AI-Khaiwani frequently attacked

The editorial staff of suspended Al-Shura weekly had on 18 October issued a statement affirming that two inmates in the Central Prison in Sana'a had attacked Abudlkarim Al-Khaiwani, editor-in-chief of Al-Shura, Monday afternoon.

Described as "urgent and important," the statement added that two others had assaulted him on Sunday October 17.

The statement accused unnamed sides to be intending to harm Al-Khaiwani psychologically and physically

The editorial staff charged the director of the Central Prison with concocting the attacks against Al-Khaiwani, holding the director responsible for any consequent harms occurring to al-Khaiwani.

The staff appealed to the Minister of Interior Rashad Al-Alimi, Minister of Human Rights Amat Al-Alim Al-Suswa, and the local, Arab and international public opinion to render protection for Al-Khaiwani against frequent attempts to inflict harm on him.

The staff also accused the prison's

authority of putting Al-Khaiwani among prisoners convicted of crimes, some of whom sentenced to death, without providing any protection measures in his favor, putting the responsibility of any possible harm inflicted on Al-Khaiwani on the judicial, security and political authorities.

"Continued detention of Al-Khaiwani is a shocking title for the ongoing violations against Al-Khaiwani as a journalist, writer, political activist, and human being.

Meanwhile the statement called on journalists, NGOs and political parties to continue seeking his release. Al-Shura staff urged Arab, regional and international organizations concerned with freedoms to maintain pressures on the government to free Al-Khaiwani and not to be satisfied with promises until he is outside prison.

Before the recent attacks, Al-Khaiwani had been assaulted by convict inmates. Some believe the attackers were incited by certain parties interested in demoralizing Al-Khaiwani and compelling him to ask for sympathy and pardon of the state.

Some 16 human rights organizations working in Yemen called last week for

the immediate release of Al-Khaiwani.

A statement signed by leaders and representatives of such organizations declared that their request was based on their belief in the freedom of the press and expression guaranteed by the Yemeni constitution and international conventions to which Yemen consented.

The statement was also signed by members of Amnesty International, journalists, and academics from Sana'a and Aden universities.

Meanwhile, the defense team of Al-

Khaiwani and Al-Shura sent a letter to President Saleh, Chairman of the Supreme Judiciary Council, explaining to him about the investigations and trial procedures of Al-Khaiwani, and asking him to intervene to secure his freedom. On the other hand, the Islamic

Is it just more bureaucracy?

Government to get more control of NGOs

Yemeni authorities intend to set up a new plan to control the foreign funding of the NGOs operating in the country,

Mr. Ali Saleh Abdullah, deputy minister of social affairs said in a workshop on the "Future of NGOs Work in Yemen that started last Monday that his ministry along with the ministry of planning and international cooperation will address the funding NGOs and embassies to assist the Yemeni government in "controlling and organizing the funding presented to the Yemeni NGOs.'

He said that his ministry is to set a new form to register the NGOs in place of the license that used to be issued to these NGOs to start operating.

"We have gone through the process and reviewed it several times and came to find out that there is no legal license; we do not exercise unaccepted monitoring or supervision; we do not want to turn into a policeman controlling the NGOs; we just want to know what is going on. In fact, we do not interfere into the business of these NGOs in the common security manner," he pointed out.

The Yemeni official did not say if such step has to do with the fight of the

fund-raising for terrorism purposes. However, the Yemeni authorities have already taken some step to control some of the suspected NGOs.

The new step has been attacked by some legalists and advocates who consider it as illegal. Advocate Mohammed Allow who participated in the workshop run by Civil Society Forum that this step" is a drawback to the reign of totalitarianism that was prevailing pre-unification."


He stressed that there has not been any change in the law of NGOs except for changes of names, adding that, it gives the state the right to license or stop the set-up of NGOs which has brought about its interference in the work of these NGOs.

According to the 2004 statistics of the Social Affairs Ministry, the number of the registered NGOs mounts to 4,576, out of which only 2,941 operate within the framework of the NGOs law, according to Mr. Saleh.

On his part, Jamal Eddin al-Adimi of CSF pointed out that the constitution has given privileges to NGOs work, but the law has restricted this to a great extent in addition to the bureaucracy of the Yemeni officials when they come to enact it.



Ambitious vision the first of its kind in region Mokha to get \$550 million tourist project

The Al-Kabatily company for oil investment and services in Yemen intends to implement the biggest tourist resort at the port of Mokha, the governorate of Taiz at a cost of approximately \$550 million.

It is expected to be the first of its kind in the Arabian Peninsula and the Gulf.

The company's chairman of the board of directors Sultan Othman al-Kabatily has affirmed that the resort would include the construction of a residential city composed of 100 villas, 100 chalets and a number of 5-star hotels.

The entire project is expected to be

finished in six years.

In a press meeting held recently during the constituent conference of the Arab Organization for tourist development held in Sana'a, Mr al-Kabatily told journalists that the project's objective was attraction of the local tourist and saving for him the sums of money he spends on tourism abroad.

The project also focuses on attracting family tourism in addition to offering services to foreign tourists.

The tourist project is to be situated in the city port of Mokha, renowned of growing the Yemeni coffee in an area called the Wadi al-Malik, which is an area of spacious palm tree groves in a form of crescent.

Mr al-Kabatily has also said that he found an encouragement in the law of investment in Yemen as his company has not faced any hindrances in the

presentation of his project.

He added that the goal from building the huge tourist resort was the attraction of tourists to eco-tourism and to serve development in the country.

The Yemeni government supported project is expected to create job opportunities for the unemployed, during the stage of building it and after its operation.

Meanwhile the Arab Company for Development Tourist and Investments, affiliate of the Saudi Bin Laden Group, is preparing for the implementation of a Tourist Village project situated on the mount of Haratha in the city of Ibb.

That project is to be constructed on area of 127,000 square meters at a cost of \$25 million. The project comprises a five-star hotel, a group of villas and service utilities.



More than 40 participants in a workshop held in Aden during 3-8 October issued the Aden Declaration in which they requested the Arab governments to establish the Arabic Court for Human Rights. They recommended setting up national plans for human rights that go proportionally with the current conditions of the Arab coun-

Being the fourth in a successive number of courses on human rights, the workshop was organized by Human Rights Information and Training Center (HRITC) and the Arab Institute of Human Rights in collaboration with the U.N. Higher Commissioner of Human Rights. More than 11 Arab countries participated in the event.

The conclusion session was attended by Amat al-Aleem al-Suswah, Minister of Human Rights, who delivered a speech stressing the contribution of HRITC in organizing the course and

pointing out the role the center played in promoting human rights.

Ezaddeen al-Asbahi, Director of HRITC, greeted in his speech the participation of the minister of human rights considering it a source of inspiration and encouragement for the center. He also praised the participants for coming up with the declaration, which he hoped could be implemented on the ground. Then Mr. Farag Fensh, human rights' representative in the Middle East and North Africa spoke on the participants' behalf expressing the significance of the course as well as the work

in this field.

In a statement to Yemen Times, Mr. al-Asbahi said "the participants learned many things about the legal and philosophical background of human rights and the relation between the economic, social, political and cultural aspects of human rights and the international legislatures, besides several other issues." The participants were also given certificates recognizing their participation in the event.

diabetic patients in Taiz have reportedly complained about poor services of the Health Office of Taiz Governorate. They raised complaints about insufficient quantities of Insulin, which is prescribed for them in monthly doses. They claim that such medicine is mostly provided by International donors and is then sold for benefit of certain individuals.

Yemen Times received a copy of the memorandum directed by the Republican General Hospital Management in Taiz demanding the

Health Office and the Medical Supplies to provide the Insulin quantity prescribed for more than three hundred and sixty patients. The memorandum in question indicated that the hospital didn't receive more than ten vials caused to the hospital tremendous difficulties in delivering the appropriate medication to diabetic patients. The reply by the Medical Supplies Office to the memorandum aforementioned that there was a deficit in its budget and could not have sent any more medicine. The response also mentioned that nothing could be done until more quantities are received from the Regional office

Somalis in Yemen are looking for a better future

ope is running high among Somalis living in Yemen now that a new president has a chance to stabilize and rebuild the war-ravaged country. "I have high expectations and I am very

happy about our new president," said Usman Omar, Vice President at Somali Community Center in Sana'a. "For 13 years we have experienced ongoing warfare, but now we have a president who has the qualities to lead a nation."

Last Thursday, Abdullahi Yusuf Ahmed was sworn in as Somalia's president in Nairobi, Kenya, after Inter-Governmental Authority on Development headed a twoyear peace process and was elected by the country's interim parliament. Over the coming weeks, Ahmed will put together a cabinet, and a new government will move to Mogadishu, Somalia's capital, in the near future.

In a United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees recent report, around 80,000 Somali refugees and those seeking asylum reside in Yemen. Over 400,000 Somalis have fled their country as the country's civil war has continued since Mohamed Siad Barre's regime was ousted in 1991.

Many Somalis in Yemen have expressed confidence in the new president.

"The president is a good leader because I believe he has the power, the will and the ability to have authority," said Abdul Rahman Jama, a Somali who has been living in Yemen for 11 years. "He is able to unify the country and bring everybody together.

Ahmed has a military history being a colonel in the Somali army. He was jailed in 1969 by Barre for not backing a military coup, fought against Barre in the eighties and led Puntland as an independent region in northern Somalia.

The last attempt to bring peace to the country came after a conference carried out in Djibouti in 2000. Abdulkassim Sala Hassan was chosen as president, but he was unable to persuade tribal groups to lay down their arms and unify the country. He controlled only a small section of Mogadishu and a few areas outside the capital

"The president is different than the previous one, so it is a good chance that he will do some good for the people," said Abdirizak Dhilo. "I believe he will be the president to bring unity, peace and stability while the world stands behind Somalia.

Along with their country becoming stable, Somalis are also looking for a growing economy and job opportunities to consider returning home.

"If the government creates a peaceful country, I will return," said Jama. "But what I also want are job opportunities so that I can support myself.

Many Somalis acknowledge that Ahmed has many challenges ahead. Somalia is one of the poorest countries in the world. According to The World Bank, 43% of the population lives in extreme poverty, living on \$1 a day. Only 17% of the children are enrolled in primary school, and with limited healthcare, life expectancy is 47 years. This month, the UN Food and Agriculture Organization reported that Somalis are affected by high levels of malnutrition in a number of areas across the country

Unifying the country will not be an easy task. Mogadishu, which has been divided between factions during the ongoing civil war, is home to an estimated 60,000 armed men belonging to clans that hold different parts of the capital. One powerful warlord in Mogadishu, Adbinur Ahmed Darman, is believed to not recognize Ahmed as president. Last week, some of his militiamen fired at journalists while trying to interview people at "Camp Bosnia" refugee camp in the capital.

During his inauguration, Ahmed asked the international community to send peacekeeping forces to help disarm the militias and secure Somalia. But due to a fight that left 17 US soldiers and hundreds of Somalis dead while US and UN forces supported international aid during a famine, countries might be reluctant to commit troops.

"It might be better if the Somali leaders and people created peace without outside help," said one Somali in Yemen. "If it is done from within, there may be fewer problems.

Some Somalis question the choice of Ahmed being the leader to take on the task of ending over a decade of warfare, however. Some are worried about Ahmed's record of being involved in the civil war.


"Some of us are worried having a president who participated in warfare," said a Somali in Yemen. "We are not certain that the new government can bring us solutions, and it might have been better if the

president came from civil society, not from a war background."


Others are concerned that because of Ahmed's support from Ethiopia, there might be opposition in some areas of Somalia since there have been land disputes between the two countries in the past. "The president may not be liked in Mogadishu because he is close to Ethiopia. There might be armed clashes while he is trying to bring peace to the capital," said a Somali

But despite the challenges the president will face, many Somalis in Yemen hope that the steps taken will lead to a brighter future after over a decade of instability and ongoing fighting.

"I now have high hopes and expectations," said Abu Bakr Abati. "We now have a government, a real government. I believe there will be peace, and all we want is peace. Most of my family lives in Somalia, so now that there will be changes, I want to go back.

Lack of resources a major issue **University life is** filled with challenges

he life of students can be a controversial topic. It's seen as a symbol of struggle or a store of troubles. It can bring the bitterness of suffering and the grandeur of knowledge. Students have a real struggle against obstacles and difficult circumstances.

The Yemen Times made a survey in Sana'a University to show what students face, to let you see what hinders them to record better achievements. The list included a series of problems. Which ones get the priority is the question.

Sexual discrimination

It is a phenomenon that is present globally. It, however, varies from country to country. Women usually complain of discrimination, but it is not always the case. Muneer Al-Humaidi, a fourth-level students, English department, says that the main problem that disturbs his peace is the discrimination between boys and girls by some teachers as well as officers in the university.



Fasting is an additional safety device for the repair processes of the body and the brain. Sleeping during Ramadan is much deeper than in other times. Two hours of sleep during Ramadan are more satisfying and refreshing than more hours of sleep otherwise.

During fasting, serum magnesium is increased. Magnesium has cardio-protective effects and it is being used in prevention and treatment of heart attacks. It has antiplatelet properties and prevents extension of the clot, and prevents cardiac and cerebral dysrhythmias. It also prevents the formation of atheroma as well as dissolves atheromatous plaques, which are responsible for heart attacks and strokes. Hence, fasting takes an active part in the rejuvenating processes of the body.

During fasting, there is increased secretion of the growth hormone by the pituitary gland. It is an anabolic hormone for synthesis of proteins and collagen, which produces a positive nitrogen balance.





Two Palestinians, Israeli killed in Gaza, W. Bank

GAZA, Oct 19 (Reuters) - Israeli soldiers killed two Palestinian gunmen in Gaza on Tuesday and Palestinian militants shot dead an Israeli in the West Bank.

The violence followed the killings of five Palestinians in gun battles with Israeli troops on Monday, two days after Israel ended a 17-day offensive in north Gaza in which 105 Palestinians, three Israelis and a Thai farm worker died.

An Israeli military spokesman said soldiers opened fire on two Palestinians as they crawled toward Gaza's border fence with Israel with the apparent aim of planting a bomb.

Palestinian security sources said they had been informed by Israeli authorities that two gunmen had been killed in a confrontation east of the north Gaza town of Beit Hanoun.

In the northern West Bank, Palestinian gunmen shot dead an Israeli near the Jewish settlement of Mevo Dotan, Israeli security sources said.

The Israeli news web site, YNET, said it had spoken with a commander of al-Aqsa Martyrs Brigades who claimed responsibility for the attack on behalf of the group, part of Palestinian President Yasser Arafat's Fatah faction.

Mortar attack kills four Iraqi National Guards

BAGHDAD, Oct 19 (Reuters) -Insurgents killed four Iraqi National Guards and wounded up to 80 others in a mortar attack on their base north of Baghdad on Tuesday, the U.S. military and the Iraqi Defence Ministry said.

A Defence Ministry statement said the attack occurred at Tarmiya, about 25 km (16 miles) north of Baghdad. "Four Iraqi National Guards were killed and up to 80 wounded in a mortar attack on an Iraqi National Guard base," a U.S. military spokeswoman said.

U.S. helicopters helped evacuate the wounded after the attack at 9:45 a.m. (0645 GMT), a military statement said.

Iraq's nascent security forces are frequent targets for insurgents bent on driving U.S.-led forces out of the country and undermining the U.S.-backed interim government.

Kidnappers seize charity chief in Baghdad

BAGHDAD, Oct 19 (Reuters) -Kidnappers seized the British-Iraqi head of an international charity group in Baghdad on Tuesday and later she was shown sitting anxiously and alone in a video broadcast by an Arabic television station.

Margaret Hassan, who has dual nationality and has lived in Iraq for about 30 years, was seized by kidnappers at 7:30 a.m. (0430 GMT), a spokeswoman for Care International in London said.

Her capture comes just two weeks after militants in Iraq beheaded another Briton, engineer Kenneth Bigley. Two Italian aid workers kidnapped and held in Iraq last month were later released.

Hostage-taking, suicide bombings and sabotage have kept Iraq in bloody chaos since last year's U.S.-led invasion.

The Care International spokeswoman said Hassan had grown deep roots in Iraq.

"We want to stress that she sees herself as an Iraqi. Iraq is her home. She has been living there for many years and would never consider coming back to Britain," she said.

Hassan is the head of operations for Care in Iraq. Most international aid agencies withdrew their foreign staff after two Italian women aid workers were kidnapped last month.

The Italians were released after three weeks. Kidnappers have taken scores of foreign hostages since April and killed at least 35 of them. They have also targeted Iraqis seen as cooperating with U.S. forces or the interim government.

Arabic Al Jazeera television later aired footage of Hassan after her capture, sitting in a room and looking anxious. It showed close-ups of her identification cards and said an unnamed Iraqi group had said it had kidnapped her.

A militant group led by Jordanian Abu Musab al-Zarqawi, America's top enemy in Iraq, said it had beheaded Bigley and two Americans seized with him last month.

British Prime Minister Tony Blair, who was attacked by Bigley's brother Paul for not doing enough to save him, said his government would do everything possible to secure Hassan's release.

"This is someone who has lived in Iraq for 30 years, someone who is immensely respected, someone who is doing her level best to help the country," he said.

"It shows you the type of people we are up against, that they are prepared to kidnap somebody like this."

STRIKES ON ZARQAWI TARGETS U.S. planes struck overnight at what the military said were Zarqawi-linked targets in the rebel-held city of Falluja.

The government has threatened to attack Falluja unless Zarqawi's men are handed over, as part of its drive to pacify all of Iraq before parliamentary elections due in January.

U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan said a crackdown on rebels in hotspots like Falluja had to be carefully calibrated. "In these kind of situations you have two wars going on," he said in London. "You have the war for minds and hearts of the people as well as efforts to try and bring down the violence."

U.S. Secretary of State Colin Powell said his country was doing all it could to enable Iraqis to conduct elections.

"It's still possible to have the kind of election we want to have by the end of January. The key is security and building up Iraqi forces to make them competent, fully equipped and able to do the job," he told USA Today newspaper in an interview.

The United States has asked staunch ally Britain to send troops now based in southern Iraq to more volatile areas closer to Baghdad to free up U.S. units to fight insurgents.

Britain is expected to agree in the next few days to the request. A British team was on the ground on Tuesday to look at the logistics of such a move, which has revived anger in Britain to Prime Minister Tony Blair's support for the war.

bid 'dangerous'-Green MEP

Referendums on Turkey EU

ISTANBUL, Oct 19 (Reuters) - Any future referendums on Turkey's European Union membership would set a "dangerous" precedent by stoking anti-Muslim sentiment in Europe, a leading European Parliament lawmaker said on Tuesday.

EU candidate Turkey hopes European leaders meeting at a December summit will set a date to begin entry negotiations next year after the bloc's executive commission said this month Ankara had made sufficient human rights reforms to start talks.

But French President Jacques Chirac's promise to put Turkey's membership to a public vote when the time comes has stirred debate about whether this populous Muslim nation belongs in overwhelmingly Christian Europe.

"I am against referendums in one country against another. A referendum about Turkey ... I think its very dangerous," said Daniel Cohn-Bendit, the Greens' parliamentary leader, who was exiled from France for 10 years for his role in the 1968 unrest.

"Can we guarantee that a referendum won't be on whether (voters) like Turks or not? It won't be a question on whether you want to integrate, but a referendum on 'Do you like Muslims?" Cohn-Bendit told reporters at an Istanbul conference on Turkey's EU prospects.

Under pressure from a public largely opposed to Turkey's entry, Chirac said this month France would hold a referendum on whether Turkey can join in some 10 years time when negotiations with the

bloc are expected to draw to a close.

Italy's right-wing Northern League party, part of the coalition government, also came out on Monday in favour of a referendum on Turkey's membership, despite widespread Italian public support for Ankara's bid.

Germany's opposition party, the Christian Democrats, also opposes Turkey's full membership in the bloc, but has said it currently has no plans to push for a referendum. Under Germany's constitution referendums are not allowed. Cohn-Bendit acknowledged the integration of Turkey, a relatively poor country of 71 million people, would be a difficult process that would require a different approach to that adopted with other EU candidates.

"We need a special negotiation between Turkey and Europe because Turkey's integration is a special problem that is much more complicated, much more difficult for Turkey and Europe," said Cohn-Bendit, who supports Turkey's EU bid.

"The integration of Turkey is a big historical move."

Darfur faces unprecedented food crisis-ICRC

GENEVA, Oct 19 (Reuters) - Villages throughout Sudan's Darfur region face an "unprecedented food crisis" worse than the famines of recent decades, the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) said on Tuesday.

The warning was based on a study of food supplies in 20 selected villages across the huge region where villagers — those who have not taken refuge in camps — reported they had more trouble coping than in earlier severe droughts, it said.

ICRC officials interviewed 400 villagers and made house-to-house visits in all three provinces last month after poor crops, looting and theft of livestock, a spokesman said.

"Most rural communities in north, west and south Darfur are facing an unprecedented food crisis, worse even than the famines they faced in the 80s and 90s," the ICRC said in a statement. "Insecurity is the root cause of the col-

lapse of agriculture and trade in Darfur," it added.

The United Nations has threatened sanctions against Sudan over what it calls one of the world's worst humanitarian crises. The United States has called the violence in Darfur genocide.

Attacks on villages by bomber planes

and militias on the ground since a rebel uprising began in early 2003 have helped to drive more than 1.5 million people from their homes.

A spate of incidents over the past 10 days near the West Darfur capital of El Geneina highlighted dangers for the displaced and aid agencies, the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) said.

STOPPED AT GUNPOINT

An UNHCR team was stopped at gunpoint by police last week, days after two staff of Save the Children were killed by an anti-tank mine in North Darfur, spokesman Ron Redmond said.

"This gives some indication of the problems we are facing in just trying to provide some kind of protection presence in Darfur. We feel the more international staff on the ground who can go to these places — the more eyes and ears from the international community — the better for everybody," he said.

Rebels launched a revolt in western Sudan in February 2003 after years of skirmishes between mainly African farmers and Arab nomads over land.

They accuse the government of arming Arab militias, known as Janjaweed, to crush them and their civilian sympathisers, a charge Khartoum denies.

Sudanese Foreign Minister Mustafa Osman Ismail said talks between Darfur tribal leaders, which includes rebel group representatives would begin in Libya on Tuesday to try to help restore stability in the troubled region.

"You need such a meeting of the all the tribal leaders so that they will have their impact in confidence building, insecurity and in administrative arrangements," he said on Tuesday.

He added he hoped the tribal leaders would help push the rebels to be more cooperative at peace talks due to begin in the Nigerian capital Abuja on Oct. 21.

According to the United Nations, about 70,000 people have died from hunger and disease in Darfur since March when international agencies began a massive aid effort. The Sudanese government disputes the figure.

The U.N.'s World Food Programme

 the main food agency operating in Darfur — says that access to and food security in the camps are generally improving despite logistical challenges.

The ICRC said that it was maintaining food aid to rural areas "well into next year" to avoid further mass movement to camps for internally displaced people.

The Mosad is evil!

e receive many letters questioning the very plausible assertion that the Mosad, the intelligence arm of the Israeli Government, is capable of clandestine activities that too some may same far fetched. This is understandable because most of these

skeptics really have a faint understanding of the history of the region or consider the creation of the Hebrew State as a natural phenomenon that has "could never pursue evil efforts" or conspiracies, etc. There is significant historical support that lends credence to the charge that Israel and the international Zionist Establishment that has given its all out support for the creation of Israel must rely on a lot of covert activity to overcome the weak legitimate grounds by which the creation of Israel and the outcome of that the usurpation of Palestine from its legitimate inhabitants for thousands of years can be justified. in the past that our major problem is our inability to speak up and convey our point of view in a proper manner. I came to conclude how correct I am in this respect when I discovered that the last documentary released recently about the life

The Western audience watching a recent documentary looked shocked and amazed as if they knew about the atrocities in Israel for the first time ever. Many of them were in tears while others expressed regret for not knowing about those incidents before. They were shocked even more when they knew that the cameraman who filmed the documentary was himself killed by the Israeli forces.

This striking example demonstrates that the facts in the film were not known to most of the viewers, making the larger-scale assumption that billions around the world also do not know those facts, particularly those in the developed world.

Having said that, one must also understand that the fault is not in those viewers, but it is rather in us, Arabs and Muslims who failed to use the means we have to present the facts to the international community in an appealing and convincing manner.

It is indeed a pity to see Brits and other Westerners making documentaries about the miseries that our brothers in Palestine are facing, while we Arabs fail to even broadcast those documentaries on our own TV stations.

It may be lack of vision or capabilities in our governments, our media, and our communities, but no matter what the reason behind our poor public relations performance, I believe we are now obliged to identify the problem and correct it so as our voice can be heard.

Let us try from here, and in this column, to present some facts to our Western readers who may know about the atrocities committed against Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, but who may not know enough about the murdering of journalists and peace activities by Israeli forces.

Let me remind them that more than a year ago and within a period of seven weeks, one British and one American peace activist were killed by the Israeli army in Rafah, which is located south of occupied Gaza Strip.

A second Briton was shot in the head leaving him braindead. In two of the cases the Israeli army is being blamed for murder; the third is considered "attempted murder."

An Israeli military bulldozer also crushed the 23-year-old American peace activist Rachel Corrie, who was the first to die, as she tried to prevent it from demolishing a Palestinian doctor's home.

British photographer Tom Hurndall, 22, was left brain dead after being shot in the head by an Israeli soldier on April 11. British cameraman James Miller, 34, was shot by an Israeli sniper as he left a house with two other journalists on Mav 2. For those who may think that I am biased, I must remind them that I also condemn suicide attacks that indiscriminately kill innocent people including women and children. However, it is a well-known fact that the publicity that such suicidal attacks take are much more than those news items that talk about the regular daily killings happening to Palestinian.

He further stated that: "Thanks to the encouraging government approach towards investment in the oil and gas sectors, Yemen became a contender in the competitive oil and gas industry of the world."

Dr. Barabba'a also pointed out: "With the initiation of production in 1988 in Block 18 in Mareb and Al-Jouf Governorates, other international firms were encouraged to explore for oil in other regions of the country. With the dream of Yemeni unification realized in 1990, oil production efforts in Block 4, west of Ayad was pursued. This was followed by the discovery of oil in Al-Museilah Valley in Block 14 in 1993, then in Junnah Field in Block 5 in 1996, Block 10 in the east of Shahwa Governorate, Block 32 in Hawarim and Block 53 East of Saar in 2001. Trial production also commenced in 2003 in other fields.

Dr. Barabba'a indicated that thanks to these discoveries, Yemen's requirements for oil derivative products is now fulfilled and this has allowed Yemen to export its surplus from the its share of produced crude. Yemen's revenue from exports of oil reached over US \$ 2.5 billion in 2003.

The Minister of Oil pointed out that the discovery of considerable quantities of gas in Mareb-Al-Jouf block led to the ability to supply local demand for gas and will undoubtedly help in preserving the forestry of the country and to minimize environmental pollution. Then there is the promising potential of the exploitation of gas for electric power generation, with an electric gas power station already set for construction in Mareb Governorate.

When speaking of the mutual partnership of the Yemeni Government, Hunt Oil and its partners, Dr. Barabba'a affirmed the good cooperation towards



Biological diversity is fundamental to agriculture Celebrating the World Food Day means raising awareness

rom the millions of genes that serve as life's building blocks, to the thousands of plants and animals that inhabit the

Earth, to the almost limitless combinations of organisms that make up natural ecosystems, biodiversity makes an essential contribution to feeding the world.

Living things are interdependent intricately linked in birth, death and renewal. Human beings are just one small part of this vibrant mosaic yet put increasing pressure on species and the environment. As a result, many plants and animals are at risk as well as essential natural processes such as pollination by insects and the regeneration of soils micro-organisms.

To feed a growing population, agriculture must be intensified to provide more food. It will also be essential to increase the resilience of agriculture by maintaining a wide

array of life forms with unique traits, such as trees that survive drought or cattle that reproduce in harsh conditions. Sustainable agricultural practices can both feed people and protect the oceans, forests, prairies and other ecosystems that harbor biological diversity.



For safety of navigation in the Red Sea and Aden Gulf, **Yemen installs** sophisticated lighthouses

he Yemeni Authority for Maritime Affairs has recently installed a hightech lighthouse in the Greater Hunaish Island with a height of 200 meters above the Red Sea level. That is part of the efforts Yemen is exerting in cooperation with the regional organization for protection of marine environment in the region and in the south of the Gulf of Aden aimed at

serving the safety of navigation.

While the Authority, in cooperation with the International Marine Organization, is during the upcoming period preparing to study the situation of lighthouses pertaining to serving navigation in the Yemeni regional waters, it has installed an automatic equipment for monitoring ships movements in the South Region of the Red Sea for the purpose of implementing goals of the international agreement for marine safety and the international agreement for prevent-

ing collision of ship, as Yemen is one of the member countries of the agreement. According to executive chairman of the Authority Khalid Ibrahim al-Wazir, the new two-way navigation route was defined in the south of the Red Sea and the Gulf of Aden with an area of 750 square meters in an area that has not been surveyed for more than 140 years. The aim of this measure is to secure safety of international navigation and avoid ship collision incidents as well as prevention of occurrence of damage to

the marine environment.

Mr al-Wazir has said in a statement to the Yemeni news agency that what supports Yemen's efforts for protection of safety of international sea navigation is the Yemeni parliament's approval of criteria governing training and qualification of ship captains and engineers. For this purpose the Authority has dispatched a group of its cadres to the Alexandria Sea Academy to acquire skills for training seaports, coast guard and navigation companies' employees

on implementation of terms of the international regulations for the safety of ships and issuing certificates proving application of the regulations by Yemeni ports. That has been done through the International Marine Organization.

The State Authority for Sea Affairs has appropriated a sum of YR 60 million in the budget of the year 2005 for financing a training program to be held abroad for the training of its cadres in specialized academies in the United Arab Emirates, Egypt, Syria, Singapore and

the United Kingdom. The Authority dispatched trainees to Syria for training on operating modern electronic navigation equipment and the receiving of distress calls from ships and also on monitoring them.

By carrying out these training programs, the authority intends to activate its monitoring for the securing of international sea navigation safety and building new lighthouses wherever their installation is needed in the Yemeni regional waters.

Hadramout: "The Pearl of Yemen"

governorate of he Hadramout is located in the eastern part of Yemen, 770 km from Sana'a. It is surrounded by the Empty Quarter desert from the north, Al-Mahrah from the east, the Arab sea from the south and Shabwa from the west.

I visited Hadramout last week for the first time after being invited by some businessmen to cover the functions of an entrepreneurial project of cement for Yemeni and Saudi businessmen. My visit to this coastal city was so pleasing, I felt somehow guilty for not visiting it before, even though I promote tourism.

Hadramout is characterized by tropical hot and dry weather, which also prevails in the southern parts of the Arabian Peninsula. In summer, the temperature sometimes exceed 38C in some areas of the province, and 35C in the coastal areas owing to the seasonal storm full of humidity coming from the southern direction. In winter, the temperature does not exceed the 20C.

Hadramout has many historic towns, various sights and green valleys that experienced the flourish of ancient civilization. Among its important towns is Mokalla, the capital and one of the ports in the Arab sea.

Mukalla is distinguished for being the only coastal city that possesses an instinctive architectural style; an original one combining the elements of the Arab and Yemeni architectural styles as well as those of the east southern parts of Asia.

Yemeni ma'awiz weaving: A popular handicraft

t would be rather interesting to speak more precisely on ma'awiz (sarongs) weaving traditional handicraft which is very much obscure. However, I could as well mention something noticeable to point out that weaving of ma'awiz in fact made its appearance not only in Shabwa, Taiz, Wosab, or Hadramout, but also in Aden and other districts throughout Yemen.

Ma'awiz weaving, especially in Shabwa, has been concentrated in some districts such as Lahieah, Hawtah, and intensively Rawdhah- the main center for handicraftsmen, such as carpenters, blacksmiths, weavers etc. They are full of energy and are fully and enthusiastically engaged in their activities.

The old kinds of ma'awiz consisted of a simple piece of white cloth called 'kar' soaked in a black substance called 'neel". Such neel-dyed clothes are known as 'kisa' and used popularly. They are worn and prevalent among people in rural areas, and were particularly fashionable among bedouin tribes of the former times.

It is noticeable that the coloured ma'awiz weaving is virtually an art pertaining to Lahj which in fact took precedence in it. It is practiced by certain families who pass it on from father to son. This art is manifested in the Saidooni style which was popular nearly at the beginning of 1960s. This kind of ma'awiz was named so after Al-Saidoon, a well known Lahj family who are celebrated weavers admirably producing a beautiful sort of ma'awiz. Later on, in the time of the Federal Government, this kind of maawiz was replaced by the name ma'awiz Itihadi, in allusion to the so-called the Federal State of South Arabia which was estab-

lished in 1959. Ma'awiz produced in Lahj were worn only by sultans, princes and wealthy people.

Professional coloured ma'awiz weaving was gradually transferred from Lahj, scattering over other districts of the country. Such kind of marketable products ceased to be dyed by neel, and took on new creative patterns.

At the beginning of 70s, the Cooperative Society for Weaving Industries was established in Rawdhah, Shabwa governorate. It was meant to promote ma'awiz weaving in the province. The aim was primarily economic in nature: members of the society wanted to improve their living standards. Not long after, a loom was imported to help increase production. By virtue of the Yemeni unification. which encouraged investment and competition, ma'awiz weaving spread remarkably.

Coloured ma'awiz are classified into three types: "assafi" which are ma'awiz with one colour, "al-kada," with two colours or more, and "annagshah," which means the ones with one colour or more but are thick. The raw materials used in manufacturing ma'awiz include fibers, threads and combs for weaving. They are imported from Indonesia and India

ow that we are in the holy month of Ramadan, it is rather useful to present to our the true readers wisdom and benefit associating with fasting, which may seem a bit strange to non-Muslim readers, but is in fact a wonderful thing if one looks into its depth and meaning.

There are several reasons and great wisdom behind every single act in Islam, no matter how small. In time, we may know the wisdom for such acts, and for others we may never know. Salaat (act of worship in Islam), for instance, is a daily training to purify the believer and remind him that he is a member in a community of believers. Fasting, on the other hand, is an annual institution containing all conceivable attributes for human excellence. It is also training for the body and soul, a renewal of life, encouraging the spirit to share and give.

The following are some of the general benefits of fasting:

Self-Restraint (Taqwaa)

Allah (SWT) states: "O you who believe! Fasting is prescribed to you as it was prescribed to those before you, so that you may (learn) self restraint." (Al-Qur`an, 2:183)

This verse indicates the first lesson or wisdom to be gained from fasting, which is self-restraint (Taqwa) or the fear of Allah (SWT). That is to say, fasting instills in the heart the essence of consciousness of the Creator, moral courage both in secret and manifest, guiding the heart, the seat of emotion from spoilage and moral indecency.

It has been reported that Abdul Malik bin Al-Asma'e was in Makkah when Ramadan came, so he decided to leave for Taif to escape its heat. On the way, he met a Bedouin, who told him that he was heading for Makkah. Abdul Malik asked him, "Aren't you afraid of Makka's heat in Ramadan?" The Bedouin replied, "It is from the heat (hellfire) I am running away."

Fasting instills *taqwaa*, fear of Allah, and does so by controlling two parts of the human body, which are the root causes of human downfall, namely the stomach and lust. The human body is constructed with the need to please the two desires and, in the process, man transgresses the rights of others, fellow human beings, and the commandments of Allah are violated. Fasting is complementary to life, because with the level of taqwaa being raised, the person avoids sins, which are detrimental to life itself.

Change in Behavior

One of the most important things that fasting grants the individual is the ability to control or change his or her habits. To change or control a habit is to wage a war on your regular behavior. If jihaad is mandatory on every believer because it is the peak of

the essence in Islam, and it entails changing habits, fasting is the training ground for the inevitable war to occur. The believer cannot wage a war and hope to defeat an enemy if he or she cannot wage war against his own soul that calls for sin. Thus, the faster is admitted to the compulsory training opened only in Ramadan, the learning in this school is mandatory and succeeding or scoring high is mandatory, otherwise it is like you never entered. The Prophet (SAAS) said: "Many a faster receives naught from his fast except the pain of hunger and thirst."

If he scores high the reward is guaranteed: "Three people's prayers are not rejected-among them - the faster, until he breaks his fast." (Ibn Hiban) Now, does a Ramadan fast control one's habits? Simple, two of the most important habits are eating and drinking. An average person eats three meals a day, 21 meals a week. The way the fast is structured, with its basic and drastic alteration of eating habits, a faster takes light meals early in the morning and late in the evening. If the believer can control these two habits, food and drink, it will undoubtedly be easy for him to control other habits, including the habits of smoking, drug abuse and sex illicit. Do you not see that, if you can control your tongue, hands and all other parts of your body, it will be easy for you to apply the same training for the rest of the year?

Heath Care

The benefits of fasting transcend guiding the faster from idle talk and indecent acts. It is a sentinel against disease and provids the faster follows the strict dietary rule: eat during fast breaking and avoid over-eating. Allah (SWT) states: "...Eat and drink, but waste not by excess, for Allah loves not wasters." (Al-Qur`an, 7:31)

A great deal of ailments originates from stomach indigestion. This is why the Messenger of Allah (SAAS) says: "The son of Adam will never fill a container with something worse and evil than his stomach. It will suffice him some morsels (food) that will keep him on his feet, otherwise, he should divide his stomach into three parts: one third for his food, the other for his drink and the other third for his breath." (Ibn Hibban)

This hadith indicates that the stomach is the origin of illness. Even in the age of sophisticated machines, you can hardly find a machine so fragile but yet so remarkably durable and efficient like the stomach. This is the machine that receives food particles, processes and refines them, and distributes the products to different parts of the body. This is a lifelong operation. For the non-faster, the stomach will have no chance to rest. When the stomach is empty, as a result of fasting, it gets well-deserved rest to renew and rejuvenate its energy. Through fasting, the stomach is forced to go through a discharge whereby

harmful residue are eliminated through

perspiration as the body searches for food during fast.

Patience

Fasting helps in conditioning the heart, the soul, and the body on the virtues of patience, tenacity, and firmness in the face of adversity. Patience is the pinnacle of selfmastery, discipline and spiritual agility. Patience is to turn the phrase "I can't" into "I can." It is to say, the difficult is easy. It is an inner and psychological demolition of things perceived by others as impossible. Fasting helps in all these shades for the virtuous, patient person. The conditioning is that if a believer can exercise patience, and forsake gourmet food and drink, and the exhilaration we enjoy while eating or drinking our favorites, as well as marital association, the gratifying of other normal appetites for a whole day, for a month the realization that the barrier between you and food is your consciousness of your Creator. This can better make you able to exercise patience virtually in everything in life.

Social Outlook

Socially, fasting is an expression of solidarity with the poor, the family and the whole society. This is a period in which the rich have first-hand experience of what it is to be poor; the pains the indigent suffers in normal living conditions. The process of disciplining resulting from Islamic fasting, instills in the rich the virtue of mercy, Rahmah, which is very important in terms of social well-being and proliferation of harmony. Allah bestows his mercy upon those who themselves are merciful to others. "Those who are merciful to others, the Merciful will have mercy upon them," the Messenger said. He continued, "Have mercy upon those on earth, and those in heaven will have mercy upon you." (Abu Dawud/Tirmidhi)

Family Ties

Fasting strengthens family ties, especially in that the family is an endangered institution in Western society. It helps the family gather together to break fast, at Iftar, and eat sahuur together at least twice a day for a month. The family even makes Salaat, together with the father as Imam.

Fasting enhances and energizes friendship, as Ramadan is known as the month of invitations and visitations. Friends, family members and neighbors extend invitations to each other to come to their homes to have Iftar together. The Messenger said, "When a believer invites you, you should respond." Besides, Muslims gather together in the mosque for eve services.

Hence, one concludes that fasting in Ramadan is a true blessing, whose real meaning and benefits may never be fully realized. That is why we believe that as Muslims, we are lucky to have this obligation for a month every year. This indeed makes us different, unique, and blessed.

ipids are a large compounds that are essential for the human body serve a large of important functions and exist in a variety of shapes, size and structures separated into four groups: cholesterol "ester and free," triglycerides or glycerol esters, "the most abundant" fatty acids, and phospholipids. Cholesterol and triglycerides are the two most prominent lipids in the plasma. The association of triglycerides and cholesterol with heart disease, hepatic disease, and other disease explain the importance to be known cholesterol and triglycerides are may taken in food or synthesis endogenous by body.

Cholesterol is played a very important rate in the body because it is a precursor to many physiological important steroids such as vitamin

"D" which is important for bone synthesis and steroid hormones androgens and oestrogens which are important for reproduction functions in addition to other hormones like a "cortisol" of 800mg/day.

Liver is capable to synthesis about from simple material. This amount is about one-third the amount that the body needs every day.

The amount of cholesterol consternation are usually about 100 mg/day. Women have lower cholesterol than men during their first decades, "the productive years". Estrogens are the main cause for that low concentration.

Young men have a cholesterol concentration that may reach 220mg/di but it is may increase at the fifth and sixth decade to more than 240mg/di.

High cholesterol concentration is considered as one of the risk factors for cardio "disease". There are many cases for the elevation of cholesterol concentration such as the food which contains saturated fatty acids. In addition to the hereditary factors, the risk of developing cardio vascular disease increase as the plasma cholesterol concentration rise above the 200mg/di.

The risk of developing is chaemic "heart disease" and a raised plasma total cholesterol and cholesterol which is the main transported of cholesterol to the cells.

When the content of LDL from cholesterol is increased the risk of cardio vascular increased, and vise versa, it leads to hypercholesterol

In addition to the hereditary facors, the risk of developing cardio tration in the blood.

> Major risk factors of cardio vascular disease include smoking and hypertension, two main transporters of cholesterol to the body tissue.

> There is HDL, which elevation is very useful and the other is LDL, which elevation with high concentration of cholesterol is very dangerous. HDL: means high density lipo protein which contains more protein and low lipid. LDL means high lipids and very high concentration of lipid.

> f we concentrated on the talk about qat and as a negative phenomenon, we will discover a disease difficult to cure.

Chewing qat became a familiar and desirable habit practiced by the majority of people within the Yemeni society.

Qat chewing is not useful more than being wastage of time and money with the passage of days. Besides, it has bad effects on the health of the chewer as well as his mind.

The person who always consumes these leaves is almost perceived in abnormal mood, and the addicted of such narcotic substance live most of their life in miserable economic circumstances.

We find that there are many people who prefer spending much money on Qat to the basic needs of their children and houses. These people do not care even for the upbringing and education of their children.

The majority of Yemeni youths waste much of their time on Qat sessions and ignore doing some important activities. Of the harms of Qat is its being an economical and agricultural problem; a lot of farmers are found to uproot useful trees of fruits and vegetables and replace them by thy plantation of Qat , thinking that it will add to their income.

Health problems widely spread among people in the Yemeni society are undoubtedly the consequence of eating the leaves of Qat, which are exposed to several poisonous pesticides used to help Qat trees grow within a short period of time.

For many chewers, including women, old men and teenagers, this narcotic substance became the source of energy and self-satisfaction. School children who are addicted to Qat chewing neglect their study and drop out their education. In addition, parents join Qat sessions outside their houses while their children seize it as a chance to stray in the streets and then to be immorally deviated. This situation of the children became more difficult to manipulate later on.

Dozens of people, heavily addicted to this narcotic substance, are often perceived in abnormal states and bad temper. After removing this substance of their mouths, they find difficult interacting with each other or even understanding one another.

Finally, I suggest some solutions that can help overcome the phenomenon of Qat and its effects as:

- Spreading awareness among people all over the country and looking at the matter more seriously.
- Farmers and landowners must gradually reduce the plantation of Qat and the increase the plantation of other useful trees.
- Parents should pay attention towards their children; not to allowing them approach this substance.
- Parents themselves are recommended to give up chewing Qat and care for the education of their children.
- Parents should instruct their children about what is harmful and what is useful for their future.

At the human level, it leaves tragedies and ailments affecting the health of the family and the society. The health situation is the main reason for diseases and death cases.

Meanwhile, the population growth, from which Yemen suffer, plays a negative role in the downing of the health services and the spread of infectious diseases. It also negatively contributes to the deterioration of the Yemeni environment that experiences a high fertility rate (7,7 births per woman).

Children under the age of 15 constitute 50 percent of the overall population, the economic and cognitive levels go down and the shortage of natural resources and water adds to the miserable situation. Early and short-interval pregnancy is remarkable nationwide.

Population and health interact

The controversial relationship and interaction between population and health can be clearly seen from the following two reasons:

- The rapid population growth caused by the high fertility rate, which increases the pressure over the health services and negatively affects health care,
- The density of population results in the terrible spread of infectious diseases and epidemics as well as the pollution of the environment. In addition, the recurrent and early pregnancy cases within short

other.

Health in Yemen

Health care witnessed progress in the last few decades and led to proportional decrease of mortalities. The mortality rate among newly born infants went down to 81 cases per thousand in the 1990s, however the 1960s saw a negative rate reaching the 230 cases per thousand.

The mortality rate of infants under five went down to 100 cases per thousand in 1994, while it was 340 death cases in the beginning of the sixties.

The population increase and the shortage of health-related resources, which does not exceed 4 percent of the State general budget and the individual's share of medicine does not exceed YR 10, make the health situation more difficult to improve. Physicians are not proportionally distributed all over the parts of Yemen.

We could realize that 74% of the total physicians throughout the republic are holding careers in the main cities Sana'a, Aden and Taiz, whereas 26 percent of them work in the remaining areas.

Regarding the specialized physicians, we perceive that 79 percent of them are in the three main cities and 21% in other places.

Finally, planning and proposing strategies to serve the reality of health in Yemen, call for adopting serious steps in the medical field.

Yemen defeated by North Korea World Cup 2006 dreams vanish

Last wek, the national football team suffered a 2-1 loss in its fifth game against North Korea in the first round of the Asian group 5 qualifiers for the World Cup 2006 in Germany.

In the twelfth minute of the first half, the Koreans scored the first goal and doubled the result in minute 19 of the second half. Yemen scored only one goal in minute 30 of the same half through the substitute Fathi Jaber.

Despite the hard circumstances, heavy rains and strong storms in the match, the Yemeni footballers performed well. Their tactical level was to some extent convincing though they endured during their travel from china to North Korea capital which took longer than 4 days.

The team members did not reach the required

preparation due to their short time training.

The first half saw a Korean dominance over the course of the play, especially after the surprise goal in the first few minutes. The opponents played in an offensive manner through their side players, especially the right side one Mon who supplied forward strikers with several horizontal balls to yield the first goal by the head of advancing Ianbic.

He exploited the defense gap among Yemeni players to hamper the numerous offensives raged by the opponent. The players organized their queues and started to attack but couldn't pass through the Korean hurdles, tightly closing the area that in turn made the Yemeni strikers Ali Al-Nono, Al-Kuhali, and Rudhwan Abduljabbar shoot from a further distance going in awry.

The goalkeeper Mu'ath Abdul-Khaliq saved his net from several fast re-offensives by the

Koreans.

After recurrent attempts, the successful attacker,Fathi Jaber could cross the Korean fence and scored for Yemen in minute 30 of the second half by placing a crawling ball to the right of the Korean goalkeeper.

Heavy rains and bad weather are not only the reasons behind the defeat but there are others including:

* weakness of defense organization; playing on the same line facilitated the task of the opponent.

* the absence of a reactive answer to the early Korean surprise goal.

* the center line of the players neither showed control nor prevented some attacks of the opponent, although the plan adopted indicates con-

centration of center players.

* lack of coordination between defense and

forward players.

* the long distance between main striker Ali Al-Nono and the sideliners Nasser Ghazi and Rudhwan Abduljabbar posed no threat to the Korean goalkeeper.

Thailand's win over UAE ensured Korea's qualification

Another play in the same group staged on the same day in Bangkok combined Thailand with UAE.

The former downed the latter 3-0 to guarantee the North Korea's qualification for the World Cup 2006 from among group members. Korea, which has 11 points followed by the UAE with its credit remaining at 7, Thailand with 6 and Yemen with a 4-point credit, will have an incontestable play against UAE in the away encounter.





Socotra: The diachronic value of multi-cultural societies (1-2)

e importance of Socotra according to the Periplus of the Red Sea, and considerations of the groundbreaking role Yemen can play in the Global World of Education In a series of previous articles, we insisted on the importance of historical culture preservation, on the stimulation given to the national development by the Humanities, on eventual breakthroughs in the Yemenite educational system, and on ways of seeking cultural authenticity and creative historicity.

The current globalization is an excellent opportunity for many countries left behind, and this is because, whereas in the colonial world only some parts of the earth matter, in the global world all parts matter. This is the great difference between reactionary Europe and progressive America.

France needs Algeria engulfed in civil war, Syria interfering in Lebanon, Iran ruined by the Ayatollahs, and Abyssinia plunged into disastrous totalitarianism and oppression of most of its peoples.

America on the contrary wants to release the real, great forces of the peripheral countries of Asia and Africa, Europe and Oceania. Liberal deregulated post-Reagan America does not view the world as a static cake for which one fights to strip the other of the portion the other owns. Particularly in the 90s, after the collapse of the opposite, Marxist -Leninist, ideology, America gave us excellent proofs that the American method to address the global needs for genuine Growth and ultimate Development is the vision of the dynamic cake

Briefly, the American way is the following: "You will not try to extirpate my 30% portion of the global cake, and I will not attempt to deprive you of your 10% share; we will work together to increase the entire, global, cake from 100% to 500%. It will be a fivefold increase for

you and the same for me! Why fighting against each other and registering loss, since we all can record a great augmentation of our wealth?"

One may find the method as quantitative, but it has a qualitative dimension as well! Peace, global cooperation, and mutual understanding, authentic respect for the other are all there! We have full proof that the developments go towards this direction. Afro-centrism was born in American universities; Black Athena of Martin Bernal emanated from the American university milieus; Eduard Said, the famous Palestinian scholar who contributed a lot to our understanding of Cultural Colonialism thanks to his renowned 'Orientalism', is - truly speaking - 'prohibited bibliography' in Europe. Whereas America came up with all these vital steps of progress in the direction of a more holistic understanding of the History of the Mankind, Europe persists in its divisive policies of colonial and racist character, sticks to the erroneous and obsolete GrecoRomano-centrism, and - turning even worse - expresses, through the mouth of Valerie Giscard d' Estaing, a total rejection of Turkey's future adhesion to

the European Union. What can a positive action of the Muslim World, of the Third World, of the Orient and/or of the South be? In this
