Taiz experiences massive sit-in, citizens demand living improvements

TAIZ, August 15 - More than 10,000 citizens held a sit-in in front of the governorate building in Taiz in response to an invitation from the Joint Meeting Parties. Citizens protested many problems plaguing the governorate including price hikes of electricity, water, gas and cement, unemployment, poverty and corruption.

The protestors lifted banners that stated, "Water is evaporation and fire bills,"
"Stop fatal price hikes," "Taiz is the city of poverty, unemployment and drought" and "Bread and water are our demands." One of the protesters threw an empty plastic bag formerly containing wheat at the mayor's face while he spoke with Al-Jazeerah channel. The organizing committee along with the governor's heightened security contained the situation before it developed into anything serious.

Meanwhile, Dr. Abdur-Rahman Al-Azraqi, first secretary of the Yemeni Socialist Party, stated, "This sit-in came as a result of price hikes and unprecedented deterioration of citizens' living stan-

He went on to say that Taiz governorate suffers from many crises such as electricity and water price hikes, deterioration of health conditions as well as the spread of

unemployment among youth and poverty. Taiz has a population of 3.5 million. The governmental institutions suffer from cor-

Conflict continues between army and Houthis, optimism about mediation success

SA'ADA, August 15 - Tribal and media sources from Sa'ada revealed that a portion of Sahar district, north of Sa'ada city, experienced armed clashes between army soldiers and Houthi loyalists. These clashes coincided with negotiations between the two parties undertaken over the last two weeks. Both parties began digging trenches and barricades and equipping their sites with weapons, carefully monitoring actions from the opposing side.

Army soldiers shot and killed a Houthi member in Qataber last Wednesday. The incident incited sympathy among many tribesmen, arousing suspicion regarding protection of their lives in the event that they return to their homes, while the state refrains from issuing amnesty according to Al-Dawha agreement.

Media sources stated that Abdul Malik Al-Houthi mentioned the double-cross killing in a message directed to the presidential and Qatari committees last Monday. This was in response to a message delivered by the two committees to the Houthis two days before.

According to the source, the message Abdul Malik Al-Houthi delivered last Monday in Sana'a through a representative contained many inquires about the decree of amnesty as well as the issue of migration from Al-Naqa'h and Matrah areas. The message also inquired about the clashes of Wahsha and Haidan districts and failure to restore stability to the areas before

Field sources in Wahsha district informed that there are army troops, supported by hundreds of tribesmen, preparing a second attack on Shallal Mountain as well as neighboring mountains where Houthi loyalists are taking cover.

Ahmed Al-Sharafi, one of the Houthi field leaders, in a statement published by Al-Mustakla.net, stated that the army is supported by hundreds of tribesmen from different areas. Last Thursday, the army launched an attack

on Al-Mashaf Mountain, resulting in mass injuries and casualties on both sides. Houthi loyalists were subjected to a mortar attack last Tuesday. Those attacked did not exclude women, children and livestock, according to his

Despite application of the ceasefire agreement in Wahsha district, Al-Sharafi stated that conflict in the area has not subsided. This is due to the army's continued attack of Houthis, despite Houthi compliance with the ceasefire agreement. He went on to say that the army and its tribal supporters continue to breach agreement condi-

Ash-Shayif accuses National Solidarity Council of treachery

SANA'A, August 15 — A number of sheiks accused the National Solidarity Council along with its supporters of treachery and supporting subversive elements. This accusation was made in a meeting attended by close to 1,000 sheiks at the Sana'a home of Sheik Abdul Aziz Ash-Shayif, sheik of the Bakeel tribe, one of the greatest tribes in Yemen. The meeting aimed at standing against the National Solidarity Council headed by Sheik Hussein Al-Ahmar who is affiliated with the Hashid tribe.



The Hashid and Bakeel tribes are wellknown for their tribal rivalry.

The meeting, chaired by Sheik Naji Ash-Shayif, in a statement signed by a number of sheiks, announced their objection to the National Solidarity Council along with its suspected goals, inciting feuds and conflict among Yemeni citizens. It also said that sponsors of this council as well as participants do not represent Yemeni tribes, tribe sheiks or any other constituency of the Yemeni community. They only represent themselves and their party.

The statement also accused Arab countries involved in the council with supporting terrorism and interfering in country and citizen affairs. "Those countries had provided well-known parties in Yemen with money and weapons to practice such barbaric acts. Today we hear about establishing the so-called National Solidarity Assembly whose sponsors received financial support from Arab countries.

Ethiopian refugees exposed to police attack

SANA'A, August 15 -Dozens of Ethiopian refugees threatened that they will carry out a series of peaceful sit-ins, starting next week, outside headquarters of the United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR) in Sana'a. They stated that they will remain indefinitely until their demands are met.

The threat came despite government to interfere and solve their problems. Yemeni security interfer-

ence of the last Ethiopian sit-in, which took place on Sunday in Front of UNHCR's office In Sana'a. "We will carry out our peaceful strikes and hanger sit-ins until we get a clear and tangible solution," stated one of the refugees Daniel Gezahegen, who also talked about violence the refugees faced during the last sit in. He confirmed that strikers who began gathering at the headquarters around 10 a.m. on Sunday, were exposed to violence from the Yemeni police force who also closed all the roads while refugees conducted an interview with reporters of Yemen Times and Yemen Observer. The police forced the strikers to end their sit-in at 4 p.m. "They attacked us in attempt to disperse the demonstration. An Ethiopian widow who has HIV was beaten until her nose bled, although we warned the police officer of her situation. They also beat me with the back of their gun," said Gezahegen.

The refugees raised signs that stated, "Let the Yemeni government to interface in our serious problems," "We are inno-

cent and peaceful refugees," and "We have no protection. We are orphans of freedom, justice and human rights. We

are in a pit of darkness." According to the refugees, the police arrested some of them and forced them to write commitments to not strike again. "My husband was arrested with others. They were taken to detention where they were forced to give their names and names of other strikers. They also were forced to write a commitment that they wont come back to protest. My husband agreed to sign this paper because he is sick and cannot stay for long in custody whereas the others refused to sign so they stayed arrested," an anonymous female refugee stated.

A security source who wanted to remain anonymous revealed that UN officials called them saying that some refugees were threatening them. The source confirmed the release of all refugees who were arrested. He did not deny or confirm that refugees were beaten during the sit-in.

Enhancing university lecturers' performance

Aug 12 - Universities of Taiz and Dhamar are organizing an international conference on enhancing performance of university lecturers for two days. The conference, which will take place in Taiz, will include experts from Yemen and abroad. Thirty two scientific research and working paper will be presented in the conference which will be divided into six themes, most important of which is the role of the university lecturers in achieving the purpose of universities and the career development of their professors as well as the requirements of higher education staff.

19th medical camp

Aug 11 — The nineteenth medical camp in Marib started two days ago and will continue for two weeks. It was organized by the Ministry of Health and includes services in eye diseases, ANT, general surgery, skin diseases...etc.

The Ministry of Health carried out field visits to the President's hospital where the camp took place and evaluated its requirements of equipments and staff before the camp started. The first phase of the camp continues for one week and aims at carrying 400 free operations as well as providing medications for more than 3000 cases.

Tourism preparations for Khaliji 20

Aug 12 — The general authority for tourism development in Aden has finalized its plan in preparation for Khaliji 20, the sport events to take place in Aden at end of 2010. The plan improving accommodation services through hotels and rental apartments as well as enhancing the outdoor recreation parks and gardens...etc. The plan also includes improving the transportation network especially from the hotels to the ground fields where the sport events will take place.

Locusts attack agricultural lands

Aug 11 — Head of the agriculture and irrigation office in Rada'a at Al-Baidha governorate reported that great amounts of desert locusts have attacks agricultural lands of an area estimated around 500 hectares. The locusts attacked crops, vegetable, and fruit plantations. He confirmed that the monsoon season and heavy floods are partially responsible for the increased breeding of locusts in Rada'a, which has not witnessed an attack of locusts at this level for a long time. Further, he indicated that his department is in close coordination with the Ministry of Agriculture and the center for fighting desert locusts in Sana'a so as to exert more efforts to deal with this plague.

Awareness activities on AIDS

Aug 12 - The General Health and Population office in Mahwait governorate is planning a number of educational and awareness activities on AIDS and sexually transmitted diseases during the second half of this year. The activities include field visits, distribution of leaflets and brochures, as well as information communication methods to barbers, physicians, and medical staff. Youth camps and assembly points will be one of the main targets for the awareness activities.

India celebrates sixty years of Independence

SANA'A, Aug. 15 — The 60th Anniversary of India's Independence Day was celebrated yesterday, August 15, at the Embassy of India in Sana'a.

In a colorful function, attended by more than 450 Indian nationals, persons of Indian origin, and friends of India settled in around Sana'a, the Ambassador of India H. E. Mr. R. M. Aggarwal unfurled the Indian National Flag, and the children, of the Indian Embassy in School, sang the National Anthem. The ambassador also congratulated the gathering and the Indian community in Yemen. Worth-mentioning, there are about ten thousand Indian citizens, and 100,000 persons of Indian origin living in Yemen.

The Ambassador then read out the "Address to the Nation" delivered on the eve of Independence Day by Her Excellency Mrs. Pratibha Patil, the first woman President of India.

"Having traversed sixty long years since independence, it is time for us to introspect on the progress achieved so far and ponder over the future course of action. We have excelled in many areas; and in many others we still have immense scope for improvement," said Mrs. Patil in her address.

In her address, she endorsed the importance of fostering equilibrium in diversity, which is the hallmark of democracy. "What sets our nation apart is that in spite of crises-crossing of a plethora of culture, languages, religions, customs, faith and traditions, our people are bound together in unison by a deep-rooted secular Indian identity," she said.

The ceremony was followed by a Cultural program presented by children of the Indian Embassy School in

The group will also perform in Aden on the Sunday, August 26, at 8:00 PM at the Palestine Hall.

Local councils and district managers prevent locust control

SANA'A, Aug. 15 — Director-General of Yemen's Desert Locust Control Center Abdu Fara Al-Romaih complained that some directors of local councils as well as district managers in Hadhramaut and Shabow resisted locust control teams sent to exterminate infected areas.

Such resistance is due to bee husbandry farms in these districts, which might be affected by pesticides. Locust control teams face many difficulties during their work. "We give these areas three days to move away the bees to safe places otherwise the teams will leave these areas without solving the problem of locusts," Al-Romaih stressed, adding, "There are some people who refused to remove the bees and let the teams to do their work because of their personal

Daily reports are sent to the Ministry of Agriculture about the latest developments of the locust control teams, but the ministry's interaction with the teams is minimal. "We inform the Ministry of Agriculture about the problems we face with such local councils and some citizens and we only receive words without them doing anything for us," Al-Romaih

An intensive campaign will continue in Hadhramaut and Shabow on Thursday. There is an extermination scheduled for Al-Mahra governorate. "The number of locust flocks is bigger



Days ago, a few locust flocks arrived in Sana'a, giving many people the chance to catch the insects. Groups of children and youth gathered on Al-Sabean Street, where swarms of locusts appeared, and started the hunt.

Yemen in 1993. But we plan to control desert and reach different areas of the the situation at the end of next month, September." Al-Romaih stated.

In Sana'a, groups of locusts blanketed the sky over Al-Saba'een field, destroying its vegetation. However, Al-Romaih ensured that locusts spreading in Sana'a are coming from outside of Yemen and they are few in number, despite citizen calculations

It is the nature of locusts to fly to different areas, especially during rainy weather which helps increase the amount of locusts. "The main reasons for the spread of the locust swarms in the governorates are the environmental conditions that were suitable for their spreading,

than the huge number that appeared in and, also these locusts start from the governorates," Al-Romaih noted.

Groups of locusts that have begun to appear on Sana'a have inspired hundreds of people to gather and watch these insects leap through the air, catching and bottling them.

Many citizens have started to collect the locusts everyday in big bottles and sell them in the main Yemeni markets. such as Bab Al-Yemen market. According to some citizens, the cost of the locusts has reached YR 1.500, more than the cost of meat. Some people believe that the meat of locusts is a medicine for many diseases, especially dia-

Yemen and Sudan sign an agreement in the petroleum field

ADEN, Aug. 15 — The Aden Refineries Company and the Sudanese Ministry of Energy and Mining signed last Tuesday a minute of

cooperation in training the two countries' cadres in fields of gas,

refining oil, and earthquake monitoring, serving the economical interests of

both countries. The two sides agreed also on having joint conferences, exchanging

technical proficiencies and visits, as well as benefiting from the countries' experiences in this view.

The Deputy Minister of Oil and Minerals Abdul Malik Alamah and the Undersecretary of Energy and Mining Ministry Hamad Abdul-Qader Al-Nile signed the minute.

According to a report for the Yemen times, Alamah said that the agreement on this minute happened since the end of the second course, which held in Sana'a between Yemen and Sudan in the petroleum fields.

The Oil Ministry is serious in modernization Aden refinery for about \$24-40 millions, he added. "We had, in the second course, clear and determined fields for the cooperation as well as the mechanisms of the implementation. We expect reaching clear and practical things in oil fields." Al-Nile confirmed.

"The points of meeting between Yemen and Khartoum are that the old Bor Al-Sudan refinery and Aden refin-

ery are from the same kind. But, Aden refinery has specific aims, where as Bor Al-Sudan refinery is stopped now", he clarified

"The reason is, first and foremost, we wanted to establish a refinery, which fulfills the internal requirements. Now we are about to establish a refinery for exportation. Aden refinery produces internally and we hope to start with new and big units and to establish a new refinery which can export the products oversees", Al-Nile

He concluded his statement with saying that his visit to Yemen was completely successful, calling upon the implementation of agreement.

Saudi Arabia allows the entering Yemeni Umrah seekers

SANA'A, Aug. 15- the Saudi Ministry of Haji and the Islamic Affairs approved 16 contracts of the Yemeni agencies of Umrah, beside 4 agencies which had approved in advance.

These 4 agencies are from 28 Yemeni traveled agencies, despite the expiry of the time limit set by the Saudi Hajj Ministry, Hassan Aal Al-Sheikh, the deputy of the endowment, explained.

Due to the good relationships

between the two countries, the Saudi Crown Prince Sultan Bin Abdul Aziz has given directives to the Ministry of Hajj to accept the Yemeni agencies of Umrah submitted by the Yemeni Ministry of Religious Endowment and Islamic Affairs.

Al-Sheikh also called upon the agencies to comply with the conditions and stipulations to avoid such problems in the registration so as to ease the path before the Umrah seekers.

President instructs \$2 billion for electricity & job opportunities

SANA'A, Aug. 13 — The President of the Republic Ali Abdullah Saleh instructed the government last Monday to assign \$ 1billion so as to accelerate producing electricity power to cover the power shortage. He also allocates another \$ 1 billion to create job opportunities to the huge number of unemployed peo-

Saleh pointed out to the participants of the 4th General Conference of the Cooperative agricultural Union that he is trying to solve the critical and significant situations of the shortage of electricity as well as the steadily accelerating unemployment.

"We are looking forward to come out of the conference with positive and fruitful outcomes to avoid deficit aspects which occurred during the last period", the President said.

He also stressed that the government should seriously solve the perplexing problem of unemployment which is of high rate in Yemen.

Recent studies referred that Unemployment in Yemen increased sharply due to the government failure to improve the economic policies and enhance the life standards of Yemen. According to the 2006 annual economic report, unemployment average in Yemen has rocketed up since 2003 - 05 to 34%, which is regarded as the biggest number

The report stated also that the number of young people graduating every year from universities and private institutions reaches up to 188000 graduates, while the available annual vacancies are not more than 16000 jobs.

Unemployment in Yemen is a real

hassle facing the development as it has economical and social effects. The person average daily income has been affected due to the recent price hikes and the increase of unemployment. Studies conducted by both local and international institutions show that poverty is the main cause of violence and crimes.

The young people spend their time hanging around in the streets, committing violence and crimes as a result of unemployment.

The electricity, on the other hand, is not in a good condition too. Yemeni people all over the country suffer from unbearable power shortage.

"It is a received habit that the power goes off daily for one to two hours. Sometimes during the exam period the power keeps on flashing continuously and we can go with that, but in Ramadan, it is unbearable", a 25-yearold young man working in Trust Yemen Company said.

"The President pledged during his recent electoral campaign to enhance the power shortage with nuclear power and we are still waiting", he continued.

According to Yemen's Public Electricity Corporation (PEC), the country's electricity distribution network is inadequate. Currently, it is estimated that only 40 percent of the total population in Yemen have access to electricity from the national power grid. Even for those connected to the grid, electricity supply is intermittent, with rolling blackout schedules maintained in most cities. In order to meet the growing demand (up to 20 percent between 2000 and 2004) and to avert an energy crisis in the medium term, Yemen's Electricity and Water Ministry has plans to increase the country's power, generating capacity to 1,400 megawatts (MW) by 2010.

Yemeni economic corporation caters for providing flour and wheat

Sana'a, Aug, 15 — The Yemeni Economic Corporation catered for pro- Habari, the famous businessman, said in Republic governorates. The General Manager of the corporation, brigadier Ali AL-Kuhlani said that the corporation along with its branches will provide the consumers with their needs of flour and wheat via direct selling centers distributed in all the governorates of the

Republic. Al-Kuhlani also said that strict measures will be taken against any employee who manipulates and goes against the rules. Further, he will be referred to Prosecution.

Likewise, Mahfoudh Shamakh, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce, pinpointed that the decision of the government is courageous and is in need of reviewing. Further, he indicated that the decision came amid accusations of tradesmen, importers, retailers, and government over the wheat issue. The burning question is who is responsible for what is going on within such accusations? We find that the opinions contradict each other. Mahfoudh went on to say that importers do not increase the

He also declared that the importers sell one bag of wheat at YR 2500. However; some people purchase it and sell it at 3000 at the same moment. He mentioned what the President had said regarding some food suppliers' increase of the foodstuff prices while they are piled up in their stores.

Shamakh maintained that the mistake lies in the trading style, which is the policy of starvation, especially, when the stored wheat bags are sold with new

He also affirmed that the government has faults because it did not establish mills to store for wholesale and retail tradesmen. So, they can get reasonable

gains, emphasizing the importance of selling at retail in all areas.

These statements came after what Altradesmen of being accountable for these price hikes as well as monopolizing wheat import. Al-Habari also went on to say that the price hikes taking place in the Yemeni markets have no relations with the international price

In his statement, according to September net, Al-Habari stated that there are some tradesmen who have great quantities of wheat stored in mills since before prices go up. These stored quantities are now sold at the new prices, indicating the avarice and greed of those tradesmen.

Worth-mentioning, the prices of wheat progressively increase since the presidential elections run in September last year. The price of one bag with capacity of 50kg reached at YR5000 while the quotation listed in the state-run press is YR 4000.

However, the president criticized the government for being unable to stabilize prices of wheat and flour, approving a new operation to generate electricity and to provide job opportunities for unemployed people. The operation was valued at two US\$ billions. He granted the Economic Corporation with additional amounts valued at YR three billions to purchase and import wheat to face demand of this primary foodstuff.

Worth-noting, the monthly consumption of wheat in Yemen reaches 200,000 ton. However, 94million ton is consumed annually.

The reports of Arab Union for Food Industries indicate that the annual consumption of Arab region is one hundred million ton of cereals, of which 50million ton is wheat. One billion loaves is eaten daily. And, the value of importing wheat reaches US\$ 5 billion annually.

Taiz experiences massive sit-in

Al-Azragi considered the meeting held by the governor and opposition parties last Monday as a news copout that does not convince even children. He also said that promises pledged by the governor have been raised before while crises are growing steadily.

Ahmed Al-Maqrami, head of the Islah party media committee in Taiz, pointed out that the government should take the demands of the citizens into consideration regardless their political affiliations. The government must treat all citizens equally without showing preferential treatment to those affiliated with the General Peoples

Al-Maqrami added that the sit-in is a peaceful expression which will be followed by other sitins if the government does not meet citizen demands related to human rights such as equal access to water and electricity, alleviating poverty and fighting unemployment as well as price hikes. He advised the government to take heed to the Taiz sit-in to prevent similar sit-ins from occurring in other governorates.

Rashad Saif, representative of Al-Wahdawi party, affirmed that the JMP did not seek to incite conflict with the authority by carrying out this sitin. He went on to say, "The citizens are fed-up with the tedious and monotonous pledges. It is time now for the government to hear the citizens voice who suffer from living crises." The most important issue that Taiz suffers from is water accessibility, he stated. The government could not find a solution for this problem, despite massive amounts of water being wasted. The unreasonable price hikes have driven citizens crazy while the government remains unresponsive This could lead to a human disaster in the coun-

The governor, Ahmed Al-Hajri, invited chairmen of the JMP, members of Parliament, media and local officials to an open dialogue in which he delivered a seemingly cooperative speech, attempting to stop the sit-in by reviewing a number of provisions to resolve Taiz problems.

Al-Hajri went on to say that he will struggle to the last moment before handing over control of Taiz to another governor in the upcoming election, three to four months away. He expressed his wish that the local council will choose the

right leader The meeting between the governor and the JMP emphasized the importance of privatizing the sea and air ports as the public sector has failed to administer them successfully. Al-Hajri pointed out that electricity teams assumed their duty in most of the governorate districts, aiming at installing electrical power in 80 percent of the governorate within three years.

Al-Hajri stated that success is dependent or unity. If there is a failure, the local authority will work diligently to correct itself. He also praised MPs for their commendable efforts at following up on projects in their districts, highlighting the actions of Islah MP Abdul Hameed. "Taiz is the governorate that brought up unification and the most beneficiaries of its services," he main-

The governor declared, "The governorate has taken four measures to resolve the problem of water. They are represented by repairing and rehabilitation of the network so as to reduce the loss with 90 percent. The governorate has established many barriers to recharge the ground water basins. There are some studies on the possibility of desalinating water of Al-Hawjalah area. All these measures will be done through an

investment project in hand of Saudi investors and Hail Sa'eed An'am.'

Al-Hajri urged citizens to be patient for one year only, pointing out what will be achieved in the exceptional plan of the next year.

Representatives of the opposition confirmed their solidarity with the sit-in. Sadig Al-Ba'dani. from Islah party, along with Sultan Al-Samai, affiliated with the Yemeni Socialist Party, directed sharp criticism of current conditions in the governorate. Al-Ba'dani revealed that flights from the area airport have decreased from 1.500 to 150 between 1984 and 2004

Ethiopian refugees

UNHCR's protection officer was on leave so no one was authorized to comment.

This is not the first demonstration arranged by Ethiopian refugees in front of the UN refugee office. The refugees, who have lived in Yemen since 1991, have arranged many protests demanding citizenship in Yemen as well as resettlement in another country.

"We feel that we are exposed to social and racial discrimination in Yemen. We are not allowed to travel from one region to another Even if we want to integrate into the Yemeni society it's difficult without the citizenship, but the Yemeni government said that the refugees can continue living in Yemen under refugee status but did not show interest in offering the refugees citizenship. So the only option that we have is resettlement in a third country," Gezahegen stat

UNHCR officers in Sana'a have stated many times that the refugee agency cannot offer citizenship to refugees. It is the responsibility of a host country. Additionally, they confirmed that the UNHCR cannot offer a refugee resettlement status because that decision rests on the shoulders of another country

Conflict continues between army and Houthis

He also added that the army laid siege on people seeking shelter in Shallal Mountain and neighboring mountains. The siege has enclosed the area for seven months, interrupting the supply of food and medication to the region's vil-

Al-Sharafi stated, "We are sure that the army is preparing during the next hours for a gross massacre, however, we are ready for them, adding, "We are still sticking to our commitment in terms of ceasing fire preventing bloodshed of Muslims. Though they continue setting fire at us we did not retaliate in the last period. But we will be obliged to defend ourselves in case they carried out their creep toward the mountain."

Al-Khaleej newspaper revealed that the leader of the Houthis presented a schedule to resolve the conflict between his movement and the state. This schedule lasts for 23 day in lieu of the 20-day timetable specified by the Qatarsponsored committee assigned to implement the ceasefire agreement

In a plan delivered to the chairman of the Qatari-delegation, Nassir Al-Ateeyah, along with other members of the presidential committee Abdul Malik Al-Houthi declared, "The mechanism of his plan must consider the suffering of people. This mechanism must have a positive role in reducing the suffering of thousands of evacuated people. These people must have the priority to get benefit from the agreement as they were the first disadvantaged people in the war.

Al-Houthi's 23-day timetable included five

days in Haidan district. The plan called for the ceasing of fire in Juma'at Bin Fadhl. Thwaib and Jaza'a areas, in addition to ceasing the construction of barricades, descending from mountains, evacuation of the army from currently seized homes and property and returning control of villages and farms to citizens. The army must also allow displaced people to return to their villages and homes, providing those whose homes were destroyed with tents and other necessities

as well as releasing detainees. The above conditions were also to be applied to Saqeen, Razih, Kataf, Qataber, Baqem, Maiaz, Al-Safra' and Sahar districts.

Additionally, Al-Houthi stated that he is ready to release detainees belonging to the army in return for the release of his followers. He hoped that the committee will review lists, which include names of mountains and mountain passes belonging to Matrah and Al-Naqa'a areas. He demanded the recording of missing people as well as compensation.

Media sources revealed that the United Nations World Food Program (WFP) approved a new operation to provide food assistance to 36,000 people displaced by the conflict in Sa'ada governorate in North-west Yemen. The threemonth operation, which is valued at \$1.3 million is a continuation of the organization's previous two-month operation, through which some 20,000 displaced received assistance during June and July.

The International Red Cross, in a report published at the outset of the current month, criticized what it described as a "security restriction" imposed on its movements in Sa'ada, limiting its assistance to displaced people inside the city limits and neighboring areas

"Through WFP presence in Sa'ada and our assessment of the humanitarian situation, we

came to the conclusion that food assistance must continue: however, we anticipate that during this period, a durable ceasefire agreement and a political solution to the crisis would be reached and maintained. This would enable the displaced persons to return to their homes and resume their regular livelihood activities. Mohammed El-Kouhene, WFP representative in Yemen, stated

The amount of displaced people increased in Sa'ada due to continued conflict in the area over the last one month. This is attributed to renewed obstacles in implementing the ceasefire agree-

According to local sources, governmental concern for displaced people is non-existant. In the agreement signed by the government and Houthis, and sponsored by the Qatari delegation, authorities did not stipulate any conditions for returning displaced people to their homes or compensating them for damages incurred.

Forty-seven prisoners detained due to the Sa'ada crisis started an open food strike, protesting against the continuation of their detainment for months without just cause. The prisoners live in miserable conditions inside the

Al-Shoura.net stated that the 47 detainees in Al-Nussairiyah city in Hajah continued their strike for the second day, aiming at pressing the authorities for their release. They have been imprisoned for more than six months without prosecution or accusations directed against them. They were all imprisoned by security forces. Authorities detained hundreds of citizens in a number of governorates, most of them students studying legal sciences in Zaidi schools or affiliated with the Zaidi sect. Detainees are said to have no relation to the war.

Most of the detainees belong to districts of Hajah governorate. Their relatives have appealed to the human rights organizations to assist in the release of their illegally detained relatives.

The Yemeni Organization for Defending Rights and Freedoms announced its solidarity with the detainees, considering detention without any direct accusation a breach of law and constitution. The organization demanded the release of the detainees, expressing its worries about the state restriction of freedom of thought and attack of the Zaidi sect. It also invited all civil society organizations to stand against such irresponsible actions, demanding particular solidarity with the relatives of Hajah detainees

The statement also invited all Yemeni citizens along with their respective tribes to foil the destructive objectives of the National Solidarity Council and stand against all conspiracies against the values and principles of Yemeni peo-



Youth Consultative Council:

A bright initiative struggling to survive

"It's a huge step towards democracy," said Abdu Alaziz Abdu Al-Ghani who heads of the Consultative Council describing Yemeni Youth Consultative Council (YCC). Many people haven't heard of this council because of many reasons, such as lack of financial support and conflicts within the members themselves, especially between the secretary general panel and the presidential board.

So, what's this council? How does it operate? Does the council affect Yemeni youth or is it just an empty

Those questions were directly taken to Walid Al-Ariqi, a 28 years old young man who is president of the council. Al-Ariqi is an accountant graduated from Sana'a University; he is working with a non-governmental organization called the Democratic Social Forum. Al-Ariqi founded and is currently heading the youth development center at the Forum. He is also the General secretary of Takamul Arab Youth

Wojoud Hasan Ali Mujalli interviewed him for Yemen Times.

Mr. Walid, first of all, thank you for taking time for this interview with us and I'd like to start by asking you about the council, what is YCC?

Well, thank you for giving me this opportunity to explain about the youth council. YCC is a national youth organization consisting of 111 members, representing different NGOs, political parties and national education organizations. The council started as a project proposal introduced by Mr. Gamal Al-Shami head of the Democratic School to National Endowment for Democracy in USA. The project was accepted and was granted \$40,000 US. The mission of this council is to encourage the spirit of voluntary work among youth and provide them with opportunities to participate in civil society and social work. Al-Shami then directed invitations to NGOs and civil societies as well as political parties to recommend one of their members to represent them in the youth consultative council. This is how we got the diversity we have today, keeping in mind that all of this is on voluntarily basis. The members are to present studies and suggestions to enable youth to solve or recommend solutions of national issues.

How is the council organized and managed?

The council consists of the main committee, which is represented by the president and two vice- presidents, and there are 10 different council committees. The council committee are as follows: Anti Terrorism and extremism committee, Anti Corruption committee, Revenge killing committee, Poverty and illiteracy fighting committee, Smoking and Qat fighting committee, Democracy and Civil Society support committee, Human Rights and freedom support committee, Media and Culture committee, Health and Environment committee, and Law and Constitution committee.

The council's structure seems quite sophisticated, but what is the operating mechanism?

The council holds a general meeting once every six months to discuss specific youth issues and the council's plans. The agenda of the meeting are defined by the presidential board of YCC or by the secretary general panel.

However, each committee panels holds a monthly meeting to discuss the tasks and achievements of the their committee and they operate all year round. The council issues a quarterly publication in which the activities and issues are

Can you tell us about the recent activities of the council?

Recently we had a seminar about terrorism in coordination with the ministry of interior. Celebrations ended... problems still persisting

29th anniversary of President Ali Abdullah's Saleh's stay in power as he assumed throne of North Yemen on July 17, 1978? This year's celebrations on July 17 were unusual. They were the greatest and the nosiest from among all the national and religious celebrations so far held in Yemen. Similarly, the official media devoted much of its programs to speeches, addresses and poems praising Mr. President and his regime.

The echo of Yemen's celebrations on the occasion reached the worst Arabic Language satellite channel, run by a Tunisian national, who is professional in flattering. Except for this notorious channel, no space television channel, be it Arab or international, said something about the July 17th anniversary being celebrated in Yemen.

Anyway, such celebrations don't justify any allegations that they drew the attention of those interested in the Yemeni affairs. They raised negative questions about the real motives behind their organization in such an exaggerated way. It appeals to the

minds of judicious people that motives behind staging the celebrations are merely meant to cover the persisting crises and problems, which the country is going through. In addition, these crises and problems increase citizens' sufferings and exacerbate their living standards.

The worst one from among the celebrations was the morning cultural activity, during which spokesman of the Yemeni Interior Ministry declared that the Ministry of Information staged the activity in front of the Cabinet, where civil community organizations were holding a sit-in. The sit-in was protesting the violations exercised against journalists and press freedom in Yemen.

The Interior Ministry's spokesman called the place, where the cultural activity and the sit-in were staged at a time, the Square of Democracy while protesters gave it the name 'Square of

activity, held by the Ministry of Information, is that participants came with jambias glittering in their hands and some of them brought their personal pistols with them. They attacked and beat protesters and destroyed the seats, which protesters were sitting on. They tore down the slogans, which

protesters were raising and caused various injuries among them. The educated people gathered by the Ministry of Information haven't killed any one of the protestors, who were assembling in the same manner for two consecutive days.

This kind of celebration lacks all the meanings of judiciousness and reasonability. Only lies and hypocrisy prevail the general atmosphere in the country, and disgust and disappoint people. I never believe that Mr. President, who is known for his shrewdness and cleverness, knows nothing about such facts. I believe that Mr. President is enraged by those who

fabricate facts and tell lies, and therefore reprimands and insults them. He hates all those who save no effort in exercising hypocrisy and telling lies.

As far as I am concerned, Mr. President needs to listen to the other kind of voices and then makes a distinction between what is authentic and what is machinated for deception. He is more able to examine seriousness of these voices, as well as their content.

What is mostly remarkable in this year's celebrations of July 17 is that they tried to show a negative response to the public rage, which is the result of real political crises and the poor living standards experienced by the majority of Yemen's population. Frankly speaking, such behaviors originate from a wrong hypothesis, which is based on the belief that the Yemeni people are stupid and lack the sense of differentiating between what is working well and what is not. According to this belief, the Yemeni people can be easily neglected and their feelings as well as attentions are possible to be drawn away from realizing the real problems facing them.

This country's regime is misfortunate

because its own mechanism of propaganda uses an ancient system that never cares for people and their daily issues. Instead it scorns people and inflames their feelings. Such an outdated system doesn't care for teaching people how to have more patience in the face of adversity. It only triggers people's negative reactions to trivial matters.

From the political viewpoint, the negative effects of these celebrations prove that Yemen hasn't yet obtained real democracy, particularly as we see that the countries of monarchical regimes have nothing of these celebrations. They don't care for marking the first day of their monarch's assuming power. What they do is celebrate the national days of their independence or unity. Remorsefully, this year's July 17 celebrations took place at a time the Yemeni people were suffering very difficult political, economic, and social conditions. Yemen should have taken a lesson from what happened to the former Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein and his regime.

his observer, along with millions of devout, faithful and sincere Moslems throughout the world, are somewhat puzzled and are often outraged by the tactics adopted by some of the selfdeclared Jihadists of the world. More than that, many knowledgeable Moslems are at a loss in finding jurisdictional, dogmatic and textual reference relied upon by the latter in Islamic literature, which reveal that such tactics emanate from or even fit in with conceptually. Furthermore, any true faithful Moslem would



find many of the tactics employed by those who profess to be carrying the banner of Islam as actually being contrary to the interest of Islam or providing any hint of short-term or long-term support to any Islamic cause. In short, such tactics as senseless suicide bombings against non-Moslem civilians, not to mention the ones against members of the Islamic community, even if under sectarian pretexts; kidnappings of unarmed "foreigners", who have entered Moslem countries legitimately or with good and peaceful intentions; hijackings of civilian aircraft, the projection of a crude or uncivilized image and the rejection of any Moslems, who may differ in the interpretation of dogma on minor secondary issues and matters of religious doctrine all tend to reflect a serious effort to corrupt the real civilized nature of Islam and to render it unattractive to any misinformed witness or observer in these modern times. When such actions emanate from misguided Moslems, who profess to work for the restoration of an "Islamic State", which is actually viewed as having been a total failure, even if viewed outside of a Moslem context, is really problematic. Surely the failure of the Taliban regime could undoubtedly be attributed to its poor comprehension of the real essence of Islam as truly being a powerful social reform doctrine, with reason, logic and compatibility with human nature as essential elements of any application of Moslem dogma. On the other hand, any applications of Islamic dogma that fails to encompass, mercy, tolerance, respect for all people, who do not display any animosity towards Moslems is for all practical purposes absolutely incongruent with Islamic fundamental principles and render the followers of such incongruities as heretical to Moslem doctrine.

One would think that the Taliban would know all the foregoing without fail, being as they profess to be true Moslem "orthodox fundamentalists". That they would undertake such violations of Islamic principles, when they were a "state' may be rationalized (but of course not justified) by a sense of arrogance. But nevertheless such misdeeds are unforgiveable in the Islamic context and surely do a great disservice to the proper reflection of true Islamic dogma. It goes without saying that the current methodology employed by self declared Jihadists, has no precedence in the actions of many generations of Moslems since the time of the Prophet Mohammed (peace and blessings of Allah be upon him), who, as the Holy\Quran states "was sent as a mercy for all the Universes¹. In this context then, it would be viewed as being self-defeating, if improprieties such as the kidnapping of the 22 Korean hostages would be construed as being in service to their declared cause of liberating Afghanistan, not to mention such an act being totally incongruent with Moslem teachings.

As long as those who wish to carry the banner of Islam continue to fail to understand their own religion, then it is hard to believe that the Al-Mighty would ever think of supporting them or bringing them any closer to their goals. America's day of reckoning

he pessimists who have long forecasted that America's economy was in for trouble finally seem to be coming into their own. Of course, there is no glee in seeing stock prices tumble as a result of soaring mortgage defaults. But it was largely predictable, as are the likely consequences for both the millions of Americans who will be facing financial distress and the global economy.

The story goes back to the recession of 2001. With the support of Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan, President George W. Bush pushed through a tax cut designed to benefit the richest Americans but not to lift the economy out of the recession that followed the collapse of the Internet bubble. Given that mistake, the Fed had little choice if it was to fulfill its mandate to maintain growth and employment: it had to lower interest

rates, which it did in an unprecedented way – all the way down to 1%.

It worked, but in a way fundamentally different from how monetary policy normally works. Usually, low interest rates lead firms to borrow more to invest more, and greater indebtedness is matched by more productive assets.

But, given that overinvestment in the 1990's was part of the problem underpinning the recession, lower interest rates did not stimulate much investment. The economy grew, but mainly because American families were persuaded to take on more debt, refinancing their mortgages and spending some of the proceeds. And, as long as housing prices rose as a result of lower interest rates, Americans could ignore their growing indebtedness.

In fact, even this did not stimulate the economy enough. To get more people to borrow more money, credit standards were lowered, fueling growth in so-called "subprime"

mortgages. Moreover, new products were invented, which lowered upfront payments, making it easier for individuals to take bigger mortgages.

Some mortgages even had negative amortization: payments did not cover the interest due, so every month the debt grew more. Fixed mortgages, with interest rates at 6%, were replaced with variable-rate mortgages, whose interest payments were tied to the lower short-term T-bill rates. What were called "teaser rates" allowed even lower payments for the first few years: they were teasers, because they played off the fact that many borrowers were not financially sophisticated, and didn't really understand what they were getting

And Alan Greenspan egged them to pile on the risk by encouraging these variable-rate mortgages. On February 23, 2004, he pointed out that "many homeowners might have saved tens of thousands of dollars had they held adjustable-rate mortgages rather than fixed-rate mortgages during the past decade." But did Greenspan really expect interest rates to remain permanently at 1% - a negative real interest rate? Did he not think about what would happen to poor Americans with variable-rate mortgages if interest rates rose, as they almost surely

Of course, Greenspan's behavior meant that under his watch, the economy performed better than it otherwise would have. But it was only matter of time before that performance became unsustainable.

Fortunately, most Americans did not did not follow Greenspan's advice to switch to variable-rate mortgages. But even as short-term interest rates began to rise, the day of reckoning was postponed, as new borrowers could obtain fixed-rate mortgages at interest rates that were not increasing. Remarkably, as short-term interest rates rose, medium- and long-term interest rates did not, something that was referred to as a "conundrum." One

hypothesis is that foreign central banks that were accumulating trillions of dollars finally figured out that they were likely to be holding these reserves for years to come, and could afford to put at least some of the money into medium-term US treasury notes yielding (initially) far higher returns than T-bills.

The housing price bubble eventually broke, and, with prices declining, some have discovered that their mortgages are larger than the value of their house. Others found that as interest rates rose, they simply could not make their payments. Too many Americans built no cushion into their budgets, and mortgage companies, focusing on the fees generated by new mortgages, did not encourage them to do so.

Just as the collapse of the real estate bubble was predictable, so are its consequences: housing starts and sales of existing homes are down and housing inventories are up. By some reckonings, more than two-thirds of the increase in output and employment over the past six years has been real estate-related, reflecting both new housing and households borrowing against their homes to support a consumption binge.

The housing bubble induced Americans to live beyond their means - net savings has been negative for the past couple of years. With this engine of growth turned off, it is hard to see how the American economy will not suffer from a slowdown. A return to fiscal sanity will be good in the long run, but it will reduce aggregate demand in the short run.

There is an old adage about how people's mistakes continue to live long after they are gone. That is certainly true of Greenspan. In Bush's case, we are beginning to bear the consequences even before he has departed.

No laughing matter

n the post Sept. 11th world, I learned several things. It is easier to hate a stranger than to hate someone you know. And, anger often appears as "hate" when coupled with excessive fear and lack of knowledge.

There is a rising sense of hatred, of "anger gone wild" in America against Arabs and Muslims because of Sept. 11. And there seems to be a growing resignation among Palestinians and Israelis that peace and compromise are no longer possible.

Peace and compromise are always possible. What has changed, though, is attitude. People are discouraged by the unending violence, the failure of the peace process, and the increased negative rhetoric and speech.

Do we just stand by and allow extremists to control us? Or do we take unorthodox steps to remind everyone that we are both human beings and that peace and compromise are in fact the only alternatives to the conflict and violence?

After Sept. 11, I decided to turn to the most powerful form of communication that exists between human beings. Humour. Not just any kind of humour, but stand-up comedy. Stand-up comedy is a controlled kind of humour, involving social satire and sometimes biting commentary, which not only seeks to entertain but to deliver important messages.

Humour alone can't resolve conflicts like the decades-long Palestine-Israel conflict, but it can change attitudes. It

can restore a person's belief in the humanity of the other people. It can cause people to see each other in a positive way that can nurture improved relations. If people can laugh together, we can live together.

I first tested the theory in a show in East Jerusalem in Oct. 2004, at the residence of the American Consul General. More than 75 Israelis and Palestinians attended.

To press the need to bring humour to Palestinians and Israelis, I co-founded with Israeli comedian Charley Warady the Israeli-Palestinian Comedy Tour (www.IPComedyTour.com), appearing with Israeli comic Yisrael Campbell and African American Jewish comedian Aaron Freeman.

In January and again in June, we performed 10 shows in Israel for mixed but mostly Israeli audiences, and in East Jerusalem for mostly Palestinian audiences. In May, The Israeli-Palestinian Comedy Tour performed in Toronto, Canada for more than 1,200 people, mostly Jews and Palestinians.

There has been some opposition. Some Israeli comedians said they couldn't appear with me because it might harm their careers.

For Arabs, appearing on stage with "Israelis" is considered haram (against values) and is not the same as appearing with "Jewish comedians." Five Arab organizations cancelled my scheduled performances for them in the two weeks after returning from the first tour in Israel and Palestine. Other Palestinian and Muslim comedians have blacklisted me from their festivals and TV shows.

I don't mind the rejection because the

acceptance is overwhelming.

After the 2004 show, the consul general said it was "the first time in three years" Palestinians and Israelis had come together in the same room. After the Toronto show, the auditorium's entrance filled with hundreds of Palestinians and Jews who actually talked and laughed together.

We need to do more of that.

During the January tour, a suicide bombing in Eilat made us question whether we should continue. We decided we had to continue because we would not allow one terrorist or a group of extremists to control our lives.

The violence of a few should be reprimanded to the few. We must strive to believe that the majority of Israelis and Palestinians who are not involved in the violence are people who are angered and frustrated but not necessarily hateful of others.

We went on with our shows reminding audiences that the terrorists and extremists do not speak for the majority of Palestinians or Israelis.

We can have compromise and peace if we stop demonising each other; the best way to do that is through humour. And that's no joke.

Fisheries Industry: Not doing so good

lthough Yemen has a coastline stretching for over 2000 kilometers across the Red Sea, Gulf of Aden and Arab Sea, Yemen's marine wealth has been facing a number of obstacles towards proper utilization of this asset. Yemen's marine wealth is estimated at 850 thousand tones allowing the production of 350-400 thousand tones per annum to maintain sustainability; however, Yemen's annual production did not exceed 290 thousand tones, mainly generated through the unorganized fishing sector consisting of around 65.000 fishermen according to official numbers.

Furthermore, governorate of Al-Mahara, which accommodates around 90,000 people (0.45 percent of population), is responsible for producing around 98.1 thousand tones of fisheries, estimated at over 41.5 percent of the country's total fisheries production, while other coastal governorates such as Hodieda and Aden are responsible for 9 percent and 4.9 percent of fisheries production respectively.

It is noted that Al-Mahara's fisheries production been growing in spite of the limited government interference and the underdeveloped financial and services infrastructure which might be offered to fishermen, apart from the non-existence of private-sector

enterprising initiatives which can develop the fishing industry in the governorate. This fact indicates that Al-Mahara governorate has promising potential to further increase the production of fisheries, while showing the strong contrast with the production of other governorates.

Corrupt Ministry of Marine Wealth

A recent parliamentarian report accused the Ministry of Fisheries and Marine Wealth of being the biggest obstacle against the development of the fisheries industry in Yemen, the report accuses the ministry of issuing and renewing licenses to local and foreign fishing companies to fish within 4 and 5 miles from the coast, in spite of an existing law which forbids issuing licenses for fishing companies within 21 miles from the coast. Marine experts indicate that shallow waters are breeding grounds for many types of fish as it protects them from sea currents, while fishing within this area is hazardous to the reproduction of fish and seriously diminishes sustainability of marine wealth.

The report also listed many violations by the Ministry of Marine Wealth including the leasing of a research vessel, which was donated by an international donor to the center of Marine research, to a commercial fishing company, one of the companies which were granted licenses to fish within the forbidden fishing zone.

Complaints and reports of incidents where commercial fishing vessels have

been shooting at local fishermen in territorial waters in order to scare them away, reports stated that at least one fisherman was killed and tens were injured of such incidents, many of which have been reported to the Ministry but no action has been taken by the Ministry to follow up or gather details in this regard.

Several sources at fishermen associations has accused the Ministry of conspiring against Yemeni fishermen, claiming that the Ministry

is simply an agent working for International fishing companies, including Jordanian, Thai, and other Asian companies, however, they refused to give more information about such allegations.

MP demands a supreme council for

Member of Parliament AbdulKarim Shaiban has told media sources that he demands the set-up of a supreme council for fisheries which should have authority over the Ministry in order to 'rectify the wrongs' and administer the country's marine wealth, Shaiban held the Ministry responsible for the damage affecting the fishing industry and the inefficient management of the funds allocated to the Ministry.

He said: "Millions upon millions of dollars have been spent in order to build and reform this Ministry, but it is hopeless, the many organizations this Ministry has set up in order to undertake fishing activities and provide further funding for the government, so far the returns have been less than 0.25 percent and we are very disappointed to see all funds going to this Ministry going down the

He also added: "take for example Nashtun fishing port which coasted the government US\$ 40 million, it was set up and funded after a detailed proposal that this port will revive fishing but the port has not been operational since construction."

Say what?

The 2006-2010 third poverty reduction plan allocated over 32.3 billion Rivals as planned investments in the fisheries sector, including 10.5 billion Riyals of donor funds which are expected during the years 2006-2010. the largest chunk of these funds are allocated to the coastal development program which aims at providing government support for traditional and unorganized fishermen, using funds exceeding 13.3 billion Riyals over the span of four years.

Another 9.5 billion Riyals have been allocated to the Program for Fisheries development, a program with a scope limited to monitoring regional waters, buying more vessels and technical research equipment to know more about Yemen's ecological and marine wealth. While the third program was allocated 8.17 billion Riyals to research is basically a turnaround strategy that aims at providing a vision towards better economic management of fishing organizations and developing fishing ports as well as storage facilities.

The remaining amount goes to the ministry of marine wealth; it

specifically states that it will be used in building more buildings, buying more vehicles, and, of course, acquiring a state-of-the-art information database.

Minister: I'll do better

Minister of Fisheries and Marine Wealth Mohammed Sagheri has promised the Parliament that he will look into the problems and issues within the Ministry that impede developing the fisheries industry,

promising to implement all the suggestions the Parliament's report highlighted including implementing the fisheries law, which seemed to many Parliament Members as a good idea. The Yemen-Times has tried repetitively to contact the Ministry to verify several other allegations of corruption claimed by fishermen's associations, however, there was no cooperation from the Ministry's







Therefore, people can have the chance to improve their living standards if they are welleducated and well-qualified.

The third reason is the separation of family. For instance, suppose that there are problems between mother and father, which might be solved wrongly, of course, by divorce. It aims at involving and attracting Arab tourists especially those coming from Gulf countries as well as activating tourism locally.'

He added that the festival is unique as it aims at developing economic and trade activity inside the country through engaging a large number of beneficiaries and dealers in its marketing as well as expanding tourism awareness. It also supports the national economy and growing developmental concerns.

The festival is very important as it is staged in Sana'a. The city of Sana'a is heavily populated and is the third city included on the international heritage list in addition to its cultural and heritage preservation.

Sana'a Summer Festival is not limited to heritage and technical shows, but also includes trading markets inside the garden, showcasing traditional antiquities, gifts and man-made products including silver decorations. The most outstanding and prominent products are rings composed of jewels inlaid with Yemeni

The Chinese team performed acrobatic shows and other activities while the Egyptian National Circus Troop performed many concerts at Al-Saba'een Park. It was the troop's first appearance in Yemen after accepting an invitation from Yemen's Ministry of Tourism.

Despite bouts of heavy rain in Sana'a, a large crowd of Yemenis from different governorates gathered for the Ahmed Bukhatir festival held on August 8 in Al-Saba'een garden. Bukhatir's sweat voice resonated in the Yemenis' hearts and overshadowed the evening's resilient

Italian town to pay residents to shed flab

verweight residents of an Italian town will be paid to lose weight, the mayor said on Monday.

Men living in the northwestern Italian town of Varallo will receive 50 euros (\$70) for losing 4 kg (9 pounds) in a month, Mayor Gianluca Buonanno said. Women will get the same amount for shedding 3 kg (7 pounds).

If they can keep the weight off for 5 months, they will get another 200 euros (\$280), he told Reuters.

"Lots of people are saying, 'I really need to lose some weight but it's really tough.' So I thought, why don't we go on a group diet?" said Buonanno, who said he was about 6 kg (13 pounds) overweight.

The town of 7,500 people started the campaign on Friday and some residents have already signed up, he said.

Around 35 percent of Italians are overweight or obese, according to European Union figures, with waistlines expanding as the country's healthy Mediterranean diet has given way to processed foods rich in fat, sugar and salt.
