April 4.

During the 50-hour extensive training course held at the Yemen Times premises in Sanaa, participants gained diverse practical skills in project proposal writing. More than 25 trainees participated in this course, which started on July the first.

The training course hosted a number of prominent personalities involved in evaluating proposals presented by NGOs in Yemen. Among those guest speakers were Charles

Heatly, the Political Secretary of the British Embassy, Mohammed Chraibi an NGO Researcher, and Hatem M. Bamehriz, Deputy Manager of the National Democratic Institute (NDI) for International Affairs.

Jameel al-Anisi, the course trainer described the idea of such a course by saying, "the idea of training was first implemented by the American Embassy at YALI in 1999. The best aspect of this kind of training is that it is a thorough step-by-step practical experience." he said.

Unlike most short courses that provide "quick guides", this Proposal Writing course began with a series of introductory sessions on several developmental issues such as democracy,

development, empowerment, community participation and sustainability, which was enriched by trainee's practical training abilities that involved the encouragement of discussions and sharing different views and opinions. The trainees were grouped into teams

which they worked in throughout the different stages of the course including the planning, drafting, and applying stages. The teams are trained to conduct a participatory appraisal (by carrying it out in the

field), analyze the data and work through strict and profession-

al guidelines. This includes writing a problem statement, defining the overall goal and objectives, defining activities and scheduling them, and constructing a budget that takes into consideration all activities involved in the

According to the instructions given, the information is then developed into a proposal. The writing is revised and refined several times until the end product is complete. After 50 hours of hard work, the trainees graduate after applying all the skill they have learned.

On the other hand, one of the female trainees, Maryam Ashowafi stressed on the benefit women would get from such courses. "The main goal of holding such programs is to raise awareness among Yemeni women working in NGOs of the need to acquire skills and propose projects courageously so as to become active members in giving a hand to the poor families, improving their living conditions and contributing to increase their income," she said.

She spoke highly of the organizers of this course including the instructor, Jameel al-Anisi for his strenuous efforts to make this program a success and she also thanked the Yemen Times for hosting this valuable training

## **Taiz University!** Campus turns to battlefield

In a press release issued by the Executive Committee of the General Yemeni Students Union, (GYSU) at Taiz University, a security officer of the university pointing his pistol at a university student on June 28. The incident was followed by shooting fires at a number of students sitting next to the fence of the university campus.

In an unprecedented move, three female students were illegally incarcerated in individual prisons set up by the university security. Students at the university campus had no way except to protest against this flagrant violation and disregard for human rights. After mounting pressure was exerted on the security, those girls were all released.

In the same context, 20 students were also incarcerated in the criminal investigation jail of the city.

In response to recent incidents at the Taiz University campus, the GYSU filed an official complaint to the prosecuting attorney of Taiz Governorate asking for immediate intervention to release students who were unfairly detained in the criminal investigation jail. The complaint demanded the concerned bodies to compensate and rehabilitate students morally and materially.

It is worthwhile mentioning that the overall tuition fees along with entrance examination has considerably increased from YR 2,600 in the academic year (1998-1999) to YR 7,600 in (1999-2000). The fee increased to YR 7,900 in (2001-2002) during the academic year, (2002-2003) tuition fees 10,000.

On the other hand, the GYSU at Ibb University sent a letter to President Ali Abdullah Saleh appealing to save the educational process and make the universities a place for acquiring knowledge and not a battlefield for causing troubles and disputes among political

The GYSU expressed its deep concern over uncertain future of the educational system.

At the same time the GYSU at Ibb University has expressed its total refusal of the high tuition fees. Students claim that university campuses have become places for moneygrubbers, which resulted in having many poor students, who couldn't afford

## Yemen Airways receives its second Boeing 737-800 aircraft


The Canadian petroleum company Calvalley, has an oil concession at sector 9 in Hadhramout governorate has successfully finished its exploratory




## Self-exiled Journalists to return to Yemen



# Women's rights discussed

nder the auspices of Prime Minister Abdulqadir Ba Jammal and the President of the Supreme Council for Women, the Arab Sisters Forum organized on Thursday, the first of August a national consultative meeting under the motto "Women's rights between the challenge of law and reality". The event was attended by Mr. Abdulkarim al-Arhabi Minister of Social Affairs, Mr. Ali Saleh Abdullah Deputy Minister of Social Affairs, Mrs. Amal al-Basha Director of the Sisters' Arab Forum, Mrs. Rajani Khana Oxfam-Britain, Mrs. Hooria Mashoor Deputy Chairman of the Women's National Committee, and distinguished participants and guests.

Mrs. Amal al-Basha, the host and

Director of the Forum gave a welcome speech in which she emphasized the importance of organizing such a meeting to raise awareness among women and civil society organizations as well as the whole society on the need to focus on women's rights in Yemen. "This meeting aims at starting a dialogue to discuss an important issues resembled in the need to get more justice and equality for all citizens alike" she said.

She appealed to the government to modify some of the constitution's articles that are openly considered discriminative including articles on nationality, law of penalties, etc. "In this meeting, I ask the government to eliminate all shapes of discrimination against women according to the constitution's articles which guarantee equality in duties and rights for both genders" she comment-

Mrs. Hooria Mashoor praised the crucial role that the forum had played in such a short time in keeping pace with new events and global changes. Quoting from the Holy Quara'n, she stressed that Islam guarantees rights of women and pointed out that many families still use force to have their young daughters marry in an early age, depriving them from education and other rights. She stressed on the need to mobilize the frozen articles of the constitution that are related to women's rights.

Then, Mrs. Rajani Khana gave a speech in which she said, "We are happy that the Republic of Yemen has signed Convention to Eliminate Discrimination against Women (CEDAW), which demonstrates its commitment to promote women's rights. Moreover the Yemeni society is becoming increasingly aware of this instrument and is beginning to present its perspectives and viewpoints by filing their own Shadow Report on CEDAW that is going to be discussed at the forthcoming UN special session to be held in New York in August."

She added that "the workshop is an exciting and challenging process that requires transparency, trust, solidarity and commitment to move towards gender equality in Yemen"

Mr. AbdulKarim al-Arahbi, praised the efforts in holding the event and thanked the participants by saying, "it is a pleasant moment to see that women have becomes aware of their rights and can frankly express their views benefiting from the given democratic margin they have" he said.

"The government has exerted s lot of efforts despite Yemen's strict and con-



Iragi Ambassador to YT:

## "Other Arab countries will subsequently fall prey to the USA if a unified stance is not taken,"

aha Yaseen al-Basri, the current Iraqi Ambassador to Yemen graduated from Baghdad University, College of Education in 1959. He then became a teacher following the outbreak of the 14 Ramadhan Revolution in 1963. Then, he spent most of his life in the field of journalism, where he worked for about 30 years. He worked in the field of the diplomatic corps for a short period of time and was appointed as a chief-ineditor of Iraq's al-Thowra official daily newspaper.

He was appointed Director of the Iraqi News Agency and then as a journalist advisor in Spain. The deputation period in Spain lasted for 4 years and was later entrusted with the diplomatic corps at the foreign ministry as an ambassador.

From 1976 to 1978, he worked as Deputy of the Ministry of Information and Culture and then as a Chairman of the Iraqi journalists Union for 4 years from 1982 to 1986.

He also occupied several positions as Director at foreign ministry Offices. Then he was appointed as a resident ambassador to Argentina, as a non-resident ambassador in Chile and Uruguay and then he was appointed as an ambassador to Italy for a short period of time.

Later on he came back to Italy after which he occupied several posts in Oatar until 1999 when he was appointed as Ambassador to the Republic of

Three years and a half have passed since he was appointed as an ambassador in Yemen. "During my stay in Yemen as an ambassador, I spent charming years full of fond memories because Yemenis are so kind-hearted and of bright-minded. Yemenis were not spoiled by the modern era," al-Basri said.

Al-Basri added that the Yemeni-Iraqi relations had been deeply rooted in the past. "Iraq is the first Arab country where Yemenis go to study particularly in the field of armed training and thousands of Yemeni university students go to Iraqi universities to study in different academic fields," he said.

As for academic cooperation between Yemen and Iraq, the Iraqi Ambassador pointed out two kinds of scholarships:

Scholarships that have been granted by the state in accordance with agreements singed between the two countries.

Scholarships that have been signed between the Arab Ba'ath Socialist Party and the political parties in the political arena. It has been agreed that a number of limited scholarships should be allocated and granted separately for members of each political party.

Students in Iraq are treated equally like any other Arab or Iraqi student. As a result of this, political parties have the desire to increase the number of scholarships each year.

The Yemeni-Iraqi relations have wit-

nessed considerable improvements in different fields whether social, political, economic or cultural. Visits exchanged between the two countries at different levels have participated in consolidating those relations further. Recently, a trade zone agreement between Iraq and Yemen has been signed. This has opened the way for



open trade exchange and exemption of customs duties.

The Yemeni-Iraqi relations have been in continuous progress ever since al-Basri was appointed as an ambassador to Yemen in 1999. Yemeni-Iraqi trade relations were now gaining greater momentum. "More than 50 Yemeni companies working in the field of trade have started business relations with Iraq. As a first step, certain Yemeni products are in the process of being exported to the Iraqi markets. Such products include foodstuff, detergents, medicines, etc." he added.

"Yemeni businessmen are given the chance to import commodities and goods from other Arab countries to be exported to the Iraqi markets as well,"

In a question about Yemen's stance towards the sanctions imposed on Iraq, al-Basri said that last week there was a solidarity festival held at the Research and Studies Center in support of the Iraqi issue. "We make every effort to coordinate with the concerned bodies Palestinian uprising in the Arab countries their due attention," he stated fur-

The US dominance over some of the Arab orders has made many countries submissive to enemy's pressures. This has been represented by imposing the New World Order. In this regard, the Iraqi Ambassador commented, "What we see is that around 90% of the countries in the world are dominated by the New World Order led by the USA," the Iraqi Ambassador said.

He further made clear that the official stance of Yemen towards the Iraq's issue is one of the most honorable, which manifested itself in different angels including the call upon the international community to raise sanctions and its denouncing of the continuous threats of attacking Iraq.

As for trade exchange between Iraq and Yemen, al-Basri said that Yemen and Iraq had signed a memorandum of understanding, which was also signed with other Arab countries that had trade relations with Iraq. "Iraq is now looking for new trade opportunities to export its products. As a result of sanction imposed against Iraq, we are unable to export our products. Iraq is only allowed to export oil within the framework of the oil for food memorandum," he said.

Concerning lifting sanctions against Iraq, Mr. Taha said, "The President of Iraq once said that he doesn't expect the lifting of sanctions against Iraq at all. Nobody can expect to lift sanctions sooner or later. This issue is subject to international and regional changes. It may last for a long period of time and we have to deal with this issue in a

to give the Iraqi issue and the careful manner. In this respect, Iraq is and will remain steadfast for ever."

> Unfortunately, there is no unified Arab stance in regard to sanctions because of the differences among Arab regimes, which reflects itself negatively on Iraq.

> But according to the ambassador, there are some shining and promising examples such as Saudi Arabia's stance towards the imposed sanctions and its stance concerning the latest US threats

to strike Iraq, which is a new promising development. "I hope from the bottom of my heart that Saudi Arabia's stance will be the same of all other countries. What has been declared by H.H. Prince, Saood al-Faisal of opposing any strike against Iraq is a promising step forward," he said. He added that defending Iraq means defending the whole Arab nation. "Iraq is not the only target. Other Arab countries will subsequently fall prey to the USA if a unified stance is not taken," he concluded.

## Public institutions' survey started

The field survey for public instituions for the year 2002 started last Monday with a campaign to count and inspect governmental buildings and structures all over the country. The survey aims at providing a complete database on all governmental institutions to improve labor offices services and to calculate small, middle and large public institutions in main cities and rural areas. The survey includes the inspection of more than 600 establishments in main cities and more than 453 in rural

# Powell still plans to meet Palestinians

JERUSALEM, Aug 3 (Reuters) -U.S. Secretary of State Colin Powell said on Saturday he still hoped to meet Palestinian leaders next week despite the bombing of a Jerusalem university that drew swift military retaliation from Israel.

Israel responded to the deadly university bombing by sending troops into a militant Palestinian stronghold in the West Bank city of Nablus, demolishing houses of the families of Palestinian suicide attackers.

Powell condemned Palestinian attacks and mourned those killed, including five Americans and two Israelis who died in this week's blast at a Hebrew University cafeteria, but said the sides "can't give up" efforts to end 22 months of bloodshed.

"We can't walk away from it. We must continue to try to find a path forward," Powell told a news conference in Manila near the end of an eightnation Asia tour. He made clear no dates or participants had been set.

Tensions on the ground continued on Friday as Israeli troops backed by tanks poured into the centre of Nablus, killing three Palestinians and seizing at least 30 suspects in what the army said was an effort to root out a "local terror

Soldiers went from house to house in the Casbah, or Old City, smashing holes in connecting walls to avoid exposure to gunmen outside, as they searched for militants.

The army also demolished the houses of families of militants and started to deport their relatives.

Bulldozers and army engineers razed four homes in three West Bank towns, at least three of which belonged to relatives of suicide attackers.

Palestinian President Yasser Arafat condemned as a crime against humanity the demolitions that left dozens

homeless.

"I am asking for quick international intervention from the United Nations. If they are not able to send forces, they should send observers," Arafat said in the West Bank city of Ramallah.

Powell intends to meet palestinians

Senior Palestinian negotiator Saeb Erekat said last week he expected to visit Washington for talks on August 5 and 6 with Abdel Razzak al Yahya, the new interior minister also in charge of Palestinian security forces, and Trade Minister Maher al-Masri.

The meeting would be the most senior contact between the U.S. administration and Palestinian Authority since

President George W. Bush called in June for Yasser Arafat to be sidelined as Palestinian leader.

The United States has said Arafat can empower his officials to speak on his behalf at negotiations to push forward reforms that Bush said must take place before Washington would support the immediate creation of a Palestinian state.

In an effort to stop further attackers, an Israeli general signed orders on Thursday for the deportation from the West Bank to the fenced-in Gaza Strip of the brothers of two militants.

Israeli officials facing international criticism for the decision said they would deport only family members who were

accomplices to the attacks.

A committee considering whether to approve deportation orders would resume its deliberations on Sunday, Army radio said. Lawyers for the two men said they would appeal to the

Supreme Court if the decree was not revoked.

The bodies of two of the Americans were flown home on Friday as the FBI launched an investigation into the attack, which drew words of outrage from U.S. President George W. Bush.

At least 1,477 Palestinians and 574 Israelis have been killed since a Palestinian uprising began in September 2000.

## U.S. says Iraq offer does not alter view on Saddam

LONDON, Aug 3 (Reuters) - The United States said on Saturday Iraq's offer of talks on U.N. arms inspectors did not alter its ultimate goal of seeing President Saddam Hussein removed from power.

"We continue to favour the reintroduction of the inspectors and we are supporting them as much as we can," U.S. Undersecretary of State John Bolton told BBC radio. "But...our policy at the same time insists on regime change in Baghdad.

"That policy will not be altered whether the inspectors go in or not," added Bolton, Washington's arms control expert.

"The real question is the removal of Saddam Hussein and his continuing threat to peace and security in the region."

The letter was sent in a week that U.S. President George W. Bush repeated his commitment to a "regime change" in Iraq and his determination to look at "all options...all tools" to oust the Iraqi leader".

Bolton said the U.S. position on Iraq - dubbed by Bush along with Iran and North Korea as an "axis of evil" had not changed since the September 11 attacks on New York and Washington.

"I don't think our policy is tied to September 11, although we continue to explore what linkages there might be between Saddam and al Qaeda," he

"The threat that Saddam represents to our interests, the interests of our friends and neighbours in the region and to peace and security at large is what motivates us to think that regime change is the only way to eliminate that threat," he added.

Bolton refused to be drawn on how Saddam might be removed from

"There are all kinds of ways for regime change to take place," he said. "The Iraqi opposition has long felt that the country is really burdened intolerably by Saddam Hussein's presence in Baghdad, and that opposition continues to grow.'

Bolton added that time was pressing and the United States was confident it would have adequate support for whatever action it might eventually decide

# Iran and Saudi say oppose any U.S. attack on Iraq

TEHRAN, Aug 3 (Reuters) - Saudi Foreign Minister Prince Saud al-Faisal arrived in Iran on a one-day visit on Saturday as the two former foes said they opposed any possible U.S. military attack on their common neighbour Iraq.

Prince Saud told reporters at Tehran's airport that he would deliver a written message from Saudi Crown Prince Abdullah to President Mohammad Khatami at a meeting later on Saturday.

"We have a common position with Iran," Iran's state television quoted Prince Saud as saying.

"We oppose any military attack against Islamic and regional countries and we are both opposed to any American military attack against Iraq.'

The United States is debating an attack on Iraq to topple President Saddam Hussein, seen as a threat due to his alleged efforts to develop weapons of mass destruction.

Prince Saud also welcomed Iraq's offer on Thursday for the chief U.N. weapons inspector, barred since 1998, to return to Baghdad for technical talks.

"The return of U.N. weapons inspectors is the most appropriate way to ensure the safety of Iraq and its people," the state-run Saudi Press Agency quoted him as saying.

Iran, which fought a 1980-88 war with Iraq, has repeatedly urged

## Angola's **UNITA** rebels disband their military wing

LUANDA, Aug 3 (Reuters) - The military wing of Angola's once feared UNITA rebel movement has disbanded, the latest stage in a peace process started after the death in combat of the group's charismatic founder, Jonas Savimbi.

Angop, the government's official news agency, said on Saturday the disbanding took place at a ceremony in the capital Luanda on Friday.

"UNITA military forces were Friday officially disbanded," Angop said.

The disbanding was originally scheduled for July 20 but that deadline was missed, raising concerns about a possible setback to peace in the southwest African nation that has known little but ruinous oivil war since independence from Portugal in 1975.

Angop said 18 UNITA generals were commissioned and integrated into the Angolan army

It said 5,000 UNITA soldiers would be assimilated into the regular armed forces and close to 80,000 other former fighters would be demobilised and integrated into civilian life.

Analysts have said only about 10,000 to 15,000 UNITA soldiers were still active in the bush when the two sides signed a historic ceasefire in April, triggered by Savimbi's death in a gun battle in February.

But it remains unclear how many have actually laid down their arms and UNITA is said to have deep political

UNITA was pounded into submission by a "scorched earth" policy that

saw government forces drive peasants off the land, depriving the rebels of vital food supplies.

But aid workers say that strategy has put tens of thousands of people at risk from starvation

The war in the oil and diamond rich nation is believed to have killed about a million people and displaced millions

One of its worst legacies lies beneath its fertile soil in the form of landmines, which are strewn across the country.

## Nigeria to postpone election for second time

LAGOS, Aug 3 (Reuters) -President Olusegun Obasanjo said on Saturday Nigeria's local elections, the first polls since military rule ended in 1999, could not be held on August 10 as scheduled because preparations were not complete.

Obasanjo said in a monthly national radio talk show that governors responsible for local elections in the country's 36 states had decided the poll would have to be put off for the second time to allow revision of the voters' register.

The polls were originally to have taken place in April, but were put back for the same reason.

Obasanjo said he was discussing the electoral crisis with political leaders on Friday when a spokesman for the governors came in and said: "By consensus we've decided that August 10 is unrealistic." The governors have yet to decide a new date.

The postponement marks a major setback for the democratic process in oil-producing Nigeria, a country of 120 million that has not managed a successful transition between elected governments since independence from Britain in 1960. It could also affect presidential, national and gubernatorial elections early next year.

Any election would take place against a background of Nigeria's worst cycle of violence for decades, in which an estimated 10,000 people have died in three years. The end of 15 years of military dictatorship in 1999 released the pressure cooker of long suppressed grievances, leading to bloody outbreaks of ethnic and religious clashes across the country.

Political unrest has surged, notably since Obasanjo declared his re-election bid in April.

> They also endorsed a plan to put the pact into action within 90 days.

## India says Pakistani shelling kills three soldiers

SRINAGAR, India, Aug 3 (Reuters) -At least three Indian soldiers were killed in Kashmir when Indian and Pakistani troops exchanged "heavy" fire across a military line that divides the disputed region between the two countries, a senior army official said on

"There is lot of firing going on both sides (in Kupwara sectors), we have lost a JCO (Junior Commissioned Officer) and two men," Lieutenant-General, V. G. Patankar told reporters.

"This time it (shelling) could be because infiltration is going on, it (infiltration) has started," Patankar, chief of 15 Corps of Indian army operating in the Kashmir Valley, added.

Kashmir is at the heart of a military standoff between the two nuclear-armed rivals India and Pakistan as New Delhi battles a separatist revolt in the state.

India accuses Pakistan of pushing Muslim rebels into Kashmir under the cover of artillery shelling. Pakistan

denies the charge and says it provides dates and voters. only moral support to the separatists.

Islamabad also says infiltration has

Close to a million soldiers are still massed along the border between the two nuclear rivals and the shelling comes after India announced on Friday dates for holding elections in the rebellious Jammu and Kashmir state.

## **Vultures scare Bangladesh** flood victims

MANIKGANJ, Bangladesh, Aug 3 (Reuters) - About half of Bangladesh is underwater from the worst monsoon flooding in years and officials say the death toll is about 70 - small compared to floods in 1988 that killed more than 3,500 people.

The extent of flood-related diseases or illness such as diarrhoea has been relatively small, officials say but medical officers warn the situation may change for the worse when floodwaters recede fully.

And it is the worry about what could happen next that was foremost on the minds of villagers in Manikganj, 65 km (40 miles) from the Bangladesh

In the flooded areas, people are concerned about a shortage of drinking water and their crops being damaged by the deluge


Agriculture officials have yet to make an estimate of losses but say the damage to the rice crop may be extensive if the floods continue through this month. Bangladesh has not suffered a famine since 1974 and the country has produced bumper rice crops in the past

Many villagers have stockpiled food in preparation for the annual floods but if they last longer than usual or damage to crops is greater than estimated, they would be in trouble.

## Calls for Afghan arms amnesty fall on deaf ears

KABUL, Aug 3 (Reuters) - In a country where owning arms is seen as a fundamental right, it was little wonder that a government delegation returned to the Afghan capital at the weekend with little to show for a rural amnesty on personal arms.

"We got a few guns...maybe around 10," said one Western diplomat who accompanied the mission to Jaghatu in Wardak province, around 125 kms (80 miles) southeast of the capital.

"But you definitely had the feeling that there were a lot more around, hidden away somewhere for when they might be needed," he said on Saturday.

The government last week ordered Afghans not attached to a recognisable branch of the national army to hand in any weapons, but few believe the regulation will result in anything more than a handful of old muskets or broken rifles being surrendered.

"We know that it may seem a hope, but we have to start somewhere," said an official from the Afghan defence ministry. "Anyway, even if it just makes people hide them away, it will be better.

Their first high-profile arms gather-

ing trip to the countryside turned into a farce on Friday.

After a long bumpy drive to Jaghatu, government officials including Interior Minister Taj Mohammad Wardak gave a series of lofty speeches urging the populace to surrender all weapons and put their trust in the national army.

The visit yielded slim pickings which one cynic even suggested had been brought along by the delegation for just that eventuality.

"Here every man is born a soldier," wrote Lady Sale, the wife of the commander of British forces in Afghanistan, in 1842. "Every Afghan is armed with three or four knives of different sizes...pistols and a jezail (rifle)."

Those weapons were used to deadly effect by the Afghans against the British in those times, and the country has time and again united to fend off invaders - the latest being the decadelong Soviet occupation from 1979.

They infuriated their opponents by either stealing their weapons or copying them to perfection," wrote Victoria Schofield in her book "Every rock,

'Whereas they used Martini-Henrys and Lee-Enfields against the British in the 19th and 20th centuries, they have automatic Kalashnikovs to use against the Russians, for they steal and reproduce the rifles of their enemies with dexterity.'

Gerald Curtis, a political officer in Afghanistan in the 1930s, said this tradition of bearing arms came about because the country had rarely enjoyed a strong central government, leaving each man to defend himself, his family

"It can be argued that in a country where there is no Government to enforce sanctions on those whose conduct is injurious to others, the blood feud spares as much life as it destroys."

That lack of strong central government is what still drives Afghans today to stash a weapon or two somewhere around their home, analysts say.

President Hamid Karzai has said improving security is essential to dragging Afghanistan out of 23 years of occupation and conflict and revitalising a shattered economy.

## Thousands of Indonesian Muslims rally for Islamic law

JAKARTA, Aug 3 (Reuters) - About 5,000 Indonesian Muslims marched peacefully through Jakarta on Saturday, calling for the nationwide imposition of Islamic sharia law to rescue the country from its many ills.

Chanting "God is Greatest" and carrying placards that read "we miss sharia", the crowd marched through central Jakarta to the top legislature, which is holding its annual session.

There, they urged legislators meeting on Saturday to change the constitution to introduce sharia across the world's most populous Muslim nation, which has overwhelmingly moderate religious views. The crowd dispersed peacefully after midday.

Conservative Muslim legislators, as they have in recent years, are expected to submit proposed constitutional changes during the assembly's 10-day annual session that would recognise sharia. That effort has failed to get much support in the past and key parties have already rejected the idea this time around.

"Save Indonesia with sharia," shouted hundreds of teenaged girls in white veils, as police cleared a path through the mid-morning traffic.

Older women carried babies in slings or pushed their children along in the odd pram.

Over the past 10 years, mosque attendance has risen and Islam become more important to the identity of Indonesians, but moderate Muslim leaders dismiss suggestions the nation

could become an Islamic state in the decades to come.

Conservative Muslims believe sharia law would help root out woes like endemic corruption in Indonesia by imposing stricter punishments, although few favour drastic measures carried out in parts of the Middle East such as stoning adulterers.

The rally came a day after U.S. Secretary of State Colin Powell visited Jakarta, pledging \$50 million to help the security forces fight terrorism while expressing admiration for a Muslim nation that "allows (its) diversity to flower".

Indonesia plunged into turmoil in late 1997 during the Asian financial crisis, and has struggled to rebuild its economy and manage a messy transition to democracy from authoritarian-

The marchers came from a low-profile conservative Muslim group, Hizbut Tahrir Indonesia, which had predicted 20,000 would join the rally.

None of Indonesia's small extremist Muslim groups, some of which have members linked by neighbouring countries to terror organisations, were present.

Jakarta last year allowed sharia to be used in Aceh as part of an autonomy package designed to douse independence demands in the staunchly Muslim province on the tip of Sumatra island. There have been no reports of drastic punishments.

The annual session of the 700-

member People's Consultative Assembly (MPR) opened Thursday.

Some 85 percent of Indonesia's 210 million people are Muslim, where

## U.S. consulate bombing trial in Pakistan on Aug 10

KARACHI, Aug 3 (Reuters) - The last month. bomb attack on the U.S. consulate in Karachi that killed 12 and injured 20 will begin on August 10, a Pakistan court official said on Saturday.

Habib Ahmed, assistant advocate general of southern Sindh province, told reporters police have submitted an "interim" charge sheet against the suspects in two cases — the consulate attack and a plot to kill President Pervez Musharraf. "The court has fixed August 10 to start a trial for the cases and has sent them (the suspects) to jail," he added.

Pakistan's paramilitary Rangers have arrested four people, including three leading members of al-Almi, an offshoot of the radical Harkat-ul-Mujahideen organisation, on suspicion of involvement in the June 14 attack on the U.S. consulate.

One of those arrested is now suspected of involvement only in the Musharraf assassination plot.

All of the victims in the fourth attack this year on a foreign target in Pakistan were Pakistanis.

Harkat-ul-Mujahideen has long been on a blacklist of organisations deemed "terrorist" by the United States and reportedly has links to Muslim separatists fighting Indian rule in Kashmir.

Two of the accused — Mohammad Imran and Mohammad Hanif, the head and deputy head of the organisation admitted to their involvement in the consulate attack and a plot to assassinate Musharraf at a news conference

#### Failed assassination

The accused said they tried to kill Musharraf late in April, but their car bomb failed to go off. They said their targets included U.S. interests in Pakistan, such as fast food chains McDonalds and Kentucky Fried Chicken.

Ahmed said three suspects in the U.S. consulate attack case Mohammad Imran, Mohammad Hanif and Mohammad Ashraf - were charged with conspiracy, attempted murder, murder, use of explosives and

"Those three and Waseem Akhter (another suspect) were charged with conspiracy, attempt to murder and terrorism and the judge has asked the ATC-1 (anti-terrorism court) to hear both cases," Ahmed said.

He said the police had named six other people involved in both cases who were at large.

"The police have named six other suspects, Shariq, Kamran, Jamil, Naveed, Habib and Mustafa, as absconders in both the cases," Ahmed added. Pakistan's cooperation with the U.S.-led coalition pursuing Osama bin Laden, his al Qaeda network and the Taliban in Afghanistan has angered Islamic militant groups.

Embassies and foreign companies have scaled back staff after a string of attacks against foreign targets, including a May strike in Karachi that killed 11 French engineers and three Pakistanis.

# Legionnaires' outbreak could claim more lives

LONDON, Aug 3 (Reuters) - An outbreak of Legionnaires' disease in northwest England could infect as many as 120 people before it is contained, with one in five likely to die, health officials and experts said on Saturday.

But as fears grew that the outbreak in the Cumbrian town of Barrow-in-Furness could be Britain's worst since 23 people died in 1985, officials said they were confident the source had been found, in a leisure centre air conditioner, and urged calm.

On Friday, an 89-year-old man became the first person to die and 54 adults were in hospital by Saturday — 19 confirmed cases and the rest showing symptoms of the pneumonia-like illness.

Ian Cumming, chief executive of the area's Morecambe Bay Hospitals Trust, said up to 10 people a day with symptoms were being admitted and this was set to continue for around 12 days.

"Incubation is between five and 10 days...it is usually six or seven days before symptoms show," he told

The projections were based on the fact the likely source of the outbreak, an air conditioning unit at a council-run entertainment complex in the town, had been closed on Thursday.

Local council leader Terry Waiting said the unit had leaked steam and was shut down for maintenance a day before the disease was confirmed.

He said tests were under way to confirm this was the source and said the cordoned-off building posed no danger to people.

Health officials echoed his comments at a news conference.

"If the source is where we think it is then control measures have now been taken and it doesn't pose a further threat to public health," said Professor John Ashton, regional public health director.

"There is no need for panic. It seems to be a local source, a local problem which is being tackled."

Professor Hugh Pennington, an eminent bacteriologist, said Legionnaires' was "the nastiest bug you can catch in the environment" and it was likely more people would die. "In past outbreaks, as many as 20 percent of people who've been infected with it and become ill have died from this bug," he told BBC television on Saturday.

The disease, named in 1976 when an outbreak killed 29 people at an American Legion Convention in Philadelphia, is a form of pneumonia caused by bacteria living in water droplets.

Symptoms are at first flu-like, followed by fever and chills, then a dry cough.

Exactly half the 54 people still in hospital on Saturday were women. Nine people were in intensive care, including five whose condition was "giving cause for concern", the Morecambe Bay Hospitals trust said in a statement.

The age range of patients was from 18 to 89

In the last major outbreak in Britain, 68 people were infected and 23 died in the town of Stafford in 1985.

# Holiday makers in France traffic chaos

PARIS, Aug 3 (Reuters) - Thousands of holiday makers were caught up in traffic chaos in France on Saturday as they hit the road on their way to or from summer vacations, fuelling the year's worst traffic jams, road safety experts said.

Road safety officials said the traffic had started building up as early as 0230 GMT, with tailbacks in the worst hit areas going as far back as 150 kms (93 miles) by 0700 GMT.

"I have never seen such traffic jams," one motorist told French television station LCI in France's south-east Rhone-Alpes, the worst affected area as holiday makers tried to make their way to the popular Provence region.

Another motorist heading for Italy said he had decided to break for breakfast after more than an hour of crawling at snail's pace.

The government's road safety unit says the weekend will be exceptionally difficult with one wave of families leaving for their summer holidays, which usually last a month, as others return from July vacations.

It has classified Saturday's outgoing traffic as black, the worst rating on its scale of traffic congestion, and warned that nightmare tailbacks could total more than 500 km (310 miles).

"Saturday August 3 is the only day classified as black at national level in 2002," the department said on its Web site (http://www.bisonfute.equipement.gouv.fr/). The normal ratings are green, yellow and red.

"As a reminder, in 2001 we registered 661 km of accumulated traffic jams at 12.30 p.m. on Saturday August 4. It could therefore be the heaviest day of traffic of the summer in both directions," it added.

No region seemed to have been spared, with traffic jams extending to France's borders with Spain and Italy.

"This weekend, motorists should favour driving on Sunday, when everything will be back to normal except for some possible problems in the Rhone valley," it said.

## Georgia seeks to appease Russia with rebel amnesty

TBILISI, Aug 3 (Reuters) - Armed fighters hiding in a remote Georgian gorge will be granted amnesties if they give themselves up, a top official said on Saturday, hoping to ease Russian fears Georgia is not doing enough to flush rebels from the area.

Moscow, which says rebels fighting in nearby Chechnya are using the Pankisi Gorge as a base, has in recent days issued a series of demands for Georgia to hunt down rebels, citing scores of incursions into the breakaway region.

Foreign Minister Igor Ivanov said Russia would seek help from the international community if Georgia failed to take action, but Georgia has rejected any notion of Russian military operations on its territory.

"Those people who give themselves up to the Georgian authorities unarmed will enjoy the same rights as other refugees," Georgian Security Minister Valery Khaburdzania told reporters after a delegation of U.S. congressmen met top officials and visited a military base just outside Tbilisi.

Khaburdzania added those accused of serious crimes would not be included in the offer.

U.S. instructors arrived in Georgia in May to lead military training courses intended to turn the ex-Soviet state's ragged army into a modern

force, with one possible task of removing rebels sheltering in the

Pankisi Gorge.
"They don't think they've wasted their money," Georgian Defence

Minister David Tevzadze said.

Officials in Russia's volatile southern fringe said the situation on the Russian-Georgian border was returning to normal after what media reports said was an incursion of up to 60 guerrillas from the Pankisi Gorge.

Moscow, which granted Chechnya de facto independence after a first 1994-96 war, returned to the region in 1999. It now says its forces control most of the region, but its forces come under regular attacks.

# Sept. 11 report criticizes NY fire department

NEW YORK, Aug. 3 (Reuters) - New York Fire Department's response to the Sept. 11 attack at the World Trade Center was plagued by communication problems and discipline lapses, according to a draft report obtained by The New York Times.

The report by independent consultant McKinsey & Co. concludes problems with the radio system caused commanders to lose touch with many firefighters who went into the twin towers, the Times reported on Saturday.

It said lapses in discipline led firefighters to rush to the scene without checking in with commanders at designated staging areas.

A virtual absence of coordination with police officials, the consultants say, meant fire commanders had no access to reports from police helicopters that hovered above the 110-story buildings, tracking their structural integrity and the progress of fires

across the upper floors.

"This lack of information hindered their ability to evaluate the overall situation," the paper reported the draft report as saying.

Radio communications were sporadic and critical information was apparently never received by firefighters on upper floors in the building, it added.

The full report is due out as early as next week.

More than 2,800 people died, including 343 firefighters and 23 pollice officers, when the towers collapsed after being struck by two hijacked aircraft in an attack blamed by the United States on the al Qaeda movement of Osama bin Laden.

The draft, significant parts of which were obtained by The New York Times, acknowledges the attack, which triggered fires that trapped thousands of people, was an overwhelming event that required an unusual level of coordination

But it says the department must improve its planning, overhaul parts of its training, acquire substantial new technology and coordinate more effectively with other emergency agencies.

"We believe that the FDNY (Fire Department of New York) cannot adequately fulfill its mission to the citizens of New York City unless the city or state governments establish a formal effective process of interagency planning and coordination," says the report.

It also says the department's Emergency Medical Service had serious problems deploying, tracking and controlling it sambulance and trauma personnel.

Overall, the draft says, the department needs to be run with tighter standards. "Accountability needs to be increased at headquarters and in the field," it says.

The consultant, which specializes in reviewing management. practices, spent five months preparing the report.

mong the most conspicuous successes scored by some national industrial establishments is the ability to market its products locally and externally. However, this cannot be done unless these products were subjected to premarketing studies the installation has learnt about consumption styles, consumers tastes, prices suit ble for marketing its products, along vith observing that installation's con mitment to application of specification and standardization to its products. 11 addition, there are other essential concitions that help acquire reputation and publicity for this or that product. So, it is the institution's responsibility to ex irt great efforts to upgrade its capabil ties of marketing and selling of its products. The increase of such efforts would support increase of that installation' production capacity, consequently a l its economic and financial aspects would change and positive indicators would clime up as a resultant of its effc ts. This also would lead to increase of its profits that ultimately benefit its owne's and the state at the same time, regarc less of that ownership (public, private or mixed sectors or cooperative).

Any installation, in order to raise the volume of its sale, has to work hard to promote and market its products by using all available media in this regard. Some of these means are within the

installation's capacity such as advertising in various mass media, including fixed advertising boards at entrances of major cities and posters. Another means is the distribution of gifts painted on them the name of the company or the product, for instance cigarette lighters, ball pens, office memorandums and calendars.

Nevertheless, there are other ways for enlarging the space of promotion and marketing the state has to play a big role in them as long as partnership between the state and the private sector has become an inevitable necessity. Hence comes up the necessity of the state giving an increasing attention to conclud-

ing commercial protocols with sisterly and friendly countries aimed at increasing our country' trade exchange with them and working for holding more domestic and foreign trade fairs because they are considered as an essential factor to enhance the exchange of products through signing trade contracts at those fairs. But due to high expenditure needed for taking part in such fairs, the ministry of industry and trade and the chambers of commerce and industry have to play a big role in mustering all productive energies for the participation in those exhibitions. The federation of chambers of industry must have a permanent exhibition for all national prod-

ucts.

All those participating in internal trade and industrial exhibitions held around the year should bear all their costs and it should be taken into consideration that there should be a focus on reasonable costs of leasing areas for erecting such exhibitions. ## Preconceptions; the Anchoring Trap

aking decisions is a very important part of management. And it is very important to take careful measures when making one, as a bad decision could affect businesses negatively or even damage them. Yet sometimes, bad decisions are inevitable no matter how good a manager is or how well-studied the decision process was.

There are two theories as to how human beings form their decisions; one states that all behavior is learned; the individual is the passive recipient of external and objective data. In the other, learning is a process of gaining or changing insights, outlooks, expectations or thought patterns, this theory takes into account not only a person's actions and the responses to these elicit, but also the interpretation the individual places on these. In both schools of thought, experiences proved that there are certain thought traps which yield relatively wrong decisions. The following example explains one of these traps; imagine you were to answer these two ques-

Does a new Helicopter cost more than \$100.000?

- How much does a new Helicopter cost?

If these two questions where asked in the same order, the information in the first question will create a perception asking a person's mind about the price of the Helicopter, so when answering the second question the answer could get affected by the first

On the other hand, if you ask someone else the same question and change the number in the first question to \$200.000 you will find that the answer will increase. This Process is called anchoring.

Anchoring is used a lot in businesses; for example sales forecast is done on the basis depending on sales of previous years, the old numbers become anchors which the forecasters use in adjusting the estimate for the coming year. Or while in negotiations, if the other party claims that the same product was sold for Mr. X for 10.000, that price becomes a "your anchor."

Another example is in real estates. Imagine that there are two apartments; A & B. Apartment A has 3 rooms & Apartment B has 4 rooms. If the rent for apartment A was thirty thousands, what is the expected rent for apartment B? The price of A helps you in estimating the price of B.

Effects of anchoring in decisionmaking are critical, but if managers are aware of the phenomena, the negative impact of it can be reduced by using a few precautions; such as taking all prospectors when making a decision and careful use of anchoring with advisers, or consultants. Also it is important to be open-mind-

And in negotiations; think through your position in order to avoid any anchoring from the other party.

End note: Anchoring is a great perception-making tool; use it to your advantage earn holosing largery and sould

# Household economy in Yemen, dwindling

ources of household economy in Yemen are facing a state of deterioration as people have abandoned breeding animal wealth and around 35 % of the population discarded work in agriculture, added to that the migration of many farmers from the countryside to cities to engage in jobs other than agriculture.

Economic sources estimate that the proportion of those who abandoned animal husbandry in the countryside at about 60%, and 50% of the people relinquished breeding of chicken and sheep. Proportion of those who migrated from rural areas to towns is estimated at 30 to 40 percent of the population, a matter negatively reflected on sources of growth in family income.

Rural population has got influenced by urban life styles. They shifted to purchasing processed dairies instead of fresh. Therefore they have neglected raising cattle. Rural areas inhabitants have also got used to feed on cereals and imported processed goods.

Decline in rainfall and recession in amount of water reserves in the country are factors helped migration of farming labor. Also as a result of drop in family income levels and weakness of the purchasing power in the countryside the people there have used up the greater amount of income-raising sources.

However, rural people try to overcome their living conditions using traditional ways like cutting wood as fuel for cooking instead of gas whose prices soared from YR 50 in 1995 to YR 250, and YR 350 in the countryside.

On the other hand, Environment protection advocates have warned of cutting forest trees in nature reserves including Socotra, and Utma. Nevertheless, inhabitants of such areas think they do not have the purchasing power to afford using liquefied gas in

cooking and thus they do not care about rare trees and would not hesitate using their wood in their daily life purposes.

The economic studies say that fifteen years ago 75 percent of inhabitants in Yemen countryside were dependent in their living on raising animal wealth and work in agriculture. People think that government jobs or work in the free market or with private sector have contributed to the drop in proportion of animal and agricultural production and created new problems to those of limited income.

Workers at the free market told Yemen Times that their work around the month does not provide them with an income securing 25 percent of the needs of their families, whereas the families that preserved the folklore professions and continued working in agricultural and animal production, are leading a more secure life. Workers say that with increased costs of living in towns, most of their incomes goes to house renting, and electricity and water supplies bills. As for big families the situation is very hard to cope with.

Economic experts see that solving the problem of dwindling family income beings by the government support for farming activities, and encouraging families on raising animal wealth. Government has embarked on calling for investment in agriculture sector to create job opportunities for the unemployed. Cooperatives for breeding animals have been set up but are still limited and need more support and financing. Economic experts conclude that Yemen countryside needs providing new resources of water such as building dams and water barriers that would help settle of agriculture labor in addition to developing grazing areas for animal breeding. Such steps would surely lead to growth of income sources for household economy and improve the population living condi-

# Yemeni-Saudi trade exchange for better future

he Yemen Customs Authority offer various customs facilities for importers and exporters, among these facilities is offering discounts in customs duties amounting to 10 percent to foreigners and 25 percent for expatriates. Customs resources have reported that during the first half of this year, customs revenues obtained at Haradh inlet in Hajja governorate and al-Bugah inlet in Sa'da governorate have amounted to YR 1,470, 894,124 billion, i.e. with an increase of YR 290 million compared to the same period of last year.

Trade exchange agreements between Saudi Arabia and Yemen has enhanced growth of Yemeni exports to Saudi markets and increased volume of Yemeni imports of goods and commodities from Saudi Arabia.

General Manager of Customs office at Haradh border inlet Ahmed Mohammed al-Haj said trade exchange between Yemen and Saudi Arabia is witnessing a noticeable boom. "The value of Yemeni exports to Saudi markets has reached YR 5 billion and 900 million during the first half of this year." The value of Yemeni exports through the Haradh inlet for the last year reached to YR 8 billion. The amount of customs revenues, at this inlet, in the first half of this year, is amounted to over YR 694

million. In addition to this, the revenues of consumption tax totaled YR 525,300,000 million.

Customs facilities, offered at Haradh border inlet, helped increase of travel movement between Yemen and Saudi Arabia, as the number of travellers to Yemen during the first half of this year reached 204, 709 thousand.

Yemeni authorities give a renewable 3-month residence permit for foreigners, and this in fact redoubles the volume of tourism revenues.

Total amount of revenues of Yemeni exports to Saudi markets through al-Buqah border inlet, for the period of January-June this year reached YR 949 million. Efforts are in full swing to improve customs procedures at the inlet

to facilitate exporting services and offering the best services to importers. The Director-General of al-Buqah customs office, Ahmed Rasa'e says that increase percentage in the volume of exports, during the first half of this year, reached to 265 per cent realizing an amount of YR 251 million, resulting an increase of YR 183 million compared to the same period of last year.

A new customs complex is to be built nearby the inlet aimed at upgrading the level of customs performance.

Agreements between Yemen and Saudi Arabia have been recently signed with a view of enhancing commodities transport movement and individuals travel movement all aiming at development of trade exchange.

## Yemeni elections and alliances unclear map

bservers expect that the coming days will be witnessing a hot electoral competition between Yemeni political parties. This competition was started earlier with political parties exchanging accusations coinciding with intensive activities of some parties in preparation for elections.

Unlike the previous elections, it seems that no party is to be out of the political game as all the parties are in full swing for the upcoming elections. Yet, there are no indicators of electoral boycotting except some statements by Islah party leaders which saying boycotting is an option on their agenda.

However, the ongoing arrangements for elections come while most of the controversial issues among the political parties, government, and opposition on the electoral committees representation and the new electoral record were

Currently, the electoral equilibration seems to be of various sides if we looked at the map of the existing alliances and the number of the participating parties. It is expected that more than 22 parties are going to frantically compete in the upcoming elections. But probably the most intensive competition will take place between the 3 sides; the People General Congress (PGC), the biggest and the dominant party, Yemen Congregation party (Islah), and the Supreme Opposition Coordination Council (SOCC)

In spite of the current agreement between the Joint Meeting parties (8 parties), mainly Islah and the parties of the (SOCC), observers think that such alliance is still not probable. This conclusion has been recently confirmed by leader of the Islah party, making it clear that his party relationship and the (SOCC) did not raise to alliance status but merely a coordination at reasonable

The chairman of the political office of Islah party thinks any future alliance could be among the opposition to encounter any legal violations. He also says that alliances meaning to run elections in one slate is too early to think of. The idea of possible alliance between Islam and PC was rejected completely by him and he described it as impossible and the alliance possibility between PC and other parties is more acceptable.

On the other hand, the assistant secretary general of the PC, Mr. Yahoo Al, said " alliances arrangement with some parties are still undecided but I'm quite sure that the nature of the coming electoral competition would pave the way for political alliances between the opposition parties against the PC". Mr. Yahoo confirmed that PC would welcome them because it is in interest of democracy.

The secretary general of the party, Al, says "The opposition parties alliance is very important and logic to face the ruling party dominance over the political life and the elections if we really want a well-balanced and democratic parliament". About Islam alliance with other parties within the DUMP, he confirmed This is exactly what the opposition parties want to achieve and I think (Islam) recognizes the importance of such alliances but we do not expect a complete alliance in these elections. In regards to his reading of the political map in comparison to the last elections, Mr. Al says that the political map is clearer than before as there is no boycotting parties and no coalition parties like 1997 elections.

In spite of all the variations in the parties expectations on the expected electoral map, some sources assure that the coming days will be witnessing a coordination of attitudes between PC and (Islam) parties on the light of the historical alliance's background between them.

On the contrary, some sources say that the absence of alliance between the two parities is more likely due to the current wide gap between them. To conclude, even the parties which include three other parties beside the five parties of the coordination council, Arab Socialist Bata's, Septemberian party and Islah, but the possibility of creating an integrated alliance for all of them, with or without Islah, still not confirmed ascribed to the existed variations which can not be left

## **Impediments facing** poverty alleviation strategy

orld countries, including Yemen, have adopted strategies aimed at encountering poverty and mitigating of its acuteness, which is a positive orientation in programs of economic and social development and programs of the World Bank. Paying attention to social dimensions and issues of poverty and the marginalized segments of the society has in the recent years become the pivot of concern of nations. The reason behind this stance is failure of development experiments in taking care of the human in aspects related to living, education, health and expansion of man's essential options.

The volume of poverty and the poor in Yemen have reached a serious level. Results of a family budget survey for the year 1998 have demonstrated that 17,6 percent of the population are living under food poverty line. Meanwhile the proportion of the people who are incapable of obtaining and meeting all their needs for food and other necessary wants such as clothing, lodging, health, education and transport amounts to around 41,8 percent. The question that could be raised in this respect is whether it is possible to realize all these targets in three years, and whether they are considered as achievable aims and characterized by reality. Here it could be said that realizing those goals is not an impossible matter or difficult one especially under availability of conditions and basical data. The strategy has defined those in three matters:

1- Achieving an annual economic Letters to the Editor

growth rate by 4,8 percent by the private sector,

2- Providing sources of funding the strategic projects amounting to YR 888,942 million, and

3-The existence of good administration and governance.

Undoubtedly, entrusting the task of achieving the economic growth with the private sector is an arrangement exceeding its present capacities particularly that it is suffering from various contradictions and both internal and external challenges. Moreover the structure of the private sector is limited and that the measures and policies taken during the past seven years have created deformities in performance of the private sector.

On the other hand the implementation of the strategy is facing restraints pertaining to funding. This situation needs making available annual resources amounting to no less than YR 294,314 million, approximately \$ 1682 million distributed between governmental funding at \$886 million and foreign funding at around \$685 million. This is a question difficult to achieve under the real situation represented by the limited financial resources of the state and inability of having capacity for coping with loans and foreign funding. In conclusion, the establishment of effective and good administration in the state establishments requires going ahead with strong determination for effecting financial and administrative reform and confronting all forms of cor-

# **Bush manoeuvres** give cause for worry

he Arabs, the Europeans, and much of the international community, have every reason to be worried by the behaviour of the Bush Administration. Its explicit threats to make war on Iraq, its scornful dismissal of Arab and European opinion, its blind support for Israel, its apparent indifference to Palestinian rights and Palestinian suffering, above all its neglect of international law, all these are grave subjects for concern.

It is no exaggeration to say that, out of fear or arrogance, or a dangerous combination of the two, the Bush Administration appears to be leading the world into a new dark age of international anarchy. President George W Bush's 'war on terror' is threatening to undermine the rule of law in many important areas of international life.

In his State of the Union address of January 29, President George W. Bush, with characteristic bombast, declared: 'American will lead by defending liberty and justice because they are right and true and unchanging for people everywhere.

Unfortunately, his actions fall far short of his rhetoric.

Consider the following:

• The United States has op-posed the International Criminal Court and has sought immunity for its citizens from its jurisdiction.

· In Afghanistan, it has repeatedly violated international human rights and humanitarian law. Specifically, it has transferred prisoners from Afghanistan to detention pens at Guantánamo Bay in Cuba and held them there in conditions that amount to cruel, inhuman and degrading treatment; it has refused to consider them 'prisoners of war' under the Geneva Conventions; it has denied them access to legal counsel

and to family members; it is holding them for long periods without charge or trial; and it has threatened to bring them before military courts, which have the right to hand down death sentences without the possibility of appeal.

According to Amnesty International, the United States has also failed properly to address allegations of extrajudicial executions, torture and ill-treatment carried out by U.S. soldiers on detained Afghan villagers. More recently, it has failed to investigate thoroughly the numerous occasions when innocent Afghans died as a result of US air strikes.

 Faced with American pressure, UN Secretary General Kofi Annan has failed to renew the mandate of Mary Robinson, the outgoing UN Commissioner for Human Rights.

A former President of Ireland, Mrs Robinson was an outspoken critic of U.S. treatment of Afghan prisoners and of Israel's treatment of the Palestinians. This was too much for Washington and she lost her job.

Bush's new 'first-strike' doctrine which is clearly in breach of international law and the UN Charter - is that America must be prepared to take preemptive military action even before any direct threat to it emerges. Bush seems particularly concerned to prevent, if necessary by military action, weapons of mass destruction being acquired by regimes, which the United States or Israel consider potentially hostile. "We must take the battle to the enemy, disrupt his plans, and confront the worst threats before they emerge," Bush declared at West Point military academy last month.

#### Iran's nuclear power

To quote a recent example of this way of thinking, The Washington Post reported this week without a hint of embarrassment that the U.S. and Israel

were discussing whether Iran's nuclear power plant at Bushehr, which the Russians are completing, should be allowed to open, or whether it should be destroyed by a pre-emptive strike, in much the same way as Israel destroyed Iraq's nuclear facility in 1981!

Such aggressive talk, appalling in itself, drives a nail into the coffin of an international order based on law. Its immediate effect will be to induce states, threatened in this way by the U.S. or Israel, to seek to acquire a deterrent capability as soon as possible and at any cost.

Instead of checking the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction, it will greatly encourage it. America's preoccupation with WMD proliferation is also deeply hypocritical, seeing that it turns a blind eye to Israel's extensive WMD capability, while pressing ahead itself with the development of battlefield nuclear weapons in violation of its obligations under the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty. The U.S. has also refused to ratify the proposed enforcement protocols to the Chemical and Biological Weapons Conventions.

These are just some of the ways the Bush Administration is undermining international law and taking the world back to the law of the jungle - a world in which the strong can do what they like, international law counts for little, and raw military power is the only thing that matters.

#### Covering Israel's crimes

A dreadful byproduct of American behaviour is the cover it provides for Israel's crimes, as it wages its cruel colonial war on the Palestinians without so much as a word of reproof from Washington.

In its recent reconquest of Palestinian territories and its wanton destruction of Yasser Arafat's Palestinian National Authority and of every vestige of Palestinian statehood,

Israel has behaved like a terrorist state. The latest example, characteristic of Prime Minister Ariel Sharon, was the recent massacre caused by dropping a one-tonne bomb from an F-16 war plane on a densely populated residential area of Gaza. The target was Salah Shehadah, the local Hamas commander, but a great many innocent people

As Dr. Menachem Klein, a 'dovish' Israeli academic, wrote this month in a British journal: "The existence of (Palestinian) civilians and their right to life have been deleted from the screen of Israeli consciousness.'

were killed as well.

An insight into the dangerous thinking of Israeli 'hawks' may be gleaned from a sinister remark by Moshe Arens, a leading Likud politician and a former minister of defense and foreign affairs. Following the killing of Shehadah, Arens declared: "This war will end only with our victory. Not in negotiations of one kind or another, or a cease-fire like this or that. Only our victory - and when we remember this, we'll also understand each and every

Meanwhile, as numerous commenta-

tors have noted in recent weeks, U.S. Secretary of State Colin Powell, usually considered a moderate, appears to have been defeated by the hawks in the Bush Administration, notably Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld and Vice President Dick Cheney.

Behind these hard-line members of the Bush Administration lie a phalanx of fervently pro-Israeli figures who have campaigned vigorously for U.S. military action to reshape the affairs of the Middle East in Israel's and America's interest.

They include Deputy Defense Secretary Paul Wolfowitz, Assistant Secretary for Defense Policy Douglas Feith, and Chairman of the Defense Advisory Board Richard Perle.

Under the Clinton Administration, the so-called 'peace process' was led and shaped by such pro-Israeli activists as Dennis Ross and Martin Indyk, who always sought Arab concession in Israel's favour. This was the main reason no peace was concluded with either Syria or the Palestinians in the decade after the Madrid Conference of

Today, when war rather than peace is

the priority, pro-Israeli activists in the U.S. Defense Department are in the ascendant. These men share a strategic vision of the Middle East dominated by the United States and Israel. One element of this vision, for which they are pressing hard, is the overthrow of Saddam Hussain, so as to bring Iraqi oil under American control and remove any potential threat to Israel.

Another is the breaking of the Palestinians' will to resist, so as to put an end to any hope of viable Palestinian statehood. A third is the 'taming' of Syria and Iran, the two powers which have so far resisted America's regional hegemony. The ultimate ambition is to defeat both Arab nationalism and militant Islam.

No doubt the next year or two will determine whether this vision is realistic or whether it represents the dangerous fantasies of a small group of men who have maneuvered themselves into positions of power in the United States.

# How to rekindle the peace process

wo weeks ago I and two colleagues, Foreign Ministers Ahmed Maher of Egypt and Saud Faisal of Saudi Arabia, had a series of candid discussions with President George W. Bush and Secretary of State Colin Powell, as well as senior officials of the European Union, the United Nations and Russia. The focus was on achieving both shortand long-term progress in the mori-

bund peace process. As Arab diplomats representing countries that have either signed peace treaties with Israel or, in the case of Saudi Arabia, successfully advanced a viable framework for comprehensive peace in the region, we were heartened to hear Bush reaffirm his personal commitment to a two-state solution.

The president was quite clear on this point. He is not backing an interim arrangement. He is not espousing a series of protracted negotiations with no clear definition or endgame. Moreover, he stressed the critical importance of a timeline - within three years - as a means of offering a real sense of hope to the Palestinian and Israeli peoples.

Our discussions were significant in another regard. We agreed that our differing opinions on the fate of the democratically elected Palestinian president, Yasser Arafat, should not deter us from working together on other aspects of the peace process and from pushing ahead toward achievable objectives. One such objective, on which we briefed senior administration officials, was the ongoing, high-level, intensive cease-fire negotiations with all Palestinian factions.

King Abdullah II of Jordan, during talks in Washington last week, outlined his proposals for the next logical step following the president's vision. He emphasized the need for a plan of action with three major components: a set of obligations to be fulfilled by both sides, acting in parallel; a timeline for reaching these goals; and a monitoring mechanism to guarantee enforcement, no matter which party is in violation.

As natural allies of the president's efforts to move the region toward peace and away from mutual assured destruction, both populations should be made aware of the plan. The two peoples must be constantly engaged to ensure that the tragedy of the past two years does not repeat itself. For the Palestinians, with nearly 1 million people living under military curfew and 70 percent below the poverty level, such a plan offers what Bush's vision hopes to achieve: a clear path toward ending the occupation, and an alternative to the horrific agenda of those espousing suicide attacks.

For the Israelis, the plan would include the historic commitment of 22 Arab states to end the conflict, and a real sense of security, provided by the whole Arab world, something no amount of electric fencing or Israeli military occupation could ever guarantee. The Arab initiative put forth at the Beirut Summit in March offers comprehensive peace in the region based on the internationally recognized formulation of "land for peace" - a return to June 4, 1967, borders in exchange for normal relations and a collective peace treaty.

Quite frankly, the one missing element is Israeli willingness to negotiate seriously and in good faith. Israel has not presented a credible plan that could realistically address even the most fundamental of Palestinian positions. Instead, for more than 22 months, the timing of Israeli assassinations and incursions has unerringly derailed whatever tenuous negotiations were underway. To be fair, so have suicide bombings. We continue to condemn these bombings as morally and politically wrong. But the only response we receive from the Israeli side is seizure of Palestinian land, deliberate delays to vital humanitarian relief efforts and promises - not of a return to negotiations but of more such actions.

None of these draconian measures has dramatically improved Israeli security. Senior Israeli defense officials have determined that a political solution is the only viable means of achieving lasting security.

The peace process should be strong enough to guarantee children under the age of 5 a life free of malnutrition. It should guarantee that they can board a bus for school without fear. It should guarantee them a future of economic and political opportunity. Today, sadly, it cannot.

The EU, the United Nations and the Arab world have heeded Bush's call for international cooperation to restore momentum to the process and, by doing so, infuse the region with some measure of confidence in the future. We have gone as far as we possibly can without strong American leadership. Now it is time for Bush to join us in pressing ahead. Only then can we expect Prime Minister Ariel Sharon to participate in a constructive manner. Otherwise, we are left without a peace partner and without the possibility of achieving Bush's vision.

# Old mosques, temples, and churches of Aden

den is a Yemeni city with a great history that dates back to more than 3,000 years and was always famous for being a trade hub where merchants used to transport, import, and export their various goods.

Having a long beach that covers it almost from all sides, Aden remains the most open Yemeni city to the world, particularly in religious aspects. Aden served as the home city of fascinated generations of different races and religions who lived in the city for long periods of time and left it with manifesting impressions of fond and beautiful memories leaving behind temples, churches, and mosques some that were

Among the religious fascinations in Aden are several religious buildings resembled in mosques, temples, and churches. Here a few examples were

#### The Aden Mosque

The Aden Mosque is among the oldest mosques in the Aden City. The mosque was built by Aban Bin Affan Bin Alhakam Bin Othman Bin Affan. Aban, a grand grandchild of third Muslmi Khalifa Othman bin Affan lived a religious life and was known for his admiration of Aden as a city. He died in Al-Madina Al-Munawwara in 763 AH (After Hijra). This mosque was rebuilt many times, and in the year 1996 AD it was completely demolished and reconstructed into a real mosque in the same location, resulting in the loss of its historical characteristics. The mosque was characterized by beautiful ornamentation.

#### Aidrous Mosque

This mosque is considered one of the famous mosques in Aden City and is situated in the Aidrous neighborhood of Aden. It was built by Wali Said Abubakar Bin Abdulla Bin Abubaker

1458 AD and died in 1508 AD.

#### Alhashimi Mosque

The Alhashimi mosque is located on Alhashimi Street in the Sheik Othman district and is ascribed to Hashm Bahar before it was demolished by some Islamic extremists in 1997.

Three pillars forming an oblong shape built in the year 1960 were ornamented in the front side of the mosque. The construction of a replacement mosque is currently taking place.

#### Alasqalani Mosque

It is located on Alasqalani Street and was quite famous for having a number of great religious scholars. The mosque was demolished and rebuilt in the

#### Other old mosques

Among other old mosques in Aden are Aliraq' Mosque, Alnoor Mosque both built in 1959 AD, Alrahman Mosque built in 1963 AD, Alrida

Al-Aidrous, who came to Aden City in Mosque built in 1967 AD, in addition to a number of other old mosques.

> Aden City also has some relics of Hindu temples and Jewish synagogues because of the presence of Hindu and Jewish communities in the past.

#### Shree Tricamiraiji- Haveli Temple

Located in Crater's Alasqacani Street, the temple was constructed in the year 1862 AD.

#### Sharee Ramji Temple

Located near the Police Academy College in Tawahi district, it was built in 1875 AD.

#### Hanoman Temple

Located in Sheik Othman district, the temple was accommodated in two lodgings for the Indian community. The temple was built in the year 1882

#### **Shree Jain Temple**

Located in Crater, it was also built in1882 AD.

#### Shree Natajee Nandhir and Shree Shankar Hanoman Temples

Both temples are located in Crater and were built inside a large cave in the nineteenth century.

#### **Shree Century**

Located in Holkat Bay in Crater, the century had a 99-year lease signed on 29th June 1932 AD.

Aden City also has a number of churches. Before independence of former South Yemen 3,500 Christians used to live in Aden City, and the most famous churches in Aden City are:

#### Saint Anthony Church

Built in the year 1839 AD, the St. Anthony church is located in the Tawahi district and a school was attached to it. In the past, the school was called Tarist Brothers' school.

#### St. Joseph Church

This church was built in the year 1850 AD and is located in Crater.

#### This school was once called the Roman Catholic Mission School

There is a school named St. Joseph's

High School attached to this church.

#### St. Mary Church

St. Antitony Church

St. Mary church is located on the hill opposite the group of Banks constructed in the Year 1871 AD in Aden. It was used for many purposes. Now it is serving as the building of the criminal technical investigation department.

Another unnamed church in Tawahi district built in the year 1692 AD is located in the Hafoon area.


#### Danish Mission School / Bookshop

Facts reveal that there was a Danish Mission in Crater in the 20th century. It ran a school by the name of Danish Mission School. It also had a bookshop called D.A Bookshop.

Keith **Falkoner** Mission Hospital/School

There also was a Christian mission located at Sheik Othman called Reith F. Mission. It ran both a hospital and a school under the same name. However, at a later stage the hospital was renamed to "Dr. Affra Hospital".

This variety in the different religious buildings in Aden, many which are preserved until today, stands as an example of the tolerance and understanding of Islam as a religion and Muslims of Aden as a people. The ones running and operating whatever temples and churches active in Aden emphasize that the non-Muslim foreign communities living in Aden are freely practicing their religious duties peacefully and without any disturbance. The authorities in the governorate of Aden have expressed their readiness and willingness to do whatever possible to provide those communities with any facilities they need to practice their religions with ease and comfort.



# Drugs registration system and pricing of medicine in Yemen (1-2)

presidential decree issued in 1975 reorganized the Supreme Board for Drugs and Medical Appliances (SBDMA) signaling Yemen as a pioneer in the Arabian Peninsula in the field of controlling and supervising the import of medicine into the country.

The main task of the SBDMA is to organize and control the import and pricing of medicine and medical appliances in Yemen. In order to achieve this, SBDMA adopted a registration system for imported drugs of all types. It advised foreign manufacturers that if they intend to export medicine to Yemen, they should first register them properly. A registration file containing certain certificates, scientific documents and other material should be set up for each and every drug imported into Yemen.

To control the retail price, SBDMA adopted a certain pricing structure to determine the public price. The board demanded from manufacturers to print the public price by non-erasable ink on the outer carton/packet of the medicine. SBDMA applied the registration system to pharmaceutical preparation including the so called OTC preparations. The board also applied the registration mechanism to medical appliances such as cotton wool, bandages, plasters, disposable syringes etc. but requested less documents for this group of products.

The price structure: from the export CIF price to the public price.

SBDMA adopted the following price structure (during 1980-1993):

#### I. Landed Cost:

This is the cost equal to the CIF price plus 20%

(The CIF stands for Cost Insurance

20% are included to the price against the following:

following: 1% -for obtaining the 'Import Permit'.

3% -for bank charges. 10% -for custom duty.

5% -for clearance, handling and transportation expenses.

1% - for damaged goods during storage.

Total 20%

Note: By the mid nineties, the Customs Authority reduced the customs of imported medicine to 5% instead of 10% which is applied until today.

#### II. Wholesale Price

This is the landed cost plus 10% (the 10% is the wholesale margin allocated for the importer/agent for ordinary medicine).

#### III. Public Price

This is the wholesale price plus 20% (the 20% is the retail margin allocated for the pharmacy). This percent was allocated for all items, either ordinary medicines, life-saving, bulky items (disposable syringes etc.), or OTC products.

Therefore, the price structure could be drawn in percentage as follows:
a) CIF: 100%

- b) Landed cost: 100% x (20%+) = 120%
- c) Wholesale price : 120% x 10%=132%
- d) Retail price (public price) is: 132%
   x 20%=158.4%

Note (1): By mid eighties, SBDMA realized that it needs to have an extra percentage on some items that are too bulky such as disposable syringes, cotton wool, bandages, I.V solutions, etc.. Those items have very low CIF prices, but their clearance, transportation and storage expenses are very high.



Yemen is a pioneer in the Arabian Peninsula in the field of controlling and supervising the import of medicine into the country.

Therefore, SBDMA allocated an extra 5% for clearance and transportation for such goods so that the landed cost for such products is CIF plus 25%.

Note (2): Some essential and vital drugs such as life-saving drugs and those indicated for very rare and special diseases are slow in sales. Therefore, SBDMA allowed a 15% (instead of 10%) as a wholesale margin for the importer, so that the wholesale price for such products is landed cost plus 15%.

Main slogan of SBDMA: "Medicine is a service, not a commodity"

This is why SBDMA decided that the 10% wholesale margin is enough for the importer to cover all other expenses such as: administration, marketing, stationery, rent of stores, salaries of employees etc plus profit. Actually, importers accepted such a low percentage despite the fact that this 10% is not enough to cover such huge expenses. Besides, SBDMA didn't include a single percentage as net profit for the importer

against his investment (capital), which is used for providing this medicine to the patient.

#### **Annual Statistics Bulletin**

SBDMA started in 1976 publishing its annual statistics bulletin. At the beginning, the bulletin started in low quality, but in time its contents and shape improved rapidly. The bulletin of 2000 was edited almost perfectly and came out in an excellent manner.

In its statistic bulletin for 1986, the board mentioned the following data:

It is clear that the increase in the import during 10 years (1976-1986) was almost 100%

Current Registration requirements: In October 1997, Ministerial Decree No. 233/10 specified the requirements for the registration of the manufacturer, the registration of the pharmaceutical preparation and the registration of the medical appliances (cotton wool, bandages disposable syringes). The decree adopted the registration and laboratory analysis fees. The decree also demanded that every three years, the manufacturer and its registered products should be reregistered, and half the stipulated fees should be paid.

(A) Requirements for registration of the manufacturer and registration fee:

- 1- GMP: a certificate issued by the concerned authorities in the country of origin and to be certified by Ministry of Health (MoH) and the Yemeni Embassy.
- 2- An independent GMP to be issued by an international independent institution for inspection. SBDMA issued a list of the recognized institutions that do this work.
- Site Master File: a comprehensive company profile with the details and diagram of the factory.

4- To pay US\$1,000 as a registration fee.

(B) Requirements for registration of a pharmaceutical product and registration

- Free on Sale: a certificate issued by the concerned authorities according to the format adopted by World Health Organization (WHO).
- 2- Certificate of a pharmaceutical product: to be issued by the concerned authorities in the country of origin and to be drawn in accordance with the format of WHO. This certificate should be certified by health authorities and the Yemeni Embassy.
- 3- Certificate of analysis results indicating the type of pharmacopoeia used for the analysis. Otherwise the manufacturer should send the method of analysis.
- 4- Declaration of prices in which the manufacturer should indicate the wholesale and public prices in the country of origin and the export CIF price requested by the manufacturer for the said preparation.
- Stability study of the specific pharmaceutical product intended to be registered. A stability chart should be accompanied with the study.
- 6- The manufacturer should send 20 pieces of the said preparation to for analysis.
  7- A comprehensive chart indicating
- various fees according to the features of the drug: whether it will be registered in its generic name or trade name, or whether it is mentioned in the National List for Drugs or not. Another comprehensive chart is set for the analysis fees: whether the sample of the product is for registration purpose or taken from the market or taken from the port.

## Ronaldo's agent talks to Real but no bid made

MADRID (Reuters) - Ronaldo's agent has told Real Madrid the Brazilian striker is ready to leave Inter Milan, the Spanish club's sporting director Jorge Valdano has revealed.

Valdano played down the chances of Ronaldo joining the galaxy of stars at the Bernabeu, though, saying Real were only "relatively" interested in the player, who led Brazil to World Cup glory by topping the scoring chart with eight goals.

Real would not be prepared to pay an "astronomical" sum to bring Ronaldo to the Bernabeu, Valdano said, and would not even consider a bid unless Inter decided they were ready to sell.

"Ronaldo's agent (Alexandre Martins) informed us that the player's intention is to leave Inter Milan," said Valdano, who was speaking in response to claims on a Spanish radio station that Real had signed the World Cup winner.

"I immediately spoke to Inter Milan directors, because we have a non-

aggression pact with their club. "The agent asked us if Real Madrid could be interested and what we want to make clear is that we would make no move unless Inter decided they wanted to sell.


"At the moment Inter Milan are not prepared to sell and Real Madrid are not prepared to buy.

"Some time ago, when some figures were put on the table, we were so far away we couldn't even get to 50 percent."

Real president Florentino Perez broke the transfer record twice in his first two years in charge to bring in Luis Figo for \$56 million from Barcelona and Zinedine Zidane for \$66 million from Juventus.

Ronaldo has experience of the Spanish game, having played a season at Real's great rivals Barcelona after moving to the Nou Camp in 1996 for a then world record \$19.5 million.

He scored 33 goals in 38 games that season as Barcelona won the European Cup Winners' Cup before joining Inter Milan for another world record fee of \$27.9 million.

# No to television replays anymore?

AUCKLAND (Reuters) - Sepp Blatter, president of world soccer's governing body FIFA, says he is opposed to the idea of using television replays to assist match officials.

Speaking after a meeting of the Oceania Football Confederation (OFC) had elected Australia's Basil Scarsella as OFC president, Blatter said: "As long as I am president of FIFA, I am totally opposed to artificial help for referees in FIFA-controlled metables."



"Any idea of television replays to sort out offside decisions or the like would take away the spontaneity of the game and destroy the human touch, which makes the game more popular."

Blatter acknowledged mistakes were made during the recent World Cup in South Korea and Japan, and that they had prompted scathing criticism from teams who believed they had been wronged by bad decisions from match officials, but said errors would always be made.

"The human touch is what is important, and while the matches are under the control of humans and not electronics, mistakes will be made," he said in Auckland. "But we must work hard to diminish them."



Coffee tree can be clearly seen grown in the northern, central, southern, and eastern parts of Yemen from Sa'ada in the north to Yafea'a in the south. The coffee tree also grows on the slopes of mountains valleys at the height of 100m-200m over sea level.

The total area planted with coffee trees represents 2.5% of the total arable land, that's around 33.000 acres spread over 12 governorates. Yemeni coffee is considered the best in terms of purity, low caffeine and side effects pesticides.
