





Concern is also expressed that US soldiers committing such crimes could ignite acts of terrorism.

"This will certainly inflame idealistic feelings, and there is no question that terrorist groups will take advantage of this," said Al-Qirbi. "They always try to justify their acts of terrorism by injustices that Arabs and Muslims receive. So there is no question they will take advantage of these acts."














Over alleged human rights violations

54 security men prosecuted

Around 54 security officers charged with violating human rights have been prosecuted, official sources said.

The sources said that among those security men are people charged with murder, torture or other crimes while investigating or arresting citizens on different charges.

Fifteen security men have been charged with practicing intimidations or attacks while doing their investigation, while 11 others have accused of gunfire, blackmailing citizens during doing their

The sources said that those people who were prosecuted were proved guilty and were sentenced to either firing or suspended from their jobs, or to blood money fine.

The heaviest punishment against those security men who violate human rights is the ten year imprisonment against three of them.

However, some human rights activists said that the reports on the cases of such violations registered by the ministry of interior are not accurate and that a lot of such cases take place on a daily basis but nobody knows about them.

Earlier this year, reports talked about violations of human rights inside Yemeni prisons, including torture. In a research paper by a Yemeni academic, it was found out that security men still represent a fear for citizens due to their horrifying practices.

Dr. Mohammed Abdullah al-Mouyad, professor of international law at Sana'a University said in his paper that the improvement of the human rights record in Yemen is totally stipulated by the improvement of the security authori-

He pointed out that violations of human rights by security men take place due to their ignorance of the law or lack of accountability.

He said that people still look at security men as a means of terror and repression, indicating that local and international reports recruited big officials' confessions of such violations and abuses of human rights on the part of security men, despite the ban of misuse of authority or

French journalist gives lecture

The ABCs of good newspaper writing

The Information Training and Rehabilitation Institute in Sana'a held a lecture-delivering on April 27 and opendiscussion assembly led by the French expert Ms. Vergina Ievy.

Dr. Abdullah al-Zalub, Dean of the Institute affirmed the importance of holding such meetings for the interaction of different generations and cultures within the same profession and where the experience and experiments of the older generation could be of benefits to younger generations in sharpening and enriching their skills and capabilities.

Ievy, a specialist in writing newspapers articles, talked about, under a title, "A good article has no boundaries: the principles of writing articles."

She summarized them in two primary principles. The first is the conformity of the written text of the article with the general policy and adoption of the newspaper and its board of editors.

The second is the importance of abiding by the profession's writing princi-

ples. She emphasized the necessity that the two principles are inter-connected and is not permitted to be separated.

She also pointed out to the importance of the availability of information and the background knowledge to enrich the article. She said that the writer must inquire about and care about the category he/she is addressing starting from the introduction in the article, which could decisively determine the attention of the reader to continue reading it or move on

The writer must use suitable terms and to always ensure the connectivity of written sentences. The writer must already understand the motives behind writing an article as writing is not a duty as much as a feeling and moreover, there is sheer perfect article.

Following the lectures, an open discussion was followed by a number of journalists representing official, private and political parties affiliated newspapers who agreed on the elimination of several technicalities predominately covering the occupation of journalism.

Yemen and Pakistan pen agreement

Yemen and Pakistan signed a Memorandum of Understanding during Yemeni Deputy Foreign Minister Hussein Tahir bin Yahya's visit to Pakistan last week.

The memorandum includes an annual dialogue between the two countries on political and economic issues and the exchange of information on the Al-Qaeda terrorist network.

"It was a productive meeting, and it dealt with a number of issues on security," Yemeni Foreign Minister Abu Bakr Al-Qirbi told Yemen Times. "Pakistan is a focal point as far as terrorist groups with links in Afghanistan and other places in the world. It is important for Yemen to maintain a close relationship with Pakistan and exchange information. So that meeting was important."

Yemen and Pakistan teamed up with the United States to fight terrorism after the terrorist attacks on US soil on September 11, 2001.

During Yahya's participation in the first session of talks under the memorandum in the capital of Pakistan, Islamabad, the two countries condemned Israel's policy of assassinating Palestinian leaders, such as the killing of Hamas leaders Sheikh

"We feel that the targeted killings are not based on legal grounds and not in line with international law," said Al-

Yemen and Pakistan also agreed that US forces must withdraw from Iraq as early as possible and be replaced by the United Nations to bring back stability to the country.

Yemen tells Saudi Embassy to stop visas for Umrah

According to sources, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs sent a letter telling the Saudi embassy to close its door on Yemeni applying for Umrah's visas. The demand came as an official intervention in the disagreement that took place between Yemeni Hajj agencies, in one side, and the Saudi ministry of

As a result of the disagreement, the Saudi ministry of Hajj suspended the activities of seventy Yemeni tourism agencies. Such suspension is expected to prevent 50% of the Yemeni intending to take part in the next Umrah sea-

In their part, the Yemeni authorities demanded the Saudi embassy to close its doors on Yemeni citizens applying for such visas until the return of the delegation team they intend to send to KSA.

The Saudi authorities excluded Agencies from Yemen and Egypt from providing them with Umrah visas. which started two weeks ago.

Putting tough conditions on Yemeni agencies, Saudi authorities hope such steps will limit the chances of people taking advantage of their stay in the kingdom, during the religious season, to look for work.

EU enlargement will help **EU - Yemen relations: Jaffer**

he long-awaited enlargement of the European Union took place last Wednesday, signaling a historic occassion for European people. On this occasion, Yemen Times met with Dr. Jaffer Hamed Mohammed Jaffer, the Ambassador of Yemen to the EU in his office in Brussels, Belgium.

Dr. Jaffer was appointed as the ambassador to Belgium and the EU, making him the first Yemeni diplomat to be concerned with the EU's enlargement and its consequences on the relations to Yemen.

On the issue of EU-Yemen relations, Dr. Jaffer said that they are indeed growing and enhancing by the day. "Those relations had started in the commercial aspect since the 1980s. After the formation of the 15-member EU, aid and cooperation had also increased and broadened," he said

"The EU allocated significant amounts of money for social and economic projects in the country, and has pledged to continue this support in the future.'

"Every year, negotiations between Yemen and the EU take place, alternately in Sanaa and Brussels. The last discussions were held in Sanaa in October 2003."

Important development

Dr. Jaffer said that in 18 December 2003, a breakthrough agreement was reached and signed. He signed on behalf of Yemen to allow the EU to

A breakthrough agreement was reached to establish a permanent EU commission delegation in Yemen

have a prominent commission delegation in Sana'a. In other words, this signals full diplomatic representation of the EU in Sanaa, just like any other

This is indeed a huge development, especially in accelerating decision making procedures on the spot and easing bureaucratic procedures to enable quicker response to project proposals and cooperation initiatives.

The other important developmen concerning EU-Yemen relations, is the ongoing work in establishing a committee for political dialogue, which will give relations a boost because it broadens the prospective of relations to

include political aspects too.

This initiative has come after Yemen worked thoroughly to find a role in the Barcelona process, in which Yemen is not included and wasn't accepted due to geographical reasons.

The Barcelona process is confined to the countries south of Mediterranean Sea. Other non-Mediterranean Arab countries also have special privileges including countries such as Sudan and Djibouti in the context of African and

It is ironic that Yemen's embassy to such a massive and important region of the world is receiving the least of attention and care

Atlantic perspectives. The Gulf Cooperation Council also has special relations with the EU. This eventually puts Yemen in an isolated position with no real frame for multilateral relations

But following extensive efforts, we have come to agree initially on establishing the said committee for political dialogue, and have also agreed on holding its first meeting in July 2004 in

Meanwhile, EU officials have also expressed their satisfaction and apperciatiion to Yemen for its positive role in fighting terrorism, developing human rights and democracy, and economic developmental reforms. The EU is also encouraged to see that we in Yemen are working to achieve social reforms such as enabling Yemeni women to participate in politics as we have female ministers, female ambassadors, and female activists. This what makes Yemen unique in this regard in

Yemen's presence in the EU needs

On Yemeni presence in the EU, the ambassador stressed that just as the EU has now enlarged and is composed of 25 countries with a total population exceeding 400 million people, it is quite important to have stronger presence and more activities of Yemen in Brussels.

"I need to focus here on the elemen of quality more than quantity. What we work of the Yemeni embassy in need right now in our embassy is more qualified Yemeni staffers more than anything else. As we can imagine, there will be more potentials for coop-

eration and expansion of relations with the EU and its individual member states, which in turn makes it quite demanding to have qualified team workers in all social, economic, logistic, research, public relations, and media fields.

This conforms to President Saleh's orders in taking care of the diplomatic sector and placing the right person in the right post.

For example, there are some Yemenis working in foreign embassies, who could be more useful working in Yemeni embassies in other Arab countries as they don't have a second language. It is not preferred to have a Yemeni diplomat with no foreign tongue (English, French, German, etc.) work in a European country, as this will not only affect the embassy's productivity and relations, but will also be unjust to the diplomat, who could have unveiled his potentials if he would have been posted in an Arab country and could potentially be frus-

On the other hand, as you have noted, the EU enlargement is also of

The problem of Yemen is that it is not considered in any block or group in the region, causing it to be somewhat isolated

major development which will result in greater demand for hard work and dedication to diplomatic work to produce more and use the opportunities available. With 10 more countries added to the current 15, and taking into account the fact that our embassy is concerned with Luxemburg too, this will require us to exert greater efforts and work closely with 25 countries. This is why it is important that the Ministry of Foreign Affairs looks into this issue with great importance and concern and provides our embassy with qualified and skilled Yemeni staffers, who will be the pillar of our mission in Brussels.

Financial difficulties in our embassy in Brussels

As for the obstacles that hinder Brussels, Dr. Jaffer said that despite the fact of enlargement of the EU and strengthening EU-Yemen relations, the embassy suffers from financial short-

ages in its budget. "I know that other embassies suffer too, but our case is even more severe as the budget is lower than most other embassies throughout the world, including Yemeni embassies in neighboring countries. This is ironic because greater attention must be paid to our embassy as it represents Yemen in the largest block of countries in the world, yet it is getting the least of attention.

Furthermore, the fall of the USD versus the Euro has also led to extra financial burdens up to 20% due to the fact that our central government in Sana'a still uses the US dollar for its foreign transactions, resulting in deficits in our budget as we have to change the dollars to Euros to pay our staffers, especially European staffers. causing tremendous losses

This financial shortage has direct implications on the level of productivity and work we can achieve m the embassy. In other words, if the financial aspect is not improved, we will remain confined to fewer activities and less productive staffers, which will ultimately result in waste of potentials and possible contribution to EU-Yemen relations.

EU support to Yemen on the rise

In a final remark, Dr. Jaffer said that the EU has been obviously keen to support Human Rights and democracy in Yemen, and that was quite evident in the co-organization of the EU of the last regional conference on human rights and democracy held a few months ago in Sanaa by the Yemeni government in cooperation with the organization "No Peace Without

"I must note that the European parliament has praised the Yemeni government for coming up with the Sanaa Declaration that concluded the conference, in which Yemen pledged to continue its efforts in supporting freedom and human rights. The conference was said to conform to the strategy of the EU in Yemen and the region, and we are now closely following up on this issue with our EU counterparts. I also believe that EU support to Yemen is on



Dr. Buthainah Al-Ja'afi, President of the High Council for Motherhood and Childhood, confirmed the importance of this workshop.


She pointed out that the need to

U.S. changes tack in Falluja Iraqis hail "victory"

FALLUJA, Iraq, May 1 (Reuters) Soldiers of the old Iraqi army led by one of Saddam Hussein's generals patrolled the city of Falluja on Saturday, a year after George W. Bush declared the U.S. "mission accomplished" in ousting the Iraqi

Cries of "victory over the Americans" echoed from minarets and gunmen celebrated in the streets under the green banner of Islam and Saddam-era Iraqi flags. Thousands who had fled a month of heavy fighting streamed back to their homes after U.S. Marines pulled back from their siege positions around the city.

Mired in a confrontation that spilled blood on both sides and outraged Iraqi and Arab opinion, U.S. commanders withdrew to more distant positions on Friday. Security was entrusted to local police and a new force of ex-soldiers under General Jasim Mohamed Saleh, formerly of Saddam's feared Republican Guard.

U.S. commanders call it an experiment that may be reversed.

But Iraqis, many of them impatient with an occupation that brought them pictures this week of U.S. and British troops abusing detainees, may well believe they are seeing the military defeat of a once-powerful enemy.


Americans, deciding whether to re-elect President Bush in November, may also wonder where the Iraq venture is taking them after the bloodiest month for U.S. troops since the war began.

"The city's defenders are celebrating," yelled one man as a group of gunmen in civilian clothes raised banners and rifles aloft on a street to acclaim their "defeat" of the Marines

A uniformed member of General Saleh's 1,000-strong force, dubbed the Falluja Brigade by Marines, looked on.

On foot and in civilian four-wheel-drive vehicles, this force began patrolling the streets of the Sunni Muslim city, which was among those most loyal to the Baathist dictator.

"God has given this town victory over the Americans," wailed a message from a mosque in the town centre. "This victory came by the acts of the brave Mujahideen



point at the entrance of Falluja on May 1. Thousands of jubilant people, forced to flee a month-long siege that cost hundreds of lives, streamed through newly opened checkpoints around the city after U.S. Marines pulled back from many positions and left Iraqis in control.

of Falluja who vanquished the American troops.'

"Eyes wide open"

A Pentagon spokesman said the United States, which had made a point of excluding senior figures of the old regime, was going into the Falluja deal with its "eyes wide open", aware of the risks of dealing with the relatively unknown Saleh, whose influence over — or links with — the insurgents are unclear.

Lawrence Di Rita said the Marines had had to end the siege or risk new challenges to U.S. authority and jeopardising plans to hand over to an interim Iraqi government in two months.

Marine commanders say they are playing the new arrangement in Falluja by ear and may return to the town. They say they will pursue insurgents and foreign militants and are still hunting the killers of four American security guards, images of whose mutilated bodies prompted the U.S. offensive a month ago.

Hammad Makhlas, returning to Falluja

with his wife and five children to find windows smashed and walls damaged at his home, said: "Praise God. The most important thing is that the town's dignity has been preserved with the defeat of the Americans.

Death toll rising

The world's only superpower turned to Saleh after failing to eliminate an estimated 2,000 guerrillas dug in among 300,000 civilians. President Bush's critics accuse him of wading into a Vietnam-style "quag-

The rising death toll is pressuring Bush in polls ahead of November's presidential election. April was the bloodiest month for U.S. troops in Iraq. A total of 129 were killed in action during the month - nearly a quarter of the combat death toll of 540 since U.S.-led forces invaded in March last

That toll includes two sailors assigned to the region around Falluja, whose deaths on Friday were reported on Saturday.



The bloodshed at Falluja has also not helped Washington win over Iraq's Sunni Muslim minority, long dominant under Saddam — doctors say 600 have died in the siege, enraging much of the "Sunni Triangle" of towns north and west of Baghdad.

And U.S. efforts to maintain the goodwill of those Iraqis who did welcome the overthrow of the Baathist state, such as the Shi'ite majority to the south, have been hampered by the scandal over the abuse of prisoners by military jailers.

The Arab world was outraged by photographs published this week showing U.S. troops abusing detainees in Saddam's once notorious Abu Ghraib prison. On Saturday, a London newspaper published images it said showed British troops, who control the Shi'ite south around Basra, abusing an Iraqi detainee.



Gunmen open fire in Saudi, U.S. victims reported

RIYADH, May 1 (Reuters) - Gunmen in Saudi Arabia opened fire on foreigners in an attack in the Red Sea port of Yanbu on Saturday and U.S. diplomats said Americans were reported among the vic-

Saudi Arabia said militants stormed a Saudi contractor's building in the city and an unknown number of foreigners and Saudis were killed, while security forces killed three of the attackers.

"At 7:00 a.m. (0400 GMT) on Saturday four men entered the headquarters of a Saudi contractor in Yanbu and fired at random on Saudis and foreigners," the Interior Ministry said in a statement.

"Security forces chased them and they took refuge in residential areas and hijacked some cars. Three of them were killed and a fourth was wounded. There were a number of deaths and injuries among Saudis and foreigners," it added. U.S. diplomats in Saudi Arabia said they

had received reports Westerners, including Americans, had been attacked in the industrial city of Yanbu and some were killed.

"We have reports of more than one death. Americans appear to be among the vica U.S. embassy spokeswoman in Riyadh said. "We are still Saudi Arabia has been battling a year-long wave of Islamist militancy, targeting mainly foreigners. More than 50 people have been killed in suicide bombings in the capital Riyadh, including an attack on a security building last month.

A hotel employee in Yanbu said a Westerner was killed in a five-star hotel in the city, adding he had no details.

"Somebody died, but we don't know their nationality yet," the hotel employee said by telephone.

U.S. and British diplomats said they were checking reports that a number of Western expatriates had been shot.

"We are looking into reports that Westerners have been killed or injured in a shooting," a British embassy spokesman



Koreas mark Labour Day after North's train blast

PYONGYANG, North Korea, May 1 (Reuters) - Koreans from the North and South jointly celebrated May Day on Saturday in the North's capital, but the occasion was overshadowed by memories of last month's deadly train blast near the China border.

About 300 South Koreans including labour union members — flew to the North on Friday to take part in Labour Day events held in the Pyongyang, where banners hanging on the street read "Celebrate May 1" and "Long live Patriot Leader Kim Jong-il."

At least 161 people were killed and 1,300 injured in the cata-





KCNA said last month the blast - caused by a collision between trains carrying fuel and ammonium nitrate and sparked by an electricity pylon — had the force of 100 one-tonne bombs and caused "horrible" damage across four km (2.5-mile) radius.

Kim Yong-nam, North Korea's number two leader and the President of the presidium of the Supreme People's Assembly, took part in the Pyongyang event.

The Koreas have been technically been at war since the Korean War ended in an armed REUTERS truce 50 years ago.

The US military has brought ple were hoping that the UN would charges against six soldiers on abuses carried out in November and December last year. Seven other soldiers have been suspended from their duties at the prison.

An army report, written by Major General Antonio Taguba in February and obtained by The New Yorker magazine, said that some Iraqi prisoners were subject to 'sadistic, blatant and wanton criminal abuses."

"These acts could not have come from the orders of the US government," said Nashwan Azzabeedi, a Yemeni financial manager. "It's probably just the individual soldiers themselves who did it."

But the credibility of the US war in Iraq may be deteriorating. The Bush Administration was in a precarious position when many countries around the world opposed the US attack on Iraq a little over a year ago. During occupation, Iraq has been unstable, and intense conflicts erupted last month when both Sunni and Shiite groups battled with US troops.

"There is a loss of credibility and confidence coming from these atrocities, and it makes the future of the Iraqis more uncertain," said Al-Qirbi. "This is at a time when peoplay a role in restoring order in Iraq and the formation of an Iraqi government, which would lead the country towards general elections. This has come at a very unfortunate time."

At a conference of local leaders in Sana'a on April 25, Yemeni President Ali Abdullah Saleh demanded the immediate withdrawal of US forces from Iraq. He said that Iraqi people were not living in freedom or democracy, they should choose their leaders and that the United States did not find weapons of mass destruction it had claimed as the reason for its invasion.

Since prisoners being abused has been broadcasted, many have been criticizing the United States for claiming that it brought liberty to Iraq. Some argue that even though Saddam Hussein was a brutal dictator, the crimes carried out by US soldiers are viewed very much the same.

"I believe that life is worse in Iraq than it was under Saddam," said a Yemeni businessman. "He was a dictator, but after him there has been nothing but fighting and killing. And now we see humiliation and torture. Life was better before the war began."

Chinese hit the road for holiday despite SARS

BEIJING, May 1 (Reuters) - A week of high-volume May Day holiday travel started in China on Saturday with tens of millions of people expected to hit the road despite confirmation of a sixth suspected patient as having the virus.

The latest outbreak has killed one person and infected at least five others. Three people suspected of having the potentially deadly disease were in hospital in Beijing.

Airports and train stations across the country installed thermal scanners to check passengers for fever, a telltale symptom of potentially deadly Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome.

The World Health Organisation, which has sent teams to China to investigate the outbreak in Beijing and the eastern province of Anhui, believes the latest cases may have come from two people who caught the virus in a SARS

More than 90 million people are expected to travel during the seven-day holiday starting on Saturday, pouring 35 billion yuan (\$4.23 billion) into tourism-related industries, China's National Tourism Administration has

An outbreak of SARS last year prompted the government to cancel the May Day holiday, one of the country's three annual "Golden Weeks" when businesses close and much of the country goes on holiday, giving the economy a shot of consumer spending.

That outbreak pounded the economy, especially service sectors such as tourism, in China and across much of

Well over 1,000 people have been isolated in connection with the latest outbreak.

The Health Ministry confirmed on Saturday that a centre for disease control and prevention researcher suspected of having SARS actually had the disease. No new cases were reported around China in the 24 hours to 10 a.m. (0200 GMT) on Saturday, though.

China came in for criticism last year for failing to report the outbreak, which began in the south of the country, when it first appeared but this time the World Health Organisation applauded China's efforts to cut the chain of transmission.

"We believe that at this point in time there is no significant public health threat from this outbreak of SARS," said Julie Hall, a SARS team leader with the WHO in China.

Nevertheless, several countries, fearful of a repeat of last year's SARS outbreak that was spread by travellers and killed nearly 800 people worldwide, quoted him as saying.




The WHO had not recommended additional measures for the government to take over the holiday, but Hall added: "It is too early to say that this is under control and the chain of transmission has been broken.'

Beijing's Communist Party boss Liu Qi inspected the city's centre for disease control and prevention's anti-SARS centres on Friday, saying it was a critical time in SARS prevention and the city could not let its guard down, the Beijing Daily reported.

The deputy director of Beijing's health bureau said he was confident the city would be safe.

"Beijing is now a safe enclave, where millions of local residents and tourists from both home and overseas will have a very joyous and safe holiday," Xinhua

Superpower on way

Learning from the EU

European Union (EU) is now definitely a step closer to becoming a superpower, even though one can argue that is far behind the USA in this

But by having 25 member countries and more than 400 million people, the EU is now the largest developed block in the world.

It was an extraordinary moment for me to witness the countdown and then the fireworks for May 1st in Brussels and in other European capitals for the joining of the 10 countries: the Czech Republic, Poland, Slovenia, Slovakia, Cyprus, Latvia, Lithuania, Hungary, Malta, and Estonia into

There was a sense of pride, hope, and optimism among most Europeans I met in Brussels and elsewhere.

This feeling was also somewhat driven by the actions of the current sole superpower, the USA. According to EU officials, this step is not in competition with the USA, but rather to enhance internal political and economic conditions and have a stronger position in the world.

However, the more important step is yet to be taken, and that is to approve and ratify the EU constitution, which could serve as a foundation for a truly unified Europe with one defense system and a single voice on international affairs.

"I hope that we will one day have one stance and bring to the attention of the world that we have a single voice that must be heard and respected," one European friend told me.

On the other hand, it is also saddening to see that Arab countries are still unable to agree on holding a summit despite the fact that they have so much more in common compared what Europeans have in common with each other. We have the same language, religion, values, and culture. We also enjoy various potentials, climates, natural resources, and a strategic location. But again, there is one thing that is missing: political will.

The EU enlargement has already started sparking a lot of questions among Arab citizens who feel betrayed by their eaders who have made the Arab world the weakest while i could have been the strongest union of its kind.

Why couldn't we make it?

Why didn't our regimes think about it?

Why weren't any steps taken since the collapse of the USSR to bring an end to divisions in the Arab world?

I was quite lucky indeed to personally witness the enlargement of EU in my visit to Brussels last week, but wished that our leaders would come and seen how Europeans succeeded to bring about such a major development despite all the odds, while we as Arab countries, were unable to hold a regular - and usually empty - annual summit that commonly witnesses insults and exchange of accu-

I believe that the more Arab citizens see such success in other countries and regions, the more infuriated and desperate they become.

But who is to blame? One can suggest that the blame is on the Arab regressive

But in my opinion, instead of blame and accusations, why

not start working for reforms, everyone in his own ways. We, as Yemen Times, have been quite active in promoting reform in freedoms, democracy, human rights, and enforcement of law. The government – at least in its highes levels - doesn't seem to mind our efforts, and sometimes is quite encouraged. This should be a driving force for us, as the civil society, to work hard to push for reforms that could rehabilitate our countries in an individual basis, and simulta-

neously work on harmonizing our relations as nations. If we have the will, we can so ... require commitment and a lot of effort, The Editor If we have the will, we can do it too. But it will surely

What if globalization failed?

The Open Road theory

rior to the September 11 attacks on the U.S., and after the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1990-1991, the world was restless towards new situations.

With the collapse of the world's equilibrium, the world held its breath and the philosophers of the new capitalism were emerging and mourning what was known as the "End of History."

But before they could receive condolences on the death of history, the world's silence was ruptured with the collapse of the twin towers and incidents of September 11, 2001.

The events, which turned the world upside down and the decision-makers formulated hastily political projects to coincide with size of those events. In reality, these projects were neither suitable for the new capitalism nor beneficiary of the humanitarian history.

The military preparation and the military might were diminishing before rising facts. There was no doubt that the end of history theory was nothing but a mere lie even to those propagating it before the September 11 incidents. Incidents, which provided a cover up for a comprehensive reaction considering the world is living in a state of world war.

The world is standing before a new historic era where the world is before open possibilities and not the end of the road. Each road possesses enough factors for victory and success to go ahead in this open road.

Measures following the collapse of the USSR that the new dominating world was afraid of new threats. Although it did not name or characterize them, this world evading the collapse not because of its immunity, but because of the absence of a competitor, remains governed by the theory meaning," the defeated is neither eliminated nor the triumphant is guaranteed survival.'

The so-called terrorism would not bear the imminent danger in spite of its assumed capabilities and potentials. The threats were in facing and opening new fronts before the world as choices before the peoples such as the occupation of Iraq, a member of the United Nations, especially following the tumbling of the pretexts behind the invasion, which make the world volatile before all possibilities.

After the collapse of the Soviet Union, many understandings at the victorious unipolar were mixed up. It became patently clear that there are deep contradictions between what the liberal world were calling for and what the policies of big industrial countries were in one hand.

On the other hand, there were also contradictions between policy makers in the industrial countries and the will and desire of their peoples, in spite of the inability of pretexts to withstand the big

Thus arising the need for dominance and the necessity for resistant, and from the principle of subjugation to the hold-

ing of identity of civilization generally controlled by religious convictions.

The solution was not in the coup against the world liberal heritage, which has won the historic battle in the previous period and it did lie in backing off from liberties for security reasons or to demand of the people concessions from the level of prosperity they have reached. But the solution lies in strengthening the liberalism heritage, which has become the possession of whole humanity, in enhancing all public freedoms without being selective and in expanding the bases of liberalism and spreading welfare and luxury to reach every human.

Liberalism

And for liberalism to benefit of criticism directed at it during its new formation just like it had benefited of criticism in the past, particularly from Karl Marx in, order to reform the existing inefficiency unlike socialism which denied the existence of inefficiency which ended up in its demise, the most effective measures are to work to halt the contradictions taking place in some industrial countries represented by the flagrant conflict between the world's liberalization heritage and the political reactions of some of these industrial countries.

The peaceful measures do not stand at the ones followed since the period of missile shield, expanding NATO eastward and dividing the world into good and evil axes. Sufficing defining terrorism and limiting it to Islamic terrorism is clearly going back to the direct colonization of sovereign countries and members of the United Nations under weak pretexts, which are not based on facts.

The most effective measures are in halting the contradictions by some industrial countries in the form of conflicts between their political policies and the world's liberalism behavior. Examples of such are the setbacks in political, social, economic and humanitarian freedoms in general because of the obsessions of security reasons.

The introducing of a new secretary of state in the US Government, Secretary of Internal Security after more than two hundred years since the foundation of the USA. The scope of work of this ministry would not be limited to curtailing the activities of terrorists as much as it would include in the future powers with political opinions different from those in the administration.

Where its principle would become, "Don't let him work, don't let him pass", and others. Which would reflect the view of the peoples of earth towards "the American Dream" if this policy continues the American dream would become less attractive and more hostile to the USA in

This in turn makes the world stands before an open road for all possibilities.

after that, generated a new era in the human history concerning general freedoms, not in the third world countries alone but in the so-called the free world. The most important element of the open road theory is opening the way for discussion of a number of issues, which require reconsideration.

What if globalization failed?

The open road theory is primarily based on the question, "How would the world be if the directions and understandings of globalization failed?"

We will try to focus on the most choices opened which excites the fear the USA and its allies, whether they have revealed or disguised them. Where the US based on them is seeking to build an international coalition on the obvious pretext of fighting terrorism based on the principle of George Bush, "If you are not with us, you are against us."

Certainly there are real concerns, but as a duty, we have to put forth questions about these fears and what the reality of these fears are? Currently, the focus is merely on Islam and whether if it represents a real threat on capitalism or not.

Muslims now live in a period of austerity requiring genuine efforts to comprehend the current and future nearing situations of red lines set one hundred years ago. Does the collapse of the Soviet Union as a world communist regime represent an era that is gone in the history of mankind? Or is there a possibility for a comeback in any form?

And are there any real contradictions between Islam and capitalism in terms of possession, which is the core of the problem? Islam accepts the principle of possession and capitalism.

It is known that there was a coalition between the Arabs and US during the USSR invasion of Afghanistan. Could Islam become the new ally to the capitalist strategy upon the appearance of real conflicts of the existing capitalism sys-

Instead of being on the opposite end, facing dangers, which could reach the direct colonization such as in the case of Iran, Afghanistan and may be Iran and Syria in the future.

What can Muslims do?

Could the Muslims lay down a basis, based on Koran in dealing with others? Could they overcome the problems, which occurred during the Islamic history, which were obstacles for advancement and renaissance? Could the Muslims reach a mechanism to choose their leaders and determining the jurisdictions and the tenure?

Many questions remain to be answered and only the future will be able to cast some light on them.

From Al-Khiyam to Al-Ghreib prisons

Now, the "screw-all" axis is here

ot that the current Bush Administration and the Likudnik-Cheney Zionist crowd has shown any grain of salt's worth of credibility. But the recent disclosure of the absolutely atrocious inexcusable gross treatment of Iraqi prisoners clearly shed more light on the mischief and intentional evil that overshadow the whole American misadventure in Iraq.

The samplings of the "coalition" atrocities that have finally entered public domain are surely not the whole story. Even the British could not help but also follow the footpaths of their allies in the "liberating coalition" and so they came out with a few tortures of

Is this really how the Bushies intend to "win the hearts and minds of the Iraqis"? The White House and the American Military Command believe they can shrug off the whole affair by simply passing the buck to the "contractors" hired by the Americans to "help America's intelligence community collect, analyze and share global information in the war on terrorism" (as CACI, one of the two contractors said to oversee the "interrogations" in Abu Ghreib prisor says in its website).

Please, give us a break! They are really adding more insult to injury to the shocked observers' perceptions of the notorious evil crimes against humanity vividly displayed by the proud American and British "liberators" of the Iraqi people. They have the nerve to want to try Saddam Hussein or any other despot, when they have in fact and in deed surpassed all the evil crimes that any tyrant has wantonly relied on to suppress his people.

One can be sure that the gross misconduct in Abu Ghreib is not the exception but the rule in all "coalition" prison camps in Iraq, and this calls for an independent international investigation, with a view towards bringing the culprits and their masters in the Pentagon and Whitehall to justice in the International War Crimes Tribunal.

In retrospect, one is inclined to recall the hideous prison records of Al-Khiyam Prison in Southern Lebanon, which was "contracted" to Lebanese War Lord Emile Lahd and his thugs, but designed and managed by the Israeli Defense Forces. Yet, to this date the world has yet to see the perpetrators of the gross tortures inflicted against Lebanese innocent people picked up at random, or for their possible resistance against an illegal occupation.

In fact, the White House insists on preventing the international community from bringing any Israeli violators of human rights to justice. Ask Belgium, why haven't they completed the prosecution of Ariel Sharon for his crimes against the Palestinians in Sabra and Shatilla refugee camps? Israel continues to run several prison camps of the Abu Ghreib caliber and continuously tortures the Palestinian prisoners picked up at will by the IDF from the larger prison that makes up the West Bank and Gaza.

It appears now that the White House has not only decided to adopt the Zionist agenda for the Middle East, but also to follow and even surpass the Zionist Likudnik approach in running the illegitimate prisons it maintains in Iraq and wherever, it intends to establish prison camps in the Middle East as it continues to carry out its "war of liberation".

Time and again, this observer and many other international and American commentators have indicated that emulating Zionist methodology and adopting the Zionist mentality could never be a passport to success in the formulation and implementation of policy in the management of public affairs, domestically and in the international arena. In fact, it only underscores the inescapable fact that the Bush Administration's insistence that America imitates Israel in just about everything will expose American interests to severe risks and certainly jeopardize American security (aptly to be called "scre wity" from now on) rather than enhance it.

Former ambassador complains of injustice

bdulrab Alwan Al-Masanne, following his long suffering, recently sent a bitter and complaining letter to First Undersecretary of Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Mr. Mohe Aldeen Al-Dhabi.

The former ambassador said he was forced to retire, without any rights.

He appealed for justice he has encountered in the diminution of status of his job position he has gained during decades of work in the diplomatic

He complained of the mental, financial and material damages from the treatment with injustice towards his earned rights

He stated in his letter, "The virtuous decrepitude laws did not embrace me or gave me a sense of belonging to this country, nor the exceptions and the omnipotence violations hosted me for at least once in a life time.

In order to compensate for my feelings of desolation and nostalgia during the expatriation from my country. There is nothing worse for one to feel than the feeling of subjugation and injustice by those closest to you."

He added that he would not dispute the legality of the measures of Ministry of Foreign Affairs to terminate his services to the country, similarly to his colleagues, but he would dispute the discriminatory treatment and handling of his situation.

Al-Masanne concluded his letter by accusing the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of discriminatory treatment of staff, and the distribution of promotions and remuneration conducted selectively, imprecisely and not transparently.

He demanded organizations concerned with human rights to find a shelter for him and his family to spend what remains of the rest of his life. considering him what he calls "a human who has found in his country nothing but humiliation, injustice and ignominy."

Both private and public sector need help

Jobs as precious as ever




ultiple variables and many syllabuses have been created by the policy of economic and financial reforms since 1995 that have impacted rates of growth and affected the labour market in Yemen.

On this occasion of the World May Day we would like to link the population growth rate in our country, estimated at 3.7%, to indicators of a rise in the numbers of workforce in the market, and its reflection on available job opportunities, as well as what must be done to reduce unemployment.

The government has tried to tackle the structural disorders in the economy in record time, and has implemented a program for economic and financial reform with the aim of enhancing trust in our gross national economy, attracting investments, increasing the gross national product, reducing debt, taking measures for halting fluctuations of exchange prices and reducing inflation to less than 10%.

But the efforts to help the industrial and agricultural sector remain weak and that has hurt the labour market. There is a shortage in training and qualification of work forces, despite the fact that the government has raised the ceiling of its investment expenditures and finished projects characterized by intensive labour.

What has increased unemployment is the retreat of both public and private sectors in providing job opportunities. That situation has created a real problem in the growing of the labour market, and that has led to spread of new cases of poor groups in the society and each individual, according to field studies; become bearing the

living costs of a medium of four members out of economic sustenance, in addition to spending on himself.

The government has not stood with its hand folded before on this situation. It has launched the social safety net, supported funds of social development and care and adopted projects to fight poverty and developing small industries.

It has also supported the fund for fish and agricultural encouragement and smaller lending program and other measures aimed at alleviation of unemployment and finding opportunities for those capable of work in the market.

By considering deeply the policy of economic and financial reforms we should judge through it what the government has traversed of distances in the social area and treatment of labour market

Indicators show that reforms were concentrated on founding solutions to structural defects while available work opportunities remained low, especially that the efforts exerted for improving the conditions of the unemployed were confined to partial solutions and short-term and temporal programs.

On the occasion of the World Labour Day we can talk with transparency about requirements of the labour market where there are squandered human resources. There a need for speeding up the rate of economic and financial reforms to stop the chronic deficit in the state's general budget and appropriation of part of it for expansion in the process of training and qualification of the workforces, as well as working for activating investment and pushing the private sector to adopt intensive work strategic projects.

If there are qualified and trained work forces in various areas and there are strategic projects the labour market would get flourished and we would be able to market and export Yemeni labour to neighborly markets in a regular and studied way founded on specialization and responding to demand for local and external job opportunities.


We would point out that there is anoth-

er problem at the labour market represented in the increase in number of groups graduated from government and private universities. They are waiting employment opportunities. These are in need for strategic plans for accommodating them at the public and private sectors according to their specialties.

The whole question requires preparation of surveying study to know their volume and need for them in different areas.

No doubt the government's programs and plans have accommodated many groups of unemployed and provided tens of thousands of opportunities for the labour market forces, but the increase in the rates of population growth and outputs of university education require exertion of more efforts to improve conditions of workers, as they are the builders of the homeland and represent leaders of the active movement in the society.

The attention paid to them should not be confined to an honoring just ceremony, but it must find comprehensive solutions to their problems.

Mapping Yemenis abroad

he Statistics Central Apparatus in Yemen is preparing for the implementation of the census of population, houses and installations next December to obtain accurate statements about demographic changes, internal and external migration and the volume of population density in the countryside and the towns compared to requirements of services and development projects.

Moreover, one of the more important things in the census is to get acquainted with the density of the Yemenis spread out in expatriation, and the places where they are living, as well the relationship of the expatiates with what is mentioned in the map of investment inside the homeland.

The Minister of Expatriate Affairs Abdeh Ali Qubati affirms the census is reaching accurate statistics and correct definite statements. The census will give records in various areas of the republic in order also to define rates of migration, kinds of expatriates and their professions, qualification, skills and their social and economic circumstances.

The census represents a major pillar in developing the field work for serving the expatriates and to reach at a proper framework on requirements of the homeland's sons in the expatriation areas, as well as effecting balance between what the country needs and aspirations of the expatriates in addition to what the expatiate hopes of services to offer to the homeland.

The government wants from the census to draw up a map of accurate data on expatriates installations and to obtain modern statistics on characteristics of the population in order to keep pace with developments and changes achieved by modern technology necessary for developmental construction.

The Ministry of Expatriates believes that the coming census would contribute to pushing forward the wheel of expatriates investments and accommodate their projects within sustainable development.

Accurate and proper figures would help he expatriates benefit from them and positive contribution to ongoing economic changes in the country.


In conclusion, the presence of military forces and the statements of officials imply that the citizens of Sarwah are aggressive and evils. They should have been living like this at the 13th century.

At the end, His Excellency gave away the prizes to the winners.



Email service verses regular mail srvice

rom time to time, someone comes to me, asking, "What is your E-mail number?" The correct question must be, "What is your E-mail address?"

Most people are used to addressing mail by numbers, or maybe it is the problem of phone numbers. You want to contact someone; you will first think of a number to dial.

Conventional writing in general is more cost effective and more practical than making phone calls. It always requires days for a letter to reach another part of a country or to another country via the postal service. Although it provides the opportunity to rewrite a letter over and over again, and to look back into and think over about what has been written, it requires clarity and a direct approach in order to convey the point or the objective or the intended purpose of the letter. Otherwise, it would take a lot of time during the exchanges of posted letters and/or packages from one region to another and from one country to another to reach a mutual understanding and agreement. This is a very slow-pace and an ineffective mechanism to be adopted as a viable mean of communication, especially in the rapidly changing competitive business markets of the world today. However, even in many instances nowadays, using paper work as a method for correspondences and contacts on a large scale would be ineffective, time-consuming and unpractical. Also, making telephones calls for conveying ideas and decisions could not be considered a wise alternative for the above-mentioned purpose. Sometimes, stating an unintentional statement could prove to be very regrettable or of nega-



tive consequences, if it was taken out of context. One could only wish that it were not stated, but nobody could retrieve or go back in time to change it.

Traditional writings are not meant to be expressive since they do not provide an immediate chance to express one's emotions for example

There are many reasons for considering emails more efficient, effective, practical, faster and less expensive, with the capability to send and receive email messages from anywhere to anywhere. Email messages can include pre-set expressions using emoticons (facial expressions) like the :) to express happiness and satisfaction, :D to express laughter, : (to express sadness, and lots more. Emails' recipients have the chance to ask for clarifications through replying back and fourth briskly with email messages or letters' delivery service. Emails can be dispatched at the desirable time. They can be sent anytime without having to worry about mail service working hours and buying envelopes and stamps.

Emails are more efficient for internal correspondences within the same company. Some companies that depend on paper work have to invest a great amount of time and efforts to have or search for a mechanism to archive all internal papers in order to obtain final reports and financial closing statements for evaluations. Another example is a company with affiliated branches over the country, or even with branches abroad. Sustaining and conducting regular follow up contacts through long-distance or

overseas telephone calls would definitely generate huge monthly telephones bills. The most cost effective mechanism, fastest, the most practical method and the easiest answer I would say is Email. All that is needed is to have an Email account, and an E-mail address for the person you want to contact.

So, what is E-mail anyway?

E-mail, or electronic mail, is an electronically transmitted message over computer networks like the Internet. It is a message sent from one computer and received by another one. E-mail is one of the most popular services running on the Internet nowadays.

E-mail service is like the normal postal service, a letter is to be sent from someone, and will have to stop at different postal stations until it reaches the final destination, almost instantaneously.

Think of the postal stations as mail servers, when the letter "email" reaches the final postal station "mail server" it is stored in a mailbox "electronic mailbox". But as I said before, emails are faster and this will only take seconds.

Attachments could be included within emails, like pictures, documents, or even applications. Think of attachments as packages also.

Packages or mails are being checked at the postal stations for the security and safety of recipients. And nowadays it is the same with emails. With emails, some mail servers check of viruses or application that might cause harm to the recipient's computer or files.

How to send and receive E-mails

Sending posted letters consumes time in writing them down manually through any available means, including the tedious process from licking and sticking postal stamps on addressed envelopes and the physical presence at the postal mail service. With emails, after typing them with the keyboard, the message would be sent through an email program. With the email program, you

address the mail to the recipient by filling the <To:> field and finally just press the send button.

After that comes the mail transport stage, where the letter "Email" goes from one postal station "mail server" to another, till it reaches the nearest postal station "mail server" for the recipient to pick it up.

When an email moves from the sender mail application to recipient's computer, it flows across various TCP/IP "a family of protocols used for computer communications" protocols.

The standard protocol for sending emails is SMTP "Simple Mail Transfer Protocol", which is the TCP/IP protocol that transfers email messages among computers on the Internet. When an email is sent, it is to be routed to a SMTP server. Mail servers use SMTP to communicate. Simply SMTP defines how messages move from one mail server or computer to another.

SMTP can only transfer ASCII text messages. But we are able to send attachments and graphics along with an email. Here comes the turn of MIME, which enabled senders to enhance the body of an email messages.

MIME "Multipurpose Internet Mail Extensions" is an addition to SMTP. It encodes the other features like attachments; sounds, pictures, and applications into a text-only representation that SMTP can transfer.

Sender mail application should be a MIME-compliant for the sender to send mails with an enhanced feature like attachments. Also, the destination needs a MIME-complaint mail application in order to decode the added features. Without the support of MIME, the recipient would not be able to view the attachments or pictures.

To receive a letter you should have an address, or a mailbox "account on a mail server". In this mailbox you receive your letters. You will have to connect to the mail server and download your mails because emails can only arrive at a com-

ret that is connected to the Internet.

puter that is connected to the Internet. This computer is the mail server, which can understand SMTP. If this mail server was not continuously connected, it may miss email deliveries from the network "Internet".

Your computer is not continuously connected to the Internet, which is why you will need an account on a mail server that is connected all the time.

The question is, "How do you check your emails, and download them to your computer?".

Here comes the turn of two other protocols, POP3, and IMAP4.

POP3 "Post Office Protocol version 3", a protocol that has been designed to let computer users connect to the POP3 mail server and download their emails. POP3 downloads all new emails in one operation. To connect your computer to the POP3 mail server, your mail program must understand the POP3 proto-

IMAP4 "Internet Message Access Protocol version 4", is another protocol like the POP3, but with more features than POP3. IMAP4 enables you to view your email subjects before downloading them, and choose which emails to download.

Some mail servers provide a web interface "web-based mail servers", where you can access your emails, and also send emails through that interface. In this case you can access your emails from anywhere, and no need for a computer with a POP3 or IMAP4 client configured. Examples of such mail servers with a web interfaces are yahoo.com and hotmail.com

Web-based mail servers enable you to access your mail via a web browser.

So, if your mail server does not support a web interface, you will need an

email application or client that understands IMAP4 to communicate with an IMAP4 server, or a client that understands POP3 to communicate with a POP3 server. And in both cases the client should understand SMTP to send emails.


E-mail Application "Agent"

An E-mail application, or what is called a Mail User Agent "MUA", is the application that accesses your mailbox on the mail server, and enables you to read your incoming emails, and send new emails.

When you send a new email, your MUA routes the email to a SMTP server. The server looks at the email address "TO, CC, and BCC fields" and forwards it to the recipients' mail server.

TO, CC, and BCC fields contain the recipients' addresses similar to the mailing address on an envelope. The regular posted letter could only be sent to a single recipient, but with email you can send it TO "To" multiple recipients, and also make a CC "Carbon Copy" of it to other recipients. And moreover you can also send a BCC "Blind Carbon Copy" to another group of recipients.

A tip worth mentioning is that if there is a time you want to send a mail to a large group of friends, don't just paste all email addresses into the To or CC fields. Do it with the BCC field. The reason for this is that the email you will send may go though a circulation process from one of your friends to another group, which will lead to exposing the others' email addresses to someone who may misuse them. In other words, your fiends or maybe even you may find a lot of unwanted emails landing in your mailbox from unknown addresses, making your mailbox full and unable to receive new mails.







Germans help uncover its past

Sarwah City's secrets unveiled

arwah City was the first capital and major commercial city of Sheba Kingdom because of the strategic importance of the region and the strategic fortified geographical location.

They erected their palaces where the ruins are reminiscent of the magnificent civilization that had once flourished in it.

Sarwah of Sheba is located at the heart of the province of today's Sarwah City, about 50km west of Marib.

It is surrounded by a series of mountains from all directions, leaving only three primary exits to the city.

From the northern eastern and western

The German excavating team headed by Dr. Aris Jerlikh has unveiled and discovered startling discoveries in the city.

The city's eastern exist is toward "Dhenah" valley, and the northern exit, commonly used by Sheba people, is toward Al-Makhdarah and Habab Valley exist from the Western side.

The inhabitants of the city, nearly 20,000, belong to "Jahm" tribe, one of the primary army-affiliated military checkpoint, one could see tens of tanks and armored vehicles scattered on the sides of the road.

The city embraces the famous "Al-Magah" temple in addition to many other temples in the city.

The German expert confirms the role of artificial irrigation system in the resurrected thriving life in Sarwah city, through the centuries, where the city continued to play its role even after the crack of Marib dam.

She said that the study conducted on the city confirmed the importance of artificial irrigation system in sustaining life in the city through the construction and building of dams.

for the flourishing of trade because it is situated at the intersection of important roads network.

The city is connected to a marble mine, the most important in Yemen, where some engraved pieces dating back to Sheba era were found inside it. This confirms that this mine was part of the commercial activities

Some of the findings in the city came as a result of demolishing some homes built in the vicinity of the temple of Al-Magah since 200 years ago. The construction of temple is dated back to the mid-17 century BC.

The excavation has unraveled some of

are all over the temple talking about his military conquests, construction activities and

his forays to some parts of Yemen. The German excavation team has also discovered a tomb inside the city of Sarwah, which is similar in characteristic to the tombs found in "Awam" cemetery in

The German team believes this tomb is only part of a massive cemetery and only the future excavation will determine that.

The German team said that the excavation at the site of Sarwah Palace adjacent to Al-Magah temple, is dated back to the 2nd century BC.

Dr. Aris Jerlikh, Director of the German Institute and the head of the German team expressed her belief that this palace remained occupied until the 3rd centruy AD, but regrettably, part of this palace does not exist it anymore because of the plundering of its rocks in the past.

But she pointed out that there are fences built of the same rocks in the surrounding region of Sarwah city, in addition to signs connected to rituals of hunting ibex, a hunting sport practiced by kings of Sheba in the Continued on page 11
