More suicide bombs says Hamas leader

SANA'A — A top official with Hamas, the group known for its support of the Palestinian Intifada through suicide bombings, told a audience Yemeni Saturday that such martyrdom killings are necessary and Arabs should not let international pressure convince them of otherwise.

"Suicide bombings are carried out by all Palestinian groups and not only Hamas and Jihad movements. Yet, Arabs should not be hasty in judging them under US pressure," Khalid Mesha'al, head of the political division of Hamas movement.

Mesha'al, based in Qatar, made his comments while at a press conference at the Taj Sheba Hotel

He stressed that the Palestinian people are ready to die honorably and that the suicide bombings are necessary for striking a balance with the Israelis amid the weakness of Arab countries.

Responding to a US-based report that president Ali Abdullah Saleh requested Hamas to quit suicide bombings, Mesha'a said

> that Saleh hasn't asked for a stop to such bombings, but the president asked Hamas to unify its lines with the other Palestinian groups fighting Israel.

> Mesha'al praised Yemen's official stance towards their Palestinian brothers, describing it as "exemplary." "Yemenis are unanimous about

the Palestinian Intifada since its outset a year and seven months ago," he said.

He affirmed the continuity of Intifada until Israel's occupation

forces leave Palestine.

"The Palestinian people have tried negotiations but to no avail," Mesha'al also said, adding that the Palestinian people and Hamas movement adhere to national unity as a strategic choice.

All the Palestinian groups have unified their lines in the field, though they aren't politically uni-

Mesha'al urged the Palestinian Authority to maintain the political to strengthen the unity Palestinian's people resistance.

He accused the US administration of being the only country in the world supporting Zionists, noting that Europe and much of the world support Palestinian cause.


Mesha'al made it clear that Palestinians don't need more Arab conferences and summits because they have made its strategic choice to resist the Israeli occupation

He said to end resistance as a gesture to get officials back to the negotiating table will not because happen Hamas believes that will dispirit Palestinian resist-

ance and shake its national unity. He also called on all the Palestinians to have patience and continue with the resistance until they are victorious.

He suggested the war is turning to the Palestinian side as more Israelis are now being killed proportionally to Palestinians.

he also called on Yemenis to financially support their Palestinians brothers, and said that all aid, whether coming through official or charitable sources, are fully received.





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Man dies inside pit

The seminar was inaugurated with a welcome speech and a working paper by Mr. Walid Chief of the Yemen Times on the

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

Exchange of trade between Yemen and Indonesia has been progressing, particularly in the recent years.



Chirac set to give big trouncing to Le Pen in final French vote


political mayhem, French voters across the political spectrum were urged Saturday to rally behind Jacques Chirac in Sunday's presidential vote and deny far-right leader Jean-Marie Le Pen vic-

With the mud-slinging campaign officially over and the noisy street rallies a distant echo, voters had a final day to reflect on an election that has become a referendum on the extreme right after Le Pen's shock success last month.

Le Pen, a 73-year-old former political street brawler who once called the Holocaust a "detail" of history, stunned Europe on April 21 when he edged Socialist Prime Minister Lionel Jospin into third place in the first round with 17 percent of the vote.

In an example of the unity that has emerged in the wake of Le Pen's triumph, France's leading newspapers Saturday urged readers to vote for the sleaze-tarnished Chirac in order to block the xenophobic far-right leader.

The left-wing daily Liberation printed the word "Yes" in big block letters on its cover over a drawing of a ballot being cast for Chirac - evoking the huge front-page "No" it ran the morning after Le Pen knocked Jospin out of the race.

default in Sunday's runoff - thanks to a rare show of unity that has both the Catholic church and homosexuals joining to block Le Pen - everyone is looking ahead to parliamentary elections next month for the real contest.

Those elections, held over two rounds on June 9 and 16, will determine the color of the next government and whether Chirac again has to share power with the left after five years of paralyzing "cohabitation" with Jospin.

Commentators say Sunday's vote could influence Chirac's choice of an interim prime minister to serve between May and June.

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
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

Seige of church in **Bethlehem coming** to conclusion

BETHLEHEM, West Bank (Reuters) -A 33-day stand-off between the Israeli army and Palestinian militants holed up in Bethlehem's Church of the Nativity could be resolved "in the coming hours," the town's mayor said Saturday.

An army sniper shot dead a Palestinian in the church compound earlier in the

Palestinian sources said aides to Palestinian President Yasser Arafat were holding a new round of talks Saturday to end the siege, which began on April 2 when 30 wanted militants took refuge in the church as the Israelis launched an offensive into West Bank towns.

Israeli negotiator Colonel Marcel Aviv confirmed that the negotiations were continuing and said he hoped a solution would be found soon.

U.S. officials were taking part in the talks, Mayor Hanna Nasser, who has been involved in the on-off negotiations over the past month, told Reuters.

"I am telling you that I expect it to be solved in the coming hours," Nasser said, adding: "Without the Americans, no solution would take place."

Inside the besieged church, revered by Christians as the site where Jesus was born, are dozens of civilians and clergy.

The main proposal would allow the freer flow of nonmilitary goods to Iraq but defines a "goods review list" of items with possible military use that need to be approved by U.N. agencies and Security Council members before items can be sent to Iraq.

The council had wanted to adopt the resolution as soon as possible to allow U.N. staff to cope with new procedures. The vote is due before May 29, when the current six-month phase of oil-for-food sales expires.

Iraq exports oil under a U.N. humanitarian oil-for-food swap permitted as an exception to U.N. sanctions imposed at the end of the 1991 Gulf War sparked by Iraq's invasion of

Lone gunman takes hostages at hotel

ISTANBUL. (Reuters) - A lone ethnic Chechen gunman burst into a five-star tourist hotel in central Istanbul on Saturday firing a Kalashnikov rifle and took 10 hostages before surrendering peacefully to police, a security official

It appeared to be the latest in a string of Chechen hostage takings in Turkey, albeit of brief duration, and could have

ramifications on relations with Russia. Moscow has repeatedly complained Turkish police do too little to counter what they call Chechen terrorists.

NTV television said the man had wanted to make a statement about the rebel Chechen region of Russia, where Russian forces still face guerrilla resistance to Moscow's rule.

"A man entered the hotel and took 8-10 hostages," said Istanbul security police chief Hasan Ozdemir. "He then started firing indiscriminately left and right." NTV Television said the hostages included Greek tourists.

He surrendered without any resistance after security police entered the hotel, a high modern building on the central Taksim Square which is busy with tourists at this time of year.

The square was sealed off and surrounded by police.

Turkey has been the scene of several Chechen hostage takings. Moscow has frequently complained that Turkey does not do enough to counter what it calls Chechen terrorists active in Istanbul. But the group enjoys broad sympathy here.

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More than 1,000 march in Bahraini

May Day demonstration

(ArabicNews.com) - More than 1000 persons held a demonstration on Wednesday on the occasion of May day (May 1st), in the first demonstration of its kind in Bahrain and in the conservative Gulf states.

The demonstrators including scores of women took the street from Raas al-Rumman in al-Manama chanting slogans calling for considering the first of May as a national day off and to found workers trade unions in the country.

Other slogans voiced solidarity with the "Palestinian people and workers" and the demonstrators which was called upon by the Progressive Democratic Forum Society (political movement) raised the flags of Bahrain and Palestine and walked for 1.5 Km until the headquarters of the UN offices in Bahrain where scores of workers were observing a sit-in called upon by the general committee for the workers of Bahrain in solidarity with the "people and workers of Palestine."

In a statement on the occasion, the general committee of the workers of Bahrain circulated during the sit-in called for drawing "fundamental solutions for the problem of unemployment" in Bahrain as the announced rate of unemployment in the country is 14% of the total labor force. A situation which created an adverse situation on the general social stability and a waste for the opportunities of human resources development," according to the statement.

In front of the UN offices, the observers of the sit-in raised two memorandum. The first is addressed to the UN secretary general Kofi Annan calling for the implementation by Israel of international resolutions especially resolutions 242 and 338 and stressing the right of return back for the Palestinians"

and also UN resolution 402 which calls on Israel "to lift the siege imposed on the occupied Palestinian territories and pull out from the Palestinian cities.'

The memorandum also called for dispatching UN forces to protect the Palestinians and called on the UN Security Council "to form a neutral international investigation committee to investigate into the massacres committed by the Israeli forces at Jenin Camp" and lastly to force Israel to abide by the international law.

In the second memorandum which is directed to the director general of the International Labor Organization Juan Somaphia, the observers of the sit in called for "condemning the Israeli aggressions against the Palestinian territories and the systematic Israeli destruction operations of the Palestinian infrastructure" and "also condemning the policy of besieging, killing and expul-

sion which put the majority of the Palestinians under the poverty line." The memorandum urged the ILO secretary general to send a special mission for fact finding on the grave conditions of the Palestinian workers and to allocate necessary funds to help in rebuilding the Palestinian infrastructure and establishments which were destroyed.

Moreover, a statement by the "progressive democratic forum society' circulated during the demonstration said that the society backs the demands voiced by the workers of Bahrain to announce May first as an official day off, expressing "solidarity with the unemployed workers in the country." The society also called for rapid and serious measures according to a comprehensive national plan to solve the unemployment crisis and to putting an end to collective sacking, according to the statement.n. (Arabicnews.com)

Japan to strengthen ties with Iran

Foreign Minister Yoriko Kawaguchi met her Iranian counterpart Kamal Kharrazi on Saturday in a visit seen as trying to balance ties between Tokyo's biggest oil supplier Iran and its major Western ally the United States.

While U.S. President George W. Bush has dubbed Iran part of an "axis of evil" for allegedly pursuing weapons of mass destruction, Japan has pursued closer ties with Iran, the source of more than 10 percent of its oil imports.

Japan, alongside European Union countries, has attempted a policy of engagement with the Islamic Republic by encouraging reformers around President Mohammad Khatami. The policy is in contrast to the hardline condemnation by the United States.

Kawaguchi's visit aimed at bolstering ties and expressing support for reform efforts in Iran as well as dis-

cussing Afghan reconstruction, a spokesman said.

Before travelling to Iran, she visited Afghanistan to discuss Tokyo's role in rebuilding the war-torn country.

Kawaguchi is due to meet President Mohammad Khatami on Sunday.

Seven Iranian schoolgirls drown as boat capsizes

TEHRAN, (Reuters) - At least seven Iranian schoolgirls drowned on Saturday when their boat capsized in a small lake in a park in the south of the capital of Tehran, witnesses said.

Police and passersby rescued five girls who were then rushed to hospital where they were said to be in a critical condition.

Local authorities were draining the lake in an attempt to find the bodies of up to four other girls still missing.

There were no life-belts on board the craft and none of the girls could swim, police said.

President Mohammad Khatami, in a message broadcast on state television, offered his condolences to the families of the victims and called for the formation of an emergency committee to investigate the cause of the accident.

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Kuwait to get archives back after 12 years

Saturday the United Nations was in sole charge of overseeing the possible handover of its national archives seized by Iraq when it invaded in 1990.

But Kuwait's Foreign Minister Sheikh Sabah al-Ahmad al-Sabah also said his country could accept a role by the Arab League if the world body asked it to set up a process for the han-

Iraq on Friday confirmed it was ready to return the archives.

The archives are among a variety of Kuwaiti property missing since Baghdad's August 1990 invasion and seven-month occupation of the country, including military gear and museum pieces.

since to account for looted property as well as some 605 people, mainly Kuwaitis.

The issue of missing persons and articles has been a major stumbling block for Baghdad in its campaign for the lifting of sanctions imposed by the Security Council after the invasion.

Baghdad denies any knowledge of the whereabouts of those missing while Kuwait, backed by a Security Council resolution, says they are being held in

Sheikh Sabah told the official Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) it would be possible to agree on a procedure with the Cairo-based Arab League "for the full return of Kuwaiti belongings, including archive, which is (among the responsibilities of U.N.) Secretary-General Kofi Annan"

Kuwaiti officials had told Reuters their small country was eager to confine disputes with Iraq under the umbrella of the United Nations and Security Council resolutions related to the 1990-91 Gulf crisis in case they became dilut-

"If this does happen and the archives are transferred to Kuwait, it will be a positive development, and I hope it would also help improve relations in the region," Annan told reporters following two days of talks with an Iraqi delegation on a possible return to Baghdad of

Oman won't allow assault from its lands

Iraqi diplomats and experts on Thursday met with UN representatives in the course of continued discussions started since two days on the return of UN inspectors to Iraq.

The UN Secretary General Kofi Annan and the Iraqi foreign minister on Wednesday held discussions in two round of talks that lasted for two hours. Today (Friday) morning, Annan and Sabri will be meeting. The Iraqi experts delegation was headed by the two advisors for the Iraqi President Saddam Hussein - Dia' Jaafar who is specialized in nuclear weapons and the Gen. Ameer al- Saadi who is specialized in chemical and biological weapons.

Meanwhile, the Omani minister of state for foreign affairs Youssef Bin Alawi Bin Abdullah - in a statement to the London- based al-Sharq al-Awsat issued on Thursday - ruled out any cooperation with the US in the context of the possibility of a military operation against Iraq, opposed strongly by the Sultanate of Oman.

The Omani minister said: "We will not permit striking any Arab state from Oman." He reiterated Muscat's objection to any military operation Washington threatens to launch against Iraq under pretexts that Iraq develops mass destruction weapons. He added that differences between countries are solved by negotiations and understanding.

He warned Washington against the grave consequences of another adventure in the Middle East. Arabicnews.com)

OTTAWA, (Reuters) - The long-awaited trial of a Canadian man accused of being involved in a fatal Riyadh bombing has finally begun, Saudi Arabia's ambassador to Canada said on Friday.

Mohammed al-Hussaini said lawyers for businessman William Sampson were now formally preparing their defense. The case will be heard by a court of 15 judges whose verdict will then be reviewed by the royal court.

"You can say the trial has begun," he told reporters in Ottawa, but declined to speculate as to how long the proceedings would take. Sampson could face the

death penalty if found guilty.

The case is putting increasing strain on relations between Ottawa and Rivadh Last month, Sampson's chief lawyer said reports that his client had been sentenced to death in a secret trial were false.

Sampson, as well as a Briton and a Belgian, were arrested in December 2000 following a bomb blast that killed a British man.

Saudi officials blame such explosions on rival gangs of Western bootleggers who make a living evading the conservative Muslim kingdom's strict ban on



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Bangladesh ferry sinks; hundreds feared dead

in southern Bangladesh overnight and officials fear hundreds may have died or been swept away by strong river cur-

Some survivors claimed Saturday the ferry was overloaded and said strong winds caused it to list to one side and sink.

Divers found the bodies of a woman and a child and pulled nearly 100 survivors from the turbulent Meghna River, keeping their fingers crossed for further rescues.

Reporters at the scene saw scores of wailing men and women crowding the river's banks looking for relatives among the survivors or seeking news about the missing.

"It (the ferry) was packed beyond its carrying capacity," said survivor Mohammad Altaf, 40. "It was dark and we were sitting on the ferry's congest-

> "Within moments I was thrown overboard into the water and I saw the ferry going down as well," he said.

More than 200 people were killed when a ferry sank near Chandpur in

disaster and ordered a massive rescue effort, the state-run Bangladesh Television (BTV) reported.

The government had formed a threemember committee headed by a senior official of the shipping ministry to investigate the ferry's sinking and ascertain its causes, it said.

BTV reported the ferry was carrying about 400 people, of whom nearly 100 had been rescued and some had made it themselves to the shore.

"I was going to Barisal (near Patuakhali) with my one-and-halfyear-old son. We were on the upper deck. Suddenly a strong wind blew and the ferry listed to one side. It sank immediately," said the boy's mother

"I was saved by another vessel but my son died," she told a Reuters photographer at the scene.

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Philippine troops capture wounded Abu Sayyaf official

ZAMBOANGA, Philippines

(Reuters) - Philippine troops captured a senior official of the Abu Sayyaf rebel group in a village hut where he was recovering from a gunshot wound, officials said Saturday.

The fourth highest official in the Abu Sayyaf, Sattar Yacub was the leader of a contingent of the Muslim rebels based in nearby Tuburan, Basilan. The government had put up a \$20,000 reward for his arrest, Southern Command spokesman Colonel Danilo Servando said.

Yacub was part of the group holding American missionary couple Martin and Gracia Burnham hostage, military offi-

Yacub told reporters while he was

being escorted by police and military officers that the Burnhams were now with the group of Abu Sayyaf spokesman Abu Sabaya but he had no knowledge of their current whereabouts.

The Abu Sayyaf, linked by the United States to Saudi-born militant Osama bin Laden and his al Qaeda network, has been holding the Burnham couple and a Filipina nurse since May last year.

"I was with Sabaya near Maluso (town in Basilan) last month and he was holding the Burnhams and Deborah Yap (nurse) before we separated," Yacub said. "I heard they are now in Jolo, but I really don't know where they are."

But military officials doubted Sabaya still had the hostages because of the growing rift among the Abu Sayyaf factions over ransom payments.

Sabaya said Wednesday the rebel group may kill their hostages since the government would not negotiate for their release. He admitted though that they would rather prolong the hostage crisis. Servando said Yacub, captured Friday, survived a gun battle with the military Monday when some 13 Abu Sayyaf members were killed.

The United States has accused bin Laden's al Qaeda network of masterminding the September 11 attacks on New York and Washington.

U.S. special forces, equipped with unmanned surveillance aircraft, night vision equipment and other sophisticated detection devices, are training local troops in counter-terrorism to aid them in their offensive against the Abu Sayyaf.

The Abu Sayyaf claims to be fighting for an Islamic state in the south of the mainly Catholic Philippines but pursues kidnapping for ransom as its main activ-

Meanwhile, local media reported police arrested six men in the northern Philippine provinces of Tarlac and Pangasinan following a series of raids on Islamic schools.

Various weapons, including high-caliber firearms and grenades were seized in the raids, the local media quoted police as saying.



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Smaliland appoints new president

HARGEISA, Somalia, May 3 (Reuters) - Somalia's breakaway enclave of Somaliland swore in a new president on Friday to replace Mohamed Ibrahim Egal, who died in hospital in South Africa, officials said.

The vice-president of Somaliland, Dahir Riyale Kahin, was inaugurated at an emergency meeting attended by senior government officials.

"The late president will be buried beside his father's grave in Berbera according to his last wishes," Kahin told the ceremony.

The new president called on the population to pray for the Egal, whose body is due to be brought to the Somiland capital of Hargeisa on Saturday.

"The people of Somaliland will do justice to their president and fulfil his goals and aspirations by safeguarding the security and peace of the country and cooperating to achieve these goals," Kahin said at the swearing-in ceremony.

Officials said the vice-president took over from the deceased president under a constitutional provision.

The self-declared republic of



Somaliland is a relatively stable enclave in otherwise anarchic Somalia. It declared independence from Somalia in 1991 but has not been recognised

internationally.

A South African official said Egal had died earlier on Friday at a military hospital in Pretoria. The South African Press Association said the 73-year-old died after undergoing a bowel operation.

Egal had been in power since he was chosen by the House of Elders, which acts as a parliament, in 1993. The House of Elders said in January it had voted to

extend Egal's latest term by one year, but opposition groups strongly opposed the extension.

Political analyst Herman Hanekom, of the South Africa-based Africa Institute, said he did not think Egal's death would have an impact on greater Somalia.

"He seemed to have been able to keep the people of Somaliland together, but in the greater context of Somalia he was a regional leader," Hanekom told Reuters in Johannesburg.

But he added that a danger point was Somaliland's neighbour Ethiopia, whose relations with its own neighbour Eritrea are tense after a border dispute and which could cause conflict by trying to exploit any Somaliland leadership vacuum.

"They would like to have someone in power there who is sympathetic to the Ethiopian cause. I think that is a possibility that must be taken note of," Hanekom

Gerry McCarthy, who heads Progressive Interventions, an Irish charity involved in Somaliland, described Egal as a "father figure".

"He was instrumental in promoting political harmony that has led to peace and stability in Somaliland in the past few years," he told Reuters in the Kenyan capital of Nairobi.

Egal left Somaliland late last month for what had been planned as a 10-day visit to South Africa for a medical checkup and diplomatic meetings.

Egal, who was married, attended higher education in Britain before beginning a long career in Somali politics, holding offices as prime minister and various ministerial posts. He spent several years in detention after a 1969 military coup.

Sout Africa's Mbeki leads minister's tribute

JOHANNESBURG, May 4 (Reuters) - South African President Thabo Mbeki led thousands of mourners on Saturday in an emotional tribute to the country's Safety and Security Minister Steve Tshwete, who died last week after a short illness.


"It is not our part to mourn. It is our right and privilege to celebrate the fact that we were blessed with so rare a gift of a fellow South African," Mbeki said at the funeral, held at a stadium at King Williams Town in the Eastern Cape.

A visibly moved Mbeki described Tshwete — who died in hospital of complications of kidney failure and pneumonia on April 26 — as a "genuine friend, a trustworthy colleague, an activist, a leader and a principled revolutionary".

Earlier, Deputy President Jacob Zuma led the crowd of about 20,000 in a rousing song of praise for Tshwete, a staunch Mbeki loyalist who was known in circles of the governing African National Congress (ANC) as "Mr. Fix-It".

During white minority apartheid rule, Tshwete was sentenced to 15 years in prison on Robben Island in 1964 for furthering the ANC's goals.

Former President Nelson Mandela — who spent 18 of his 27 years in prison on Robben Island — cabinet ministers and ANC officials were present at the colourful ceremony



punctuated by traditional Xhosa songs and cheers from the mourners.

As South Africa's first postapartheid sports minister he helped unify the country's racially divided sports bodies. He was promoted to Safety and Security minister in 1999.

Elephants, hippos destroy scarce crops in Malawi

MANGOCHI, MALAWI, May 4 (Reuters) - Rampaging herds of elephants and hippos have destroyed at least 10,000 hectares of staple crops in southern Malawi, exacerbating food shortages which threaten the entire country, officials said on Saturday.

Mekkie Mtewa, a member of parliament for the ruling United Democratic Front (UDF), told Reuters that at least three villages in his constituency had seen their entire crops wiped out by the marauding hippos and elephants.

"These animals have become uncontrollable. The three government game rangers accredited here are being overwhelmed by the boom in the population of the hippos and elephants."

"We are likely to face another major food crisis if these animals are not brought under control," he said.

The fields of maize and rice were destroyed in the southern lakeshore resort district of Mangochi, some 200 kilometres (125

miles) east of the commercial capital, Blantyre. Another 10,000 hectares are also said to be under threat from the animals.

International disaster and food relief agencies are warning of a "looming crisis" in southern Africa — mainly Malawi, Zambia and Zimbabwe — as a result of drought, political upheaval and depleted food stocks.

Malawi's representative for the World Food Programme, Adama Diop-Faye, was in the district distributing maize to people who have already run out of food and said the U.N. agency would closely monitor the situation.

Agriculture Secretary Ellard Malindi told Reuters there was a lull in the crisis as people in most parts of the country had started harvesting this year's crop. But he said this was unlikely to last as there was a projected deficit of 600,000 metric tonnes of maize this year.

Malawi's national maize requirement is 1.8 million tonnes.

President Bakili Muluzi declared a state of national disaster in Malawi in February.

Ravalomanana plans reconciliation government

ANTANANARIVO, May 3 (Reuters) - The man battling for Madagascar's presidency with incumbent Didier Ratsiraka said on Friday he would set up a national reconciliation government to try to end a crisis that has divided the island.

There was no immediate response from Ratsiraka, but before the announcement saboteurs believed to support the embattled ruler blew up a bridge to tighten a blockade of the capital Antananarivo, which his rival, Marc Ravalomanana, controls.

With the two leaders stalemated, Ravalomanana, who was declared president by a court on Monday, said he would ask the new government and the international community to help find a solution to the crisis stemming from a disputed election.

"I am working in the direction of putting in place a government that reconciles all Madagascans," he said in a statement issued in Antananarivo.

"I will ask that government of national reconciliation to prepare the conditions for a democratic conclusion to end the crisis in Madagascar."

An army general told local radio the bridge around 40 km (25 miles) south of Antananarivo was destroyed at dawn. It was the fifth to be blown up in recent weeks along roads linking the capital to the rest of the giant island off southeast Africa. It was not clear whether Ravalomanana, faced with threats of secession from provincial governors, would give in to demands from Ratsiraka supporters to hold a referendum to decide who rules the nation of 16 million people.

Ratsiraka rejected a court decision that a recount of disputed December polls showed Ravalomanana to have won. The two men had agreed to the recount last


Blowing up bridges effectively reinforces barricades erected by Ratsiraka supporters to isolate Antananarivo, cutting off vital supplies and devastating the economy by paralysing imports and exports.

Ratsiraka has reneged on an agreement made in Dakar to remove the barriers.

The crisis in Madagascar began when Ravalomanana, the hugely popular mayor of Antananarivo, accused Ratsiraka of rigging December 16 presidential elections.

Ravalomanana's supporters staged massive protests and a strike to try to force a recount, but when that failed the millionaire businessman declared himself president, saying he had no alternative.

Analysts have warned that violence is likely to worsen if the crisis persists. Up to 60 people have already died in clashes between the two sides, the Health Ministry says.

National statistics shows:

Economy shrinks, inflation rises

for 2001 recently released by Yemen's Statistical Central Organization the national economy shrank, while inflation

It shows that real GDP growth in 2001 declined to 1.76% down from 5.12% in the previous year (Table 1). Growth of all economic sectors decelerated in 2001. Four major sectors witnessed declines: construction from 8.2% to 4%, mining & quarrying from 7.2% to -0.2%, manufacturing from 6.1% to 0.9% and gas, electricity and water from 6.5% to 1.7 %. As a result, growth of value-added of the industrial sector declined from 7% to merely 0.7% in 2001. Value-added of the mining and quarrying sector recorded a negative growth rate for the first time in the 1990s. The overall growth rate of non-oil GDP also decelerated from 4.7% in 2000 to 2.1% in 2001.

The services sector (which includes government services) grew by only 2.2% in 2001 compared with 4.3% in 2000. During the year, the transport sub-sector recorded a modest growth while financial services contracted. The growth rate of the wholesale and retail trade sub-sector declined strongly from 8.3% in 2000 to 3% in 2001.

Nonetheless, the inflation rate started to decline in the first quarter (from 24% in December 2001 to 17.4% in February 2002). The main reason behind the increase in inflation rate in late 2001 was the sharp rise in the prices of Qat, fruits and vegetables. Price movements of Qat, fruits and vegetables are affected by weather and rainfall in particular. The reduction in the diesel subsidy since August 2001 was another factor behind price hikes. Similarly, the recent declines in the prices of qat and food commodities were the main reason of the recent declines in the overall index. The seasonal demand for food and non-food commodities was halted after the months of Ramadan, and two Eids.

The Central Bank of Yemen (CBY) has recently released preliminary figures of the balance of payment (BOP) for 2001. Based on the latest data (which are likely to be revised), the current account achieved a surplus in 2001 of US \$770 million compared with a record surplus in 2000 in the order of US \$1.9 billion (62% decline from last year's surplus). The current account surplus accrued due to the surplus achieved in the trade and unrequited transfers accounts.

The decline in the surplus of the trade account is mainly attributed to the 15% decline in oil exports as well as a 71% decline in non-oil exports. Workers remittances also declined in

(vii) Exchange Rate:

The nominal exchange rate stabilized at about YR 173 per US dollar after experiencing gradual depreciation in the second half of 2000 (monthly average of YR 168.59/US\$ in June 2001 and YR 173.27/US\$ in December 2001).

The Central Bank attributed the rapid depreciation during the last quarter of 2001 to the events of September 11th.

Despite seasonal demand for foreign currencies for pilgrimage (Hajj) during January and February of 2002, the depreciation of the exchange during the period was minimal. Average exchange rate reached YR/US\$ 173.36.

(viii) Foreign reserves and domestic credit:

Yemen's foreign reserves also stabilized at about US \$3.64 billion since October 2001, covering more than 13 months of imports.

The decline in oil prices following the September 11th events resulted in lower oil revenues in the last quarter of 2001. Domestic credits slightly increased between November and December and then declined during January 2002.

Net foreign assets remained stable since September of 2001. The net central government position with the banking system increased from YR 49 billion in December 2001 to YR 64 billion in January 2002 reflecting an increase in government deposits.

Further, claims on non-government sector increased from YR 96 billion in December 2001 to YR 98 billion in January 2002.

More EU business on the way

new season of economic co-operation with Europe is on Yemen's horizon thanks to the recent signing of a memorandum on the National Development Assistance Program.

Signed April 30, the agreement for 2002 to 2002 will see trade and other areas of interest increase with the EU.

"I very much appreciate our close cooperation with the Ministry and the EU Member States here in Sanaa, in drawing up this program", emphasized Rainer Schierhorst, head of the EC

office in Sana'a, during the ceremony. It will bring an estimated 70 million Euros to Yemen.

"I am confident that its implementation will make a significant contribution to socio-economic development process in Yemen and to meeting the challenges entailed therein." he added.

The National Development Assistance Program 2002-2004 has been prepared after consultations with the Yemeni government and the EU.

It takes forward the main objectives indicated in the EU-Yemen co-operation agreement entered in 1998, and prior to that in 1992 for financial and economic co-operation with developing countries in Asia and Latin America.

The areas of co-operation in the program are the following:

· Trade co-operation, with a view to diversifying two-way EU-Yemen trade and improving market access for imported and exported goods based on most favored nation sta-

Development co-operation, with a focus on reducing poverty and population growth in order to establish a favorable framework for sustainable socio-economic development.

Economic co-operation for development of a competitive and sustainable economic environment in Yemen by supporting wide-ranging measures to facilitate business and industrial manufacturing.

Co-operation in other areas such as environment, culture, science, and social and human resource development.

The National assistance program also

focuses on the following priorities: Development of economic institutions by supporting the process of Yemen's accession to the World Trade Organization (WTO) and private sector development to boost private sector investment.

\$1.5 M of work for Aden

den Plans are in the works to spend \$1.5 million to develop the city of Aden's infrastructure.

The proposal was made during an investment workshop held in conjunction with meetings of the Islamic Chambers of Commerce and Industry. The Islamic Bank for Development

presented a proposal on investment opportunities in Yemen, noting that the bank has financed 88 projects in Yemen from the time of its establishment to March, 2001.

The total cost of these operations is US \$564 million. They are geared to to help Yemen's government to establish services and agricultural and educational projects.

The Islamic development bank is currently financing 37 projects in Yemen, totaling US \$409 million.

The seminar also discussed the investment facilitation provided by Yemen's Investment Law for foreign

Activities of the Aden Containers Terminal was also discussed during the seminar, and working papers suggest activities of the Aden Container Terminal will rise to 450,000 transfers



by the end of this year.

Some of the recommendations of the seminar included activating the role of the chambers of commerce and industry in the Islamic world. The seminar also stressed the importance of activating the role of the Islamic institutions for insurance.

Government officials as well as businessmen made speeches, including Prime Minister, Abdulqadir Bajamal, Minister of Trade and Industry Abulrahaman Mohammed Ali Othman, as well as Mohammed Omar Bamashmus, chairman of the Aden Chamber of Commerce & Industry.

Meanwhile, the meetings of the 37th executive committee of the Islamic Chambers of Commerce called on all Arabic and Islamic countries plus Western countries dealing with Israel to boycott Israeli products.

The seminar also called on member countries to strengthen relations with governments with the view of building a new partnership.

Further, the recommendations of

the seminar stressed the importance of unifying all the manufacturing capabilities in order to protect Islamic interests and enhance its role within the world

Participants at the seminar commended the great role played by the Islamic Bank for Development in fostering cooperation among Islamic countries.

The bank has been using different methods for increasing the volume of trade transactions amongst member states. The overall funds provided by the bank for supporting imports amounted US \$14 billion. As for the financing of the exports, it contributed more that US \$1 billion, and contributed to the establishment of a fund for the privatization of investments in member countries through channeling US \$1.2 billion for 126 projects.

Accordingly, the member chambers of commerce recommended more support to the development bank to ensure its continued funding of projects.

In their attempt to rescue the pair, citizens involved in the operation also got trapped inside the hole when the inner walls collapsed again.

"The civil defense infantry was informed of the incident but remained silent," Mohammed Mubark, a victim's relative said.

He said that the Ministry of Public Works sent two shovels, but couldn't do anything for the victims.

Talking to a Times reporter who lowered himself into the pit to interview him, Saleh said was in a very bad situation because his friend died before his eyes while he couldn't help.

"I'm facing death beside my friend's body because of the unavailability of equipment to help us come out from this sink," Fahmi told the Times.

Colonel Faysal al-Halabi, said, civil

defense in Yemen is unqualified and can't help, even though this type of rescue operation should be simple. "How the hell would our authorities would react if a disaster happened in our country?," al-Halabi asked.

Is it begging or robbery?

egging is a very dangerous habit in our society, as young people "work," if we can consider begging a "job" as beggars while they are in good health.

The question is why do those people pave the way to seek money from other people, in the time they can get a pleasant job and work with dignity?

Here are some answers:

1. They find begging the easiest way to gain money.

2. They've lost hope because they weren't accepted at any kind of job.

3. They are obliged to do so under pressure of other reasons.

The first two reasons aren't valid and don't even deserve to be talked

But the last type is one that needs discussion, because maybe these young beggars want to study and to have a normal childhood but their parents' situation or their greediness prevents them from doing that.

Here are two examples from our daily life.

The first one is about Hanan, a young girl, 8 years old, who begs at the college where I study. When I asked her, "Why do you beg? What would make a child like you ask people for money?" she told me a very upsetting

She said her family is poor, and its needs money to survive. Her father can't work because he is sick with epilepsy and needs to go to a doctor from time to time to take some medicine and electric shocks.

What is worthy to be mentioned is that her sister begs with her. Each one works at her own area and sometimes they work together. Hanan makes up to 2,000 YR a day, at least that is what

My impression about Hanan's case is that she might have been lying. Could a child lose their innocence for

the sake of money? Or maybe is she lying because of fear of getting home with no money, to be punished and sent to bed without having a dinner? Or maybe for other reasons?

On the other hand, if the girl was telling the truth, from can her family get help? And from where they are going to get money if they don't beg? As I remember, she is the second or the third child in her family and no one of her siblings had finished their schooling to work and give the father money he needs to pay for his medicines.

I believe that the answer is very clear to everyone. If the Islamic rules were carried out correctly I think we will not see other beggars like Hanan, whether she was saying the truth or

The second example is of a girl I saw begging near some traffic lights. She was acting like a real poor girl, being without having food for two days I was about to believe her when I was told that she is studying in school, and her father owns two flats in Al-Asbahe City.

Owing flats in that region would make him appear as a wealthy person. I really would like to know why people are so greedy? Why they are not convinced with what they have, that they think that money is the only thing in life? Why do they insult themselves, and act like puppets in a show to attract people to throw money for them?

Finally, in the cases like Hanan's case "if she was telling the truth" the ones who should be blamed are us, because we haven't done more to pull her and her family out of their prob-

In the case of the second girl, we also have to blame ourselves because we gave the chance to such a father to throw his child in the street in the hard weather to ask for money, in other words to steal money which should go to a real poor person.

Begging is a social phenomenon is spreading very quickly out of control. I think the government is already doing good job to stop it from growing bigger and bigger.

But as people living in this society it's also our duty to help stop this it in one way or another. It is now our turn to spend some time with ourselves and think whether we are doing all we can for poor people.

Or we are just thinking that we are the only person who lives on this plan-

Human rights seminar hosted by Yemen Times

More than politics needed to bring justice to Yemen

Efforts of some governments in the democracy-emerging world to convince the international community that they are striving to enforce human rights only to please the superpowers are senseless, he said.

Protecting human rights and human dignity should be the essence of governance at these countries since the basis of a strong countries is man.

The editor-in-chief pointed out that we should not copy Western concept of human rights. We should rather take the best and leave the rest, as some Western countries topped by the United States are using a double standard policy with regard to human rights, as is the case with its support to Israel.

Minister in attendance

This was followed by a speech by Dr. Wahibe Fari' Minister of Human

Rights and General Secretary of the SNCHR. The Minister gave a statement explaining the role of her committee to defend human rights and spread awareness of its true meaning.

She agreed on comments made by some participants, saying that there are many violations which are all inconsistent with constitution and the established law.

But, still there is a political will to protect human rights and to fulfill Yemen's commitments made to the international community, she said.

But human rights with its different aspects cannot be achieved overnight. "We would like to adopt an institutionalized concept for human rights in Yemen," she added.

The first day included a working paper on the role of the parliament in promoting the understanding of human rights in all its forms presented by Mr.

Parliament and chairman of "Activists" NGO which defends human rights and liberties in Yemen.

He said, "We in Yemen are still mixing between the duties of the different state bodies. We really have a problem

with regard to human rights." The second day, Monday April 29, was rich with working papers including one by Sanaa University Academician Mohamed Abdulmalik al-Mutawakkil on "Islam's vision on

He said the wrong idea that human rights were first adopted by the West is wrong. All divine religions advocate human rights and protect human dignity. He also discussed in his paper the issue of human rights and the West as well as the inter-civilizations dialogue.

Ali Saif Hassen, noted the workshop would not be restricted to political rights only and added that there are two kinds of rights: rights that are "free of charge," and rights that need resources.

Political rights include the citizens right to free expression, accountability, and new rulers. He suggested the government in Yemen, however, restricts some of these rights. And he added that the Ministry of Information should be shut down since it appears that it has no role than to prosecute journalists and prevent freedom of expression.

The conference was told that a certain amount of government revenues are needed for supporting human

Jaralah Omar said he thinks the government is a violator of rights because it prevents citizens from speaking out in support of Palestine. "Though the government claims to be a human rights advocate who is then a violator," he said, noting that if there is real freedom in the Arab world, average Arabs would have the ability to speak of their resentment of the biased US stance towards Israel.

"In my opinion there should be a rather an extensive debate on this issue

and not a workshop for some intellectuals," Omar said, adding that there are many areas of human right that should be tackled.

Ahmed al-Kibsi, requested that the civil society organizations empower the Ministry of Human Rights.

"Regarding the political rights, we want to stand by the Minister of Human Rights," he said. He also demanded the opposition politicians not to rely on the US Embassy if there is a small problem related to human rights, "It is a shame to do that," he said.

Sultan al-Atwani commented on role of mass media, saying that the state-run media only serve the policy of the ruling party, while the independent media is in a very bad situation and can not help anymore.

Human rights in Yemen are lacking, and freedom of expression is also very limited, he said, noting that in police stations many people are inhumanely tortured. What some policemen commit against citizens are in some cases even more graver to the crimes of Israeli prime minister of Arial Sharon, he said, adding that we should pay great attention to how we can protect and consolidate human rights.

Mohammed al-Khiwani said that even journalists are not excused from human right violations. For instance, a journalist was detained by the secret police only on the basis of a rumor.

"The secret police even did not notify us that he was in custody," he said. "The Minister of Human Rights should probe into the cases of violation of human rights of women at prisons reported by many newspapers. Otherwise, the Minister of Human Rights will fail to carry out her mission," he added.

Al-Khiwani also demanded from the workshop to include within its recommendations a demand to Saudi Arabia to release some Saudi clerics it is holding in prisons.

Ahmed Nassir al-Hamati, deputy

minister of information for TV sector, said the simplest concept of human rights is dignity, however, what's happening now is that this concept has been victimized by the current international conditions.

Nowadays, the resistance movements in the Arab world have been branded as "terrorists" by some countries. It seems that the right to live in dignity has turned to be a form of terrorism. The United States has to review its policies towards the Arab and Islamic world because its interests in the Islamic world is much important to that of its interests in Israel.

Also, Jamal Aldin al-Ademi, presented a working paper on legal awareness for the citizens, saying that we should correct the wrong concept that human rights are pertinent to political rights. There should be a legal awareness that enable citizens to defend themselves.

Huriya Mashhur also presented a paper on the social dimensions of human rights and means of spreading

Introducing the real meaning of human rights and the role of media was the paper of Mr. Ahmed al-Dhahbani.

Also, the Human Rights Information & Training Center (HRITC) presented a paper on the role of human rights organizations in spreading awareness of human rights.

The two-day seminar included a field visit to the headquarters of the SNCHR where the Minster of Human Rights, Dr. Wahibe Fari' gave a detailed description of the committee's duties and procedures.

The seminar concluded by reading out the recommendations of the semi-

Seminar resolutions:

"We, the participants in the seminar "Human Rights: More than

Stress that there could be no economic or political development in the country unless its citizen are free and given all rights. Hence, human rights should be given attention in order to push for develop-

Compliment the political leadership for its role in encouraging the human rights-defending, democratic transition in the country, and for its decision to form the Supreme National Committee for Human Rights. We support the committee's administration, including the Minister of Human Rights, to continue its positive steps to increase awareness on social, educational, medical, and political human rights, plus other human rights.

Stress the importance of continuing this path that promotes human rights culture and principles through various public and private means to consolidate the country's commitment to continue in the direction of democracy.

Emphasize the importance to set up a long-term plan to spread awareness among governmental cadres about the rights of the citizen when dealing with any governmental

Call upon the government to approve the special budgets allocated for the awareness campaigns on the different human rights agreements signed by our government; agreements that include budgets to provide technical assistance to set up local programs to train locals on how to spread awareness on those international agreements and declarations dealing with human rights among the

Stress on the need to have the human rights and liberties committees in the Parliament and Shoura Council more effective by first, spreading awareness of the importance of human rights and its different branches, and second, by making them more effective in defending human rights, each within its framework.

Bring attention to the human rights violations by police and interrogation forces against citizens in prisons and elsewhere, signaling the importance of training policemen and security officials so as to respect human rights and spread awareness among them to reduce those violations. If needed, we request that special monitoring bodies be present in prisons and other security offices to report on any human rights violations.

Emphasize on the importance of having judges and attorney generals, and other legislative members aware of human rights to reduce injustice cases, blackmail, and threats against defendants and others in courts and elsewhere.

Call upon the government to include educational material on human rights to be taught in primary and secondary classes and to be part of the basic curriculum.

10- Stress the need for more human rights educational and cultural material to be broadcast on TV and radio to spread awareness among the public, especially illiterate families and people in rural areas.

11- Realize the need to establish a network linking all NGOs in the country whose work falls in the scope of human rights. This network is needed to launch more effective large-scale campaigns in promotion of human rights in all its forms.

sraelis ask why the Palestinian intifada broke out just when it seemed we were so close to an agreement. Palestinians ask why Israel responded with such inordinate military power to the uprising, using planes and tanks against a population largely subject to Israel's security control. Each side finds arguments to justify the escalation of the situation; each side explains to its own people, and to others, that "we can't let this incident go without

response" and then escalates the situation by using means that, until then, had not yet been used. The adversaries are like two wrestlers locked in a deadly embrace who continue to inflict wounds on one another, with no benefit to either. If, in two years time, you show film of the present behaviour of both sides, they will not believe they were parties to such stupidity.

Stop this dance

This dance of death must be ended now. The hope of returning to talks through informal channels is becoming more and more remote. Israelis are not allowed to enter the areas of the Palestinian Authority except with special authorisation, which the defence establishment refuses to give. Palestinians are prevented from reaching Israel, and their elected representatives have lost their right to freedom of movement. The only way Israelis and Palestinians can meet is

checkpoints or abroad. It is becoming harder and harder for Palestinians to travel abroad, because they cannot get permits from the Israelis.

A number of people on both sides are refusing to accept this progressive deterioration, which is leading to tragedy. Now that the other channels of communication have been blocked, we think it imperative to open an informal channel which will guarantee ongoing communication, even at the most difficult times, and allow continuous response to the debate: a channel that will restore mutual trust and prove to each side that there is a partner on the other side and a common denominator that will enable a

in February 2001, a peace coalition was set up in Israel to counterbalance the national unity government. The coalition was based on three main political groups: Meretz; Labour party Knesset Members who opposed their party joining the national unity government; and a group of new immigrants from the former Soviet Union. There were also many public figures and non-parliamentary peace movements.

In July 2001 there was a meeting between representatives of the peace

between representatives of the peace coalition and a similar group on the Palestinian side - cabinet ministers, members of the Palestinian Legislative Council and intellectuals. After that meeting there was a joint declaration expressing the parties' mutual understanding of each other's distress, emphasising the immediate need for a cessation of violence and a return to negotiations, and referring to the ou lines of a final status agreement emanating from the Camp David summit (July the Clinton (December 2000) and the Taba meeting (January 2001).

Leaders were negotiators

The leading figures on both sides have been negotiators. They have sat opposite each other and made attempts - as yet unsuccessful - to sign a permanent agreement between them; they believe that, instead of blaming one another for the exacerbation of the situation, it would be better, and even possible, to return to the negotiating table and reach an agreement that would bridge the remaining gaps and win the support of the Palestinian and Israeli populations. Both peoples are weary of the continuing, mutual attrition.

In recent months the international press has published joint articles by leaders of the coalition from both sides; we have dispatched joint delegations to countries around the world explaining our positions to national leaders, to legislative authorities, to the media; and we have published calls for a return to the negotiating table.

One of the highlights of our joint actions took place during a meeting in South Africa with President Thabo Mbeki this January. It is now hard to meet on Israeli or Palestinian territory, but both

an open, ongoing dialogue, learn from South Africa's reconciliation experiences and agree on future actions. Mbeki and 10 members of his government were present throughout the three-day meeting, and played a pivotal role by explaining what had happened in South Africa; they tried to find ways to implement in the Middle East conflict the lessons they had learned at home. For example, the South Africans concluded that it was in the interests of each side to strengthen the other as much as possible, even though their instinct might be to weaken the opposition.


A framework for peace

On 14 January, shortly after our return from South Africa, we decided to set up, as a precedent, a joint organisational framework: the Israeli Palestinian Peace Coalition. The intention, from now on, is to strengthen the ties between the parties, issue joint responses to the media, meet statesmen and politicians who come to the region and who have until now accepted separate meetings with Israelis and Palestinians. This spontaneous cooperawill be transformed for the first time since the law preventing from meeting representatives of the PLO was cancelled in 1988 - into ongoing coordination between representatives of both sides; they will run the organisation as a fulltime job, and put proposals for action to their political leaders. The new style of operation will be based on the joint perspective of both sides

The main message of our first meeting was a call for a third party to intervene in the conflict and help Israelis and Palestinians return to the negotiating table. We are talking about the United States and Europe, and others too: monitors, observers, mediators, facilitators (although this seems increasingly distant). We have not retracted our call for help from the world, but we felt a need to create a third party for ourselves: the Israeli-Palestinian Peace Coalition is intended to be a do-it yourself third party. The world may be prepared to say "let them bleed", but we will never say that. We call on the leaders of both sides to end their deadly embrace, return to negotiations, take the violence out of the joint process, remove preconditions for returning to negotiations and take full advantage of existing agreements with respect to a ceasefire (the Tenet document), a restoration of mutual trust (the Mitchell report) and a final status agreement (the Clinton plan and the conversations that preceded and resulted

It is not easy to maintain an Israeli-Palestinian Peace Coalition. Though we have substantial support from both sides, criticism is intense. People who are prepared to meet and conduct a dialogue while violence continues and innocent people are being killed on both sides are always criticised, accused of playing into the enemies' hands. This is why we need international legitimacy, extensive recognition and help from those who believe in peace.

Response: Truth of border settlement will stand, says Ethiopian Embassy

Eritreans should feel pleased, not 'victorious'

fter almost one year and a half, the Border Commission in The Hague released openly its final decision on the border dispute between Ethiopia and Eritrea. The decision was awaited by all peace loving people of the world. The most important achievement of this decision is that both sides have accepted it. This was so because the two countries earlier entered a commitment to accept the decision as final and binding.

A week after this decision is publicized, what is declared in Yemen Times by the Eritrean Embassy as Eritrea stood more victorious is indeed strange to its own ear. But it is useless for the

embassy to acclaim so much for its victory after the decision is over. If it were earlier it could have served as propaganda for the aggressor. The Eritrean embassy should have been aware that information produced in the press is property of the reading world, not only of its producers.

In the Eritrean Embassy's view Badme which belonged to Eritrea was annexed to Tigray and this precipitated war. At this last moment the Embassy seems to give its own decision on the boarder dispute and tries its best to misinform the audiences around it. It is so naïve to do so because people have eyes and ears to attend things in other dimensions. What the Eritrean embassy tries to reflect here after April 13's decision is what the state of Eritrea also reflects in its homeland.

In its article to Yemen Times newspaper (April 22) the Eritrean Embassy said that Eritreans are 'pleased' and most victorious in the border dispute decision. There is nothing wrong if Eritreans are pleased but one should at least be sincere to its own people. If the Eritrean Embassy tells the readers that their country and people are most victorious, what is its parameter for such judgment? Or does it give any sense if it blindly says 'Eritrea is more victorious'? Facts on the ground tell who is most victorious. And Badme is the land there, neither included not excluded. Wish may go its own way but truth always stand true. Any more the Eritrean Embassy wants to say we are ready to respond. But Ethiopian Embassy does not take this as a big deal after the decision is over.



Public exposure

ou could have bet on it. Dictators and authoritarians all over the world used the excuse of the need to fight back against terrorism after the horrendous attacks of September 11 to try to limit freedoms of all kinds that stand in the way of full control over their countries. Just as predictably, one of the first liberties to come under fire was freedom of the press.

Even governments of great democracies like the United States and Great Britain urged the press to refrain from broadcasting or printing the self-justifying messages of Osama bin Laden and his collaborators.

"Healthy guide censorship"?

Such calls for self-censorship were greeted with ironic satisfaction by spokesmen for governments like Singapore that are veterans at press control. Singapore's UN delegate praised the White House's exercise of what he called "healthy guided censorship" in National Security Advisor Condoleeza Rice's call on October 10 for US television networks to refrain from rebroadcasting statements by Osama bin Laden. The Washington Post noted editorially a Russian reporter's question to US President George W. Bush about "why he still bothered to express concern about media freedom in Russia, now that he was trying to curtail the flow of information himself."The pressures on the press after September 11 were renewed proof that virtually any government will, under the right circumstances, try to limit free speech from a narrow view of self-interest - at the expense of such a government's own

This press controller approach is counterproductive. The democratic faith holds that citizens must be informed, even of unpleasant realities, to make mature judgments. Afghanistan's Taliban government, allied to bin Laden, showed how much it feared independent journalism by barring almost all foreign correspondents and





by arresting and threatening with dire consequences those journalists who tried to slip into the areas it controlled. We believe that citizens need to see and hear all of an Osama bin Laden's rantings and ravings. That goes for the dictators in power, too. A free press holding them up to the light exposes their real natures, and their irrationality. This also forces the confrontation of ideas, opinions and facts in open public debate. As always, the true remedy to bad speech is more speech.

Most of the world's democratic press reacted to pressures to conform after September 11 with healthy demonstrations of independence. The Los Angeles Times editorialized October 12: "For all the risks a free press poses, stifling the media is more dangerous still. Information is what allows people to make solid decisions."

The nine-member Coordinating Committee of Press Freedom Organizations adopted a resolution September 21: "The evil that terrorism represents will best be defeated by full public exposure. Censorship, restriction on the movement of journalists, and limitations on news content can interfere with this necessary public exposure."

Bin Laden propaganda prohibited

The three main British TV networks answered a request from Alistair Campbell, Prime Minister Tony Blair's director of communications, not to transmit bin Laden statements by saying they would maintain their independence of editorial judgment. Richard Sambrook, the BBC's head of news, recalled the ridicule to which the British government exposed itself when former Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher imposed rules against the voices of Irish Republican Army spokesmen being broadcast directly. Broadcasters skirted that censorship by having actors read out the words of the militants, to match pictures of the original speakers. The Bush Administration showed that it apparently learned some lessons after it

Emirate of Qatar, home of the independent Arabic-language al-Jazeera TV satellite network. The U.S. State Department had asked the Emir to press the company to stop broadcasting its world scoops in the form of statements by bin Laden. After the Emir's refusal, the U.S. Administration came up with a much better solution. It provided Arab audiences with public condemnation of bad ideas by making high-level interviewees, including Condoleeza Rice and particularly effective Arab-speaking diplomats, available to present the U.S. side to the station's far-flung Arab viewers.

Concerns about preserving press free-

All media is in danger

dom have hardly been limited to the press itself. UNESCO Director General Koichiro Matsuura addressed the Executive Board of the International Press Institute October 20 to stress the need to avoid using the campaign against international terrorism as a pretext to limit free speech and press freedom:"[My] concern [is] that freedom of expression, media freedom and democratic processes risk being caught in the cross-fire between transnational terrorism and the search for security. The context in which UNESCO's Constitution was formulated offers some useful lessons in this regard. UNESCO's founders recognized that Nazism had transformed the media into an instrument of political control, racist ideology and hate-mongering. They placed their faith in completely untrammeled freedom of expression and the free flow of information. UNESCO's founders, in effect, were convinced that in the long run such freedoms are the best defense against racism and prejudice. ..."I emphatically reject the view that to obtain security, we must abandon our freedoms. Anxieties induced by terrorist threats may lead to laws and regulations which may undermine the very rights and freedoms that the anti-terrorism campaign is supposed to defend."

A Canadian in Yemen:

Restoring dignity in Palestine

Thomas Froese

here is an ancient Middle East prophecy that someday the wolf will lay down with the lamb, and men will beat their swords into ploughshares. It was written almost 3,000 years ago. We're still waiting.

Looking at the furnace of politics in the Middle East, is doesn't appear the dusty prophecy is around the corner. Yemen in particular has been seeking

to help Palestine. Plenty of demonstrations in recent weeks here in Sana'a have shown how much Yemeni hearts are with their Arab broth-

The topic came up while I recently broke bread with some Arab friends, in particular with a Palestinian visiting from Jordan. My conversation with

Ahmed, a 47-year-old pharmacist exiled in Jordan since 1973, reminded me that Palestinians have known the type of grief which some of us can only imagine.

Forced from home

In 1948, his family, along with thousands of others, was forced from their home to make way for newcomers, in this case Jews from Iraq. What if that happened to you, let's say, at gunpoint? No questions. Just pack your memories, and don't come back.

Ahmed was born and grew up in Nablus, among the Palestinian cities recently under Israeli attack. Even now, living with two million Palestinians in Jordan, he says he longs for the old family-home in Haifa, and believes he will return "in sha'a 'llah.' "The only solution now is military

action," he concludes. That seems strange coming from such a gentle spirit, but considering what's happened, it's not surprising. International sympathy after the Holocaust, plus views on religious

prophecy, are reasons some support

Jews having their ancestral home. But "Jesus and Moses," in the words of Ahmed, have little to do with his family being thrown out of their home. And even a cursory study of the political intrigue and double-dealing involved in the 50 years prior to 1948 shows the so-called "modern miracle of Israel" is rife with problems.

A unique calling

I suspect, if anything then, Israel has unique calling to care for the Holy and, side- by-side with a healthy Palestine. Certainly the God used to justify Israel's actions also wants justice for Palestinians, particularly since they have an ancient promise through the same bloodline as the Jews.

In his book Blood Brothers, Elias Chacour, a Palestinian scholar and minister, poignantly puts his finger on this, and suggests a "demon of mili-

A different response

Palestinians have typically responded in two ways. One is quiet resignation. The other, armed uprising. But, Chacour, whose parents actually put him in an orphanage so he could

receive a good education in Haifa, shows a third way. After studies in Europe he returned home, and with volunteers from

Germany and Holland, he built community centers, schools and libraries in Galilee. Peace centers were inaugurated with The Diary of Anne Frank, to show Anne could easily be a modern

Palestinian girl. By the early '80s, within three years of launching youth camps, 4,000 kids benefited. Jews and Palestinians were brought together for dialogue, and Palestinian dignity was restored.

Chaucor continues that type of work even now, in the spirit of brotherhood.

Why haven't others been able to do the same over the last 50 years? My friend Ahmed says because political violence has brought crippling fear to those who can help. So it seems more clear than ever that building a new Middle East will need a different approach. It will take time, and it will take soul-searching by this generation.

Binding people together

I think of Chacour's father who, at gunpoint, was forced off his homestead in Birma, a Palestinian village later destroyed by Zionists. Years later, he still walked past its charred remains to tend his old fig trees, and eventually grafted several varieties together. Each wrapped around the other into one: a powerful symbol of different people bound together.

That's the mystery of peace achieved in some modern movements. Think of Ghandhi in India, and Martin Luther King Jr. in America. They brought liberty to their races by grafting people groups together, not force.

That doesn't mean all will be tranquil. These men were martyred for blessing their enemies. But they understood that sometime peace can only be experienced even when one is in the eye of the storm. That's what eventually changes both hearts and institutions.

Without that type of vision, I'm afraid that plans for long-term peace will continue to flounder. And others will get dragged into the oven.

That's the deep need in this region.

Hospital's miracle work needs help

he republican hospital is one of the oldest hospitals in Yemen. It was founded in 1958 at the cost of GBP 1,5000,00. The foundation stone was laid by the British Queen, Elizabeth and then the hospital has never witnessed any improvements, except in some health units.

Doctors are under pressure to do their best, but the hospital's resources are inadequate and in need of support from the health ministry

The hospital has 12 intensive medical care units, orthodontics and neurosurgery departments in addition to 500 beds.

Neurosurgery, in particular, is one of the more complex services provided at the hospital.

Yemen Times reporter, Ridhwan al-Saggaf, Aden Bureau met up with one of the famous neurosurgeon at the hospital, Dr. Qasem al-Asbahi and filed the

Q: Would you give us a brief account of the neurosurgery unit at the hospital?

A: Two Yemeni doctors and two foreign ones are overburdened with the neurosurgical operations. The number of patients who come to the hospital range from 15 to 24 on a daily basis.

Most patients are coming to the hospital from different governorates of the republic. The unit includes 20 beds and patients should submit themselves to medical checkups before conducting. operations

Q: How do you handle cases in this

A: Complicated neurosurgical operations are conducted by well-experienced doctors. Three or four surgeons and five additional assistants are taken to operating rooms for operations.

The most complicated ones are the operations at the brain oncosis. Operations that have been conducted abroad can be conducted successfully at the hospital here in Aden.

A: Yes of course. We receive some incurable cases but such cases come late. We do our best to save the lives of patients. We feel very glad when we see the smile of the patients on their faces.

Q: Does the unit face difficulties? A: As a matter of fact, the hospital is in short of medical apparatus, such as, x-ray machines. This will cost more than YR 12,000, if the patient goes

The main difficulty that we face is a lack of medical apparatus and the number of beds are inadequate.

We possess well-experience neurosurgeons. We could gain the support of some international organizations, but what is needed is to increase the support of the hospital.

Exerted efforts have been made by the General Manger of the Hospital, Mohammed Assadi to promote the existing conditions of the hospital.

Q: Any last comment?

A: We thank the Yemen Times newspaper for its keen interest on paying a visit to such vital health units.

The significance of form and function in language learning



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anguage is a method of communication. It is a method of communicating ideas, emotions and desires by means of a system of arbitrarily produced symbols. All human beings learn languages naturally. There may be some exceptions but these exceptions are only those who are prevented by some form of physical barrier. They may neither listen nor speak. It is a biological deficiency.

But learning a foreign language is a different case. People may learn a foreign language naturally if they have adequate environment for it. But where there is no adequate environment, they learn it in schools and colleges or in language institutes. In learning a language the importance of both form and function had been realized.

In the past, grammar occupied a central position in language learning. It is still important because a very limited set of rules produce a good range of sentence-patterns. We can fit thousands of content words into these sentence patterns and express an enormous variety of meanings through them. For the foreign language teacher who is dealing with the students of homogeneous mother tongue, the knowledge of contrastive syntax is very valuable. It guides the choice of teaching materials and determines appropriate remedial work. It helps the teacher foresee the difficulties which they experience with grammar. By knowing where difficulties are likely to lie, he can easily avert interference foreign-language students are prone to.

The most traditional method of learning a foreign/second language is the Grammar-Translation Method. This method is basically an adaptation of techniques used to teach classical languages like Latin and Greek. It aims at teaching rules of grammar and translation of sentences and passages into the target language. Text for translation offers quite a rich semantic framework for language learning. Learners acquire good reading knowledge of the foreign language. They are also almost accurate in their production of language if they have learned it carefully. The method focuses learners' attention on the written language; but they fail to acquire oral fluency and spontaneity. Moreover, translation is itself a specialized skill. Everyone does not want to be a translator. Nor is it true that the best way of acquiring a foreign language is through translation. In this method there is emphasis on creating a framework in which rules can be applied. This emphasis may lead to stilted and unnatural use of language.

But the Grammar-Translation Method was attacked by a group of scholars and teachers in the latter half of the nineteenth century. The new method adopted by them is known as the Direct Method. This method regards speech rather than written language as the prime channel of communication. It is because speech is perceived as more universal than writing. Children learn their mother tongue through speech. It is more natural to acquire language orally. Translation is regarded as positive harm to the language acquisition because it allows interference from the mother-tongue. Learning a foreign language means learning a new and independent system of language. It also means acquiring awareness of the culture of the target language. In this method all materials to be learned is first presented orally in the target language. Grammar is taught, not through direct rules, but by situation and association. Learners are requested to engage in practice and repetition till they acquire a certain grammatical pattern. The strong point of this method is that learners cultivate oral fluency and spontaneity. Its greatest weakness is that it fails to impart any real grammatical awareness. For want of real grammatical awareness learners face difficulty in tackling new material on their own.

An attempt was made to improve on the shortcomings of the Direct method by devising more structured material for students. The new method is known as the Audio-Lingual method which reached the height of its popularity in the early 1960s. It involves a systematic presentation of grammatical construction often in the form of drills. It is guided by a belief that the fluent use of a language is essentially a set of habits which can be developed with a lot of practice. Much of this practice involves hours spent in a language laboratory in repeating oral drills. During 1950s this approach was justified by a claim that foreign-language learning is basically a mechanical process of habit formation.

The Audio-Lingual Method believes in the separation of skills-listening, speaking, reading and writing (LSRW). It used certain practical techniques like mimicry, memorization, pattern practice and some performed in language labs. It encourages the use of dialogue and substitutions tables. It lays emphasis on selection, gradation and presentation in a systematic manner. Items of grammar are graded, following the principle that simple forms should be taught before complex ones. The period between 1958 and 1964 is called by Stern the "Golden Age of Audio-Lingualism". By the end of the decade the Audio-Lingual method received a blow from Noam Chomsky who argued that language acquisition did not take place through habit formation. Human beings are endowed with the language acquisition device which helps them acquire language naturally. But mere study of the form and

structure of a language does not help a learner use it in different situations. All the methods discussed so far for language learning are concerned with language in its ideal system. But this ideal system is far from the problems of the practical use. People don't talk as consistently and uniformly as grammar books imply. They don't talk to produce grammatically correct sentences in isolation. The fact is that they utter for a variety of purposes in diverse situations. When they speak, they have something to communicate to other people. Language for them is a tool; and they use it with a purpose. They don't possess their language; but they employ it and do work with it. When we learn a new language or improve our mother-tongue, we intend not to possess something but to do something. If we learn language with a view to possessing it, we cut a sorry figure in our actual life. Vocabulary remains in our mind but we fail to use it, fail to express ourselves.

If we possess something, it does not change. But we cannot learn a language without changing it for our own purposes. Change is no more than collective different ways in which individuals find it convenient to change their personal use of language. Individuals don't usually change in isolation. It takes two to create an understood message; it really takes many to establish a convention. But the language cannot change unless we have something new to say. Language use and language change are one and the same thing.

Language changes from speaker to speaker and from situation to situation. It also changes as each speaker matures. So the study of language, either of the mother tongue or of the foreign language, remains incomplete unless it is studied in its dynamic role in sociocultural situations.

Mere linguistic competence does not enable a language learner to communicate with others in the society. What he needs more than this is communicative competence. It is Dell Hymes who introduced the concept of communicative competence in the USA. Later, many British applied linguists, such as D. A. Wilkins, Christopher Candlin and Christopher Brumfit recognized the functional and communicative aspects of language. The goal of language instruction has shifted to building learner's communicative competence. It is based on the view that the function of language should be emphasized rather than the forms of language consisting of correct grammatical or phonological structure. It has become apparent that there is no straight forward relationship between grammatical categories and functions of language, such as between the category "interrogatives" as the function "ask-ing questions.". Native speakers can elicit information as much through statements as through questions. How often does one ask the way by means of an interrogative sentence? We just express our request for information simply by saying: "Excuse me, I am lost. I am looking for station." There may be another example. When we feel cold and want to ask anybody to close the windows, we may not use imperative sentences:

It is cold outside. Windows are still

Learning a language means not merely producing grammatically correct sentences but also using them appropriately. Learning to engage not merely in speech but in speech acts means mastering something more than mere structures of a language and, indeed, more than the language itself. In the final analysis it also means learning how to behave in a certain cul-

In learning a language the importance of both form and function has been realized. In order to speak a language correctly a learner needs to learn its grammar, lexis and phonology. But mere correctness will not help him. He must know how to use it with different people in different situations. Knowing this aspect of a language means knowing not merely the form of a language but also its functions in society. Asking a teacher for a glass of water in his drawing room is entirely different from asking a servant for it: Sir, I wanted to drink a glass of

water.

Acquiring competence to communicate is much more than learning the morphology, syntax and phonology of a language.

'Melissa' Virus Creator Sentenced in NJ Court

FREEHOLD, N.J. (Reuters) - David Smith, whose "Melissa" computer virus caused \$1.2 billion in damage, was sentenced to 10 years in prison in a New Jersey state court on Friday but will serve only a 20-month federal term he was given previously.

According to a plea agreement accepted by Monmouth County Superior Court Judge Lawrence Lawson, Smith can not do more time in iail on state charges than he will under the federal sentence he was given on Wednesday. But Lawson said he still meted out the maximum term as a deterrent to other would-be virus cre-

Smith pleaded guilty in 1999 to one count of disrupting public communications, a charge falling under the state's Computer Theft statute. He is the first person in New Jersey convicted under the law for spreading a virus, a spokesman for the New Jersey Attorney General's office said.

"I can't take back what I did, but I'm not a criminal," said Smith, who named the virus for a Florida stripper he knew, at his sentencing.


In an impromptu address to the court, Smith tried to counter prosecution claims that he went into hiding after the virus began to spread three years ago and its magnitude became

"It was very big and I was very scared," Smith, who was arrested at the home of his brother, told the court.

He said he had considered turning himself in but feared he would not be treated fairly because of the damage

But prosecutors scoffed at Smith's assertion that he had not gone into hiding, saying if he had not been tracked down and arrested, he would still be at

"As you have said, you will be know as the 'Melissa virus person', but you can turn that around," Lawson told

Smith, urging him to go to high schools and colleges and lecture on the harm viruses can cause.

Smith has admitted throwing away the computer hard drives he used to create the virus. Authorities say the

equipment has not been recovered.

"The Melissa virus is still out there," said state police officer Michael Tansey, who worked as investigator in the case. "It's probably in a landfill."

Motorola to Face Tough **Questions at Annual Meeting**

CHICAGO (Reuters) Wireless technology giant Motorola Inc. needs to show signs it can reverse a series of losses amid a punishing downturn in the telecommunications sector when it faces shareholders at its annual meeting next week.

The world's second-largest mobile phone maker has already been forced to slash thousands of jobs amid a slowdown in demand for cell phones infrastructure. wireless Management missteps have compounded the problem, analysts said.

Executives will try to convince shareholders at the meeting on Monday that they are doing everything they can, even though the company posted its fifth consecutive quarterly operating loss last month.

"You've got an enormous enterprise with tens of thousands of employees... The question is what are they focused on and what can they do to make sure that the company remains strong and viable, assuming that this is a trough that lasts a while longer," Henry Asher, president of North Star Group, a New York money manager, said.

Motorola's most recent quarterly report was viewed relatively positively as it met analysts' expectations -but some are calling for more drastic streamlining.

Some analysts have even suggested that Motorola should sell or spin off its semiconductor and wireless network equipment units.

Motorola has suffered along with Nokia of Finland, the No. 1 cell phone maker, and Sweden's Ericsson. Meanwhile, the weak economy has hurt the company's automotive electronics, semiconductors and broadband businesses.



Motorola's shares have fallen nearly 75 percent from a peak of \$61.54 in March 2000. Since hitting a low of \$10.50 about a year ago, the stock has settled at around \$15. The shares were off about 10 cents at \$15.34 Thursday afternoon on the New York Stock

Last year, the annual meeting took place as Motorola posted its first quarterly operating loss in 15 years and

laid off thousands of workers. Investors were angered by Chairman and Chief Executive Christopher Galvin's bonus and some analysts questioned at the time whether he should keep his position.

QUESTIONING

This year, the tone of the meeting is expected to be slightly more accommodating due to improving financial reports, but Motorola will still likely have to face tough questions about its

Jeffrey Schlesinger, wireless equipment analyst for UBS Warburg, said investors will look for Motorola to demonstrate that the financial improvements it has made so far will continue despite the gloomy environ-

Investors will want reassurance that Motorola is "indeed on the right track and the trends that people have been seeing over the past few quarters are going to continue and there's further improvement on the horizon," Schlesinger said.

Motorola will probably highlight its

tive, Ed Breen, who assumed the position of president and January. Breen, known as a straight talker who sets tough

standards, is widely viewed as a catalyst for change at the company.

While Motorola executives were optimistic in its earnings conference call in April and said expect the company to be profitable in the third quarter, analysts expect the telecommunications equipment market will likely be tough for a while longer.

Nokia in its first-quarter report cut its sales growth forecast for 2002, citing weak demand, and Ericsson warned it would not return to profitability this year.

Since the market began showing signs of slowing in late 2000, Motorola has cut costs and slashed 48,400 jobs, almost one third its peak employment of 150,000 in August

Analysts believe that Motorola can cut more costs, especially in its weak infrastructure unit, which some suggest should be sold. Rumors have abounded recently that Motorola was in talks to sell the unit to Siemens AG of Germany or Nortel Networks Corp. of Canada.

"(Motorola's) main goal will be to talk about the long term and instill confidence in the short term as their markets very slowly improve," Justin McNichols, portfolio manager for Osborne Partners Capital Management, said.

"It'll be similar to what they've talked about in their latest (earnings) conference calls."






