Several Somali refugees have thretened to go on hunger strike to make themselves heard.

SANA'A - Nov. 20 - Hundreds of Somali refugees have been protesting for almost a week in front of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) premises with their families and children, they staged a sit-in and expressed their demands for improving their current legal, economic and social living condition as well as their forsaken human rights.

Yemen Times has met a number of them who expressed anger over the bad treatment they face from the Commission: Osman Ali, a refugee who came to Yemen in 1991 claimed that the

commission had obtained a refugee card from the UNHCR, yet he did not receive any assistance from the commission since 1991, leaving him to face sever financial conditions, he said that the UNHCR did not live up to its charter or commitment in furnishing them.

Another refugee, Hassan Ainain Osman was among a committee representing refugees and have met the Commission's officials who in turn said that they can do nothing to help them because of large number of refugees reaching around 40.000. However, more recently he said that the officials of the UNHCR refuse to meet them to listen to their problems. He said that all they want is to be taken to other parts of the world

where they may live a decent life: "We are homeless and lost everything, while living conditions in Yemen are worsening", he went on saying. Several refugees said that they come with their women and children to make their voice heard. Some said that they used to come to the commission for consecutive months without being able even to see the face of an official except when they go in and out of their cars. They come early in the morning and they are told to wait until the after noon when they discover that all the officials left by the back doors, leaving the long cues under the sun and rains.

Several refugees have called the United Nations to listen to their humanitarian call and find a solution for them; they said that

they will go into hunger strike to make themselves heard. They demanded equal consideration similar to other refugees such as the Ethiopians, whom they claim to have a better treatment. Yemen hosts a number of refugees from Somalia, Ethiopia, Sudan, Iraq and Palestine, along with other small numbers of refugees from other countries

Most of Somali refuges escaped their country because of the civil war, and faced a number of problems in the so called the trips to the unknown. These trips often end in tragedies especially those who use wooden boats in their escape. They are often being pushed over board by their smugglers, for fear of the coast guard patrols. When they reach land they got detained because they enter countries illegally.

In Yemen they do simple jobs that could hardly sustain a living; especially they have not got an educational standard that enables them to have better jobs. Yemen has recently received boats and sea equipments to support in the war against terrorism. These boats enabled the Yemenis to tighten their grip on their coasts, but the Somali refugees who suffered as a result of this; they are often being marooned along distance from shore for fear of these new Yemeni forces. The large number of the Somali influx

made many of them eye the efforts of the Commission with skepticism. They accuse the UNHCR of willful negligence, and a double standard treatment. The Commission's efforts in furnishing for the refugees can not be denied. These were either through the commission individual efforts or those joint ones with the government, by making refugee camps and encouraging voluntary return. Now there are several Somali refugee camps that are made for them in the south west governorates, which are near the coasts where the refugees infiltrate.

3 journalists fined, banned from writing

SANA'A- Nov. 19- The Capital City's Southwestern Court issued on Saturday a verdict on the case filed by the Taiz Finance Office against al-Thawri Paper, mouthpiece of the Yemeni Socialist Party.

Under the verdict, the three journalists Khaled Salman, Fikri Qasim and Salahaddin al-Dakak were fined a sum of 950 thousand Yemeni Riyals and banned from writing for 6 months, but the execution was halted.

The three journalists were accused of scorning and criticizing the General Manager of Taiz Finance Office, following the publication of scandals and

violations allegedly committed by the General Manager of Taiz Finance Office.

Al-Thawri weekly is also facing as many as 13 cases, 4 of which are concerned with insulting the President of the Republic and fomenting ethnical and racial conflicts, as well as insulting the military forces.

There are also a number of journalists and writers subjected to investigations and trials for their writings published in some opposition newspapers. Journalism community always complains of tightening the grip around the freedoms of journalists and the practice of illegal harassments against them.

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In his address, al-Baidani lashed out at the government, which he accused of corruption and failure to achieve any of the economic and political reforms it had promised.

"The reason behind the failure of the successive governments is lack of experience in achieving renaissance and mismanagement," he said.

Leftover mines and explosives pollute Saada

SAADA - Yemen - Thurs. Nov.17-The latest victim of the armed conflict among government forces and Alhouthi followers is toddler Dhiafalla Al-balawi, who died last week, after his sister found a grenade in their whereabouts of her goats near their home, left by the governmental forces which were in the area, the grenade fell from the sister's hand onto the ground, injuring her and killing her toddler brother.

(CPJ) expressed grave concern on Monday about the

recent assault on Yemeni journalists. In a letter to His Excellency President Ali Abdullah Saleh, the CPJ condemned the assault of a number of journalists in Yemen including the recent assault on Subaie which is only the most recent example in a frightening spate of violence against the press. On November 12 Subaie, who contributes to the opposition newspapers Al-Thawri, Al-Shoura, Al-Nida'a and Al-Tajammu, was attacked by two masked gunmen who stubbed

The Committee to Protect Journalist him in his right arm and upper back.

Videographer Mujeeb suwailih, cameraman for Al-Arabiya news channel, and Journalist Najib al-Sharabi, correspondent for Al-Ekhbariya channel, were attacked on November 4 by security officers while they were covering a strike by employees of a public textile factory in Sana'a. Both journalists were detained for several hours at a nearby police station where they were threatened by the same officers who attacked them earlier. The Yemeni Ministry of Interior said it would launch an investigation into the attack, but no police officer has

been held responsible as yet.

On August 23, four men seized Jamal Amer, editor of Al-Wasat newspaper, and bundled him into a waiting car. Amer said the men punched him, accused him of getting funding from the U.S. and Kuwaiti embassies and warned him about defaming unspecified " officials." Amer said he believes a car used in the abduction belonged to the Yemeni Republican Guard. Amer's newspaper has criticized corruption, nepotism, published the names of relatives of the government officials who receive educational scholarships abroad,

Aden- Overseas Port Management (OPM) Aden signed on Monday 9 Nov. 2005 a one- year Service Agreement with Cosco Container Lines Company Ltd (COSCON) at COSCON Dubai office.

Mr. Zhao Wei, Managing Director, COSCON West Asia and Mr. MMJ Subramaniam, CEO OPM Aden penned the landmark agreement.

This ceremony heralds the arrival of Cosco vessels at Aden Container Terminal (ACT) beginning from December 2005. Moreover, the Cosco containers will be the forerunners crossing the wharves of ACT from 23 November 2005 when vessels of its Far East-Red Sea (FRS) consortium partners, Evergreen and Hapag Lloyd, come in.

COSCON, winning the Shipping Line of the Year title on 3 November

2005 in the Asian Logistics Awards 2005, boasts of a 120-container vessels fleet with 300,000 TEU capacity including five 7500- TEU post panamax vessels. They are deployed on the group's 60 international shipping routes linking 100 principal ports in more than 30 countries in Europe, America, Asia, Africa and Australia. Eight 10,000- TEU vessels, scheduled for delivery after 2007, will further strengthen the Cosco fleet with some of the largest container vessels in the world.

Aden has now becomes an integral node in Cosco's FRS service in the network routing of Nansha-Hong Kong-Shekou-Tanjung Pelepas-Aden-Jeddah-Aqaba-Sokhna-Singapore-Nansha, a turnaround of 42 days. This new FRS weekly service is a result of the merger of two existing Red Sea services: the Far East-Red Sea service and the Straits-Red Sea Express service.

In line with its focus on market orientation and customer satisfaction, Cosco will add 11,000 -TEU to the container traffic of Aden each year.





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

Zarqawi says Amman bombs not aimed against Muslims

DUBAI (Reuters) - The leader of al Qaeda in Iraq, Abu Mussab al-Zarqawi, said on Friday the group had not meant to blow up Muslims in deadly bomb attacks that have provoked an angry backlash in Jordan.

In an Internet audiotape, he warned Jordanians of more attacks and threatened a possible attempt on the life of King Abdullah, ruler of the key U.S. ally which is one of only two Arab countries to sign a peace treaty with Israel.

Suicide bombings killed 54 people in Amman hotels last week, provoking outrage in Jordan despite the high level of support in the country for the activities of Jordanian-born Zarqawi in Iraq. Most victims were Muslim Jordanians at wedding parties.

In the tape, posted on an Islamist Web site often used by insurgent groups in Iraq, Zarqawi defended the blasts saying al Qaeda had inside information that they were used by U.S., Israeli and Jordanian intelligence agencies.

"We ask God to have mercy on the Muslims, who we did not intend to target, even if they were in hotels which are centers of immorality," the voice on the tape said.

"The idea that they blew up inside wedding ceremonies is a lie by the Jordanian regime...the target was a meeting of intelligence agencies, but a roof collapsed on a wedding party from the blast," he said.

The voice sounded like Zarqawi's but it was not possible to verify the authenticity of the tape immediately.

"The CIA is aware of the tape and we are looking into it," a U.S. official said in Washington, adding that Zarqawi was worried about the angry Arab reaction to the latest attacks.

A poll published in Jordan this week showed two-thirds of Jordanians had changed their views of al Qaeda for the worse.

"What we're seeing is him (Zarqawi) going to great lengths to try to justify

the selection of targets, in part because of the criticisms in the Muslim world," a U.S. counter-terrorism official told Reuters.

Tribal warrior

Zarqawi warned Jordan's King Abdullah he could meet the same fate as a tribal warrior who fought the Prophet Mohammad.

"Here is another message to the little tyrant of Jordan. I address you after you threatened a nasty fate for those behind the blasts. Listen to these words," he said, before relating the tale of Abu Jahl, who Muslim lore says lost his head in battle.

"If you do not listen, you could end up with the same fate...your star is already descending," he added.

Indicating there might be further

attacks, Zarqawi warned ordinary Jordanians to avoid large hotels, military installations and embassies of countries involved in the 2003 U.S.-led invasion of Iraq.

Al Qaeda in Iraq had already claimed responsibility for the Jordan blasts and named the attackers as four Iraqis, one of them a woman. She failed to blow herself up, confessing on Jordanian television last week that she had tried.

"We chose these hotels after over two months of thorough checks with trusted sources inside the hotels and elsewhere showed that they were centers for the Jewish, U.S. and Jordanian security apparatus," Zarqawi said.

Al Qaeda in Iraq is one of the main groups leading an insurgency against U.S. forces and the U.S.-backed government.

Car bomb kills at least 11 in Baghdad

BAGHDAD (Reuters) - A car bomb killed at least 11 people at a market in southeast Baghdad on Saturday, a day after more than 80 people were killed in a series of suicide attacks in the capital and a northeastern town.

The blast in the Diyala Bridge section of Baghdad also wounded 15 people, police said. They said the toll could rise.

The attack came as more than 50 Iraqi politicians from across the country's sectarian divide gathered for reconciliation talks in Cairo aimed at easing bloodshed that has plagued Iraq since the U.S.-led invasion in 2003.

In a second blast on Saturday, a suicide bomber in a car attacked a police convoy in central Baghdad, wounding two police and eight civilians, police said.

On Friday, 77 people were killed and more than 80 wounded in twin suicide bomb attacks on mosques in the town of Khanaqin, near the border with Iran in northeastern Iraq.

Twin suicide car bombs also detonated outside a popular hotel in Baghdad, destroying an apartment building and killing six people. More than 40 were wounded.

Insurgents are waging a campaign of suicide bombings, shootings and assassinations in a bid to topple the U.S.-backed Iraqi government.

Israeli soldiers kill **Palestinian in West Bank**

HEBRON, West Bank (Reuters) -Israeli troops on Friday shot dead a Palestinian in the West Bank who the army said had a bomb and intended to blow up the soldiers' vehicle.

An army spokesman said the soldiers heard a blast as they were driving near the town of Hebron while on patrol in search of militants. They searched the area and saw a Palestinian man lying on the ground, holding a suspicious-looking object. Suspecting it contained explosives,

the soldiers shot the man, the army said. Palestinian medics received his body in a Hebron hospital.

The army later said the man was carrying a pipe bomb but that it was not clear what had caused the blast. There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the explosion.

Israel has stepped up its operations in the West Bank to try to find Palestinian militants since a suicide bomber from Islamic Jihad killed six Israelis earlier this month.

On Thursday, Israeli forces shot dead two Palestinian militants from al-Aqsa Martyrs Brigades, part of President Mahmoud Abbas's Fatah group, near the West Bank city of Jenin.

Sporadic violence has dimmed hopes that Israel's Gaza pullout in September could lead to renewed peacemaking. Israel demands Abbas disarm gunmen to advance peace talks. The Palestinian leader says this would lead to civil war.

pparently the reason why Yemeni journalists are being prosecuted by the national security is that they have broken the law; the press law of that is. President Ali Abdullah Saleh during his meeting with President Bush commented on this by saying that he is aware of the persecutions taking place as they are direct implementation of the law. Only now he is considering change in the press code so as to change the penalties against journalists from imprisonment to financial fines. Instead of journalists and daring media personnel being directly imprisoned, they would be fined and since the living standard of such profession is lowest of the low they would be eventually imprisoned for their inability to pay the enormous fines. So what's new in the so-called enhanced press law is that it has acknowledged the violations and made them legal. Yet no matter how fines or imprisonment could be made legal there is no justification of the brutality these journalists are facing either in prison or outside it.

The latest incident was the stabbing and battering of opposition journalist Nabil Subie earlier this week. Apparently there were a group of masked criminals, but whom are we kidding? Nabil has been facing endless threats during his career as a daring journalist. And here he is following the long list of assaults against media people. According to the Media Rights Center in Sana'a there have been 72 violations in the first half of this year only. Critical writing against the authorities and corrupt officials has taken its toll on such influential people that their anger seems to be mounting by the day. Today there is even stabbing and life-threatening crimes while just one week ago these were limited to battering and persecution. At this rate journalists would certainly start disappearing and working in free media in Yemen would be a quest for a speedy death and an express pass to heaven.

In many developing countries where freedom of media is as limited as it is in Yemen the authorities seem to be a little more discreet while performing their acts against freedoms and human rights. For us, we seem to take pride in the on going trend to the extent that we admit internationally that we know it is going on, in fact as a government, the government of yemen is taking measures to make it legal in order to silence journalists and potentially outlaw their practice.. I wouldn't be surprised if army personnel and national security would be given badges to wear on their decorated uniforms indicating a "license to kill Journalists". Mr. Nabil has no case and neither would any violated journalist have against a government which legislates murder for no crime. So I guess journalists would have to seriously consider death as a reward for their lashing pens, it could be just around the corner. Even in the remote possibility that the state has nothing to do with these violations, it is enough a crime that these murders take place under the noses of the police. If the government cannot protect its people then why have a national security to start with? One last thing to say, if you thought that democracy in Yemen is progressing,

This would consequently lead to skepticism in pursuit of the report. It has appeared that the purpose behind the report is to mangle the strong and distinguished relationship between Syria and Lebanon, remove the two countries from equation of common understanding and to separate them. The aim is to besiege Syria individually and impose permanent international guardianship on Lebanon.

It can strongly be concluded that purport of the report is the toppling of the regime in Syria after tightening the grip on it. The report has that anyone would object the formation proved to be biased to favor circles antagonist to Syria that accused it before of all types of disgraceful acts, a matter that supported the existence of premeditated intention to harm Damascus.

Moreover, the report did not present accurate

picture of what had happened on the ground. It had depended merely on statements taken from Lebanese opposition elements, and this is a stance indicative of a hostile stand against Syria. In addition, the report is based on construability and consequently could not consider what it contained as abrupt legal document. For the report is distant from truth, it was supposed to bring us as closer to it. All that it reflects is intentional misleading against the interests of Syria, Lebanon and the Palestinians as well as against stability in the region as a whole.

Moreover, the report did not include any irrefutable evidence pointing out those involved in the crime. In its many paragraphs the report contained rather testimonies that need to be verified and referred to an international court to ultimately decide who the innocent is and who is the condemned. ranz Müntefering's resignation as chairman of Germany's Social Democrats in the face of a challenge from his party's leftwing has, like the divisive French referendum on the European Constitution this past May, exposed deep ideological cleavages - divisions not only about Europe, but about the very foundations of society and the economy. 

It was bound to happen

he observer is certainly not surprised by the increasing heated debate about the Bush Administration's misadventure in Iraq in the United States. Surely the American political establishment is bound to see that the people of the United States need to have their feelings expressed more vocally. Yes, the American people have now expressed their discomfort about the war and most recent polls have reflected some of the dissatisfaction (in different levels) that many grassroots Americans are having about the war. The politicians have somehow seen this as a mandate that they also must no longer hide their true disposition. The War in Iraq is on the way to becoming a rejuvenation of vocal popular dissent against US Government policy, especially overseas, that has proven again that when the people say it is wrong, even politicians have to listen. Although much of the debate for or against George W. Bush's apparent misjudgment of even his own people's refusal to be misled and taken advantage of is still along partisan inclinations, there is no question that the American people are beginning to realize that the right is no longer "always right". Politicians, who were known for their hawkish persuasion are also voicing grave concerns for the poor showing in the war effort and coming out with their turnaround view that the US effort in Iraq needs to be critically assessed and for all that matter ended.

One should take further note of this, as one notices that the terrorist attacks have surprisingly and somewhat coincidentally escalated, almost reflecting a certain synchronization of trends: when the Bush Administration seems to be getting the heat from public opinion or the political opposition, the terrorists attacks increase in frequency and goriness. Surely there is something to ponder about, especially when realizing that the attacks are not directed at the occupying forces or at the "enemies of Islam", but rather large assemblies of civilian Moslems in Iraq and elsewhere - even by mosques. Surely such attacks as the recent one in eastern Iraq (100 dead) and I Amman would find little favor among the Iraqis or the rest of the Moslem World. So, how could insurgents or anti-occupation resistance fighters expect to advance their cause when the victims are supposedly the expected beneficiaries of their struggle? There is no doubt of something that needs further explanation beyond mere religious extremism and a little less than outright madness going on in Iraq and the rest of the world. Conspiracy theories set aside, we need to consider many possible explanations, including those that disassociate from logical cause and effect.

Is the Bush Administration feeling the heat? For now the response has been the usual efforts to project all opposition as tantamount to treason or failure to see the earnest efforts to proceed with the War on Terror. Needless to say that the WOT actually has given terrorism more juice than it ever had before and not shown any meaningful successes to speak of, whether in finding and apprehending or eliminating the big icons that the pro right media always flash out to the world public opinion. A war that has cost so many thousands of lives (maybe in the hundreds of thousands now), including at least over 2,000 Americans and well over US \$ 200 Billion against an "enemy", who is growing in ferocity and momentum and enjoying all the freedom of operations, the technology of the modern age and the attention of the whole world, without so much as giving a hint of any pain from this almost farcical matchup of the world superpower and reckless bands of bloodthirsty killers. But the Americans at the grass roots level are now saying that there are apparently too many theatrics in this WOT and too much that does not make sense to them. With an unending stream of continuous lies that they are being exposed to, many Americans are now saying, enough is enough and it is time to bring the boys home and get America on a more sounder track. Yet, the Bush Administration seeks to find newer grounds to unleash its itch for war as the only destiny that it can relate to, even though there are no gauges that can be found to measure any successes or victories. In fact, victory does not have a place in the wars that Mr. Bush has waged so far and one is somewhat confounded by the earnest attempt to convince the American constituency that perhaps taking the war to a different location will produce the light at the end of the tunnel. The Washington Post reports of large movement of war material to some of the neighboring states with Syria should not be viewed lightly. If Iraq was a lesson to be learned from, the Bush Administration might indeed rush into a new battleground before the opposition at home becomes too entrenched and become more organized leading to a repeat of the American scene during the Vietnam War, when out finally became the only logical path to take. One hopes that the American administration will finally come to some realization that war is not always a viable cover for failure, especially if failure has become obvious in war itself as Afghanistan and Iraq have for all intents and purposes become no more than apparent failures in the only thing that Mr. Bush and his neo-con pals savor so much. If Mr. Bush thinks that he can overcome the mounting opposition to the war and enjoy the comfort of not having to take his case to the people again for another election, one might expect that the recent vocal opposition voiced by the members of Congress will indicate that Americans can look for more effective measures to bring some sanity to American foreign policy.

How do we explain this resurgent radicalism, which seems to ignore European and international political realities?

Add to this the congenital French mistrust of liberalism - indeed, French is one of the rare languages in which the word "liberalism" has a pejorative connotation - joined to an equally deep-rooted perception of the state (again, on both the right and the left) as the defender of the general interest par excellence. While pragmatism has come to dominate northern Europe's socialist parties since the 1930's - and, after the 1957 Congress of Bad Godesberg, the Germany's Social Democratic Party (SPD) as well - a preference for revolutionary ideology has always prevailed, at least on the rhetorical level, among French socialists.

But this cannot be the whole explanation, because a similar radicalization is occurring within German's left, where the alliance of the post-commu-

But such debates can be fruitful only if they recognize the economic and political constraints under which modern states operate. Indeed, the role of the state is made more complicated by the fact that market regulation is becoming less national and more transnational.





Saleh visit and State media camouflage

he latest visit of president Ali Abdullah Saleh to Japan, US and France has shown the real problem of the people in charge of the media policy in the country. It also showed the totalitarian mentality that still controls these people who do not respect the public and their right to

know or be informed. The crew of the Yemeni Satellite TV covered the visit and meetings of Saleh in the three countries in a very disgusting manner, focusing only on protocol meetings without any real informing substance that can be of interest to the viewers. The TV just broadcasted pictures and nonsense reports on the way Saleh was received, lunch meetings, and other general phrases like (bilateral relationship, counterterrorism, the situation in Iraq, Palestine, Somalia...etc) which all Yemeni memorize by heart. Even when Presidents Bush and Saleh were briefing the journalists after their meetings, the Yemeni TV did broadcast the pictures and the voice of the reporter who was describing how the media showed interest in the visit of Saleh to the US which is, in fact, untrue, The visit of Saleh and his meetings he had in these countries, especially the US are important to us as Yemeni citizens. The Yemeni public that was told the visit meant to voice its concerns to the leaders of these countries has the right to know what issues were discussed and the results. The state-run media described the visit as "successful" but without telling us how. The right to know is a constitutional right which the regime should respect and maintain. The regime should not camouflage and deceive its people about the real issues that have been discussed as this is a totalitarian practice, demonstrating the lack of transparency on the part of the regime. I think you all remember the attack against the al-Qaeda leader Abu Ali al-Harithi by a US plane in the desert of Marib in 2003. After the operation, the Yemeni authorities said it was a car explosion, but later the US announced the CIA was behind the attack. Last week, the former US ambassador to Yemen Edmund Hull said in al-Jazeera TV that he was monitoring the operation in the field in coordination with the Yemeni authorities. This shows how these officials respect their people and their right to know. Even the Jordanian regime behaved in a very professional

way during the latest terrorist attacks in Amman. Just some minutes after the incident, a government official went to brief the media and the other day we saw the second suicide bomber talking on camera. This never takes place with our regime which does everything underground. It lies to and deceives its people without being held accountable. But, I think this behavior makes it lose the respect and trust of the international community too. The meeting Saleh had with the cabi-

net members and leaders of the ruling party last Thursday showed that the man came back with a lot of concerns about the situation which, of course, must have been voiced by the officials in the three countries. These are the questions of arms smuggling, security, al-Qaeda prisoners and their fight in Iraq, al-Zindani, corruption and freedom degradation, journalists repression ...etc. Some of these issues the US embassy charge'd affair Nabeel Khory said before Saleh's arrival to the White House were the main issues to be discussed with Saleh. By and large, I believe it is very important for the media policy makers take the public anger to the media coverage to the latest visit of the president an opportunity to review their policy and know that camouflage or cover-up is no more useful and that the information they hide here comes from Washington or anywhere else in the world. They should live up to the digital moment and realize that transparency is a healthy sign of good governance and democratic regime, will they?



Japan's Kamikaze Isolation

-t almost seems as if Japan is bent on self-isolation in Asia. After a few months during which Prime Minister Junichiro Koizumi ostensibly sought to improve his country's relations with China, his fifth visit to the controversial Yasukuni Shrine has again raised tempers. China and South Korea both cancelled meetings of their foreign ministers with their Japanese counterpart. Once again, Japan has missed a chance to rebuild trust in a part of the world where, in the absence of cooperative international institutions, trust is all there is.

Why does Japan still not understand that the way it treats its history echoes across every part of Asia that Japan's military occupied in the first part of the 20th century? Japanese reactions reveal an extraordinary degree of stubborn selfrighteousness.

As Japan's government never ceases to point out, the Yasukuni shrine, built in 1869, venerates the 2.5 million Japanese who have died for their country, not just the 14 judged as war criminals after WWII. But, while many Japanese feel (with some justification) that South Korea and, in particular, China, exploit the Yasukuni issue to reduce Japan's influence in the region and to pander to their publics' strong nationalism, they are missing the point.

Indeed, domestic politicking seems to be at least as important to Japan's leaders as to South Koreas's or China's.

Koizumi's visit to the shrine, officially presented as that of a private citizen, was intended to impress the Japanese public, regardless of its effects abroad.

But the country now is isolated, which affects the whole fabric of stability in the region. Japan's diplomatic isolation strengthens those in the Chinese leadership who have long sought to marginalize what is economically and militarily still Asia's most powerful nation, while sucking other states in the region deeper into China's shadow. Japan's isolation also increases its dependency on its only ally, the United States, and undermines the fragile chance of developing a framework in Asia to address future regional crises in a spirit of cooperation rather than confrontation and rivalry.

Because Japan's isolation is a matter not only for the Japanese, it must be a matter for Western policy. The record, however, is not impressive. The US administration, fashionably worried over China's growing regional influence, seems quite happy with a closely-tied Japan that could help balance China. But this is obviously a shortsighted approach, for a Japan that is tied exclusively to America will lose, not gain, against China in the region, thus making the balancing act even harder.

The Europeans have no Japan policy at all, not even a shortsighted one. Fixated on the promise of an ever growing Chinese market, they give little thought to the stability of the region. They seem to think of the powers in the region as

unconnected islands, and of their own behavior towards one as devoid of political consequence for the others.

When the European Union last year considered lifting its symbolic arms embargo against China, none of the governments driving the proposal bothered to consider that this, too, would be symbolic, sending a message all over Asia that Europe was putting its political weight behind Chinese regional policies. Japanese demands to reconsider fell on deaf ears, and the initiative was put on ice only when US congressmen threatened economic repercussions and China increased pressure on Taiwan.

Instead of exploiting Japan as a regional aircraft carrier, as the US tries to do, or neglecting her politically, as Europeans do, both need to work out a new, strategic approach - if possible, jointly. The aim must be to prevent a clash of nationalisms and encourage a cooperative framework in which the region's major countries interact and develop respect for each other's interests. Such a framework can emerge in Asia only with Japan's active involvement, not on the basis of her isolation.

Of course, Japan must lead the way. Japan's leaders must recognize that the mindlessness with which they still treat the sensitivities of societies that suffered from Japanese imperialism in the twentieth century is as morally deaf as it is strategically damaging. But this process of realization is more likely to succeed if Japan does not feel it stands with its back against a wall.

Friends from abroad, therefore, can assist this process by ensuring that Japan does not to feel alone. Far from endorsing Japanese lack of sensitivity, active Western political engagement - for its own credibility in Asia - must convey that Japan's future depends on gaining the trust of the region.

That is not too much to ask. After all, Japan was a political ally throughout the half-century of the Cold War. In a part of the world where democracy is gradually advancing, Japan can point to firm democratic traditions and institutions. Its economic clout remains formidable, and its commercial and cultural ties to the West are broad and varied. Japan may have shied away for decades from sharing the task of maintaining international order, but a new awareness of international responsibility is steadily emerging.

For those who want a stable Asia, the interest in establishing close links with Japan should be obvious. This should not come at the expense of similar links with others, such as China and India, but these ties must not be acquired at the price of isolating Japan.

"All of this happened centuries ago. How about agriculture today? FAO statistics show that at the start of the new millennium 2.57 billion people

depended on agriculture, hunting, fishing or forestry for their livelihoods, including those actively engaged in those activities and their non-working dependants. They represent 42 percent of all human beings.

Agriculture strengthens economies of most developing countries. In industrialized countries, agricultural exports alone were worth about US\$290 billion in 2001. Historically, very few countries have experienced rapid economic growth and poverty

reduction that has not been either preceded or accompanied by agricultural growth.

Most cultures, especially those in which the principal activity is agriculture, have profound religious beliefs, values and rituals concerning food and respect for the environment. Lessons are there to be learned by other cultures that are striving to feed growing populations, while sustaining the resource based on which future generations will depend for sustenance.

Many international initiatives and civil society networks, such as the international Alliance Against Hunger, are promoting intercultural dialogue to help achieve these goals. World Food Day provides an opportunity at the local, national and international levels to further dialogue and enhance solidarity.'

He added that "Human and cultural ingenuity, the right vision, partnership and support including that FAO and the international community - can surely

lead to progress in achieving food security for all".

Therefore, this annual event is to remind the world leaders that there are still millions of people worldwide suffering hunger and poverty and there is a real need to expand agricultural areas. 

n Archeological discovery of a field withantiquities dateing back to 200 years BC was announced alongside the tourist festivals of Gernau in al-Jawf province. The newly discovered field contains gold and other minerals.

The festival, which was held before one month aimed at reviving the cultural heritage and enhancing desert tourism.

Al-Jawf province is famous for its handicrafts like wool weaving. These can be found in the desert and semidesert areas. It is also famous for the weaving of large baskets from palm leaves in the plain areas and valleys.

The Maenian civilization flourished on the edges of al-Jawf Valley. The remains of the cities reveal the great civilization of the area. The architecture of the granite-ornamented pillars on the Maenian temples place it in the same level as the Egyptian and Mesopotamian civilizations.

Maen people used to be great farmers, traders and manufacturers. They controlled the incense route and they

built trade stations all along it. Their influence covered the area up to northern Arabia. This is illustrated by the sculptures that were discovered in Hijaz and Egypt. A Maenian grave, which goes back to Third Century BC, was discovered in Egypt. The engravings on the sculptures indicate that it

belonged to a trader who provided the

Egyptian temples with sacred items. Recently discovered documents reveal that Maenians used to have commercial ties with other Yemeni states that controlled the coasts of the Red Sea and the Arabian Gulf. Maenian sites attracted foreign and oriental visitors during the 19-20 Centuries.

At its apex the fame of the Maen was spread as far as Greece. Classical Greek and Roman writers wrote about this civilization. The famous Greek historian Strabo accompanied the Roman leader Ilious Jalos to al-Jawf's lands in 24 BC.

French and Italian excavations in al-Jawf discovered that Maen state was a contemporary to the Sabaa state. It alternated from independence and domination from and under the Sabaian state. The ruins of al-Jawf hide many of the secrets of the Maen

civilization that will only be known when the excavations are completed.

Pre-Islamic gold mines

Festival organizers say that the discovered site lies in the Sod Mountains in the Al-Robe Al-Khali (Empty Quarter) desert 200 km north east of Sana'a. It is rich in gold, bronze and marble. The site, which is now a ruin, used to be a mine at the era of king Asaad Alkamil who ruled during the pre-Islamic era. Mining is thought to have stopped at this time, according to the information from the locals.

Hassan Hadhban, one of Gernau festival organizers, told Sabaa news agency that samples were taken to the laboratories of the Ministry of Oil and Minerals. They proved to be rich in a number of minerals.

Many of the samples are shiny granite hollow stones that were thought to be crushers of rocks, as the area was famous for its primitive old mines and laboratories.

Sheikh Arfaj bin Hadhban called on local and Arab investors to make tourist projects in the area, because of its huge capacity for attracting tourists.

Revival of public cultural heritage

The public and official organizers of Gernau festival aim at reviving the rich historical and archeological heritage of the area. Their aim is to enhance desert tourism.

Festival activities included many functions reflecting the ancient cultural activities of the region. There were camel and horse races, hunting with dogs and falcons and desert tours on camel back. A desert car rally was also organized.

Exhibition of traditional artifacts

More than 1200 people, 42 camels, 15 horses and 20 cars participated in the festival. Artifacts of the Bedouins who live in this area, including woven wool, and hand mills were displayed in the festival.

Activities of the people of the area were also displayed. Of these there were; camel milking, herding, feeding and watering from wells. The recitation of poetry during the enjoyment of Arabian coffee was held inside wool tents

Public Zamil poems sessions were presented during the mornings and evening sessions of the festival. There was even sunset watching, an old Bedouin pass time.

Stolen Yemeni stele returns home

emen has regained a fertility deity after 11 years of absence. The antiquity, stolen during the 1994 civil war, has arrived in the country recently.

September.net quoted well-informed sources as saying that the stele is one of significant Yemeni collection of antiquities

The carved slab of alabaster that has survived centuries of wear, a civil war, and looting from Aden museum has been returned to home after surfacing at an auction in the USA last December.

A repatriation ceremony took place at that time at the headquarters of the Immigration and Customs Enforcement division of the Department of Homeland Security in Chelsea. The artifact was officially signed over to the Yemeni ambassador last December.

The piece, known as the South Arabian Alabaster Stele, depicts fertility goddess Dat-Hamim in bas-relief on a foot-high tablet. It is estimated to date from 300-400 A.D. The stele was stolen in July 1994 from the Aden Museum during the cessation war.

The recovery of the artifact followed a lengthy investigation. In May 2003, British Immigration and Customs

Enforcement agents learned that the owners of Phoenix Ancient Art, antiquities dealers with galleries in Geneva and on the Upper East Side, had consigned the piece to Sotheby's for auction with an estimated sale price of \$20,000 to \$30,000. Phoenix's owners, brothers Ali and Hicham Aboutaam, had told

the auction house that the piece came from a private English collection. In their research to prepare for the auction, Sotheby's staff discovered that the stele was photographed and documented as a part of the Aden Museum's collection. Immigration and Customs agents confirmed that the stele was stolen and issued a seizure warrant in September, 2003.


While the stele was valued at tens of thousands of dollars, it is considered to be a priceless artifice. "It's much more than that," an American expert said at the repatriation ceremony. "It's a building block of history, a building block of a culture." Such breaches demonstrate border vulnerabilities that must be repaired.

Many attempts to smuggle Yemeni antiquities have been thwarted recently some of them involved large quantities of ancient relics which form a living witness to the craftsmanship and magnificence of old Yemeni civilizations.



Fifty Years in Shifting Sands (5/5)

s the Egyptians troops Yemen, many thought the end of the Republic was inevitable. Even many in the Republican side protested the leaving of the Egyptians for fear that the Royalists were going to take over Sana'a. But the Egyptians were adamant. They also affirmed their desire to close the "Yemen file" and released all the politicians, officers and social dignitaries that were locked up in the "War Prison" in Cairo. It was then that the late "Professor" Ahmed Mohammed Nu'uman uttered his famous quote when he said: "We came to Cairo to seek the right to speak, only to find ourselves now deprived of the right to take a leak!" With the Egyptians gone, the old heroes of the Yemeni Patriotic Movement found themselves again in the forefront of political life in the country. It was clear to many that the status quo of the Republic as it was kept under the Egyptians could not ensure the survival of the Republic. The "patriots" put together a proposal for reform that was to put the Republic on a sound constitutional footing. Although President Sallal had signed his agreement to the proposal, he and many of the political and military elements that relied on Egyptian backing decided to leave the country. A provisional government was set up during the bloodless coup d'état of November 5, 1967, until elections for the Consultative Assembly were held. As the military situation became critical with the Royalists surrounding Sana'a, General Hassan Al-Amri took over as Prime Minister and the Republican forces (including tribal forces of Hashid, led by Sheikh Abdullah Bin Hussein Al-Ahmar, the late Mujahid Abu Shawarib broke the Seventy-Day Siege. With the Republic somewhat saved, Al-Aini took over as Prime Minister in early 1969 and Yemen began a new era, enjoying the most dynamic period of Republican rule. A civilian government held sway and a not only of their own situations in vocal elected Consultative the homeland, but for regional cohe-Assembly was able to end the Royalist onslaught. Actually, the Saudis had pretty much agreed with the Egyptians that both should wash their hands of Yemen in the wake of the 1967 War. Although the Saudis still continued some nominal support to the Royalists, they were also not interested in seeing the Hamid Al-Dins return to power in Sana'a. Thus, the gestures for a peaceful settlement with the Saudis, by the Al-Aini Government were greeted positively. Negotiations led to recognition of the Republic by Saudi Arabia in the Summer of 1970 and a new era of National Reconciliation followed. Many of the Royalists were allowed to return and were peacefully molded back into the mainstream of society (with many reentering the civil service). All things seemed to be going well for the Al-Aini Government. However, the move to control the use of Qat and the proposed Unity Agreement with the Southern Yemenis, which was consummated after a brief period of border skirmishes made the Al-Aini Government unable to function much. December 30, 1972 saw the takeover of the Government by more conservative forces and Al-Aini went back to his diplomatic activities as Ambassador to London. The Al-Hajri Government held on for a while until the military reestablished its full control of the Government with the coup d'état of Colonel Ibrahim Al-Hamdi in June 1973. Mohsin Al-Aini returned as

Prime Minister for a couple of years, until disputes among the military brass and Al-Hamdi put Al-Aini in a critical situation since Al-Hamdi moved against some of the Abu Luhoum officers (in-laws of Al-Aini). To avoid exasperating the matter, Al-Aini resigned and went back to diplomacy again until the Mid-Nineties.

Of course, there is much more to the book than merely an accounting of the life of one of the most dynamic political personalities that Yemen could produce in this long volatile half century of the transformation of Yemen from a medieval kingdom on one part and a formerly weakly held last bastion of British Imperialism in the South later turned into the most radically oriented Arab bastion of Soviet socialism. Amidst all this dichotomy, a number of other paradoxes and much regional and international maneuvering, Mr. Al-Aini tried to bring to the reader the many challenges that beset many serious minded and sincerely hopeful politicians and social dignitaries to bring Yemen to its deserved place among nations working for the betterment sion and harmony and international peace. The challenges, as Mr. Al-Aini showed on a number of occasions in this dramatic exposé of the metamorphosis of a small strategically located country from an obscure closed state to a country of promise, beset by so many obstacles, can truly be monumental and indeed warrant more in-depth study. In this book, we have a living portrayal of not only the complex politics, so few have been able to reveal in their chronicle of these very same times, but also of the underlying aspirations, hopes and human frustration of bad circumstance, conflicting interests and other forces, for which such hopes and aspirations have no bearing. Yemen is still a promising country and much can be achieved to make its place in the regional scene and the international community more weighty. Many of the themes discussed by Al-Aini can still play a pivotal role in reorienting the country onto a proper course of modern statecraft: national reconciliation, a greater and freer role for civil society, and more genuine participation of the people in the political, social and economic development. That is what I believe Mr. Al-Aini sought to project in his candid autobiography, which should be a source of further academic and historical study and analysis. Third World politics can arouse interest indeed, if only third world intellectuals could come out and speak their minds.

Aden: The Arab Sea pearl


den has many names. Among these are The Eye of Yemen, Beauty of the East and Gem of the seas. All the names represent praise and love to this unique city.

Name and history

'Aden' is an Arabic verb, which means 'reside', or a place where travelers stay and rest. Aden is a junction of routes for old eastern and western ships. It used to be well known in the ancient world, and its name was mentioned in the Old Testament.

The ancient Greeks also knew Aden. They gave it its name, which for centuries was the name for the whole Arabia: 'Arabia Felix'. Aden's name was also found in an old Greek inscription, which goes back to the second century CE. The famous Arab explorer, Ibn Batuta, described Aden in some of his books, and called it, 'the greatest port of Yemen that receives great boats, and embraces the merchants of Egypt and India'. The ancient historian and sailor Claudius Ptolemy described it as 'the gem of Arabia'.

History books attribute Aden to Adnan, one of Noah's sons. Others connect it with the word 'Adon', which

means staying in Arabic. They say that one of the old Yemeni kings, Tababia'a, used to imprison criminals and outlaws in this area.

Yemeni historian, Mohamed Mohairiz discussed the meaning of the word Aden in Arabic dictionaries. One of these meanings is to aden the land, which means to live in it. Another meaning of to aden the land is to manure it and prepare it for cultivation. A third meaning is to get minerals out of the land. He also tackled the word

'adan', which means a group of men staying in one place. All the meanings give the sense of residing and preparing the land for cultivation and mining.

An old legend

Historian Altaib Ba-Makhrama wrote in his book that 'Aden was an old oasis to which Gabil ran to it from India when he killed his brother Habil'. He lived with his family in Sira Mountain. Gabil felt lonely so the devil used musical instruments to relieve him. The historian assumes that it was the first time that music was used for recreation

Aden and the mount of Socatra Island used to be one piece of land. A man called Tho-Alqarnain came and dug a bay between them. The sea surrounded Aden and only the tops of its hills used to be seen.

"Bird flu in Yemen" Government denies .. Parliament confesses

two or three cases of bird flu in the country", Dr. Najeeb Saeed from the General Health and Population Committee told the parliament. This confession came in the fierce debate between the parliamentarians and the representatives of the health and agriculture ministries last Monday. Although Najeeb Saeed did not provide any evidence of the actual number of bird flu cases, he criticized limited resources to diagnose a possible infected bird.

Deputy minister of Public Health and Population, Mr. Bin Majed Al-Juneid, admitted that there are no specialized labs and hospitals to test the samples that have been collected from different rural areas. He said that the samples have been sent to World Health Organization (WHO) to be checked. However, there have been no confirmed cases of bird flu in Yemen so far. "The cabinet has allocated 100 million YR for the purchase of vaccinations and to prepare specialized labs and hospitals for vain flu. The foreign aid for such preparations has amounted to US\$ 160,000 " he told the press. Dr. Mohamed Thabet Al-Asali, also from the General Health and Population Committee of the parliament, expressed his distrust of the government in dealing with the disease, and claimed that any funds allocated for



"combating bird flu" would open up the opportunity for "embezzlement and corruption". He asked how the government could deal with a possible outbreak, when it could not deal with treatable diseases such as malaria, that still exists across the country, in the past.

Al-Asali said there is a possibility of already having "a bird flu epidemic in the country in birds, if not in human, especially as Yemen has a long coastline and is a destination for migrant birds."

Health expert and politician, Dr. Abdulkareem Shaiban, who left the parliament in protest after he was not allowed to speak, supported Al-Asali's view. He stated that the government would "declare a state of emergency if a minister or a prominent official falls ill to this fatal disease", but would do little in the present situation.

"Yet there are no laboratories or

chemical solutions to diagnose the disease, nor surplus medicines to deal with a potential outbreak. We continue to import chicken and eggs."

He said that the government's strategy of "concealing facts about the spread of epidemic diseases" only contributed to increasing the disease's effect.

He said: "A clear example of consequences of this strategy is the outbreak of the Rift Valley Disease, which has killed more than 80 people in the last two weeks in Taiz province alone."

Shaiban said the parliament have already dealt with cases of suspected bird flu, referring to a recent debate concerning poultry imports suspected of infection from China. According to him, the government has ordered the shipments return to their original place, since there was no ability to test those goods. That caused a huge loss to the traders.

No evidence Tamiflu caused deaths: FDA

aryland (Reuters) U.S. regulators do not have enough evidence to say Roche AG's anti-flu drug Tamiflu caused deaths or psychiatric problems in children in Japan, Food and Drug Administration officials said on Friday.

The FDA has been studying reports of 12 deaths and 32 cases of psychiatric problems in children who had taken Roche's drug, which is in high demand as a defense against a possible avian flu pandemic in people.

All but one of the psychiatric events, which included hallucinations and abnormal behavior, also were reported in Japan.

FDA officials are seeking input about the reports from a panel of outside experts meeting Friday.

Linda Lewis, an FDA medical officer, said in prepared remarks there was "insufficient evidence to establish that deaths and neuropsychiatric events represent a safety signal associated with Tamiflu."

The agency will ask the committee if it agrees the FDA should continue monitoring Tamiflu's safety in children and report back to the panel within two years.



Lifestyle blamed for many cancers

BBC - Simple lifestyle and environmental changes could significantly help to cut the number of cancer deaths around the world each year, research suggests.

Experts linked more than a third of the seven million cancer deaths worldwide in 2001 to nine potentially modifiable risk factors. These include poor diet, smoking, alcohol, obesity, lack of exercise and air pollution.

The researchers calculated that of the seven million deaths from cancer in 2001, 2.43 million were linked to the nine risk factors, that are obesity, low fruit and vegetable intake, lack of exercise, smoking, alcohol unsafe sex, urban air pollution, indoor smoke from household use of coal and contaminated injections

The findings were based on a comprehensive review of scientific studies and other sources such as government reports.

The Harvard team and their collaborators also re-analysed some of the original data from the studies.

They concluded that in low and middle-income countries the most important risk factors were smoking, alcohol use, and low consumption of fruit and vegetables.

In high-income countries, smoking, alcohol use, and obesity played the leading role.

Deaths could be cut

Lead researcher Dr Majid Ezzati said that smoking was by far the most important risk factor for cancer - alone responsible for 21% of cancer deaths worldwide.

He said public health campaigns targeting smoking in the UK had led to a drop in deaths from lung cancer in the past few decades, and showed just how effective such campaigns could be.

He said: "Primary prevention through lifestyle and environmental interventions remains the main route for reducing the global cancer burden.

"If implemented, reduction of exposure to well-known behavioral and environmental risk factors would prevent a substantial proportion of deaths from cancer."

Dr Kat Arney, of the charity Cancer Research UK, said: "This report is an impressive demonstration that many cancers, and many deaths from the disease worldwide, are preventable.

"Cancer Research UK estimates that around half of all cancers in the UK could be prevented by changes to lifestyle."

The charity has launched a Reduce the Risk campaign, encouraging people to quit smoking, stay in shape, eat and drink healthily, avoid excessive sun exposure, be body aware and go for screening when invited

Genes can be 'changed' by foods

BBC - What we eat may influence our health by changing specific genes, researchers believe. Several studies in rodents have shown that nutrients and supplements can change the genetics of animals by switching on or off certain genes. It is not clear whether foods do the same in humans, but an article in New Scientist says there is good reason to believe they do. In the future, diseases might be reversed by diet in this way, it says.

Modifying DNA

While many disorders in humans are caused by mutations to DNA, a few, including some cancers, occur when genes are switched on or off.

There are thousands of genes in the body, but not all of them are active.

Scientists have been looking at what factors might control gene activity and have found some evidence to suggest that diet is important.

In a recent animal experiment, adult rats were made to behave differently by injecting them with a specific amino acid called L-methionine.

After the injections, the animals were less confident when exploring new environments and produced higher levels of stress hormones.

The change to their behavior occurred because the amino acid altered the way the rat's genes were expressed.

L-methionine altered a gene for glucocorticoid that helps control the animal's response to stress, Moshe Szyf and his team from McGill University in Montreal, Canada, told a meeting on environmental epigenomics in



November in Durham, North Carolina.

It added chemical tags, known as methyl groups, to the gene by a process called methylation.

The researchers are now looking to see if they can cause a positive rather than a negative behavioral change in animals using a naturally-occurring chemical called trichostatin A (TSA).

TSA causes the opposite effect to Lmethionine on genes, stripping them of methyl groups.

Dr Szyf said his work showed how important subtle nutrients and supplements can be.

Animal research has also shown that a mother's diet can affect the level of DNA methylation and hence gene expression in offspring.

Professor Ian Johnson at the Institute of Food Research is investigating whether colon cancer in humans might be triggered by diet through DNA methylation. His team is studying healthy people before this cancer

starts. He said: "It's quite a strong possibility that nutrients might cause DNA changes. We think diet may have a role to play as a regulator in genes.

"Ultimately one would want to chose diets that would give you the most beneficial pattern of DNA methylation in the gut. But it is too early to say that we know the dietary strategy to do that.

"We need much more research.

"Genes regulate all the processes in the body and things that change gene expression, therefore, may be linked to a number of health issues other than cancer too."

He said one nutrient that scientists believe might influence methylation is folate or folic acid.

A deficiency in folate levels has been linked to an increased risk of developing some adult cancers, including breast and colon.

Bryan Berard scored twice and Duvie Westcott scored the other goals for the Blue Jackets.



Dear Fellow teachers,

nowledge of computer and how to use it profitably has become a necessity for everyone in this world, for any job computeracy is a necessary qualification. Teachers and learners need to know how to use computers for their purposes not because of the recent popularity

mnk bose@hotmail.com of e-learning but for basic day-Professor of English, to-day classroom activities. Faculty of Arts, lbb Teachers find it easy to get their teaching notes prepared and printed out with their computer; they can carry them in the floppies or CDs and use them in the classroom if they have laptops with them; it is not utopian these days, as I see laptops with many teachers teaching in schools. Learners can store information, retrieve what is necessary for the class, print them out for the day. If laptops are available, not utopian any more, they can carry them to the classes. If not in

schools, it happens in some college

classes in Yemen (Don't get excited!). Long ago, I wrote in an Indian newspaper about the myths that surround the computer and why to dispel them. It is irrelevant today as most of the myths have got dispelled in the course of time; but one of the myths is still lurking in the minds of some of my fellow teachers, especially the old ones. It is this: computers may replace teachers. If any of us believe this myth, we will become a laughing stock in the midst of today's learners. Not now, even after many years of computer use and so many technological advancements, teachers can never be replaced and divorced from the learners; as long there are learners, there will be teachers. So don't worry, computers can never be a threat to our jobs!

Apart from the personal use of computers, they can be used for teaching / learning purposes. The market is full of CDs for learning all kinds of things, for learning cooking, drawing, child rearing,

driving, automobile repairing, sewing, and so on. There are CDs for learning languages, almost all languages in the world. (Don't ask me where then the need for teachers is; my quick answer is 'Who wrote the materials for these CDs?') I am told that there are CDs that can put a child

to sleep in the absence of the mother!

What I am interested in are the English language teaching materials for use in our situations. There are plenty to choose from - for teaching grammar, spoken English reading, writing, notetaking, dictionary use etc. Good materials have been published by the Cambridge University Press, Oxford University Press and the BBC, to quote a few. Though I was using some of these materials in the 90's, when I taught a course called Computer-assisted English language learning at the CIEFL in India, I am aware that most of them are available now in their advanced versions. Some of them are to be used as they are (like our books) and some others are manipulatable according to our needs. In a grammar material, for example, the blanks can be moved as we need or the words can be deleted as we want. In a reading material, for example, the passage for reading can be written down by the teacher to suit the level of the learners. Similarly, in the writing material, we can change the exercises according to our needs. In addition, materials are available for self-learning, which can be used by the learners on their own, if they can afford, at home for further practice. In the next letter, I'll share with you the other advanced uses of computers in ELT these days.



The main mountains in "Al- Jawf" Allaudah Mountain.

Allaudh Mountain is situated to the east of Al-Jawf, where there are ancient archaeological sites, and a temple lies at its foot, while the pathway leading to its summit is still existent.

Al-Boras Mountain:

Located between Raghwan and Marib and is merely consisting of plateaus known as Jabal Al-Borqan.

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fertile plains irrigated with the Wadi waters. One of the main wadis in the region of Al-Jawf is Al-Kharid Wadi, approximately 60km long and 30km wide embracing vast fruit farms along its banks, and it is historically known as Jawf Valley.

However, there is an historical site of the "Ushaiter" temple, situated some 700 meters east of Al-Sowda'a, which is known today as among the most reputed ancient temples and very accurately decorated construction ever been built by ancient Yemeni architects and artists. A French archaeological expedition discovered it in 1980 in cooperation with Public Corporation of Archeology Barat and Souq Al-Anan.

This area is accessible from Al-Harf area via a 65km-long dirt road. It is mountainous and hilly place with a valley adjacent to and connected with the plain areas.

The lifestyle of the population is predominantly nomadic. Some of the villages boast of wonderful architectural style. Outstanding are the villages of Al- Marashi, Rajouza and Souq Al-Anan. The houses of Souq Al- Anan are colorfully decorated on the outside, with ornamental decorations around the windows as well as white gypsum motifs.

Al-Beida'a & Al-Sowda'a Cities

These two cities are located in AL-Masloop province in AL-Jawf. The two cities are twenty kilometers far

Barakesh

It is to the south of AL-Khalak province, about 5 kilometers to the west of the main paved road that links AL-Jawf governorate to Sana'a, the capital, and governorate of Mareb.

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Barat Mountain

It is a high mountain permeated with fertile valleys where various types of fruit are grown, especially figs as well as vineyards. It overlooks the area of Najran to the north and the areas of Khab and the Empty Quarter to the east.

Al-Rayyan Mountain

It is a big mountain on the northeast of Al-Jawf.

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
